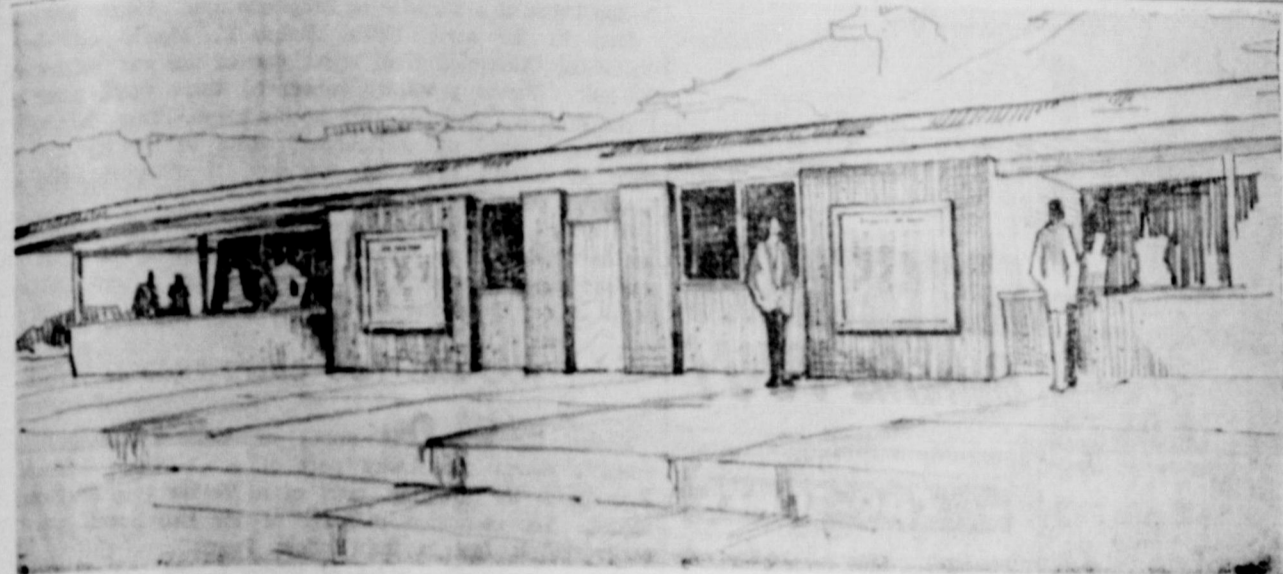

FACTORY TESTS SET FOR CUBAN REFUGEES

APPROVAL OF PLAN GIVEN AT MEETING

Preparations for bringing a number of Cuban refugees to McLean were going forward this week, after an estimated 75 local business people voted approval in a meeting Monday night.

Not a dissenting vote was recorded at Monday's session, held in the high school auditorium. Mayor John C. Haynes and Cliff Day discussed the possibility of bringing the Cuban women here.

Cal Fraser, owner of the Marie Foundations factory in McLean, announced following the meeting that he will go to Miami, Fla., probably next week to screen and test Cuban women interested in seeking jobs at the local factory.

The federal government will pay their transportation to McLean and provide them with a small amount of money for living expenses until they begin receiving pay.

Fraser had insisted when the possibility of relocating the refugees here was first suggested that he would be unwilling to go along with the plan unless the group of McLean going.

Mayor Haynes will accompany Fraser to Florida.

Fraser had to return to California and was not present at the meeting of business people.

No large number of Cubans will be brought to McLean at one time. Fraser plans while in Florida to prepare a list of women qualified for employment at the factory, then call them as needed—in groups of five to 10.

It is not known at this time how many will come to the city.

Fraser explained to the city commission that factory production is below capacity, and an increase is urgently needed.

More Employees Needed

He said he has hired all available women qualified and interested in working at the factory, and (See CUBANS, Page 7)

One State Band Alternate 10 Band Students On All-Regional

McLean students did themselves proud at the Regional Band contest held last week in Hereford.

Of 81 students chosen for the All-Regional Band, 10 were from the McLean Tiger Band—and all were in the upper part of their respective sections, according to Director Jim Boyd.

Sharon Sitter, who plays the alto clarinet, and Linda Guill, the French horn, were chosen as first chairs in their sections.

Joyce Beasley was placed as second chair clarinet; Marilyn Magee was third chair flute; Janice Saunders, third chair alto saxophone, and Jim McCarty, fourth chair.

Mike Johnson placed in the sixth chair cornet; Carolyn Willoughby, seventh chair cornet; Max Coleman, fourth chair baritone; Larry Williams, utility drummer.

Boyd said that "because of their high performance, seven of our 10 students were eligible to try out for the State Band. Since we had no idea we would fare so well, some of the try-out music was not available to our students for practice."

However, Miss Sitter was named as an alternate for the State Band. Thus, if one of the students in the State Band should not be able to attend, she will be permitted to play in the band.

Boyd reported that a recording of the Tiger Band performance was made at the contest, and it will be played at the next Band Boosters' meeting.

Short Foundation Assists 9 Students

The Short Foundation, established by Mrs. Alice Short Smith of McLean in memory of her parents, is currently providing financial assistance to nine students at West Texas State College in Canyon.

Mrs. Smith, a 1928 graduate of West Texas, gave a dinner for the nine students in the college cafeteria recently in order to become better acquainted with the group.

Students on the Short Foundation plan are Carol Ellis, Avlin Brownlee, Jo Hendricks, Lynda McCurley, LeAnn Pafford, Esther Salazar, Gienna Gaines, Judy Smith and Patricia Thomson.

Mrs. Smith is also a director of the Opportunity Plan, Inc., which was established to assist student in college.

A total of \$36,848 had been loaned to students through Aug. 21. The Opportunity Plan was established in 1954 with \$500.

Some 303 students have borrowed money from the plan so far in 1962.

PARK TO GET NEW LIGHTS

New Guardian lights will be installed at McLean's City Park, as the result of action taken Tuesday night by the city commission.

Aldermen voted to replace the present two standards containing regular incandescent bulbs with the new type of lights.

Three Guardian Lights are to be installed by Southwestern Public Service Co. There will be no installation charge for the new lights.

Actually, the Guardian Lights will represent a saving to the city. The present lighting system in the park costs \$12.50 per month. Operation of the Guardian lights will be \$4 each, or \$12 per month.

During their regular business meeting Tuesday night, aldermen also voted to place large stop signs in the middle of the streets in the vicinity of local school buildings.

The signs will be placed in the streets each school day morning and removed each afternoon after classes are dismissed.

The action was taken after representatives of the board of education requested improved traffic control around the school buildings.

The Alnreed Invitational Junior High Basketball Tournament opens this afternoon with seven schools represented.

In the girls' bracket, Alnreed was to face Groom "A" at 2 p.m. today, while McLean tackles Lela at 5:30 p.m., and Lefors and Groom "B" collide at 7:30.

Shamrock drew a bye in the first round of action.

In the boys' competition, Alnreed and Groom "A" were to square off at 3 p.m. today, followed by Shamrock vs. Kellerville at 4, Lela vs. McLean at 6:30 and Lefors vs. Groom "B" at 8:30.

The tournament will continue through Saturday, with the girls' championship game set for 7:30 p.m. and the boys' title game at 8:30 p.m. on the final day.

Welch Pacing the Tigers

Another tournament opens tonight for the McLean Tigers and Tigerettes—this time with Samnorwood as the site.

The Tigers are scheduled to meet Memphis at 6:45 p.m. today and the Tigerettes face the winner of this afternoon's Samnorwood-Quail game at 8.

Coach Derral Davis' Tigers, paced by sharp-shooting Derrith Welch, avenged an earlier loss here Tuesday night by downing Hedley 54-39.

Coach Lloyd Hunt's Tigerettes, however, fell victim to the tough Hedley girls for the second time 41-31.

Welch, showing big improvement

as the season progresses, hit 77 of his attempts from the field and sank all seven free throw tries (or 29 points).

He also accounted for 11 rebounds.

Don Woods added 10 points and seven rebounds; Eddy Windom eight and nine; Ronnie Hunt five and two, and Glen Swift two and eight.

LaVon Watson tallied 12 points for the Tigerettes, followed by Joan Flowers with nine, Judy Connell three and Sharon Goldston seven.

The Tigers won the consolation title in the Shamrock Tournament last weekend, and Welch and Woods were named to the All-

Tournament team.

Welch swished the basket for an average of 29.75 points per game in the tournament.

In the opening game, he counted 25 as the Tigers fell to Shamrock 54-45, then got 23 as McLean knocked over Wellington 35-32, and bagged an amazing 38 points in the locals' 51-26 triumph over Kellon.

In the consolation finals, the ratty junior hit for 33 points as McLean clipped Lefors 44-31.

The Tigerettes lost to Wellington 41-27 in their opening game at Shamrock. Watson scored 22 of the locals' points.

Highway Committee Asks Continuation Of Hedley Road

Members of the McLean highway committee adopted a resolution in a meeting here last Friday asking the State Highway Commission not to permit controversy in Donley County to hold up construction of the McLean to Hedley Road.

The resolution, passed unanimously by the committee, takes note of "certain difficulties in determining the most suitable siting of those portions of said highway lying south of the Salt Fork of Red River have intervened, so as to obstruct the orderly completion of said highway."

But the local committee asked the commission to proceed with construction of the highway north of Salt Fork and of the bridge across the river.

"It is respectfully submitted," the resolution states, "that if the commissioners should find that approval could be made of the construction of all these northern-most portions, which portions are in no way involved in controversy, such construction could fulfill to a substantial degree the purpose of the project as a whole."

Two Routes

The Highway Commission had announced plans to let the remaining part of the project under one contract. However, two routes are under consideration for the road south of the river.

The commission following a hearing in Austin chose the eastern route, which would terminate the road farther from Hedley than the Hedley highway committee desires.

Two weeks ago the Donley County commissioners court declined to furnish right-of-way for the eastern route and requested that the commission designate a western route to terminate the new road nearer Hedley.

The local committee's resolution also declared its policy is "to avoid any actual or seeming intermeddling in matters more properly determined by the Hedley citizens highway committee."

During Friday's meeting here, presided over by Chairman Boyd Meador, Spencer Sitter was appointed to the highway committee.

McLean, Alanreed Split Cage Games

The Alanreed Longhorns and McLean Junior High teams split a pair of basketball games last Thursday night in Alanreed.

McLean's junior girls won 18-15, while the Alanreed boys were victors by a score of 35-15.

Alanreed Supt. George Smith praised the sportsmanship of all four of the teams and the spectators in the games.

"It's meetings like this that make me proud to be able to associate with people and students of this caliber," Smith said.

Smith coaches the Alanreed teams, while the McLean squads are coached by John Ramp.

Just Between Us by J.B.O.

Many words have been said, both for and against the bringing of Cuban refugees to McLean. Whether we are right in favoring the plan won't be known until it is tried, and have no intention of being "put out" with anyone who might disagree.

This is one of the wonderful things about America. We can do what we please, without fear of a government agent or the police overbearing us. I had, we hope, without fear of being friends.

Her belief that this is the right thing to do was strengthened last week when Dr. Tomas Doran, formerly of Havana and now of Amarillo spoke to the Lions Club about conditions in Cuba.

It was strengthened more Wednesday afternoon when Slick and Ben Boyd brought us a letter they had received from a former resident of McLean.

The writer, Mrs. Harold Rippey of Fort Worth, began by deflating me a bit with the comment that she really didn't know "why she bother to take it (The McLean News), because there is very little news in it."

But she had read in last week's issue that we were thinking about bringing some Cuban refugees to McLean. And she had some comments more pleasing to us on this subject.

Mrs. Rippey and her husband moved away from McLean some 15 years ago. He is a brother of Mrs. Nida Rippey Green and sister Rippy of the Heald community.

Speaking from Mrs. Rippey's letter: "Our church has brought one Cuban family to Fort Worth, as many Methodist over the city have done. I think it is a wonderful thing to do and we find that all of these families are of the highest standard."

"Our family has two little girls in school. The girls speak English wonderfully well and they help the mother and dad understand us. We have had them since early infancy. They are members of our church now and attend regularly because of his English problem she is working as a janitor at a school."

"She is going to school to learn the language. We think of Cuba as Catholic but we found there was a lot of Methodist there."

"All we were asked to furnish was a place to live with furniture and one month's salary of \$200. We do not treat them as a needy family but one of us."

"This Christmas the adult class of our church are giving \$25 each to the family for things (See JRU, Page 7)

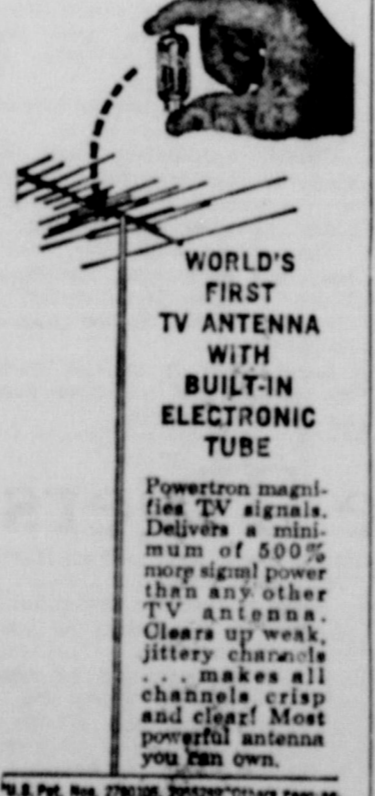

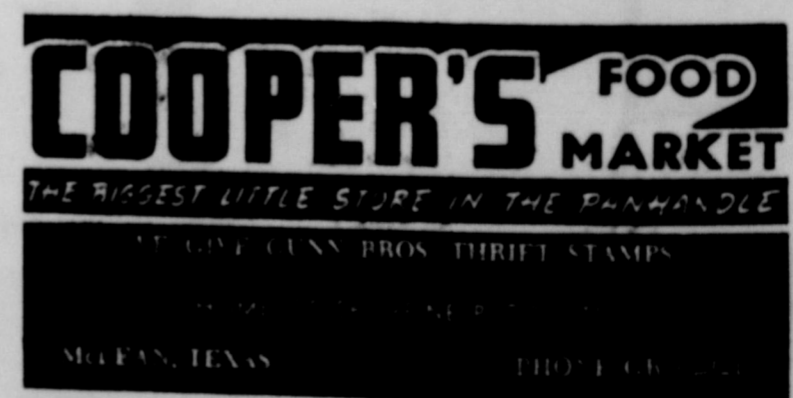

It is necessary to either look elsewhere for employes or construct another plant where there is a larger labor supply.

The factory owner prefers to expand operations in McLean, increasing the number of employes to 300 within the next few months and possibly further expanding the facilities here.

It was pointed out at Monday

night's meeting that each time a person living in McLean is employed at the factory, more of the payroll is retained here.

A survey conducted by the city shows there are more than 50 vacant houses and apartments in McLean.

As of Monday Marie Foundations had 229 employes. Of this number, 191 were from McLean, six from Alford, two from Keller-ville and one from Dozier. The remainder live outside this trade territory.

25 From Oklahoma

Twenty-five are from Oklahoma—Erick 20, Texola two, Sweetwater, Mayfield and Sayre one each.

Employes by other Texas towns include:

Lela six, Shamrock 41, Lefors nine, Pampa 13, Twitty four, Quail Route one, Clarendon one, Wheeler six, Mobeetie two and Hedley two.

The current payroll is about \$12,000 per week. Of this about 55 per cent, or \$6,600, is paid to employes from the McLean area.

Fraser emphasized that bringing of the Cubans to McLean will

not stop the hiring of local women. Qualified local and area women will continue to receive priority.

COTTON GINNING

Weather has kept cotton stripping to a slow pace. A gin breakdown last Tuesday halted ginning briefly.

A total of 594 bales have been ginned to date. Weather hasn't lowered the grade, but very little. Mr. B. F. Holland reports the value of the lowest grading bale at over 29 cents per pound.

LOCAL ANGUS SALE
George Saunders is to have his first registered Angus cattle sale on Dec. 17. I've been expecting to receive a copy of his catalogue, but to date have not received a copy.

TOMATO DISEASES
Newt Barker said he had trouble with his tomatoes last summer. He described the trouble as being a large rotten spot forming on the bottom side of the fruit.

This is what we call blossom end rot. Sometime it is caused by over watering. Some varieties are more resistant to the disease than others.

My wife, the guardian of the family, has real good luck with the Plainsmen variety of tomatoes. This variety was developed by the experiment station at Lubbock. They produce real well.

COW-CALF BUSINESS IN DRY LOT

An interesting experiment is being conducted at the Spur experiment station. This test has been in progress for three years.

Researchers are testing the feasibility of producing weaner calves under dry-lot conditions. Surprisingly enough, feed cost under dry-lot conditions compared very favorably with that of pasture cost.

Hand feeding a high silage ration cost \$78 per year while cost of maintaining a cow on pasture costs \$70.

Weaning weights of the calves were about the same on an average of the years.

Who knows, we might soon be producing calves under dry-lot conditions.

I have a copy of this report, if someone should be interested in studying it.



ABSTRACTS

While driving around a lake, John and Mary saw a "For Sale" sign on a piece of property which they thought they could afford to buy.

They made inquiry of the owner and agreed on a price. They inquired about title and the owner assured them that he would give them an "Abstract." They took the abstract, which was a fat book of papers, and the deed, filed the deed at the courthouse and thought no more about it, assuming, as many people do, that an "abstract" is an assurance of good title.

Some years later they went to sell to a buyer who was better informed. He insisted that either the abstract be examined and an opinion given by an attorney that the title was good or that the sellers must provide title insurance. When they sought an opinion as to whether the abstract showed good title, they were dismayed to find that the title was not in good order and that there would have to be a quiet-title lawsuit to dispose of some flaws in the title before the buyer would accept it. Neither would a title insurance company write a policy of insurance for them without legal action to clear up the title.

John and Mary were astounded to learn that they were wrong in assuming that an "abstract" was assurance of good title. An abstract is merely a record of every document which has ever been filed of record at the courthouse affecting the title to a particular piece of property. It may show good title or bad title, or no title at all. It is only a bundle of papers, as John and Mary discovered, which summarize the state of the title. Its possession does not in any way assure good title.

Thus while one may be able to get possession and peacefully oc-

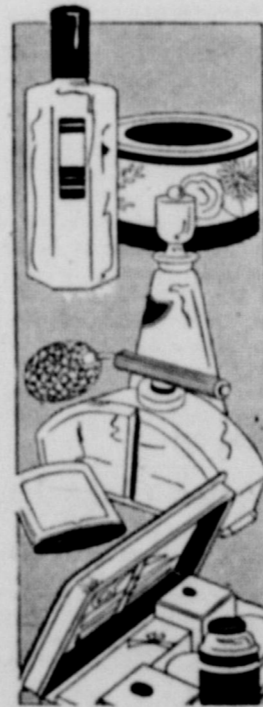

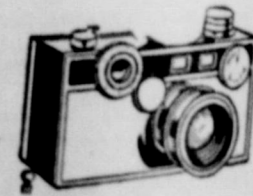
