Jr. of Denton. Senate Bill No. 7 is a companion measure. Under provisions of the bills, the Rural Electrification Administration would be permitted to continue to operate in areas it now serves after they are annexd into a city-if the municipal govern-

ment desires. Private power users in the affected cities also could change over to the REA, if they desired. And they would be foolish not to, if given the opportunity, since for various reasons the REA can furnish electricity at a cheaper rate.

-- jbu--Please don't misintetrpret our feelings toward the REA. Cooperatives have served their purpose well, since the REA was

formed back in the 1930s. And they are still functioning as intended by Franklin Delano Roosevelt. But passage of such legislation as House Bill No. 2 would put the REA in direct competition with private enterprise. This we don't like at all. We know what it's like, competing as we are against the government in the printing business.

-ibu-The lives of thousands of rural families have been made more comfortable and enjoyable by REA, and thousands more can reap the

same benefits That is the whole purpose of the agency, and we're all for it. However, we feel, too, that when the need for the REA ceases to exist in certain areas, the governmentbacked power administration should fade from the scene.

SMILES ARE CONTAGIOUS!

In every human body there are millions of various muscles; some are voluntary, others involuntary. Many of them are working constantly, others occasionally, while some are rarely utilized.

The movement of the majority muscles requires very little effort. An example of this is the muscles around the mouth. These are tiny organisms that are about the easiest muscles to work.

However, for a rare few people it is a job to move these muscles into a pleasant position. For others, it comes naturally, almost involuntarily. simple changing of the facial expression that involves a brightening of the eyes and an upward curving of the corners of the mouth results in a most pleasing appearance, commonly known as smiling.

With one exception, unless a person happens to be suffering from myositis, there is no excuse for not smiling. Myositis is a simple inflammation of the voluntary muscles, which results in stiffness of the muscles.

Few people have myositis, so that it is not a very concrete excuse either. When a person comes right down to it, there is no reason not to smile; even if it is just occasionally.

Whether smiling or laughing there is one major thing to remember—mainly that they should be natural, not put-on. If you are one of those unfortunate persons who never smiles, don't feel you have to fake a smile or laugh falsely just to be accepted in a group. This is the only exception to the smiling rule; ordinarly it's best not to smile in such a case.

Another good thing about smiles is that they are highly contagious. It's a fact! Just experiment sometime and see for yourself that when smiled at a person automatically returns the smile.

Now any time you feel amusement, pleasure, tender affection, approval, irony, etc., try a simple, but warm and natural, s-m-i-l-e.



Changeable Weather Is McLean's Menu

Winter and spring-like weather continued to alternate in McLean this week- and it was anybody's guess as to this area's menu in the days ahead.






