Undefeated White Deer To Invade McLean on Friday

BENGALS FALL TO GROOM IN LATEST BOUT

Shocked last week by Groom, 28-6, the McLean Tigers return to home territory Friday night to face the tough White Deer Bucks in an 8 o'clock appointment at Duncan Field.

The stampeding Bucks, riding along on a three-game winning streak, are expected to be among the toughest foes the Tigers will face in 1960.

McLean apparently will go into the fray without the services of two regular starters. Coach Clifford Bradshaw said that Backs Tommy Herron and James Farris had quit the squad.

Woods at Halfback

Donnie Woods, 150-pounder, will be moved to right half in place of Herron, with Jim McCarty taking over the quarterbacking chores.

Clyde Windom, 160 pounds, will be at fullback, and Jim Watson, 170, at left half to complete the backfield.

No changes were reported in the regular starting line.

White Deer will come to McLean fresh from a runaway, 36-6, triumph last week over Lefors.

The Bucks—tough on defense as well as offense—opened the season by tromping Groom, 42-6, then blanked Canadian, 14-0.

Second Defeat

Last Friday's loss to Groom was the second defeat of the year for McLean. The Tigers were dumped, 36-8, by Shamrock in the curtain-raiser, but then came back to slap Wheeler, 13-0, a week later.

Quarterback Dickie Hanna and Fullback Thomas Lester paved the way for White Deer's win over Lefors last week. Hanna's passing and Lester's running were too much for the Lefors Pirates to overcome.

Fumbles and penalties took their toll in the McLean-Groom contest a week ago.

It was a McLean fumble on the McLean seven-yard line that set up the Groom Tigers' first score shortly after the opening kickoff. Kit Littlefield scooted across from two yards out moments later, then Eldred James took a pass for the two-point conversion.

Eldred James took a pass late in the second period and galloped some 15 yards for Groom's next score. Leroy Littlefield ran across the extra points, and the hosts led, 16-0.

Leroy Littlefield added another six-pointer in the third quarter before McLean was able to score. He did it on a 13-yard run. But this time the conversion attempt failed.

Fullback Clyde Windom provided McLean fans with the brightest moment of the entire night.

The 160-pound junior galloped 30 yards for the Bengals' lone touchdown.

Johnny London completed the scoring on a five-yard run for Groom.

McLean Youth Hurt In Gun Accident

Robert Norman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merle Norman of McLean, was admitted to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Monday after an accidental shooting.

The 15-year-old youth was struck on the little finger of his left hand by a bullet while firing a gun.

Saunders' Angus Cattle Triumph

Monday appeared to be "Saunders Day" at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, when Black Angus cattle from here walked off with high honors.

Saunders' Edwina 12, owned and exhibited by George Saunders of McLean, was named grand champion Angus female of the fair.

Edwina 12, calved June 11, 1959, earlier in the day had won first-place honors in her division.

Taking the top title in Amarillo was nothing new for the heifer. She previously captured grand champion female titles at the Wyoming State Fair and the Mid-American Fair in Topeka, Kan., and was named reserve grand champion of the Colorado State Fair.

Others Win, Too

But Edwina 12 wasn't the only animal from the Saunders Ranch faring well at Amarillo Monday.

Saunders' Eltonier 2332 was reserve grand champion bull of the show and first-place winner in the summer senior yearling division.

Saunders' Keystone Prince won first among senior bull calves (Sept. 1, 1958, to Aug. 31, 1959); his Keystone Prince 4 placed second among senior bull calves (after Nov. 1, 1959); his Prince Evascus was first among junior yearlings and junior reserve champion bull.

Yearling Is First

In three Angus bulls competition, Saunders' animals placed second, and second also was captured in the two Angus bulls judging.

Saunders' Blackcap Bessie 6 was first in the division of summer yearling heifers calved between July 1, 1959, and Aug. 31, 1959, and his Missouri Barbara 3 was second to Edwina 12 among summer yearling heifers calved between May 1, 1959, and June 30, 1959.

In the junior yearling heifers (Jan. 1, 1959, to April 30, 1959) division, Evergreen Erica 3, shown by Mr. and Mrs. Guy C. Saunders, George Saunders' parents, placed second.

Saunders' Elmarretta took first in the division of senior yearling heifers calved Sept. 1, 1958, to Dec. 31, 1958.

CRYER SPEAKS AT EVENT FOR CITY TEACHERS

C. A. Cryer, former superintendent of schools in McLean, emphasized the importance of education and Lions Clubs Tuesday night at the annual Lions "Teacher Appreciation Night" in the First Methodist Church.

Cryer, now an instructor at Amarillo Air Force Base, was guest speaker at the event, where local faculty members and their husbands and wives of Lions Club members were special guests.

Discussing his stay in McLean, Cryer said he "made more friends and taught more school for less money" while here than at any other time in his teaching and administrative career.

He recalled that he served as superintendent of the local schools during the depression years of the 1930, when teachers were paid with "IOU's" instead of cash.

Concerning his work at Amarillo AFB, Cryer said the instruction given servicemen there is costing the taxpayers \$8 an hour for each student.

But he stressed that the schooling is necessary to keep the United States and other nations of the free world prepared to defend themselves.

"You are in a war," Cryer told his listeners, "one of the toughest we've ever faced—a war for human minds."

Cryer was introduced by Jim Hathaway, Lions program chairman.

Club President Sammy Haynes was master of ceremonies. Lion tamer Don Blair introduced McLean Supt. Lee Welch, who in turn introduced high school Principal Bob Green and grade school Principal Jack Riley.

Green and Riley then introduced members of their respective faculties.

Rainfall Light Here During Past Week

Rain in small quantities fell on McLean three days in the past week to keep the total precipitation for the year above that to the same date in 1959.

Weather Observer Pete Fulbright recorded measurable amounts of rainfall last Thursday, .05 inch; Friday, .11, and this Tuesday, .14. These amounts brought to 22.14 inches the total for 1960, compared to 21.17 to the same date a year ago.

Temperatures remained on the cool side during the week, with only two days—Sunday and Monday—having 90-degree readings.

Students are required to have a physical examination by their family doctor before being allowed to participate in athletics or any activity that requires extra physical endurance.

THE DANGER OF RED CHINA

Part III: Brave New World

China is the homeland of civilization's most enduring dictatorship—the very Alpha and Omega of despotism. The hand of oppression reaches back from the Atomic Age and touches the ancient patriarchs who walked in the pre-dawn twilight of history.

Its allegiance to totalitarian doctrine outlives the pyramids, the Code of Hammurabi or the Laws of Moses. And when Mao Tse-tung's triumphant army marched into the Forbidden City of Peiping on Feb. 3, 1949, 5,000 years of dignified but tortured Chinese looked down with profound silence.

The Communists are thus not the first masters of China, but they may well be the last. The degree of regimentation and repression of the people, planned or already afoot, is one of the truly revolutionary developments in all of man's experience.

For life in China today seeks nothing less than the destruction, in large measure, of a part of human instinct itself. Indeed, the image which this land has presented in the past few years calls to mind a passage from Aldous Huxley's book of the 1930, Brave New World:

"People are happy; they get what they want, and they never want what they get. They're well off; they're safe; they're never ill; they're not afraid of death; they're blissfully ignorant of passion and old age; they're plagued with no mothers or fathers; they've got no wives, or children, or lovers to feel strongly about; they're so conditioned that they practically can't help behaving as they ought to behave . . ."

None of this, of course, has quite come true for China today. But as one sees more and more of the incredible upheavals within Chinese society, the picture which Huxley has painted appears less and less imaginary.

The people who live under the Peiping regime are not only subjected to the familiar naked power of a police state. Something new, a more positive factor, has been added. The people cannot merely endure, they must appreciate; they cannot simply parrot Communist doctrine, they must actively embrace it; they cannot even hope to die, but must publicly and convincingly expound the glories of life in the mass.

What are the outlines of this

life? Pack 5,000 families onto a 10,000-acre farm. Work them ruthlessly for an annual salary of about \$35. Place their children in remote nursery centers. Shuttle them about ceaselessly, without regard to separations of husband and wife. Brainwash them daily in small "study groups." Drill them incessantly under full military discipline. Feed them at a common trough in gigantic mess halls. Develop an extreme emotional insecurity with an intolerance for and hatred of all other social and political beliefs. The result is roughly equivalent to commune life.

Four hundred million Chinese—three of every four rural dwellers—live in such a nightmare every day. And movement is aiming toward the eventual envelopment of the entire population.

It is more than the physical terror of a Stalin or a Hitler. It is a purge of the mind and the past, a systematic blotting out of virtually all loyalties except those to the regime.

Patriotic songs, street corner skits, fanatical slogans and official ideology all penetrate to the most remote homes with all the endless pitter-patter of a carnival huckster.

More than half a billion people are neatly divided into "voluntary" study groups containing no more than a dozen members. Here the psychology of the herd is employed with insidious efficiency. Silence is impossible.

Regular meetings require not only a thorough understanding of

unofficial doctrine, but an application of this doctrine calculated to discredit one's own ideas in light of the orthodox version. A crusading fervor combines with an understandable urge to belong and produces an irresistible and positive conformity unprecedented in human experience.

China, when the Communists took over in 1949, had but one trump card: The most abundant population in the world. Mao and his followers have played that card with all their might and at every conceivable opportunity. The people were China's only natural resource, and they have been refined and molded far beyond the limits of reality.

For all its horrible achievement, there is a sort of permanent danger of failure bound up with the entire process.

As Winston Churchill once said in relation to another power, "Dictators ride to and fro upon tigers they dare not dismount. And the tigers are getting hungrier."

The stress of China's mental as well as physical diet may keep the tigers hungry for many years to come.

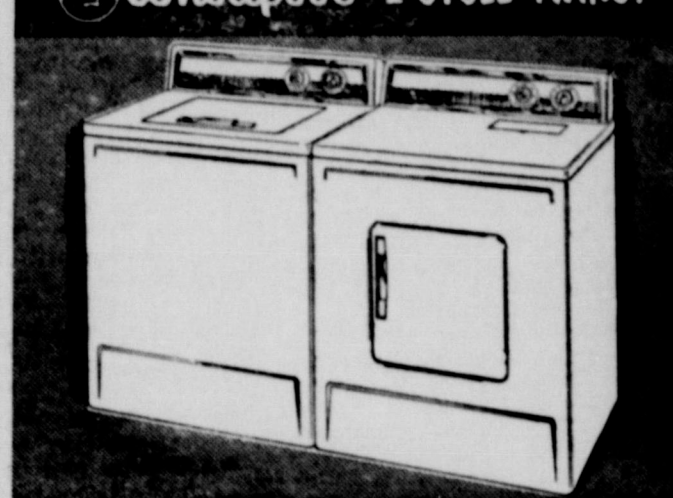

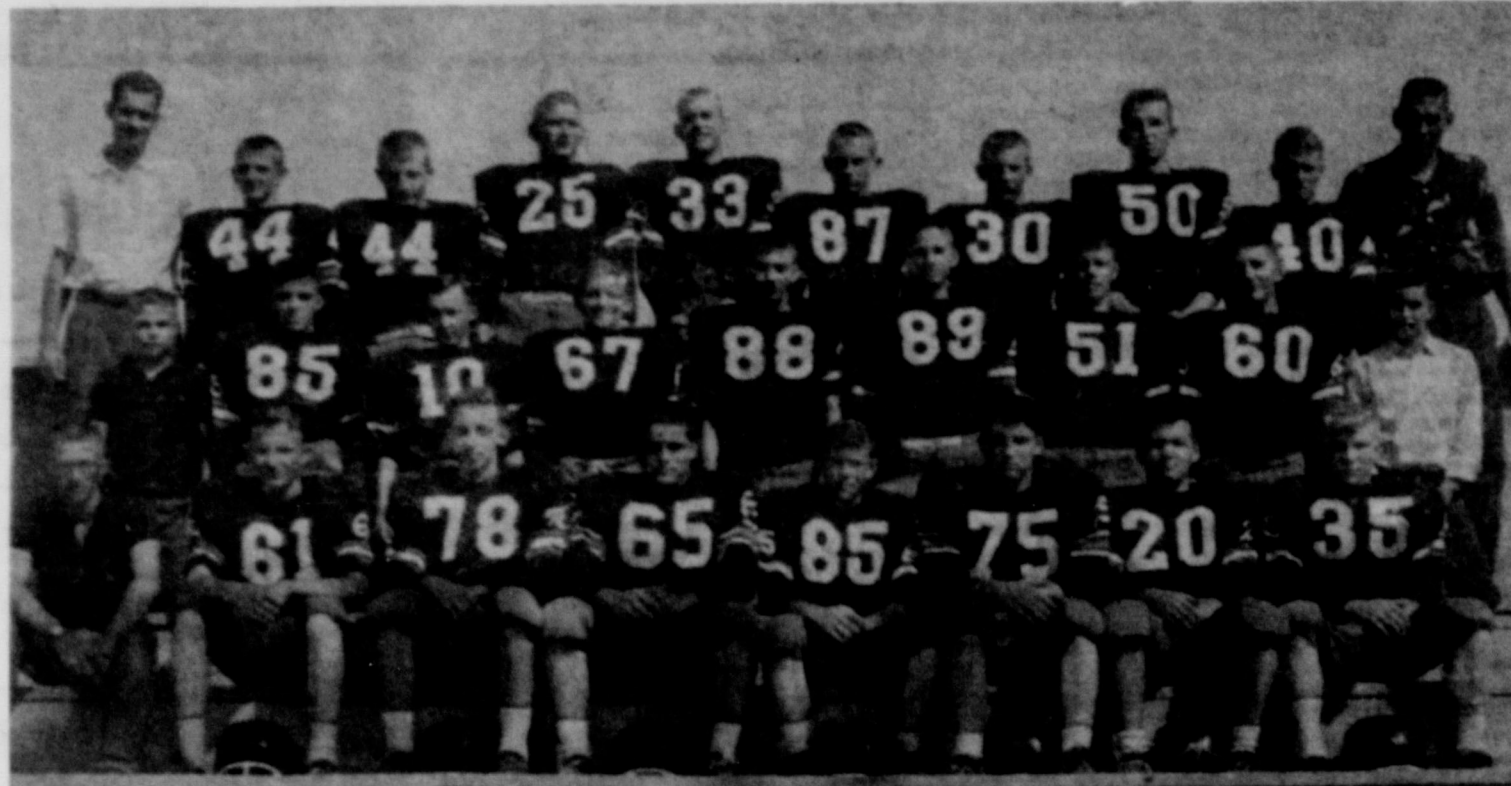
