## Big Re-Building Job Ahead

### 34 Tigers Report For Grid Practice

Facing a staggering re-building chore, the McLean High School Tigers—defending District 2-A champions—kicked off football practice Monday morning on a twice-a-day workout schedule.

A total of 34 youths reported for the first day of rehearsals for the fast-approaching season, and the number remained the same through Wednesday, with the possibility of more joining the squad when school opens next Monday.

### Cotton John Tells About 'Down Under' Agriculture Industry

Cotton John Smith, farm director of KGNC-TV in Amarillo, said here Tuesday that McLean's annual wagon train is a "human interest story that can't be beat."

Smith, guest speaker at the Lions Club's annual Farmer and Rancher Day luncheon in the Methodist Church, said such annual undertakings as the wagon train are an indication of progress in any town.

### Introduced by Mayor John C. Haynes, Smith discussed his recent trip to Tahiti, New Zealand and Australia.

Special emphasis was placed by the speaker on the agricultural aspects of the three countries visited.

Agriculture is not an important industry in Tahiti, Smith said, even though there have been attempts to establish plantations on the island.

Tahiti As Expected

He said Tahiti is so isolated "it's just like you've heard it is."

New Zealand, Smith reported, is a true socialistic state. The government there owns and operates transportation facilities, hotels and even restaurants.

There is no food problem in New Zealand, he said. All cattle are grass-fed, with no feed lots in the country.

He said he saw no abandoned farms there and all farms are well kept.

However, the government controls over agriculture and all business are so strict farmers are unable to afford many luxuries.

"Really Get Going"

Smith believes the country could "really get going" if relieved of government encumbrances.

Australia is almost as socialistic as New Zealand, Smith found, but while New Zealand patterns itself after England, Australia is much like the United States.

The speaker said that one of the shocking things about both countries was the huge beer consumption. In New Zealand, with a population of 2.3 million, the per capita beer consumption is 22 gallons per year.

In Australia, having a population of 11 million, the consumption is even higher than in New Zealand.

Smith said the KGNC farm department is presently working on a spectacular film made in Hawaii and Japan. The film will be released about Sept. 15.

Nelson Christie, new McLean High School agriculture teacher, presented two awards at the luncheon Tuesday.

One went to young Joe Taylor for his Future Farmers of America work in electricity. The other, a Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, was received by Jack Shelton for The McLean News.

## SCHOOL WILL OPEN MONDAY AT ALANREED

### Reception Planned Friday Night For 3 New Teachers

The Alanreed School is "ready to go after quite an active summer," Supt. George D. Smith said this week as preparations were being completed for beginning the 1962-63 term.

Smith announced that the board of trustees and employees of the school district will meet at 7:30 p. m. today in the school cafeteria to discuss school policies and duties.

Then Friday night, at 7:30 p. m. in the gymnasium, the annual reception for new teachers is scheduled, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Organization.

"We hope everyone will come out Friday night and personally get acquainted with the teachers," the superintendent said.

Enrollment and the start of classes will be Monday morning, Smith reported. Buses will make their routes on that day.

The superintendent said 40 students are expected in the Alanreed school's eight grades, a slight increase over last year.

The enrollment is showing a gain despite the fact the school lost seven elementary students who attended there last year and five other students entering the ninth grade this fall.

Three new teachers have been employed.

Eugene Dickenson, with 22 years of teaching experience, comes to Alanreed from Arizona. He holds a master's degree with majors in both math and English.

Dickenson has been assigned as math and English teacher in the seventh and eighth grades.

Mrs. R. B. McMillen moved to Alanreed from Lakeview. With 17 years of experience, she holds a master's degree in education and will teach the third and fourth grades.

C. W. Ballard, a native of Naegoches, is to teach social studies and science in the seventh and eighth grades, in addition to serving as assistant coach.

Ballard has a bachelor of science degree with a major in social studies and minor in science. This will be his first teaching assignment.

The Alanreed school has received a face-lifting during the summer, with grass being planted, new paint, new portable science cabinet and several new desks.

## VACATION AT END; CLASSES OPEN MONDAY

McLean High School students began enrolling for the 1962-63 term this morning, and youngsters entering grade school and junior high are to join in the registration period Friday.

Supt. Lee Welch said two days are being allowed for registering high school students, but the younger children will enrol Friday only.

Kindergarten enrollment also will be held on Friday.

Hours for registering are 8 a. m. to noon and 1 to 5 p. m. in the respective school buildings.

Welch reminded high school students taking typing to bring their \$5 fee to class on Monday.

He also reminded students that cars are not to be driven "whatsoever" by any student during school hours.

12 Credits

A new State Department of Education directive eliminates credit for driver training, the superintendent said.

This year's freshman class also will be required to have 18 credits for graduation, compared to the present 16. Actually, the two additional credits include 1 1/2 units for physical education and one-half for health, which now is a required subject in high school.

Classes are scheduled to begin at 8:30 a. m. this year, instead of 8:35 as in the past.

The first day of school will be next Monday, and the following Monday classes are to be dismissed for the Labor Day holiday.

Teachers, administrators and school board members and wives and husbands will attend the annual pre-school breakfast at 7 a. m. Friday in the school cafeteria.

## Farm Facts

There are some exciting new developments in food processing, according to Phillip B. Dwozkin of the Marketing Economics Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In "dehydrefreezing," fruits and vegetables are dried to about 50% of their original weight and then frozen and kept frozen. Quality of the thawed and cooked food is equal to that of the normal frozen product, and there are savings in freezing, packaging, storage, and shipping costs.

"Freeze-drying," another development, offers even more convenience and produces foods of high, fresh-flavor quality.

Food (cooked or uncooked) under this process is dehydrated under vacuum while frozen. Freeze-dried foods apparently do not become toughened or shriveled, and when rehydrated, regain their original flavor and texture. Properly sealed, these foods can be stored at room temperatures for long periods of



time. Although present emphasis is on meat products, fresh-dried shrimp are available for the institutional market, and sportsmen can buy complete, already cooked entrees.
