Tigers Will Host Wheeler Friday; Opener Goes to Shamrock, 36-8

McLean's young Tigers, jarred 36-8 in their season-opening engagement at Shamrock last week, will attempt to hit the victory trail as they host the Wheeler Mustangs here Friday.

Coach Clifford Bradshaw's Bengals will go into Friday's tussle with a slight weight advantage—a situation different from the one they faced in their game with the Irishmen.

The McLean starting eleven this week will boast an average of 159

pounds per man, compared with Wheeler's 157.

The visitors' line will be heavier, averaging 163 1/2 to McLean's 159, but the locals' backfield will be larger—161 to 145.

Coach Bradshaw announced some changes in the McLean lineup for the Wheeler game. The Tigers will take to the field looking like this: Joel Meacham, 180, left end; Phillip Flowers, 160, left tackle; Clyde Windom, 160, left guard; John Evans, 150, center; John Pettit, 140, right guard; Bob Patton, 180, right tackle; Ricky Banks, 143, right end; Donnie Woods, 150, quarterback; Jim Watson, 170, left halfback; Tommy Herron, 170, right halfback; and James Farris, 155, fullback.

Straight-T Formation
The Wheeler club, which will operate from the straight-T against McLean's slot wing-T, is scheduled to line up in this manner:

Kenneth McCasland, 150, left end; Bob Riley, 180, left tackle; Leon Watson, 170, left guard; Ronnie Smith, 145, center; Larry Levitt, 160, right guard; Troyce Hunter, 170, right tackle; Wayne Hill, 170, right end; Bill Green, 110, quarterback; Jim Jolly, 165, left halfback; G. C. Baker, 155, right halfback; and David Tremble, 160, fullback.

Wheeler also will be looking for its first victory of the young football season. The Mustangs were stopped 36-16 in last week's opener.

Forecasts Improvement
Bradshaw blamed fumbles and the fact that "it took us too long to get started" for last Friday's loss to Shamrock.

He believes, however, the Tigers will show rapid improvement as the season progresses.

Watson scored McLean's lone touchdown in the Shamrock game with just eight minutes remaining on the clock.

The young back had carried deep into Shamrock territory to set up the drive to paydirt. He smashed to the three-yard line from the 21, then scooted across on the next play for the score.

20-0 in First Quarter
Banks passed to Herron for the two extra points.

Shamrock, defeated by a big margin by the Tigers in 1959, started to work early to roll up a 20-0 lead in the first quarter.

LOCAL WOMAN IS INJURED AS AUTOS CRASH

A two-car crash at a McLean street intersection early Wednesday sent one local woman to the hospital, but the extent of her injuries had not been learned later in the day.

Mrs. Quannah O. Rice was rushed to the local hospital for treatment after her 1955 Ford and a 1958 Pontiac driven by Mrs. Leroy Williams, also of McLean, collided in the intersection of Gray and Fourth Streets.

Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker, the investigating officer, said later Wednesday that he had not learned how badly Mrs. Rice was hurt.

Mrs. Williams was shaken up in the accident, but she apparently was not seriously injured.

Cars Heavily Damaged

Parker said Mrs. Williams was traveling north and Mrs. Rice west at the uncontrolled intersection when the mishap occurred at 7:55 a. m. Wednesday.

Both cars were heavily damaged. Two other accidents were investigated by Parker during the past week but all occupants of the vehicles escaped serious injury.

On Tuesday, a 1957 Ford driven by Sidney O. Satton of Claude ran out of control after the right rear tire blew out 9 mile east of McLean on U. S. 66.

Crosses Highway

Parker said the vehicle, traveling east, ran off the right side of the highway, knocking down a sign, then swerved back across both two-lane portions of U. S. 66 before coming to rest in a bar ditch near the Derby Drive-in theater.

The car was moderately damaged. Two out-of-state cars collided 2.8 miles west of the city on U. S. 66 last Saturday, causing considerable damage to both vehicles.

Starts to Turn Around

Parker said the accident occurred when Allen William Hauck of Detroit, Mich., driving a 1958 Edsel which was pulling a trailer, started to turn around and return to McLean after passing through the city.

A 1956 Dodge driven by Henry Harold Green of Tucson, Ariz., and approaching from the rear, struck Hauck's car as it attempted to turn.

Parker expressed his appreciation to persons of this area for their safe driving during the Labor Day holiday period.

Testing Scheduled On City Gas Wells

The city commission Tuesday night ordered tests on the City of McLean and the Biegel gas wells to determine their capabilities before the heavy fuel consumption period arrives.

Aldermen took the action after hearing a report from Ray Jordan of the Thurmond-McGlothlin testing firm in Pampa.

Requests Are Being Taken For Low-Rent Units

Applications from persons desiring to move into the new low-rent housing units are now being taken at the city hall, it was announced this week.

The 12 units, located in north-east McLean, are expected to be completed early in October.

Containing one, two and three-bedroom units, the six duplex structures are being built by Barker Construction Co. of Quanah. Contract price of the project is \$116,800.

Work began last May.

Income Determines Rent

Only low-income families will be permitted to occupy the brick dwellings. Rent will be determined by the income of the families.

The McLean Housing Authority will be in charge of the project, which is being paid for by the federal government. Under the program, the houses will become the property of the city of McLean in 40 years.

A stove and refrigerator are furnished in each dwelling unit, and the rent includes a "reasonable" amount for utilities.

Leases Renewable
Leases on the units will be automatically renewed for successive terms of one month each at the regular rental rate.

Rent will be due on the first day of each calendar month, and the lease may be terminated by the tenant giving the management 15 days prior notice in writing.

Each tenant's status will be subject to re-examination at least once each year, and any change in rent as a result of this is to be made in accordance with the then current schedule of rents established by the management.

Reserve Seat Ducat Sale to End Friday

Friday will be the final day in the sale of season football tickets, McLean School Supt. Lee Welch reminded fans today.

The tickets and a diagram showing the location of reserve seats are available at Brown's Rexall Drug Store.

Welch advised interested persons to purchase the tickets before 7 p. m. Friday.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE OPENS; FEE IS \$25

R. D. (Sonny) Back was elected president of the McLean Lions Golf Association at a formal organizational meeting Wednesday morning.

Vice presidents of the new association, which will operate the recently re-opened McLean golf course on SH 273 just northwest of the city, are Don Blair and Sammy Haynes.

Elected secretary-treasurer was T. Elmo Whaley; H. V. (Pete) Rice was named director of maintenance; Joe Burroughs, tournament chairman, and John Haynes, membership chairman.

The officers will serve for one-year terms.

\$2.50 Monthly Dues

John Haynes announced today that the membership drive is underway.

The initial membership fee will be \$25, with monthly dues set at \$2.50. However, Haynes said persons who wish may pay the membership fee at \$2.25 per month for a year.

The membership fee will be paid only one time.

Non-member green fees will be 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. A sealed box will be placed at the No. 1 tee for paying green fees.

Improvements Ahead

Money from the fees and dues will be used to pay for golf course improvements.

The nine-hole sand-green course, which had not been in use for several years, was re-opened only recently as a Lions Club project.

However, memberships will be sold to all interested persons, whether or not they are members of the Lions Club.

Burroughs announced that preparations will be made soon for a city-wide golf tournament.

Funeral services were held under the direction of Richerson-Lamb Funeral Home Tuesday in the McLean First Methodist Church, with Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery.

Saye, who retired from ranching in 1958, had been in ill health for some time. He had moved to Albuquerque about six weeks ago from Wibaux, Mont., for his health.

He moved from McLean to Clayton, N. M., in 1940 and later to Wibaux.

Saye was born on Nov. 29, 1894, in Breckenridge and was married July 26, 1910, in Hill, Tex., to Miss Ruth Bailey.

Noah's School Really Up-to-Date

While it's located far across Texas, a fabulous new school nevertheless should receive more than just passing interest from the people of McLean.

The \$975,000 worth of fine structures of the Tuloso-Midway school system in the Corpus Christi area are under the direct supervision of Noah Cunningham, son of Mrs. R. O. Cunningham of McLean.

Cunningham, a 1929 graduate of McLean High School, has been superintendent of Tuloso-Midway High School for the past four years. The new buildings opened their doors to students for the first time Monday, Aug. 28.

The 40-unit, modern structure of red Elgin brick was constructed following the passage two years ago of a \$975,000 bond issue.

Corpus Christi architects custom designed the plant to fit the specific needs of Tuloso-Midway. A "use" study of the various school departments was conducted by the architects before they started work at the drawing boards.

The new plant is on a 15-acre tract just off Highway 9. The outside appearance presents a one-story plan developed around courtyards and paths, except for one two-story classroom unit. The administrative office is ma-

hogany paneled and provides a mail section for the faculty and teachers' daily register desk. The entire school is wired for FM radio with soft background music played in the lounges.

A new gym included in the long structure will accommodate 1,200. The floor is maple over rubber skids for flexibility and has glass backboards. It provides two practice courts and one college-size game court.

The 1,078-seat air-conditioned auditorium is dome-like in appearance. The extra-wide stage will accommodate a 20-piece band. (See SCHOOL, Page 5)

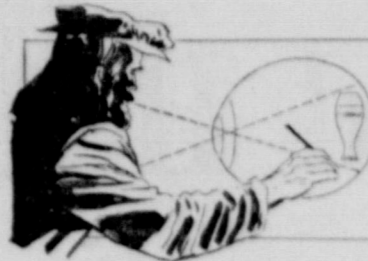
