Construction projects always give a community the size of ours a shot in the arm, so McLean's economy should be getting a boost before long.

Cal Fraser finally has his long-desired expansion program at Marie Foundations underway, with the foundation taking shape.

Then that even longer-wanted McLean to Hedley road should be at the construction stage before many more days have passed.

We keep thinking the advertising for bids will be announced at any time for the new road. We're told all easements for property involved in the project have been signed, and everything is now in the hands of the engineers.

Bid advertising will take 30 days, and the successful contractor probably then will want to get started quickly to take advantage of the good weather.

The factory and the road are two of the finest examples of what town and area people can do once they make up their minds and set their sights.

Of course, we weren't here at the time the Marie Foundations plant was started, and know only what we've heard about the successful effort to "sell" Cal Fraser on McLean.

The fact Marie Foundations is in our city amazes and even shocks any passerby who happens to hear the news. The story still fascinates us, too, and we're sure even the people who did so much to make it a reality wonder a little at times themselves just how it all came about.

It appears someone is going to have to drag out the tape measures to settle a dispute that has arisen.

We had always thought no other Panhandle town would dare challenge McLean's claim to having the most paved streets for its size.

But Deskins Wells, publisher of the Wellington Leader, seems to think that Collingsworth County seat deserves the crown.

He wrote words to that effect in his column last week.

Wellington is considerably larger than McLean, and perhaps does have more paved streets, but we doubt the bigger town would stand a chance, if the contest were based on population.

It is sort of disgraceful the number of fans who turn out to watch our Tigers and Tigerettes play basketball.

Never more than a handful of fans are on hand for their games, even though the Tigers have an excellent chance of winning District 2-A and going even farther in the cage wars.

They're undefeated in the district to date, with only a couple of games left to play.

Tigers Undefeated in 2-A City Cagers Win Pair Over Lefors

Brushing aside early threats, the McLean Tigers and Tigerettes sacked up another District 2-A victory apiece Tuesday night in games here with Lefors.

Coach Derral Davis' Tigers, hard-pressed during the early stages, came to life in the second quarter and went on from there to win 59-41 and remain undefeated in district play.

Coach Lloyd Hunt's Tigerettes trailed Lefors' Pirateettes after the opening period, but found the range and triumphed 39-33.

The Tigers travel to Memphis Friday night, then return home next Tuesday to close out the basketball season with Canadian. The Tigerettes will see action Tuesday but will remain at home Friday, since Memphis does not have a girls team.

Clarendon's Broncos gave the Tigers their biggest fright of the current season last Friday night, with the locals narrowly managing a 59-54 win.

Tigerettes Defeated
The Tigerettes, who had clipped Clarendon in the first round of 2-A action, fell victim this time 42-33.

In Tuesday's game here, the Bengals trailed Lefors for a time in the opening minutes but managed a 16-12 edge at the close of the first quarter.

At halftime, McLean was in front 31-20 and after three quarters the locals led 45-28.

Jim Watson copped scoring honors with 17, but soft-shooting Derrith Welch was a step behind with 16.

Kenny Willingham had 11, Clyde Windom 10 and Bill Goldston five. Don McCool's 11 was tops for Lefors.

Watson Gets 27
In the Clarendon game, Watson sank 27 points to lead the field, followed by Donnie Woods with 11; Willingham, eight; Welch, four; Goldston, three, and Windom and John Switzer with two each.

The Tigers got off to a slow start at Clarendon, too, barely leading 10-7 when the first quarter ended. The Broncos jumped in front 30-23 at intermission, and the score was knotted at 42 all after three quarters.

Cindy Rice tossed in 22 points to pace the Tigerettes over the Pirateettes Tuesday night. Jan Bailey had 10 and Linda Burnett seven.

Lefors led McLean 11-9 after the first quarter, but the Tigerettes pulled ahead 16-13 at halftime and 31-19 to begin the final period.

Miss Rice also led the locals in the Clarendon game, sinking 19 points. Helen Smith bucketed nine, Miss Bailey four and LaVon Watson one.

Clarendon kept ahead of the Tigerettes throughout the evening, holding margins of 15-11, 25-18 and 35-31.

POSTMASTER GETS AWARD

For "resourcefulness and devotion to the postal service" in the situation developing from last August's railroad baggage car fire at Alameed, McLean Postmaster Bill R. Reeves Wednesday received a Superior Accomplishment Award from the Post Office Department.

Making the presentation of the award—consisting of a certificate and a lapel pin—was J. M. Benesch, field service officer for the Post Office Department from Amarillo.

The presentation was made in Reeves' office.

The local postmaster is the first to receive this award in the Amarillo district since Benesch became field service officer eight years ago.

'Above Normal Duties'
"Bill was presented the Superior Accomplishment Award due to his action over- and above normal duties in the protection of mail involved in the baggage car fire at Alameed," Benesch explained in making the presentation.

The certificate is signed by Postmaster J. Edward Day and W. M. McMillan, Dallas, regional director for the Post Office Department.

In a letter accompanying the citation, McMillan said: "The chief postal inspector has informed me of your action in removing mail from a burning baggage car in the McAlester and Amarillo Train 22 near the small community of Alameed, Texas, on August 31, 1961.

Assumed Responsibility
"You arrived at the scene, some 10 miles from your office shortly after the fire department from your city reached the fire. In the absence of other postal officials, you assumed the responsibility for removal of mail from the burning car and for the subsequent care of the mail.

"Undamaged mail was sent to your office for reworking and dispatch.

"Your resourcefulness and devotion to the postal service are highly commendable, and I am pleased to present this certificate of recognition by our postmaster general in appreciation of your action."

"A copy of this letter will be placed in your official personnel folder as a permanent record of your outstanding performance."

Fire was discovered in the baggage car as the Rock Island train was en route east from Amarillo.

J. M. (Jake) Schrum of Sagar Land was elected president of the association, succeeding Charles Neblett Jr., who had served for the past two years.

Hess was the only Hereford breeder from this area named to office in the association.

NOEL RITES HELD IN CITY

James Bryan Noel, long-time resident of McLean, died Tuesday morning in the Groom Hospital. He was 63.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon in the First Methodist Church, and interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Rev. Jack Riley, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church in Pampa, officiated at the services, and was assisted by Rev. J. B. Stewart, local pastor, and Rev. Lee Crouch, of Hart.

Mr. Noel was born in Memphis on March 28, 1901, and moved to McLean in 1911 from Collingsworth County. He was married on Dec. 26, 1937.

In Hospital 2 Weeks
He was a well-known rancher and a member of the Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge. His father, the late J. M. Noel, was a pioneer of this area.

Mr. Noel had been in Groom Hospital about two weeks at the time of his death.

Surviving are his wife, one sister, Mrs. Paul Kennedy, Hart, and one niece, Mrs. Tony Smitherman, Hart.

Large Candidate Field Facing County Voters

MANY GRAY INCUMBENTS UNOPPOSED

Voters in McLean, Gray County and all across the state of Texas will have a big variety of candidates to choose from in elections this year.

While most incumbent county officials made it through the filing period which ended Monday night without drawing opposition, some races did develop for the May 5 primaries.

Two county officials residing in McLean are assured of new four-year terms, since neither is opposed. They are Truitt Johnson, Precinct 4 county commissioner, and Cliff H. Day, Precinct 5 justice of the peace, both Democrats.

One other McLeanite is a candidate for one of the offices to be filled this year—George W. Terry, local electrician, filed as a Democrat for state representative from the 87th district.

2 Republicans
Also filing for the post were Incumbent Grainger Melhany, Wheeler, Lester A. Jones, Pampa, both Democrats, and two Pampa Republicans—Johnny Wills and Warren Fatheree.

The district includes Gray, Wheeler and Collingsworth Counties.

Voters will choose between three Democrats in electing their Gray County judge. Opposing Incumbent Bill Craig are Bruce Parker and Clyde L. Carruth, both of Pampa.

Congressman Walter Rozers, Pampa, has the Democratic nomination clinched for re-election, but he must face Republican Jack Seale of Amarillo in the general election.

Only Races
These will be the only races on the county and district level.

Six Democrats and three Republicans are in the race for governor, including the incumbent, Price Daniel, a Democrat.

Absentees Hit 20 Per Cent Illness Takes Toll In Local Schools

Flu, mumps and various other illnesses were taking a heavy toll on attendance in McLean schools this week.

Supt. Lee Welch said Wednesday night that approximately 20 per cent of the student body was absent Wednesday, but he hopes the "peak" has been reached.

The top seven grades have been hardest hit, Welch said, and school administrators are "sweating it out" now to see if the illness onslaught moves into the lower grades.

No consideration has yet been given to closing school doors because of the large number of ill students, the superintendent reported.

Welch said he had discussed the situation with a local doctor, who believes the peak has been reached and the number of absentees will begin to decline.

However, there was an increase Wednesday over the day before, when 17 per cent of the approximately 470 students failed to attend classes.

Other area schools also have been hard hit. The White Deer superintendent told Welch that 30 per cent of the students enrolled there were absent from school for almost a week.

In White Deer, however, most of the ill students were in grade school.

March of Dimes Collections Here Hit \$1,248 Total

Weather records kept by Pete Fulbright show .80 inch of moisture—rain and snow—up to Wednesday afternoon. On Feb. 8, 1961, a total of .36 inch had fallen here.

Spring-like weather hung on in the McLean area during much of the past week, but there were indications that cooler temperatures could be on the way.

Wellington Woman Not Seriously Hurt

An elderly Wellington woman miraculously escaped serious injury Wednesday when her car went out of control near Alameed and rolled several times in a deep canyon.

Mrs. Esther Rasco Holton, 68, received treatment at the Groom Hospital and was released following the accident early Wednesday afternoon some eight miles west of Alameed on U. S. 66.

Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker of McLean said Mrs. Holton apparently went to sleep at the wheel of her car, and the vehicle knocked over a guard post and plunged into the canyon, some 50 feet deep.

The vehicle came to rest upside down.

Have Autos Checked Before Deadline, Patrolman Advises

Patrolman Gwin Fowler, motor vehicle inspection service representative with the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week that less than 50 per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962.

With the April 15 deadline for having the vehicles checked rapidly approaching, Fowler said this means there are approximately 14,200 vehicles in Gray County remaining to be inspected by approved inspection stations.

Inspection stations in McLean include Windom Garage, Ellison Motor Co. and Jones Pontiac and Equipment Co.

Fowler urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid the last minute rush.

In addition, he reminded drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevent the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers, while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Fowler pointed out.

"All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

I Remember Cam

She must have been about 14 when I first saw her. In a black skirt and a black-and-white shirt waist, hands clasped, she leaned against the apple green wall of the old brick school building west of town—a building long demolished.

As the children marched in, they misbehaved, pinched the child in front of them, kicked the one behind them.

The new girl, arrow straight, slender as a willow, her black hair drawn back in a large plait, curled at the end, smiled at each misdeed, her large blue eyes seeming not to miss any movement within the six marching lines.

She smiled not only with her lips, but with her eyes as well. She must have smiled at me. For I felt at once that the new girl was a lady—a real lady.

Later, I was to learn that her voice was soft and gentle, that she seemed to think before she spoke, and whether in agreement or disagreement with another, she was never argumentative and did not lift her voice—and there was at all times a ready smile.

Nothing could make her unkindly-like. If there was bickering in line, or trouble anywhere near her, she moved out of the way.

As the years went by Cam Henry never became less a lady in my mind.

We each went our way to teach. Later she married Burl Glass, the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Glass, and whose family were one of our most highly respected pioneers.

Burl and Cam moved to his farm and I went east in an effort to establish myself as a writer.

I did not see Cam again for many years, not until her two sons were grown, married and well established in their careers. Cam and Burl moved to McLean.

Only a few weeks ago, Burl retired from business. They would live an easier, a more leisurely life.

Then, a few days ago, she and Burl, en route to visit their daughter-in-law in Amarillo, turned from Highway 66 onto a farm-to-market road—sudden crash—sudden death. You know the rest of the story, the modern tragedy.

Cam was killed instantly. And Burl faces long months of hospitalization.

I remember Cam. She was the lady I knew in my childhood.

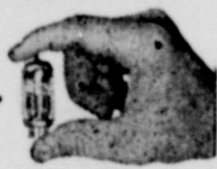

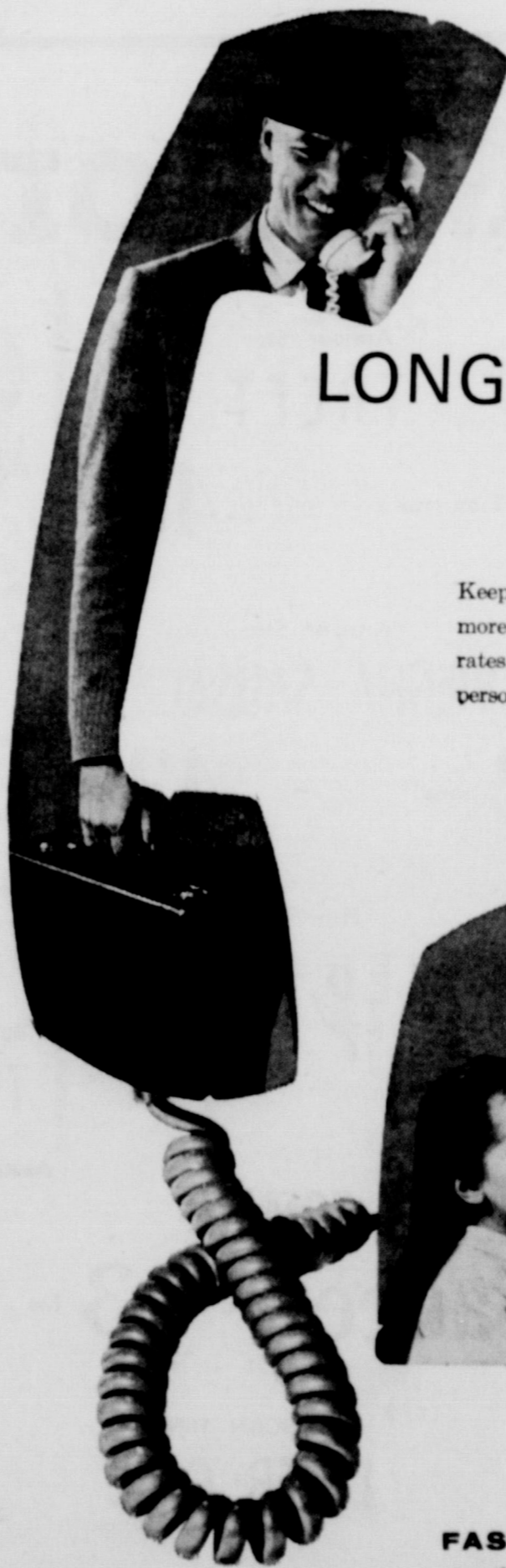
