## Panhandle Panthers Due In McLean Friday Night

### STOP SIGNS GOING BACK NEAR SCHOOL

The McLean city commission Tuesday night gave its approval to the city budget for fiscal 1963, subject to possible changes before becoming effective on Oct. 1.

Aldermen also approved a request from the McLean board of education for re-installing stop signs at the intersection of Fourth and Main Streets.

The signs on Main Street were removed at the end of the school term last spring. Erection of the signs again will make a four-way stop at the intersection, located just south of the McLean Grade School.

**Make Area Safer**  
The board of education felt the signs were needed to make the area safer for school children.

The city commission gave its approval to installing a gas-burning air-conditioning and heating unit in the city hall, instead of using an evaporative cooler as specified in the original remodeling plans.

Installation of the new year-round air-conditioning unit will increase the cost of the remodeling work by \$750.

Work on the city hall was begun last month by K. W. Hambricht of McLean. Hambricht had submitted the low bid on the project.

### Baptist Association Meets Next Week

The 49th session of the North Fork Baptist Association is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 22, at the First Baptist Church of Wellington. Morning and afternoon sessions are to begin at 9:45 and 1:15, respectively.

The annual sermon will be delivered by Rev. Frank Ross, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.

Outstanding visiting speakers will include Dr. Guy Newman, president of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, speaking on "Christian Education"; Rev. Grayson Glass, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church in Amarillo, speaking twice from the book of Genesis, and Rev. Chester O'Brien, pastor of Paramount Baptist Church in Amarillo, bringing the closing message in the afternoon.

There will be a review of the important work done by the churches and by the association during the past year.

Rev. Meredith E. Wyatt, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Shamrock, is the present moderator and Rev. Glenn Hickey of Wellington's First church, is vice moderator.

## Tigers Lose 19-0 In First Game

Defeated in their first game of the season last week, the McLean High School Tigers perform before the homefolks Friday night when they entertain the Panhandle Panthers.

Kickoff time at Duncan Field will be 8 p. m.

While the Tigers were losing to the Shamrock Irishmen 19-0 last Friday, the Panhandle Panthers were clipping Spearman 16-6 in their opening game.

Panhandle is coached by Ed Lehnick, former head coach at Lefors.

Tiger Coach Derral Davis said Wednesday the locals "need lots of work on offense," and they have had a steady diet of this phase of football this week.

Injuries have hurt the Bengals thus far, with Jim McCarty, who was to have handled the quarter-backing chores, sidelined with a bad knee.

McCarty will be out of the lineup for four to six weeks.

Coach Davis said he thought the Tigers "scrapped well" against the bigger and more experienced Shamrock Irishmen, and pointed especially to the fine performances turned in by John Evans, Don Woods and Bob Patton.

Evans, McLean's hard-playing center, was injured and forced to leave the game at Shamrock.

Davis said Dickie Crockett and Gary Graham also did well against the Irishmen, and he praised Mike Johnson and David Seaney for their action in their first game in Tiger uniforms.

Use of the quick-kick helped the Tigers keep Shamrock in check through most of Friday's game, but the tough Irishmen weren't to be denied their victory.

**Fumble Helps Irish**  
A fumble by McLean set the stage for the Irishmen's first score. Shamrock recovered on their own 47 and began the march downfield, using passes and hard charging on the ground.

Dick Reeves bootlegged around right end for one yard and the first touchdown with 90 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

The conversion try was no good. A combination of passes and ground-gaining charges gave the hosts another TD with six minutes and 40 seconds remaining in the first half.

Reeves again bootlegged, this time to the left, for the score. But again the extra point try failed.

Gray Benson added the third and final tally for Shamrock on an 80-yard run in the third and final tally for Shamrock was good this time.

## Gray County Budget Reaches \$1,175,428

A \$1,175,428 budget for fiscal year 1963 was approved Monday for Gray County by the county commissioners.

This is an increase above the \$986,000 for the past fiscal year, but the tax rate was set at the same—\$1.29—based on property valuation of \$54,457,000.

Property valuation in the county is down approximately \$1 from the past year.

The tax rate has been unchanged for the past eight years.

## LIONS' EYE BANK READY

Hi-Plains Eye Bank, Inc., activities will open on Saturday at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, according to Omar Hermesmeyer, president of the Lions Club-sponsored project.

Hermesmeyer, in a news release sent to The McLean News this week, said the eye bank booth will be located in the Fairgrounds Sports Arena.

McLean Lions and other clubs throughout the Panhandle are participating in the eye bank. The local club voted several months ago to purchase a container for transporting corneas for transplant operations.

**Long in Planning**  
Opening of the eye bank climaxes almost two years of preparation by the area Lions Clubs.

Hermesmeyer said donor cards will be distributed to all clubs in the Panhandle. Residents of the various cities and towns will be asked to sign the cards, donating their eyes to the bank after death.

Within 24 hours following the death of a donor, the eyes are to be removed and taken to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo for use in restoring the eyesight of a person blinded because of cornea damage.

St. Anthony's has been designated as a receiving station for the eyes.

### WHEAT PASTURE

Most of the High Plains got fair good showers last week. A large acreage will be sown by the end of this week.

If we can get one good rain on this wheat after it comes up, we will have another excellent prospect for a wheat pasture year.

Although wheat planted now can make excellent wheat pasture, it is about two weeks late to be considered ideal.

As far as yield potential is concerned, wheat planted from Oct. 1 to 10 usually out-yields the earlier planted wheat. There is little chance of any wheat pasture.

A disease of wheat called "Wheat Streaked Mosaic" attacked all the early planted wheat last year in the county. By planting after Oct. 1 a farmer can avoid the disease which is carried by an insect called tulip mite.

The mite doesn't have the ability to transmit the disease from one plant to another when the temperature is below 60 degrees. Usually our mean temperature will average below this by Oct. 1.

Many farmers on top plan to hold off on planting date on the account of this new disease. However, many farmers that ran their own cattle on wheat pasture last fall and winter grossed from \$40 to \$60 per head in a five to six-month period.

This is equivalent to a 20-bushel wheat crop. It is hard to figure out why so many have their drills running now.

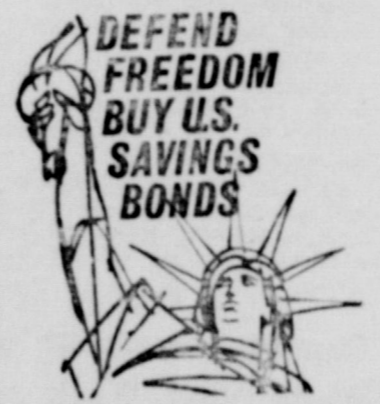

**154 Vacancies Are Reported in Texas Uniformed Services**

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill the 154 vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, commander of this region for the Texas DPS.

The commander said this new method of recruiting has not been used in the entire history of the Texas Department of Public Safety prior to this year. Entrance examinations were formerly given two or three times a year, now the examinations are given the second Saturday of each month throughout the state of Texas.

The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are given include Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls. Dec. 8, 1962, will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given for entrance in the next student patrol school, a 16-week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin in February, 1963.

Hutchison said that upon successful completion of the 16-week training course, graduates will become commissioned officers and will be assigned to the field. The salary while in training will be \$31 per month and will increase to \$36 or \$42 per month upon graduation, depending on the nature of the patrolman's assignment.

Longevity pay increment of \$10 extra per month will be added for each five years of service for each of the uniformed services, which are the Highway Patrol, license and weight, driver's license and motor vehicle inspection.

In addition, uniforms and equipment will be furnished, and the officers will participate in the state retirement plan. There are other personal benefits they will have, such as job security, annual vacations, sick leave and insurance benefits.

Applicants must have a high school education or the equivalent, be in good physical condition and be of good moral character. They must be not less than 5'8" nor more than 6'4" tall, and weigh not less than two pounds or more than three pounds per inch of height.
