The lone, drawn-out process of building another ear for young James McCartney has begun.

James, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. B. J. McCartney, underwent the first in a series of several operations a few days ago in a Galveston hospital. Surgeons will take the skin from his neck and through a grafting process bring the skin up to the side of his head for forming the new ear.

At least three operations will be required to take the skin from his neck up to the proper place. Then James must undergo more surgery as the ear is formed.

It had been feared earlier that there wasn't enough cartilage of the ear—torn off by dogs—left to provide a base for forming the ear.

In that case a portion of one of his mother's ears was to be removed and grafted onto James' head for the base.

Doctors decided, however, that this would not be necessary.

Mac and Margie returned to McLean Sunday to pack their belongings and move to Houston. Mac's resignation as McLean city manager had been scheduled to be effective on Sept. 15, but the city commission relieved him of his duties a couple of weeks ago, permitting him to move now.

James, described by his parents as "very brave," will re-enter the hospital for another operation on Sept. 5.

Board Receives Proposed Budget

The board of education Monday night accepted the proposed school budget for the 1961-62 term, but delayed setting the tax rate until operating expenses are determined.

A sizeable increase in the cost of operating the McLean schools is reflected in the budget, with a tentative total figure of \$235,550.

This compares with the 1960-61 budget of \$223,879.60.

SHOWERS UP RAIN TOTAL

Showers the past week have boosted the total rainfall for this year above that to date in 1960, according to records kept by Pete Fulbright, weather observer.

Precipitation up to late Wednesday totaled 17.67 inches, compared with 17.46 to Aug. 16, 1960.

Three showers have been recorded in McLean since last week.

The first, on Friday, amounted to only .03 inch, but a thunderstorm Saturday afternoon dropped .72 on the city. Another .09 inch was recorded here Tuesday.

Cloudy skies have been the order of the day in this area, and heavy rains have fallen in other portions of the Panhandle.

The temperature is reaching up to its regular August levels, after a comparatively mild summer through July.

While there are no temperature recording instruments located here at present, Fulbright said he had checked the thermometer during the heat of one day the past week and it showed 98 degrees.

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SCHEDULE FOR REGISTRATION IS ANNOUNCED

Aug. 24, 25 Set As Dates; School Calendar Approved

Registration of McLean students for the 1961-62 school term will be next Thursday and Friday, Aug. 24 and 25, Supt. Lee Welch announced Wednesday.

Seniors will register between 8 a. m. and noon and juniors from 1 to 5 p. m. Thursday. Sophomores will enroll from 8 to 12 and freshmen from 1 to 5 on Friday.

Grade school registration is scheduled to begin at 9 a. m. on Aug. 25.

Students will register at the respective school buildings. Welch said buses will not run on these two days.

\$5 Typing Fee

Student enrolling in typing will be required to pay a \$5 fee at the time of registering.

The new term officially opens Monday, Aug. 28, with a general assembly in the gymnasium. Serving in the cafeteria begins the same day.

Welch advised parents of new first graders to bring birth certificates with them at the time of enrolling.

High school and grade school faculty members and the board of education have been invited to a breakfast at 7 a. m. Saturday, Aug. 26, in the school cafeteria. A teachers meeting will follow the breakfast.

A complete calendar for the school term was submitted by the superintendent and approved at a board of education meeting Monday night.

177 Days of Instruction

The calendar provides for 177 days of instruction, and Welch pointed out that the Easter holiday period may be used to make up any days missed.

Classes are to be dismissed for Labor Day this year.

Other holidays include: Tri-State Fair, Sept. 18; Thanksgiving, Nov. 23 and 24; Christmas and New Year's, Dec. 23 through Jan. 1; conference for education May 9; Easter March 23 through 26.

The second six-weeks period of the first semester begins Oct. 9.

The third six weeks Nov. 27; second semester Jan. 15; second six weeks, Feb. 26, and third six weeks, April 15.

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Tigers Begin Workouts

The McLean High School Tigers, picked as the favorites in District 2-A, are hard at work getting into shape for their approaching battles.

Twice-a-day drills began Monday, and the Bengals are putting in four hours daily on the gridiron under the tutelage of three coaches.

Derral Davis, head coach, Lloyd Hunt, assistant coach, and R. L. Cline, junior high coach started the youth right off at a pace expected to round them into shape before Shamrock invades Duncan Field for the season opener on Sept. 1.

Bob Patton, stalwart lineman who was injured in last year's Claude game, was taken to an Amarillo clinic Wednesday for examination to determine the cause of the continued pain in his back.

Coach Davis said Wednesday night that X-rays revealed vertebra

had been damaged, but a doctor pulled them back into shape and recommended heat and whirlpool treatments to remedy the ailment.

Patton, 192-pound junior, will be a regular if the ailment can be corrected.

Quarterback Kenny Willingham pulled a ligament in his knee Tuesday night, but a local physician said the injury apparently wasn't serious and he should be fully recuperated soon.

Willingham, hefty senior, missed action much of last season because of an elbow injury suffered in a pre-season scrimmage.

There were the usual turned ankles, bruises and other minor injuries, by Wednesday but most members of the Tiger squad seemed to face well through the first three days of workouts.

Practice sessions are being held from 6:30 to 8:30 each morning and evening.

Coach Davis said he plans to give the team a breather Saturday evening, so the players can attend the City Slickers and Sodbusters game in Amarillo.

JULY SEES 20 MISHAPS

The highway patrol investigated 20 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of July, according to Sgt. E. G. Albers, patrol supervisor for this area.

Five persons were injured and property damage totaled \$9,970 in the wrecks.

The rural traffic accident summary for Gray County from January through July of this year shows a total of 88 crashes. As a result, there have been 51 persons injured and four killed.

Estimated property damage was \$42,334.

This compares with the first seven months of 1960's total of 110 rural accidents, injuring 75 people, killing one and causing estimated property damage of \$70,222.

"Prior to Aug. 1, throughout the state of Texas, there has been a total of 974 fatal crashes resulting in 1,241 persons losing their lives needlessly," Sgt. Albers said.

During the same period in 1960 there were 929 fatal accidents and 1,134 persons killed.

More than 300 persons from across the Panhandle area are expected in McLean for a special short course on selection, feeding, fitting, training and showing of calves.

Farris Hess will be host of the affair on his ranch. A free barbecue lunch is to be served at noon by members of the McLean Lions Club. The meat and food is being furnished by Hess and Wright Hereford Ranch and George Saunders Angus Ranch.

McLean FFA boys and the Gray County 4-H boys will furnish the cold drinks.

Jay Turnphrey, manager of the Burnett Estate Ranches, Fort Worth, will serve as master of ceremonies for the morning session. Bill Dameron, Dameron Hereford Ranch, Hereford, will be emcee in the afternoon.

Also helping with arrangements for the program are Jim Weatherford, McLean vocational agriculture teacher, and Foster Whaley, Gray County agent.

HERE IS A grassed waterway in excellent condition to receive runoff water from terraces. A waterway should have a thick grass cover before dumping terraces to prevent gullying out. Waterways should be maintained if washes start. Shaping and seeding of waterways may be cost-shared through the Great Plains Conservation Program or ACP.

DIVERSION TERRACE just completed. This type terrace is especially effective on long gentle slopes or to pick up large drainage areas of water. They may be built with varying side slopes, dependent on size of farming equipment, and have a channel on the up-side. They may be graded to run the water off. A safe outlet is needed. These diversions may be cost-shared through the Great Plains Conservation Program or ACP.

**100 YEARS AGO
ILLNESS AND BAD WEATHER
ADD TO THE WAR'S MISERY**

"A Tennessee hog pen would scarcely be more uncomfortable," a Confederate officer wrote to his family 100 years ago this week.
The officer was sitting on cold, wet ground near Cheat Mountain in what is now southeastern West Virginia, and as he wrote, rain poured down. Around him, Confederate soldiers shivered and stared at each other. Many were seriously ill; many more were hungry.
The Confederates in western Virginia were meeting an opponent that felled thousands of soldiers on both sides throughout the war. And this week 100 years ago, when the shooting war had died down to minor skirmishes, disease and bad weather bore in relentlessly on both sides.

The officer in western Virginia who wrote of Tennessee hog pens was not the only one to complain. In the same camp was Gen. Robert E. Lee, to become the Confederacy's No. 1 soldier, who also lamented the weather.

20 Days of Rain
Lee had come to western Virginia in late July, and his first 20 days in the area were 20 days of rain. "It is raining now," he wrote his wife in mid-August. "Has been all day, last night, day before, and day before that."
Measles swept through the camp bringing men down by the hundreds. Supply wagons mired to their axles in the roads, and sufficient food could not be brought forward. During one rainstorm, a company of soldiers had to stand or sit all night, fearing they would drown if they lay down. Lee's first campaign was becoming no thing more than a campaign against the weather to stay alive. But the Yankees were having the same trouble. At Cairo, Ill., where the federals were outfitting a

Importance of Area Code Explained by Telephone Manager

If you think Chicago is in Illinois, you're only half right—according to long distance telephone operators.

They'll tell you Chicago is located in the "312" dialing area. Operators use these three-digit numbers—called area codes—to tell the long distance switching equipment here how to route your calls to distant cities throughout the United States and Canada.

Their telephone number geography divides the United States and Canada. For example, McLean is in the 806 dialing area. The area code for New York City is "212" and it is "213" for Los Angeles and other nearby California cities. Operators use these codes to make your long distance service faster.

In Use Here

Now McLean customers can also use these area codes when placing long distance calls, according to George Newberry, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. manager.

"Area code calling will mean faster long distance service for customers here," he said.

Using this new calling method, you give the long distance operator the area code and the distant telephone number. It's not necessary to give her the name of called city or state.

For example, if you were calling Oklahoma City, Okla., Central 6-7798, you simply tell the operator: "Area code 405 CE 6-7798." The operator then could immediately dial this number to the switching equipment which would automatically route your call to the Oklahoma City telephone.

Codes Necessary

"The '405' is the Oklahoma City area code and is actually part of the long distance number," Newberry said.

Making area codes part of long distance numbers is necessary for direct dialing to telephones in distant cities, he added. Today Pampa operators dial direct to the telephones you call in most cities throughout the country. And direct dialing will be installed here within a few years, enabling customers to dial their own long distance calls.

"Direct dialing of long distance calls requires that no two long distance numbers can be alike in the United States or Canada," Newberry said. "Area codes are a key part of the telephone numbering plan that provides these different long distance telephone numbers."

He explained that no two local telephone numbers are alike within the same dialing area. By combining the area code with the local number, you have a long distance number unlike any other in the country.

For example, a local number in St. Louis, Mo., is Chestnut 1-9800. The area code for St. Louis is "314," so the long distance number is "Area code 314 CH1-9800" and there is no other such number in the United States or Canada.

Since no two long distance numbers are identical, the operator does not need the name of the city to complete most long distance calls or to fill out the charge ticket. The long distance switching equipment automatically routes calls to the proper telephones in distant cities when the operator dials the area code and distant number. The operator records the area code and distant number on the charge ticket. When this ticket is processed by accounting machines, these machines automatically identify the city you called so you will be correctly charged for the call.

Newberry said telephone customers in several other nearby towns also can use these area codes when placing long distance calls. These towns are Canadian, Lefors and Shamrock.

He gave these pointers for fastest long distance service under this new calling method:

1. Give the operator the area code and distant number. Like this: "Area code 405 CE 6-7798."
2. Don't give the operator your own telephone number until she asks you for it.

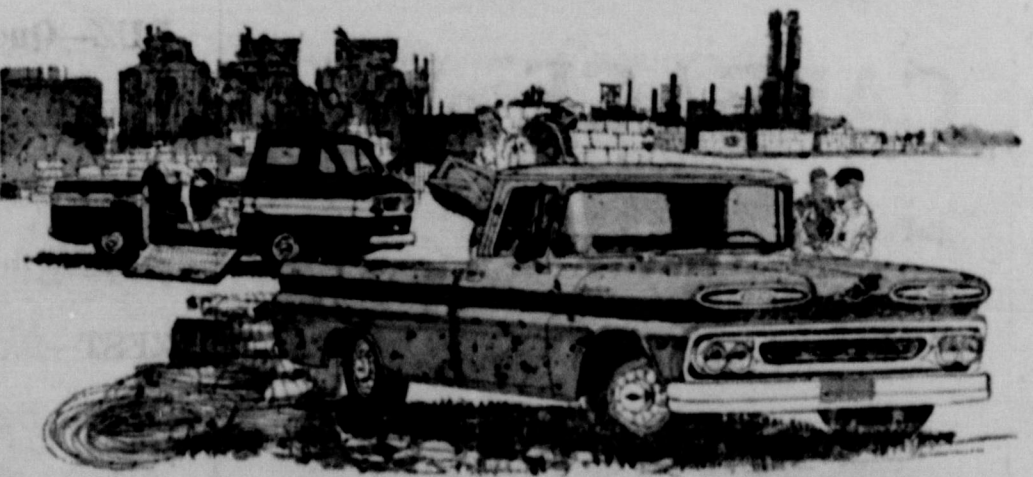

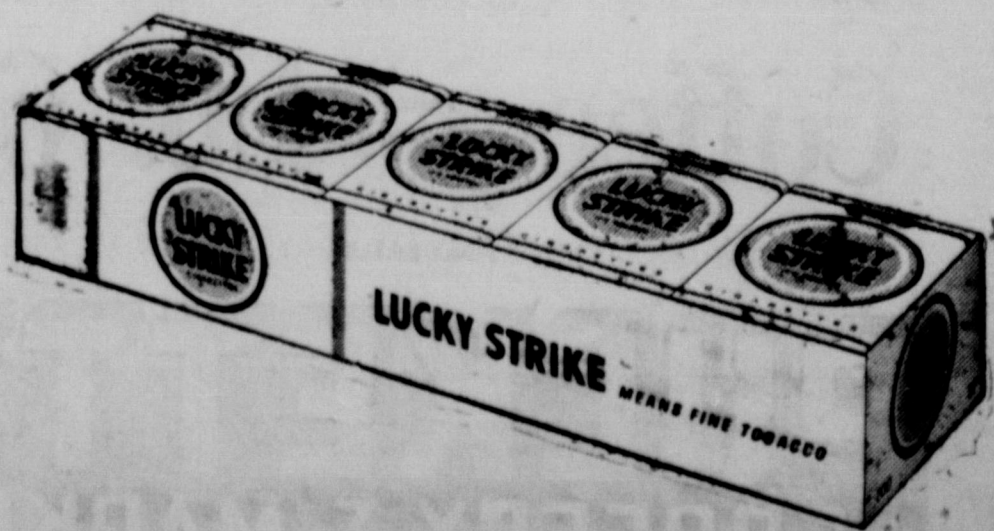

SOIL TESTING

Mr. H. H. Hudgins of the Hudgins Ranch is not satisfied with the yield of his hay meadow. Bill Brooks and I visited his ranch last week, took a soil sample which we have sent to our soil testing laboratory at Lubbock.

Mr. Hudgins plans to follow the recommendations of the soil testing laboratory and fertilize next spring accordingly. This might be an excellent suggestion for you to follow.

We have in our office complete instructions on how to take a soil sample, information sheets and small cartons to put the soil in for mailing.

This service costs only \$2 per sample, and it is available to both city and rural people. Drop me a card and I will be happy to send you the mailers and other information.

FERTILIZING LOVE GRASS

Probably one of the most debated subjects among farmers is whether weeping love grass is any good or not for either grazing or hay.

This week I saw a good looking

bale of hay in Tuit Johnson's pickup. I asked Tuit if that was any good for hay, and if cattle would eat it.

To demonstrate, he stopped the pickup and dumped out the bale to some cows that didn't look very hungry. They took to it very eagerly. Tuit said he had fertilized the hay pretty heavily and tried to put the hay up in the right condition.

He says he runs the baler right behind the swather. It probably all goes back to managing your hay properly.

POISON GRAIN

Smoky Price has it now. I delivered 10 two-pound packages and 10 one-pound packages this week. The new grain has one ounce of poison to 16 pounds of grain, whereas the old formula had one ounce to 21 pounds of grain.

The cost on this is 25 cents per pound, slightly higher than the old mix.
