McLean Whips Lefors 6-3 To End Season With 5-5 Record

TIGERS TAKE PIRATES IN TOP THRILLER

McLean's Tigers finished up their 1962 football season last Friday night in exactly the fashion they had hoped.

They defeated their long-time rivals, the Lefors Pirates, 6-3 in a rock-sock-em contest that kept fans from both towns on the edge of their seats until the final horn.

Tiger Coach Derral Davis heaped the praise on his charges for "rising above" injuries, inexperience and the fact that they were outweighed by their opponents in virtually every game this season.

The victory over Lefors gave the Bengals a 5-5 record for a season in which most fans would have been happy with a single win.

Speaking before the Lions Club Tuesday, Davis said he was "pleased and quite proud" of the entire squad, which showed more determination than he had ever before seen in a team.

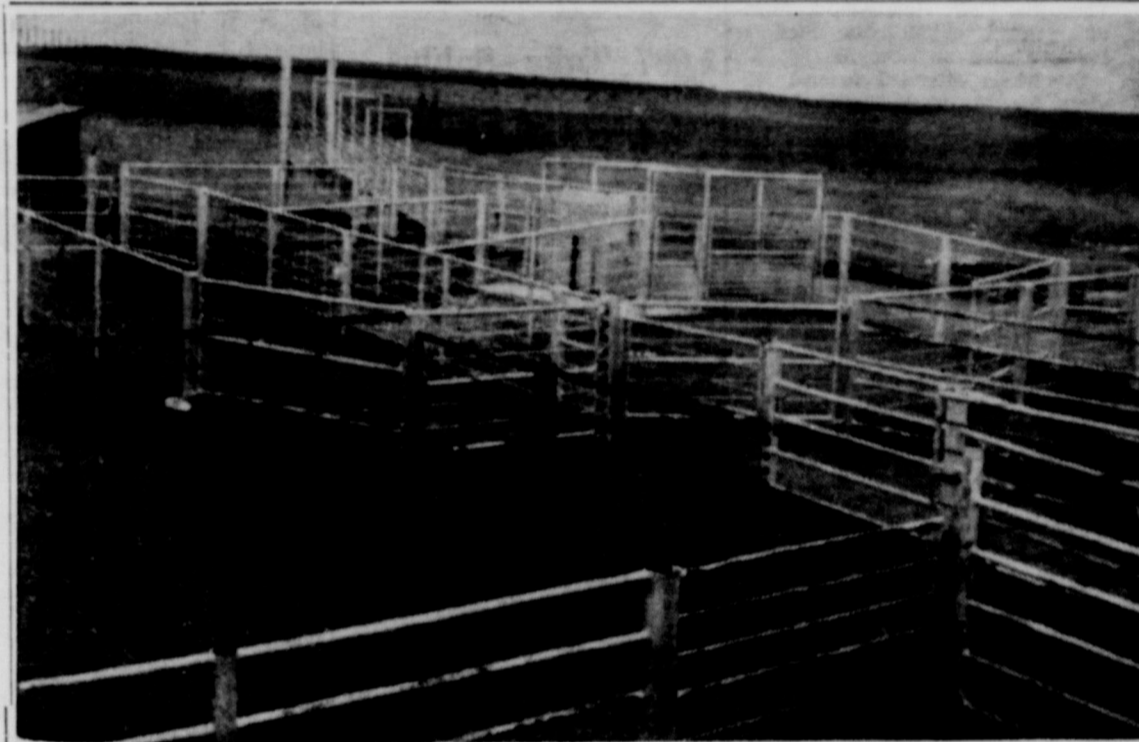
Fans Praised

Davis also praised the fans for their loyalty to the team.

Last Friday marked the only District 2-A defeat suffered by Coach Danny Goode's Lefors Pirates this season. The win was McLean's third in district play.

Only Clarendon and Memphis were able to handle the Tigers in the district, while Canadian, Wellington and Lefors—the last three McLean opponents—were subdued.

The Pirates had a bi-district payoff berth clinched even before meeting the Tigers Friday. Lefors faces the undefeated Sunray Bobcats, champions in District 1-A. (See GAME, Page 2)

Just Between Us

It is McLean may have missed the thrilling runs of one Jim Watson during the football season just completed, but others have certainly been enjoying them. To quote from The Bulletin, "The A and M College newspaper of Nov. 9, 'Aggie Halfback Jim Watson... as a one-man demolition crew he intercepted three passes... in the end zone, recovered... a fumble leading to A and M's first score, ran back a kick... for 28 yards, caught two passes... for 35 yards and carried the ball... for 38 yards from scrimmage.' The article was an account of the Aggie freshman's 17-12 victory over the Rice Owlets on Nov. 8. Watson, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Watson, graduated from McLean High School last spring and is in his freshman year at A and M. The win over Rice was the Aggie's first victory of the season. They had been defeated by TCU 28-13, Baylor 28-13 and tied Houston 14-14.

Snow in McLean Over 4 Inches

McLean's first snowfall of the season, catching the awakening city by surprise last Saturday morning, was a real whopper—measuring at six inches in some portions of this area.

Officially, the blanket totaled 4½ inches, and melted out to .42 inch of moisture.

Predictions for another four-inch of snow on Sunday failed to materialize, however, with only a few flakes falling here that afternoon.

Saturday's snow, which started about 6 a.m. and continued through much of the day, was a couple of days later than the first in 1961. Last year the first recorded snow occurred on Nov. 15.

The moisture total for the year 1962 now is 18.58 inches, compared to 24.88 on this date in 1961.

Temperatures Down

Temperatures registered the arrival of the snow Saturday, with a low of 32 and a high of 34 recorded for the day. Sunday was even colder, the mercury climbed to a high of only 32 and dropped to a low of 29.

Cotton farmers saw their hopes of getting harvesting operations in high gear suddenly dashed by the white blanket.

B. F. Holland, manager of the McLean Gin, said Tuesday afternoon that not a bale of cotton had been ginned all week. He doesn't expect any more until next week.

To date a total of 290 bales have been ginned at the local gin.

Determination Evident

From the opening kickoff last Friday, the Tigers showed determination to pull off the upset of the season in the Panhandle.

With Bob Patton, John Evans, Eddy Windom and, in fact, all members of the squad stiffening up on defense, McLean halted the visitors' first deep thrust—that started with the opening kickoff—on the Tiger 15-yard line.

Then after moving out to the 25, the Tigers fumbled with Lefors recovering.

After three tries—including a five-yard penalty, 11-yard loss and incomplete pass—Lefors punted, and McLean took over on its 25-yard line.

And thus the see-saw fight continued the rest of the first half.

Pirates Get Field Goal

The first scoring in the game came with six minutes and 26 seconds left in the third quarter. Lefors had pushed down to the McLean 5, but was stalled short of a first down.

Faced with a fourth down and four situation, the Pirates decided to try for a field goal. Don McCool kicked straight and true, and Lefors was on the scoreboard.

On their own 31 after a punt in the fourth period, the Tigers began their game-winning drive.

Donnie Woods, paying his final game in a Tiger uniform, got to the 36, and dependable Dickie Crockett—big McLean ground-gainer for the night—picked up a first down on the 41.

Gary Graham picked his way to McLean's 47, Woods added another yard and Crockett was called on again for the first down try—he got it on the Lefors 43.

Woods lost to the 50-yard stripe, but Crockett plowed his way to the visitors' 43.

Spectacular Run

At this point the most spectacular run of the night began.

Graham took the ball on a hand-off and seemed stopped at the Lefors 40, with Pirates surrounding him and grabbing at his feet.

He suddenly shook loose, angled to his right and picked up speed. At around the 20 Harlon Pool blocked out the closest Pirate to Graham, but Lefors' Fullback Rodney Airington dashed across in time to haul the speeding McLean halfback down on the three-yard line.

It took Crockett three tries, but he succeeded in crossing the goal stripe.

Patton's conversion attempt failed, giving the Tigers a surprising 6-3 lead with 7:59 left in the game.

Moments later McLean had what appeared to be the makings of another scoring drive, when a Tiger recovered a Pirate fumble on the Lefors 26.

But they could get no closer than the 18 before losing the ball on downs.

The Pirates came battling back, and with Airington, Neal Cates and Tom Smith handling the ball-carrying chores they raced their way to the McLean 29.

Woods ended the threat by intercepting a pass and galloping to Lefors' 42. The game ended with the Tigers on the Pirate 20.

Airington was injured on Graham's thrilling run, and was hospitalized with a concussion. However, he is expected to be ready for action in Friday night's game with Sunray.

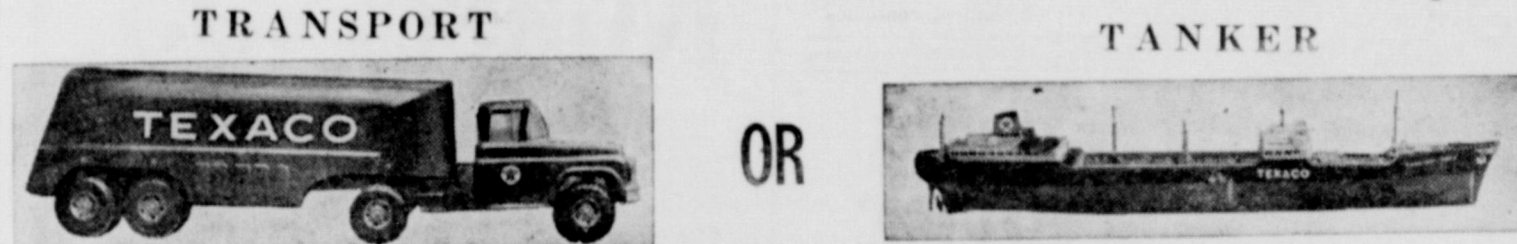

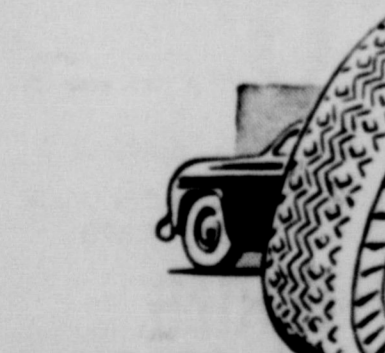

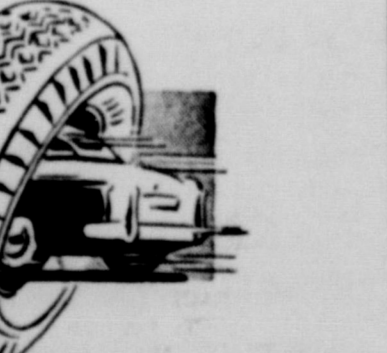

DONLEY STOCK TESTS SLATED

Testing of livestock in Donley County for brucellosis probably will start a little earlier than previously expected, according to H. M. (Flip) Breedlove, county agent.

Breedlove reported this week that he had discussed the testing with Dr. T. H. Leenerts, district veterinarian for the brucellosis program stationed at Amarillo, and was informed that work probably will start around the middle of December.

Ranchers and livestock owners of Donley County petitioned the Animal Health Commission of Texas for the testing this past August.

"It is planned to have a county-wide meeting of all livestock owners just prior to starting of the testing and have Dr. Leenerts present so that he can tell the livestock owners how the program will be handled," Breedlove said.

Blood samples will be tested in a mobile laboratory set up by the commission in Carendon. Everyone will be notified of the meet-date through the local newspapers.

Everyone interested in the program is invited to attend the meeting, the county agent said. He explained that this will probably speed up the testing program.

Dr. Leenerts told Breedlove he hoped to complete all work in Donley County in about one month. Some four crews will be working in the county on this program for the Animal Health Commission.
