We've been wondering for months about the Six Flags Over Texas, the historical amusement park between Fort Worth and Dallas, which has been so much popularity.

And now we know. It's every bit as fabulous as they've said, and—at the risk of sounding like a press agent—we would recommend you take the day off for a weekend before school starts.

Our two daughters enjoyed their hour stay at Six Flags last Friday... perhaps as much as did.

The admission charge of \$2.75 for adults and \$2.25 for children seems a bit steep, until you consider that this entitles you to see everything, climb aboard every ride and pay for the entire visit, with the exception of food and a helicopter ride.

Six Flags gives Texans a glimpse of the history of their native state in a unique way.

There were some 10,000 visitors on hand the day we went down, and it is all so large the park isn't really crowded.

Waiting for a ride on the river boat, train (drawn by an honest-to-goodness steam engine), stagecoach, miniature cars, mule train, etc., could mean standing in line for up to 15 minutes.

But we were quite comfortable throughout each wait. For air-conditioning vents were aimed toward us at all times.

That's right, even the shaded waiting areas are air-conditioned.

So, join the growing throngs and go down some weekend. It's well worth the trip.

Which reminds us, while in Denton, we visited with the Perkinses, and they were really to whoop and holler when they told the Browns were moving to Denton.

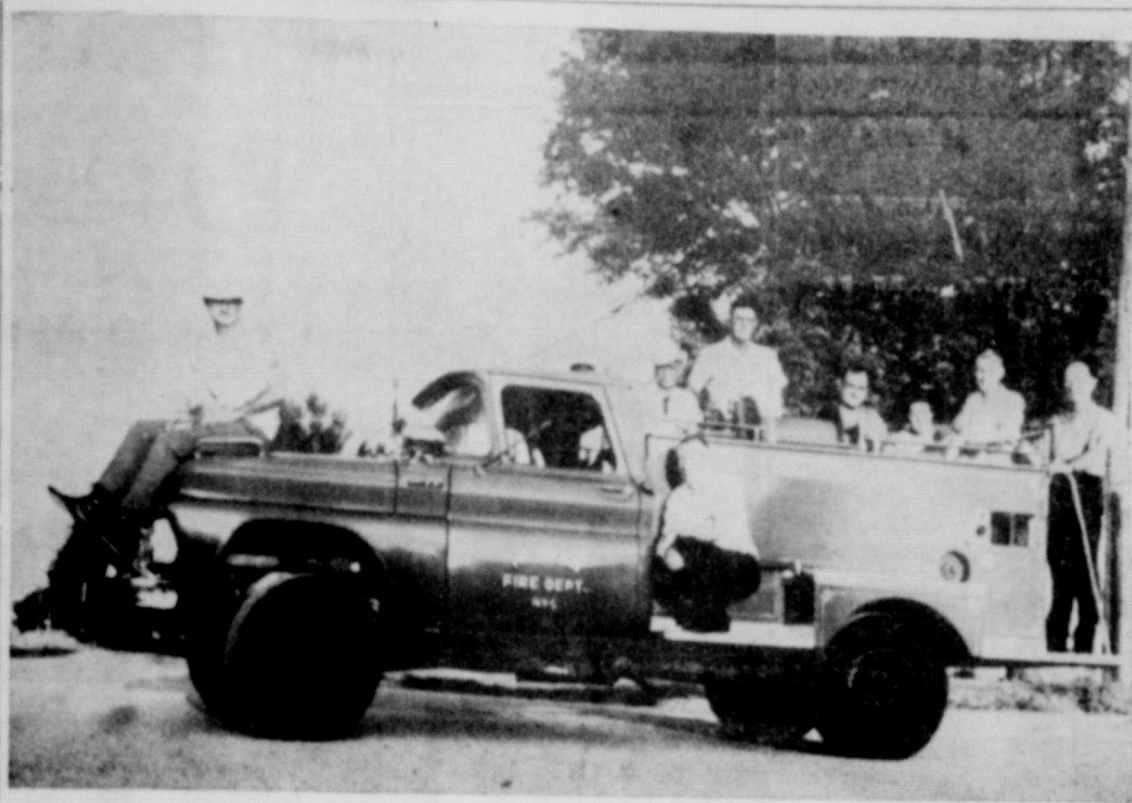
It's much closer for visiting than McLean, they explained.

## New City Firetruck Is About Ready for Use

### PROTECTION TO IMPROVE WITH FAST PUMPER

McLean's newest piece of fire-fighting equipment soon will be ready for action, greatly increasing the protection of local and area property.

The bright red firetruck was delivered to the fire department recently, after being several weeks in the building stage.

Fire Chief Boyd Meador said Wednesday that the truck will make it possible for the local volunteer department to better protect property—not only in the city but in rural areas as well.

Currently the vehicle is in Amarillo for installation of dual wheels on the rear and a two-way radio, but it should be returned here within a few days.

#### Cost \$7,500

All told, the truck cost approximately \$7,500. A fire department fund which has accumulated over the past 10 to 12 years is some \$2,000 short of the amount needed.

The fund is made up of donations from persons grateful for assistance in fighting fires on their property and of money received from the county for answering alarms outside the city limits.

Meador said no campaign for contributions is planned, but any donations would be appreciated.

The fire chief said he had been told that McLean is the first city in this area to purchase a truck as well equipped as the latest addition to the fire department.

The truck chassis, a three-quarter-ton Chevrolet, was purchased from Ellison Chevrolet in McLean at its actual cost.

#### 300-Gallon Tank

The vehicle is equipped with a 300-gallon water tank; high pressure pump with two hoses equipped with fog-nozzle, two-way radio; front-end winch; public address system, which also serves as the siren; four-wheel drive, making it possible to travel over any terrain.

The high pressure pump is capable of pushing water through the fog nozzles at 800 pounds of pressure.

Meador said the truck will be used primarily for grass fires in the country, but it also will be used when needed in the city.

The truck is lighter and faster than other equipment in use here for several years.

The newest truck brings to six the number of pieces of equipment now owned by the city and department. These include two pumps, two tankers, a pickup used for hauling emergency equipment and a 1,000-gallon water truck.

## 19 Rural Mishaps Investigated in June

The Highway Patrol investigated 19 rural accidents in Gray County during the month of June, according to Sgt. J. W. Wilson, patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, 19 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$14,315.

The rural traffic accident summary of Gray County from January through June of 1962 shows a total of 84 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were six persons killed and 57 injured.

The estimated property damage amounted to \$48,240. This compares with the first six months of 1961's total of 63 rural crashes, killing four persons, injuring 46 and causing an estimated property damage of \$32,354.

In a statewide comparison the total number of traffic fatalities are practically the same as they were this time last year.

## Veterinarian to Be at City Hall

### Dog Vaccination Clinic Is Aug. 8

Dr. E. B. Range, Shamrock veterinarian, will be in McLean Wednesday, Aug. 8, to vaccinate dogs against rabies, Mayor John C. Haynes announced this week.

All persons owning dogs were asked to bring the animals to city hall for the rabies shots.

Dr. Range will arrive at city hall at 2 p. m. and remain as long as necessary to inoculate all dogs brought to him.

He asked that the animals be kept on a leash.

Cost of the vaccination will be \$2.50 per dog, compared to \$3 which Dr. Range charges at his office in Shamrock.

Dr. Range uses the long-acting modified live virus vaccine, which

he feels offers the best protection to the dogs.

An increasing number of rabies cases are being reported in this area. The State Health Department has positively diagnosed rabies in skunks this summer at Alanreed and Lela.

Such wild animals often carry the disease to dogs.

The veterinarian will furnish a tag and certificate of vaccination for each dog inoculated here on Aug. 8.

Other vaccine also will be available here on that day, as a convenience for persons desiring their animals vaccinated against other dread diseases—including leptospirosis and hepatitis.

## Citizen Recognized in Michigan For Work With Youths

Mrs. Janiece Carpenter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Magee of McLean, received recognition the past week for her work in a summer program for handicapped children in Kalamazoo, Mich.

Mrs. Carpenter was shown with a group of children presenting a speech therapy demonstration in last Sunday's edition of the Kalamazoo Daily Gazette. She is a teacher in the program.

The program includes 100 youngsters enrolled in the Harold Upjohn School for physically, mentally or speech-handicapped children. It is sponsored by the Kalamazoo public schools, the county board of education and Western Michigan University.

Mrs. Carpenter is a senior at Western Michigan University, where she is majoring in speech and hearing correction, with a minor in art.

She was graduated from McLean High School in 1958.

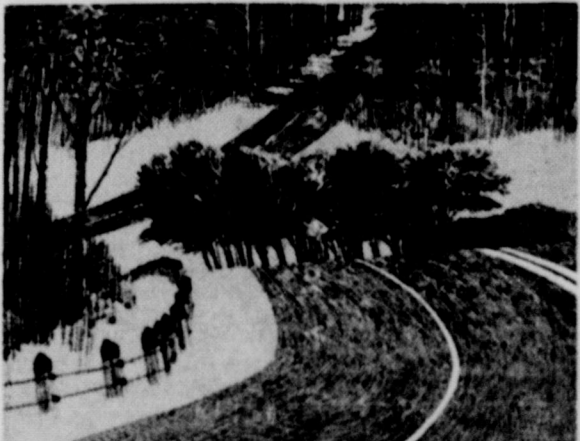

# Farm Facts

Farmers have long relied on signs to forecast the weather, but today's operations demand more precise information. Bad weather may hinder application or nullify effectiveness of materials in which they have invested heavily.

The U. S. Weather Bureau, therefore, is providing forecasts tailored specifically to agricultural operations in key areas. News media, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and other agencies are co-operating.

These services include an agricultural interpretation of the 30-day and 5-day outlook, as well as hourly reports and information at intervals throughout the day on the kind of weather to expect for the next 36 hours and for 24 additional hours.

Also issued are agricultural aviation weather forecasts and summaries during the spraying and dusting seasons. Forecasters are kept posted on "fire weather." Warnings also are issued of unusual distur-

ances or severe conditions as indicated by radar and other equipment.

Soil temperatures, wind speed and direction, dew, temperatures, and other factors are duly noted.

## Water Resources Of Southern Plains Are Revealed in Bulletin

A bulletin adding to the available knowledge of the Southern High Plains water resources—including Gray County—has just been issued by the Texas Water Commission.

Entitled "Water-Level Measurements Through 1962 in Selected Observation Wells, Southern High Plains, Texas," the bulletin is No. 6207.

Included are reports on ground water-level measurements in observation wells in 25 Southern High Plains counties. These include the most extensive irrigated farming development in the state.

The bulletin may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 2311, Capitol Station, Austin.

Other counties in the report, in addition to Gray, are Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Oldham, Parmer, Randall, Roberts, Terry and Yoakum.

Yearly Measurements

Yearly water-level measurements on 1,150 observation wells for the entire period of record, and maps showing their location in the 25 counties, are contained in the publication.

Some of the annual measurer's notes date back as far as the 1930s. These well measurements thoroughly document the major declines of water levels in the areas of heavy irrigation pumpage, such as in parts of Lubbock, Hale and Floyd Counties.

Declines extended into the 1961-62 period for most of the wells, though in most cases these were small. The average drop in level this year for all wells measured 62 feet.

Systematic measurement of water levels in observation wells is useful as an index in maintaining a current inventory of available water supplies in making quantitative predictions of the future availability of these supplies.

munists) openly declare that their ends can be attained only by the forceful overthrow of all existing social conditions."

3. Lenin wrote, "There is only one banner on earth under which it is well worthwhile to struggle and to die. It is the banner of the Communist International."

4. Dimitroff (general secretary of the Communist International) states, "The working class is the real master, tomorrow's master of the world."

5. William Z. Foster (national chairman of the Communist Party, U.S.A.) dedicated his book, "The Twilight of World Capitalism," to my great grandson Joseph Manley Kolko who will live in a Communist United States."

6. In a sworn statement made by Foster, he says, "When a Communist heads the government of the United States—and that day will come as surely as the sun rises—the government will not be a capitalistic government, but a Soviet government, and behind this government will stand the Red Army to enforce the dictatorship of the (working class)."

In an address before a young men's lyceum in Springfield, Ill., on Jan. 27, 1837, Abraham Lincoln asked, "At what point shall we Americans expect the approach of danger? By what means shall we fortify against it? Shall we expect some trans-Atlantic military giant to step the ocean and crush us at a blow?"

Thoughtfully, Lincoln answered his own question: "All the armies of Europe, Asia and Africa combined, with all the treasure of the earth . . . in their military chests . . . could not by force take a track on the Blue Ridge in a trial of a thousand years."

What, then, is the danger Lincoln foresaw in 1837? The danger, "if it ever reach us . . . must spring from amongst us; it cannot come from abroad. If destruction be our lot, we must ourselves be its author and finisher. As a nation of free men, we must live through all time or die by suicide."

Lincoln had no concept of atomic bombs, jet planes or rockets. But he understood the only course by which free men shall perish from the earth.

Ours today is a day demanding greatness in individual men and women, greatness in sacrifice and greatness in disciplined service of the highest. As Lincoln noted, "If destruction be our lot, we ourselves must be its author . . ."

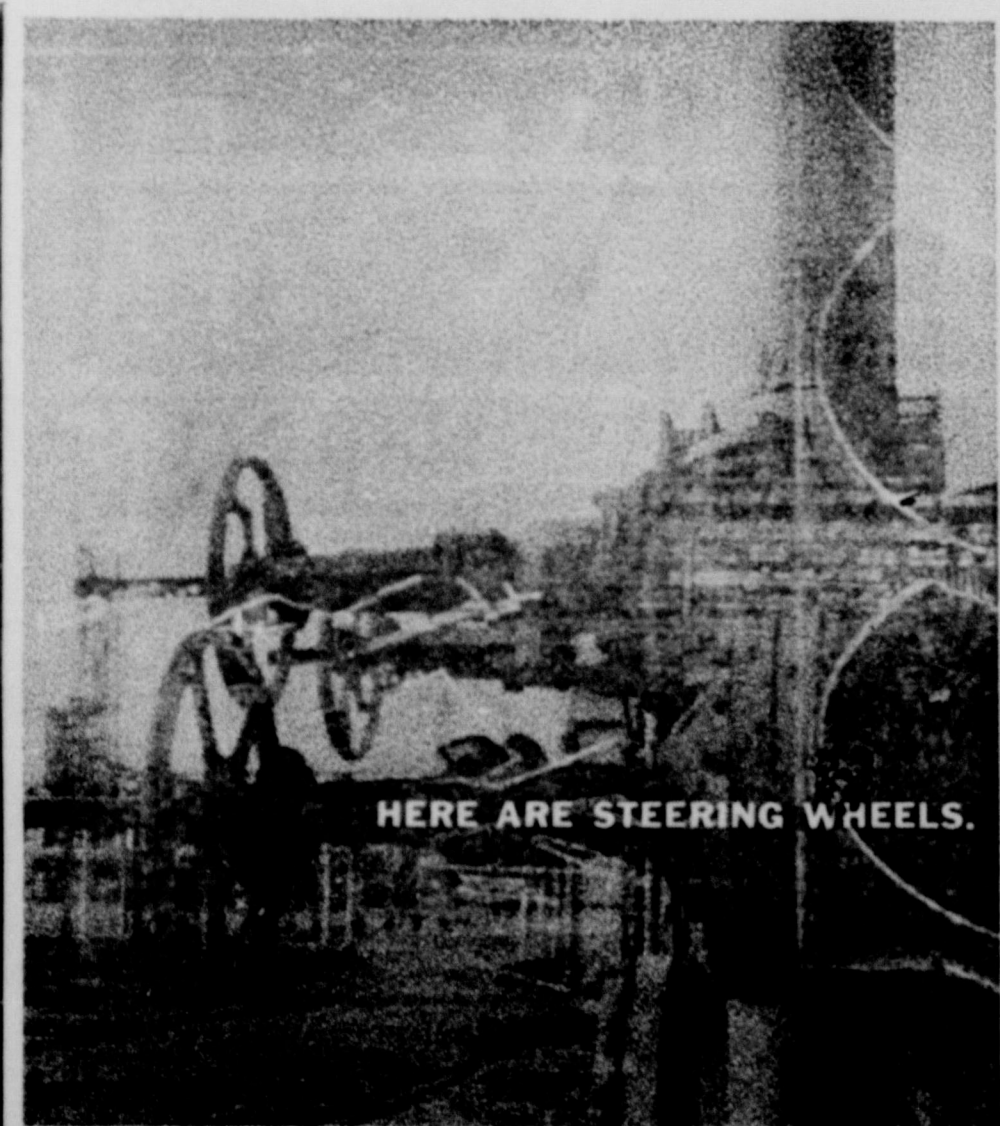

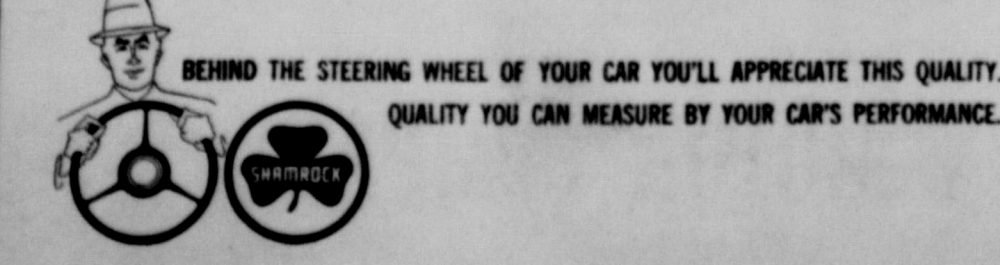

### OTTON LEAF APHID

D. D. Pennington is having some cotton leaf aphids. Fact is, we recommended spraying with parathion. Usually cotton leaf aphids aren't bad enough to make spraying necessary. In his case, I've never seen them quite this bad before. Since it isn't safe to use parathion in a ground spray rig, he would need to use an airplane. By the time I got down to help him, he had already mixed up some DDT-toxaphene. This won't work on any type of sucking insects. Aphids, of course, are sucking insects. I'll just betcha Dewey applied the DDT-toxaphene because he already had it mixed up. Check with him.

### WINTER BEETLES

Mrs. O. O. Tate left word for me to call her on my recent visit to McLean. She was having some winter beetle trouble in both tomatoes and beans that were in production. She recommended that she pick up tomatoes and beans closely. After a few days, she can again harvest beans and tomatoes, wash them and you will be on the safe side.

So should also spray in and around the garden good with chlorpyrifos, or use a chlorodane dust. Do not use this on vegetables that are in production because of the lingering residual effect.

### WARF HYBRID MILO

Leamon Andrews planted five acres of a dwarf hybrid milo, which I supplied him with earlier this year. This is planted just southwest of the McLean Gin. This was

given to me by the experiment station for demonstration purposes. I hope to mark the place where he has this planted with a demonstration marker furnished us by the Extension Service. It is my understanding seed for planting by farmers will be available for general distribution next year.

According to the experiment station, this is as good a yielder as hybrid 610. The main advantage is its standability. It is supposed to be less than three feet in height and have an excellent stalk.

### BACK ON HIS FEET

Clyde Brown is the latest to report he has a few prairie dogs. I shouldn't have ever bragged about having the prairie dog population about whipped.

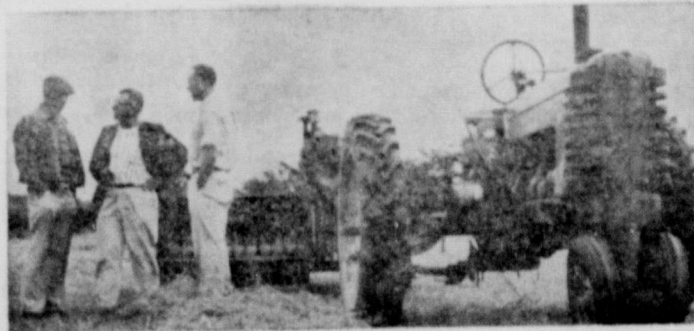

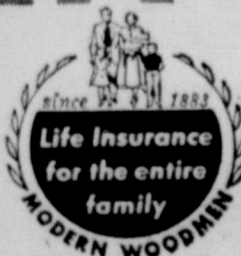

Our courts need witnesses. A lawyer can't find the facts. The judge can't apply the law. The lawyer to tell his client's story.

Chances are you worry about being called upon to testify in a trial.

As a witness you, too, must have the right to be examined, not to testify against yourself in someone else's lawsuit or crime trial.

If you are ever in such a bind, consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests within the law.

Was lawyers tell their witnesses to obey 12 rules:

1. Go to the place (say, the scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. Don't forget and get caught up in details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.

2. Visit a court. Hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.

3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.

4. Don't memorize your story and for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard.

5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.

6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be misled.

7. If you err—and people often do—correct yourself at once. If you can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff.

8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.

9. Stop when the judge breaks and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. That you might say could end in a "mistrial."

10. Keep cool and don't sass back.

11. If they ask you: Certainly, you talked to other people—the lawyer, for example; and yes, you may be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.

12. Remember, without witnesses the law would fail to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.

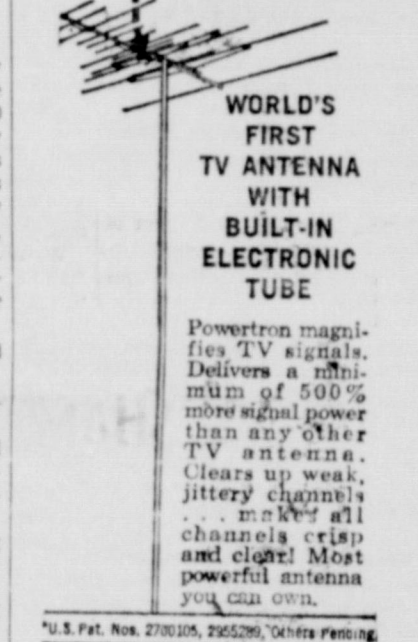

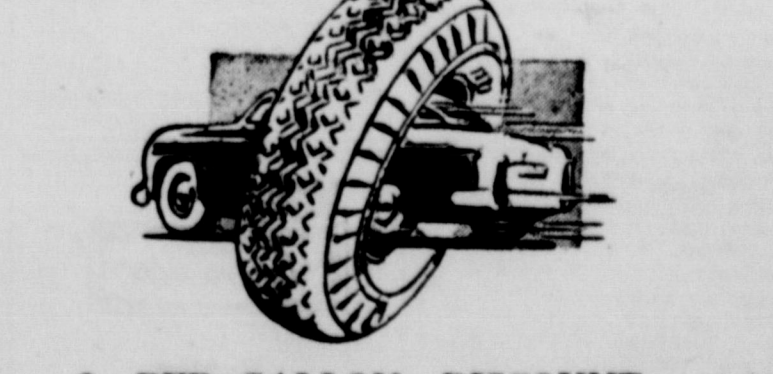
