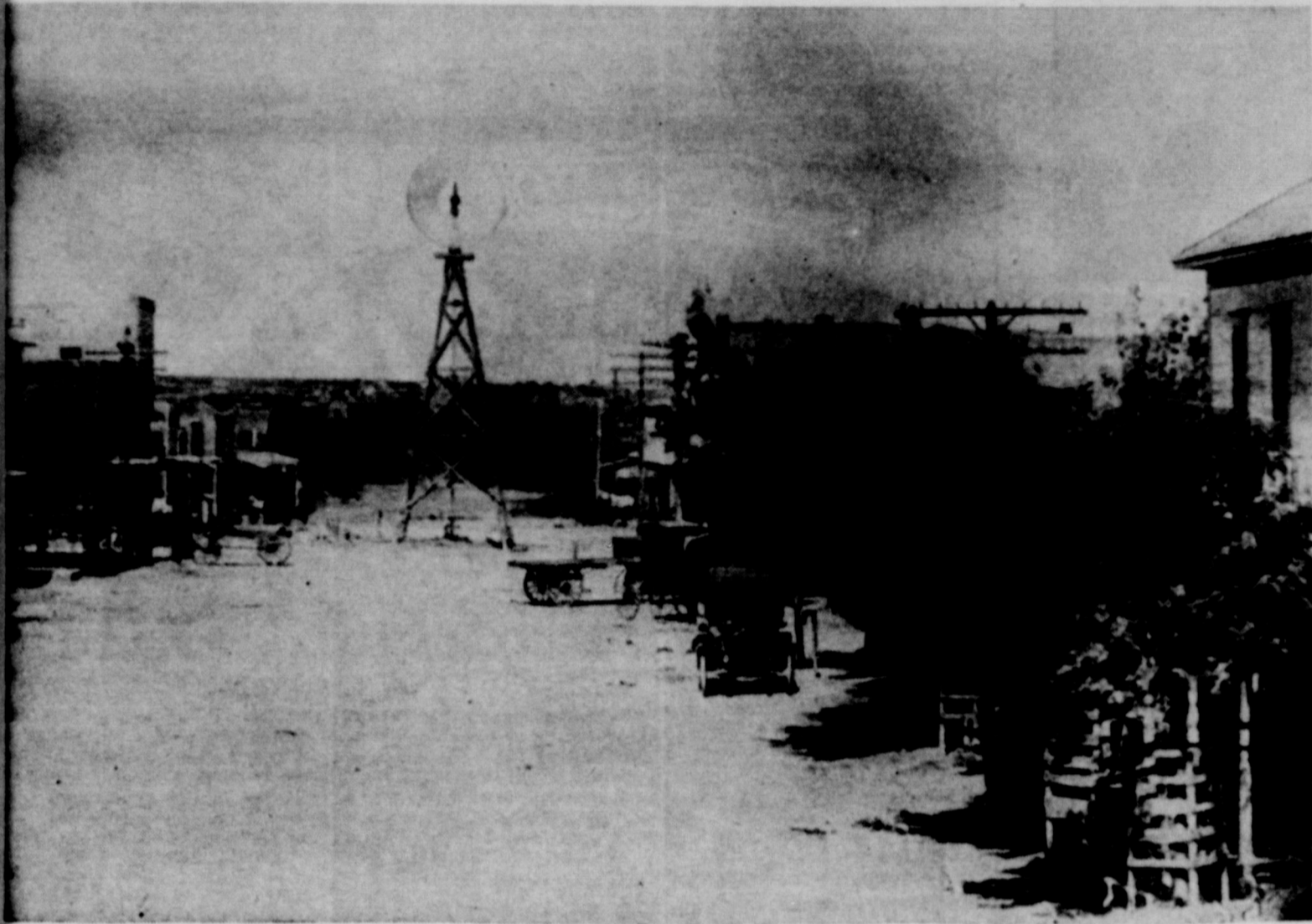

Postal Rates Rise Next Monday; New Increases Explained

Starting next Monday morning the cost of mailing a letter out of town will go up a penny—from four to five cents.

This is one of several increases in postal rates which go into effect on Jan. 7, Postmaster Bill Reeves announced Wednesday.

Among the other boosts most patrons will be concerned with are:

1. Drop letters, for delivery to local Post Office box patrons, from three to four cents per ounce.
2. Air mail letters, from seven to eight cents per ounce.
3. Postal cards, from three to four cents.
4. Air mail postal cards, from five to six cents.

Size Governed
Effective on Jan. 1 were Post Office Department regulations on envelope and post card sizes.

Envelopes smaller than three by 4½ inches are not now mailable. The mailing of envelopes larger than nine by 12 inches is not recommended.

Envelopes and post cards must be rectangular in shape to be accepted for mailing.

Minimum size of post cards also is three by 4½ inches, and maximum size is three and nine-sixteenths by five and nine sixteenths inches.

16-Ounce Weight
Sealed third class mail, including sealed packages that weigh up to but not exceeding 16 ounces, must be plainly marked by the sender: "Third Class."

Rates for second class, third class, bulk mailing fees and permit application have been increased, too, Reeves said persons desiring information on these items should inquire at the Post Office.

To date there has been no increase in parcel post rates.

The postmaster also announced that a complete supply of Internal Revenue Service forms is on the table in the Post Office lobby.

"These forms are for your use and convenience; please help yourself," Reeves added.

Temperatures Up Over Week Before

Temperatures have been on the milder side during the past week, reaching a high reading of 61 degrees on Wednesday.

Low temperature of the week was 20 degrees last Thursday.

McLean ended the year 1962 with a grand total of 19.60 inches of moisture, well below the 25.16 recorded in 1961.

The wet year, prior to this, 1960, saw a total of 32.37 inches of rain, sleet and snow fall on the city.

McLean High School Graduate

Leslie Huff Wins AC Alumnus Honor

ABILENE—(Special)—A 1926 graduate of McLean High School, Leslie G. Huff Sr. of Austin, has been named Abilene Christian College's "Outstanding Alumnus of the Year for 1962." He is now president of American Founders Life Insurance Co.

Huff's selection was announced Friday night at a meeting of ex-students held in Catchings Cafeteria on the ACC campus. He was chosen by the Alumni Association's executive committee from nominations received from members of the association.

Huff is the son of A. C. Huff of McLean and a brother of Mrs. Pete Fulbright, also of McLean.

Huff was chosen because of the success of American Founders, now one of the fastest-growing insurance companies in the nation, according to several reports.

In April, that company gave Abilene Christian College, through its educational foundation, 3,500 shares of the stock of a pledge totaling 5,000 shares. At that time, value of the 5,000 shares was

estimated at \$250,000, but the price of the shares has increased considerably since.

4 Children
Huff is a 1930 graduate of Abilene Christian College, and his wife, the former Eunice Swope, is a 1931 graduate. They have four children, Norma, now Mrs. Clyde Gordon of New Orleans, of the ACC class of '53; Lynn, a missionary to Brazil, and 1938 graduate of the college; David of Dexter, Mich., a 1961 graduate of ACC, and Leslie Jr., Austin High School.

Huff was born in Harmon County, Okla., March 23, 1909, but was graduated from McLean High School in 1926. After his graduation from ACC he went on to earn the master's degree at the University of Texas in 1936.

He taught school at Coleman and Belton from 1930 to 1935, but in 1934 became an agent for Gulf States Life.

From 1947 to 1951 he was agency manager for Fidelity Union Life, and from 1951 to 1954 was regional manager for C and I Life Insurance Co. In 1954 he became president of the newly-established American Founders Life.

While at ACC, Huff was a member of the A Club, scholastic organization, manager of the yearbook and a business manager of the school newspaper.

Active in Church
He also was councilman on the University of Texas Student Association, president of the Temple Texas, Chamber of Commerce, and member of the Texas State Board of Education. He currently is a member of the Lions Club and the Texas Association of Life Underwriters.

Long active in the Church of Christ, Huff was an elder in Temple, and presently is an elder at the University Avenue congregation in Austin.

He has been a member of the Abilene Christian College board of trustees since 1949.

Huff is the fifth ex-student to be honored as the Outstanding Alumnus of the year. Former winners of the award were Dr. Batsell Barrett Baxter, 1961; ACC Track Coach Oliver Jackson, 1960; Dean Walling, president of Western Geophysical Co., Los Angeles, 1959, and Dr. M. Norvel Young, 1958.

Cotton Harvest At End in This Area; 1,030 Bales Ginned

The McLean area cotton harvest is drawing to a rapid finish, with some 10 to 12 more bales expected before the gathering is completed. B. F. Holland, manager of the McLean Gin, estimated this number remained in the fields Wednesday afternoon.

Through Wednesday, a total of 1,030 bales had been ginned here, less than the number anticipated before the season began but still enough to give McLean its annual economic boost.

Four bales were ginned Wednesday. Prior to the start of the harvest it appeared that as many as 1,200 bales might be brought here for ginning. Hail wiped out some. There was a marked increase in the low quality of cotton classed during the week ending last Friday at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's cotton classing office in Memphis.

18,552 Samples Classed
K. E. Voelkel, manager of the office, reported a total of 18,552 samples were classed in the short week, bringing the number for the season to 136,789.

This compares with 213,859 as of the same date last year. White grades represented only about six per cent of the total samples classed. Approximately 94 per cent of the grades were in the light spotted, spotted and tinged categories.

Strict low middling light spotted predominated with about 34 per cent, and 10 per cent of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of blemish.

There was no significant change in staple length with that of the week before. About 75 per cent of the cotton was 15/16 inch in length; eight per cent was 29/32 inch and shorter, and 17 per cent was 31/32 inch and longer. Nearly nine per cent was called wasty.

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March of Dimes Helps Youngster With 'Assist' from Coincidence

Kathy Anderson is too young at 18 months to understand coincidence. This is the story of how it tipped the balance in a life-and-death battle for her—hopefully, in favor of life.

The first child of Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson of Grundy, Va., Kathy was born in December, 1960 with spina bifida—a severe birth defect in which the spinal column fails to close completely. Its cause is unknown and there are too few specialists in its treatment.

Mrs. Anderson had been sent home, uncertain of her baby's future, while Kathy remained in the hospital. The doctors were undecided on the next move.

Helpful Neighbor Phones

Ten days passed. Then the Andersons' telephone rang. It was a neighbor who had just read a magazine story about Linda Breesse of Columbus, Ohio, the 1961 March of Dimes Poster Girl.

The article, in the monthly publication of the Loyal Order of Moose, told how Linda, also a spina bifida victim, had undergone an operation at Children's Hospital in Columbus, and was now making steady progress under a program of treatment and rehabilitation at the March of Dimes-financed Clinical Study Center there.

Mrs. Anderson, whose father-in-law is a Moose member, read the article for herself and promptly called her family physician, Dr. Thomas McDonald. They agreed on an immediate call to the Breesse family, 200 miles away.

Mrs. Breesse confirmed the story. She also praised the skills of Dr. Martin P. Sayers who had performed the operation on Linda and of Dr. William O. Robertson, director of the March of Dimes-supported Center.

With Dr. McDonald making the arrangements, Kathy was soon taken to Columbus for surgery by Dr. Sayers. The operation was successful, but Kathy then began to develop hydrocephalus, or water on the brain, which frequently accompanies the open spine condition. Dr. Sayers inserted a plastic tube which drains the excess fluid from Kathy's head

into her body to be absorbed. Kathy went back home to Grundy in February of 1961 after spending a month at Children's Hospital, but she's been a regular visitor since. Faithfully each month from March through October, Mr. and Mrs. Anderson drove 650 miles, round trip, between Grundy and Columbus, leaving home at midnight to reach Children's Hospital at 8 a.m. and returning the same afternoon.

Kathy Checked Closely

This enabled Dr. Robertson and all the other members of the Clinical Study Center's medical team to keep a close check on Kathy in the important early months and to act promptly on any changes in her condition.

Now that the critical stage is past, the Andersons must make that long auto trip only once every three months. But it doesn't seem so long to them now because it leads to hope for Kathy's future.

Despite her continued improvement, Kathy's problems are far from over. Says Dr. Robertson: "Kathy is a cheerful little girl who seems to be respond-

ing well to much of the treatment we are prescribing for her. However, like most children with severe birth defects of the central nervous system, she has complications which we can't fully correct because we don't know enough about them yet."

Centers Fight Crippling

The expert medical team at the March of Dimes-supported center in Columbus and those in more than 50 other centers are working to improve diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation techniques to help make possible nearly normal lives for the victims of crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio.

Jim and Barbara Anderson can only hope that the work of Dr. Robertson and his associates will bring a promising future to Kathy. But they can personally endorse his diagnosis of their daughter's disposition.

"She's a lively, happy baby who loves to have people around her," says Mrs. Anderson. "We try to keep her from getting spoiled but it's not easy. What can you do with four grandparents who have only one grandchild to fuss over?"

Farm Facts

The greatest single use of fresh water in the United States is for irrigation—75 billion to 100 billion gallons a day, or about half of the fresh water we use annually.

Next largest consumer is industry and steam power plants. According to Karl O. Kohler, Jr., writing in the 1955 Yearbook of Agriculture, they require about 70 billion gallons of fresh water daily. It takes 18 gallons of water, for example, to refine a barrel of oil and about 300 to make a barrel of beer.

Kohler notes that application of irrigation water is relatively inefficient. Annual delivery to a farm may range from less than an acre-foot (325,850 gallons) up to more than 7 acre-feet (2,280,950 gallons) to an acre.

A cutting of alfalfa requires about 325,800 gallons of water an acre, and a crop of cotton, 800,000 gallons. In 1959 more than 33 million acres were irrigated as compared with about 20.5 million acres in 1944. Most of the irrigated land is located in the 17 Western states, Louisiana, and Hawaii.



About 1/2 the fresh water used in the U.S. is for irrigation.

Increases in irrigated acreage in the Far West and rapid introduction of supplemental irrigation in the Midwest and in the Eastern and Southern states in recent years have contributed to a much heavier consumption of water.

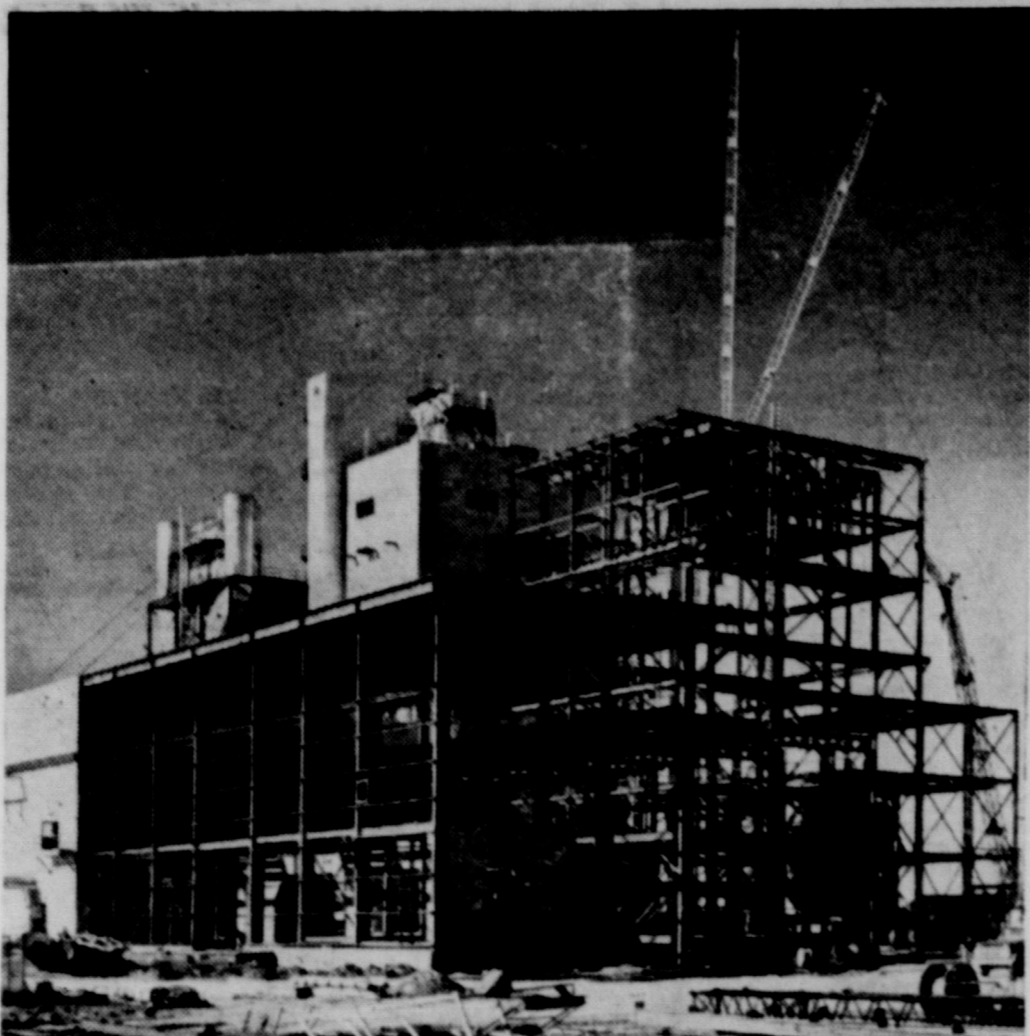

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**NEW CONSTRUCTION SET BY
SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE**

A five-year construction program which anticipates the investment of an additional \$130,000,000 in new facilities to meet the electric needs of the area has been announced by A. R. Watson, president and general manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co.

"In all sections of our 45,000-square-mile service area, the indications are that the fast growth which has marked recent years will continue. We have a two-fold obligation to have facilities available for our customers before their need, and to keep their rates low and service efficient. Our construction program is designed to fulfill that obligation," Watson said.

The 1963 portion of the five-year program calls for an investment of nearly \$25,000,000, with the new generating and transmission facilities accounting for the bulk of the figure.

A 210,000-kilowatt generator, largest single unit ever installed by Southwestern Public Service Co., is now under construction at Plant X, near Earth. Scheduled to be in service in June, 1964, the new unit will bring capability of Plant X to nearly 500,000 kilowatts, and make it one of the largest generating stations in the Southwest.

A "first" for the Southwestern system in 1963 will be the installation of a 10,000-kilowatt gas turbine unit at Roswell. This "package-power plant" will be used as stand-by equipment and at peak periods. It is designed to start automatically, with the turbine being driven by gas and compressed air rather than the steam drive used in the larger units on the system.

The year 1963 will also see the beginning of the engineering and survey work for a new generator to be installed at the Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, N. M. This is also a 210,000-kilowatt machine, and is scheduled to be in service in 1965.

"I think the new unit planned for Cunningham Station is the ideal example of the growth of our region and the flexible position which an electric company serving a growth area must maintain. Originally, this machine was planned for service in 1966, but as soon as it became apparent that it would be needed earlier, we changed our plans accordingly, and moved it up to 1965," Watson pointed out.

Nearly \$5,000,000 in the 1963 construction budget will be invested in new transmission line facilities. Southwestern's 12 electric generating stations are all tied together by a transmission line network of more than 4,000 miles.

This interconnection makes it possible to provide power at any point in the 45,000-square-mile service area, and to employ the most economical plants, which are those with the larger and newer generators, at all times, keeping the power production costs down and the rates for service lower.

In addition to the transmission line tie-in, the generating facilities of the larger stations, Plant X, Nichols and Cunningham, are directly controlled by an automatic dispatching system, which electronically employs the most efficient plants at all times.

The dispatching system also computes the share of the load which other plant should be carrying, on the basis of costs, and then these loads are assigned to the plants by direct communication from the load dispatching center in Amarillo.

"I'm not sure that our customers are aware of the vital part that new equipment plays in keeping their rates down. Our fuel rates, for example, are up almost 100 per cent in the last 10 years. Yet, by constantly investing in new and efficient equipment, plus the fact that our customers are using more and more electric service, we have managed to keep our rates at the same level that existed 11 years ago," Watson said.

Watson emphasized that the United States strengthened its world leadership in the production and transmission of electric power in 1962, contrary to some reports from government sources that Russia was gaining on this country.

"The United States, with only six per cent of the world's population, produces nearly 40 per cent of the world's electric power. We generate three times as much as Russia, and have four times the miles of transmission lines. Thanks to the foresight and action of our industry, Russia isn't even close as far as electric power is concerned, and they're getting farther behind," Watson pointed out.

"When the American people have an opportunity to look at the record of the investor-owned, taxpaying electric companies of this country, they see that the arguments of the advocates of a government-controlled, socialized electric power system will not hold water. We have kept the rates low, we have kept service efficient and ahead of the needs of our customers, and we have kept the United States far ahead of Russia in electric generation and transmission facilities. And, we have done all this at the very same time that we have paid to various state, federal and local government taxing bodies approximately 25 cents out of every dollar that we have received from our customers."

 socialist hydroelectric power projects may have made good news copy in Russia, where everyone is agreed that the socialist fatherland is far ahead of the capitalists in America.

"But the Udall enthusiasm is hardly likely to win him approval or respect in the United States. The American people already are concerned that the aim of the New Frontier is to improve a Soviet-style collectivism on our electric power industry."

Sensing's column caused us to recall some of the remarks made by Wes Izzard, Amarillo News editor, when he spoke to the McLean volunteer firemen a few weeks ago.

Izzard warned his listeners not to be discouraged by the government's repeated tales that Russia and the Red satellites are gaining on us so rapidly.

As an example, he cited a report that one of the satellite countries had increased its ball bearing production by 100 per cent in the past year, while the United States showed a gain of only three to four per cent.

What actually happened was this: Communist nation had but one ball bearing factory the previous year—and the second one was constructed.

Izzard emphasized that America's industrial capacity is still so far ahead of Russia's there is no comparison.

But he cautioned all of us to be ever on the alert against the continuous trend toward more government control, which year by year makes more inroads into private enterprise.

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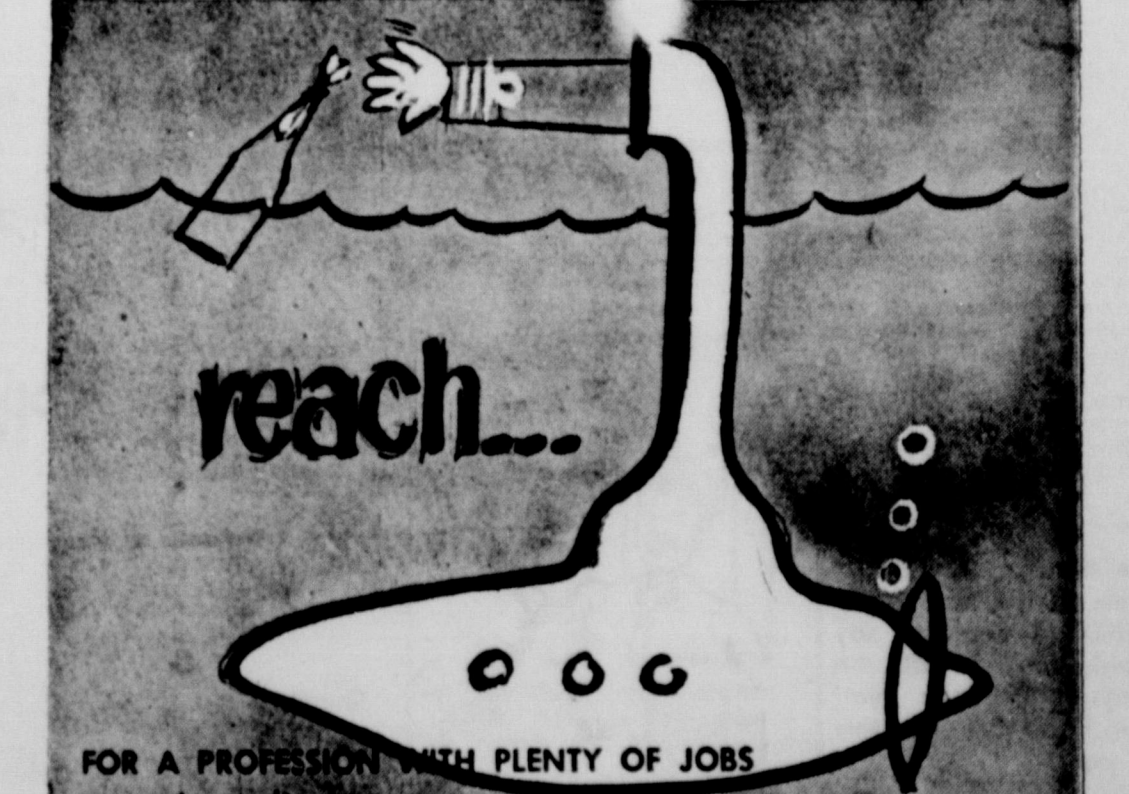
