The word "matrix" means abstrusely nothing to the average newspaper reader. But to the person who put out the paper... there wouldn't be one (paper) without 'em (matrices).

It's our way of explaining to you as you read the News this week, you're sure to find a few things missing.

As long as we're discussing this subject, we may as well make it a bit educational. So... hundreds of these mats (as printers call them) are stored in Linotype magazines. Each mat is a sort of tiny mold.

Grouped together in the proper order, they form words. Then the metal is squirted against them in the Linotype, a line of type is formed. These lines are set in the forms from which the printed page comes.

After a line is formed, the mats return to their proper place in the magazine.

## TIGERS OPEN SEASON WITH 42-28 VICTORY

Tigerettes Lose To Stinnett; Both Teams in Tourney

Making the switch from the gridiron to the hardwoods seemed an easy change for the McLean Tigers Tuesday night, when they laid a 42-28 defeat on the Stinnett Rattlers.

But the Tigerettes found the going tougher in their season-opener at Stinnett, and they were trimmed 50-35.

This afternoon the two local squads traveled to Miami for the first round of action in the Miami Tournament.

The Tigerettes were to meet Canadian at 2:45 p.m. and the boys tackle Canadian's Wildcats at 4.

The tournament continues through Saturday.

Next Tuesday the Tigers and Tigerettes leave home again to face Hedley. The following Thursday, they enter the three-day Shamrock Tournament.

Play Here Dec. 11

Their first home games will be here on Dec. 11 against Hedley. Derrith Welch led Coach Derral Davis' Tigers to their win over Stinnett, scoring 23 points and grabbing 17 rebounds.

Eddy Windom tallied 10 points and had 11 rebounds; Don Woods, eight with four rebounds, and Jim McCarty, one with five rebounds.

The Tigers led 9-2 at the close of the first quarter, 22-12 at half-time and 36-19 after three periods.

Jan Bailey's 12 points was the best effort of the evening for the Tigerettes of Coach Loyd Hunt.

LaVon Watson finished the evening with 11, Judy Connell with six, Joan Flowers five and Sharon Goldston one.

Stinnett led all the way in downing the McLean girls. The hosts had a 14-7 advantage after one period, 23-19 at the half and ended the third quarter 30-24.

In this season of junkets, far too many of our senators and representatives spend far too much of our nation's money on fancy vacations throughout the world. Somehow they seem to have "business" — committee assignments, etc.—in the countries they want to visit most. Uncle Sam (you and I) picks up the tab, providing not only the transportation but also spending money for them after they get to their destination.

The "counterpart fund," as we understand it, is money certain countries keep on deposit for the United States, instead of sending the cash for the goods they receive from us.

It's one sure way those nations have of not draining their reserves. At a time when our gold reserve is dwindling rapidly, as other nations take the gold, perhaps we should have a similar arrangement.

Instead of letting them take our gold, keep it in reserve and make them come here and spend it.

The play is directed by the class co-sponsors, Mrs. Mary Tom Riley and Nelson Christie.

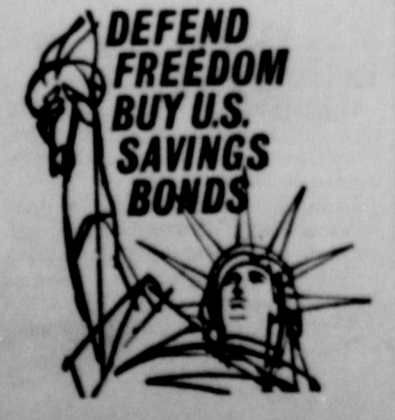
**Emme Grigsby On College Honor Roll**

**Marketing Quotas On Upland Cotton Due Dec. 11 Decision**

A national marketing quota referendum on upland cotton will be held in Gray County and all across the nation on Dec. 11.

Miss Evelyn Mason, manager of the Gray County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Pampa, announced this week that the referendum had been called by the secretary of agriculture.

Cotton allotments for county farmers have been computed and will be mailed to producers shortly, so they will be received prior to the voting, Miss Mason said.

Voting places will be at the McLean city hall and Pampa ASCS office. Polls are to be open from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m., and all cotton producers are urged to vote.

**Determines Support**  
If marketing quotas are approved in the Dec. 11 referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their allotments for upland cotton at a level within the range of 65 to 90 per cent of parity.

In order to be effective, marketing quotas must be approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers over the nation.

Miss Mason explained, however, that if more than one-third of the growers oppose quotas, the quotas and marketing penalties will not be in effect for the 1963 crop.

But allotments will remain in effect next year as a means of determining eligibility for price support, which then would be available at 50 per cent of parity.

**Master Gland Key to Health**

Why can some persons quickly and easily throw off every infection while others constantly wage a losing battle against one germ after another?

Why do most individuals react with overwhelming success to a vaccine, while it has very little effect on other persons?

Is there perhaps a master gland that triggers the immune reactions?

"Yes, it's the thymus gland," says Dr. Robert A. Good, research professor of pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, and March of Dimes grantee.

Dr. Good recently won the annual award medal of the American Society for Experimental Pathology, much of his work being done with National Foundation financial support.

He detailed the results of experiments carried out in collaboration with other scientists which, he said, provide evidence that the thymus is a key organ in the body's endless struggle to protect itself against harmful substances. The thymus is located behind the breastbone in humans.

Much of Dr. Good's study was based on observation of 125 patients with agammaglobulinemia, a rare disease occurring most often in children whose bodies fail to produce gamma globulin, the substance in the blood which forms antibodies to fight off invasion by germs and other foreign substances.

Further study showed the association of other diseases with agammaglobulinemia, including a high incidence of rheumatoid arthritis and related diseases; leukemia and Hodgkin's disease (cancer of the lymph glands); and other disabilities suspected to result from malfunction of the immune system.

This led Dr. Good and his associates to the thymus as the important organ of immunity. The theory was tested by removing the thymus of rabbits less than five days old.

They proved later to be unable to form antibodies in any way and thus could not throw off disease.

Secondly, Dr. Good found that these same animals would accept skin grafts from other rabbits. Normally, skin can be transplanted only between identical twins. By this means the doctor was able to show how the natural barriers to tissue transplantation can be knocked down merely by removal of the thymus in the newborn.

This phenomenon, the Minnesota pediatrician believes, has a human parallel, namely agammaglobulinemia, where antibodies are usually absent. For example, one of the children with this disease now under study by Dr. Good's group has been carrying an intact skin graft for more than seven years—even though the skin had been taken from a unrelated donor.

Studies of this sort, Dr. Good pointed out, have been possible only during the last decade since modern treatment has enabled the survival of children with immunologic deficiency diseases, and new laboratory techniques made possible the accurate analysis of blood and tissue components.

"We are gradually getting much closer to understanding the whole process of immunity and its relation to disease," Dr. Good said. "We now can see a real possibility of learning how to manipulate and overcome the natural barriers to transplantation of human organs, such as the kidney, as well as other tissues."

"It's tempting to speculate that someday we may have thymus gland banks just as we now have blood banks and bone banks, in order to supply thymus tissues for persons whose immune response is below par. This may also provide us with a means of altering an individual's immunologic pattern by implanting foreign thymus cells when the need arises."

The March of Dimes-supported scientist pointed out that further studies of animals artificially deprived of the ability to produce antibodies are urgently needed to provide insight into rheumatoid arthritis and other diseases which occur in patients with agammaglobulinemia.

Fundamental research aimed at unraveling these disease mysteries is already under way with March of Dimes support at medical centers throughout the country, including Dr. Good's laboratory.

Monday's shower increased to 1.09 inch the moisture McLean has received during the month. For the year, the total now stands at 19.25 inches.

On this date in 1961, moisture totaled 24.88 inches. Low temperature reading for the week was 32 degrees recorded last Thursday. The high was 73 on Wednesday of last week.

## Housing for Senior Citizens Provision Of FHA Legislation

L. J. Cappelman, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, has advised the county FHA supervisor, James Gouddy, that recent legislation amends Title V of the Housing Act of 1949 by adding new provisions which authorize loans and grants for moderate cost housing and related facilities for elderly persons and families in rural areas.

It liberalized some regulations on rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration and sets up new direct and insured loan programs. This new legislation will be administered in Donley, Gray and Armstrong Counties by USDA's Farmers Home Administration. Rural housing loans are made by this agency to farmers and other families living in rural areas who need improved housing and cannot qualify for credit from other sources.

One new provision will give those people who are 62 years of age or over special advantages not available under the earlier loan program. First, they can buy previously-occupied existing housing as well as improve their homes.

Second, they can finance the cost of the building site as well as the dwelling with the loan proceeds; other families must own the land on which to build the homes before they can apply for a loan. Third, co-signers may be used by elderly applicants who are deficient in repayment ability. Like rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration, these direct loans will bear interest at the rate of four per cent and may be repaid over a period not exceeding 33 years.

For detailed information concerning rural housing loans for the senior citizens, interested persons may contact Gouddy in the Agricultural Building at Clarendon.

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**THE HOUSE TO HOUSE SALESMAN**

Joe Greenriver had been traveling to various cities selling magazine subscriptions. At each new town he would go from house to house selling subscriptions to the occupants.

He had been selling in Pleasantville for a couple of days when he was arrested and fined for violating a city ordinance which prohibited such door to door soliciting.

"You can't do this to me," screamed Joe. "This ordinance violates my rights of free speech, free press, and my right to work. It's unconstitutional!"

Can a city pass an ordinance prohibiting uninvited peddlers or solicitors from going into private property to sell goods or solicit orders?

Yes, said the U.S. Supreme Court. Persons seeking private gain cannot be permitted under the guise of free speech or right to work, to infringe upon the rights of others. Such a case calls for an adjustment of constitutional rights in the light of the particular living conditions of the time and place. Different communities may well call for different laws and regulations as to methods and manners of doing business. Everyone cannot have his own way, but each must yield something to the reasonable satisfaction of the needs of all.

Communities can control such practices by ordinance. The court ruled that this ordinance was constitutional.

WASHINGTON AND  
**"SMALL BUSINESS"**

Starting on January 1, it will cost one cent more to mail a letter or a postcard.

This increase was ballooned as necessary to wipe out post office operating deficit.

Thus, presumably, the postal service will now be a going concern. But this is not quite true, because in raising postal rates Congress also raised the pay of some 1,600,000 government employees. Only 800,000 of them are connected with the post office.

Therefore, this rate increase enacted to wipe out a deficit will fall short by an estimated \$400 million of meeting the new costs incurred.

This keeps the record perfect for it cannot be said that the taxpayer was ever relieved of any burden. In addition, the number of \$20,000 per year employees in government will reach a new all time high.

But of course, the number of civilian federal employees has also reached an all time high. Congressman Earl Wilson of Indiana states he was quite shocked with waste of taxpayer money when he came to Washington 20 years ago, now he's completely astonished.

For the Congressman says, "Walk into any federal office, National Federation of Independent Business"

As I have been doing. You will see people sitting behind rows of desks. Some are men, some are women. A few of the more experienced, needed personnel are working. The rest are just plain loafing—parasites living off the sweat of the taxpayer's brow. They read magazines, work crossword puzzles, write letters to friends, talk among themselves, or sit and stare.

"When the telephone rings," Rep. Wilson continues, "it is a major triumph for the one who gets to answer it. Someone is calling! There is a rush for the phone and the called might be surprised at how the call is stretched out and how detailed the questions are, even if results from the call aren't forthcoming."

He further states that in the past two years an average of 300 new employees per day have been added to the federal payroll.

Yet in raising postal rates and government pay together, it was announced that one objective is to make federal pay comparable to that paid in private industry. Thus there is presented an interesting paradox. For on the basis of Congressman Wilson's reported observations, for thousands of federal employees, parity for them with private industry would be 26 weeks on unemployment compensation. And it would seem logical that if the objective is to make government employees equal to private business employees, the thing should be done whole hog. It is doubtful, however, this is what the bureaucrats had in mind.

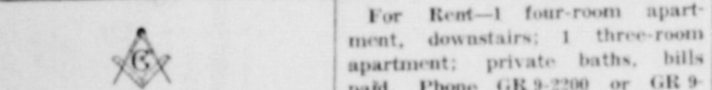

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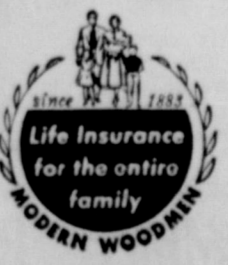
