Car Traveling North Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker, who investigated the mishap with Patrolman Charles Henderson. said McDonald was traveling north and the train was headed east

when the collision occurred, The 1961 Chevrolet Impala was struck on the left rear quarter panel, indicating it had almost crossed the tracks out of danger. The impact swung the front of the car around, causing it to slam against the side of the locomotive. The automobile then was knocked 51 feet east of the Rowe Street intersection, and it came to rest 24 feet north of the railroad

Forty of the 50 freight cars in the train passed the accident scene. The train's engine received only slight damage.

The train, whose engineer was William Bert Brewer of Amarillo, had left Amarillo at 8:40 p.m. The crash occurred at 10:20 p.m.

Didn't See Train Parker said McDonald's vision was partially obscured by a grain elevator just west of the intersection, which could have caused him to be unable to observe the approaching train. A layer of ice coated the ap-

proach to the track crossing, but there was no indication young Mc-Donald had applied his brakes before being hit by the train. Crewmen on the train said the

car appeared to be traveling at about 20 miles per hour The left front door of the vehicle was ripped away, as were the gasoline tank, trunk lid and a

portion of the left side. An antenna from a rear fender was found imbedded in Dora when rescurers removed her from the wrecked car.

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




