brought from these three countries.

The three representatives of Korea, China and Japan gave interesting facts about their countries.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — (Special) — Lawyers are wondering if the Texas Senate really passed a constitutional amendment resolution proposing that the voters give women equal rights.

Records show that this resolution passed the Senate 26-5. But it also shows that the Senate voted down an amendment which would have made it clear that the purpose of the proposal was to repeal all laws on the statute books which treat women differently from men.

When courts interpret the laws and the constitution, legislative intent is what they must determine. Records now show that the legislative intent of the Senate was not to repeal all the discriminatory laws about women.

This proposal, by Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan, has been defeated in the Senate many times before.

It now goes to the House of Representatives, which has passed it many times before.

TEXAS SELLS ITSELF—Legislators' proposals to add such slogans as "Lone Star State" and "Texas Has Everything" to auto license plates haven't found favor with Dewitt Greer, chief engineer for the State Highway Department.

"T-E-X-A-S is the only slogan this state needs," Greer told the House Appropriations Committee. He added that more wording on car tags just means additional expense.

"All law enforcement officers will tell you," Greer explained, "that the readability of the rest of the plate is lessened if you crowd in slogans."

DEATH OF POLL TAX?—If the rest of the Senate feels like the Senate committee on constitutional amendments, the poll tax may be on its way to extinction.

Committee gave a nine-to-two approval of Laredo Sen. Abraham Kazen's bill to submit to the people a constitutional amendment that would kill the poll tax as of Feb. 1, 1965.

The two "no" votes in com-

mittee came from Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and Sen. Galway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler.

"Ayes" came from Sens. Kazen, Charles Herring of Austin, Roy Harrington of Port Arthur, Don Kennard of Fort Worth, Culp Krueger of El Campo, Walter Richter of Gonzales, Aaron Schwartz of Galveston, Franklin Spears of San Antonio and Jack Strong of Longview.

If Kazen's bill passes the full Legislature, voters would make the final decision in the 1964 general election. So far, every state that has voted on the federal constitutional amendment to do away with poll taxes, except Mississippi, has voted to drop it.

ATTORNEY GENERAL DONATIONS OPPOSED — Contributions from oil companies to finance investigations by the attorney general to see if competitor's oil wells are slanted would be outlawed under a bill introduced by Rep. Ben Barnes of DeLeon.

Nearly \$300,000 in contributions from major—and some minor—oil companies was used by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson to make such surveys in east Texas.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr told Rep. Barnes that the \$30,000 recently appropriated by the Legislature will be sufficient for his investigations.

So Barnes filed a proposal which would make it illegal for the attorney general to accept money from anyone to investigate or prosecute anything.

PARENTAL PAY PLAN—Fifty per cent of a man's weekly wages could be attached to pay child support if Tyler Rep. Ben Jarvis' bill becomes a constitutional amendment.

COUNTY UNIT CHANGE PROPOSED—Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola thinks it's time someone started doing something about "modernizing county government."

So he has introduced a bill to require county commissioners to be elected by the county at large. Each county precinct would have to put up resident candidates, which, Hinson explained, would assure continued local representation through pooled knowledge of each precinct's problems, and prevent the largest community from filling a commissioners court with its own residents.

Hinson believes his county-at-large election plan would get commissioners from all precincts to work at all times for the best interests of the entire county.

If his bill becomes law, Hinson sees it as a forerunner to eventual, economical pooling of the resources—capital, road machinery, manpower and equipment—of all a county's precincts into one central unit.

DO 'EYES' HAVE IT?—A proposal by Rep. Bill Walker of Cleveland that the state song be changed from "Texas, Our Texas" to "The Eyes of Texas" has been referred to a study subcommittee which includes no Texas exes.

Subcommittee Chairman Gene Hendryx of Alpine is a Sul Ross graduate. One member, Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth, finished at TCU, and the third member is an Aggie—Rep. Richard C. Slack of Pecos.

Some interested legislators have suggested that the "Eyes of Texas" might be made more palatable if the opening bars of the "Aggie War Hymn" were added. But a state association of music clubs has indicated that the Aggies aren't the only ones opposed to a change of the state anthem.

UNION SUES TEC—A suit against the Texas Employment Commission has been filed by the AFL-CIO.

Labor union accuses three TEC commissioners and four employees of "pro-employer lobbying."

Petition also alleges use of state funds for research and preparation of pro-employer amendments to the State Unemployment Compensation Act.

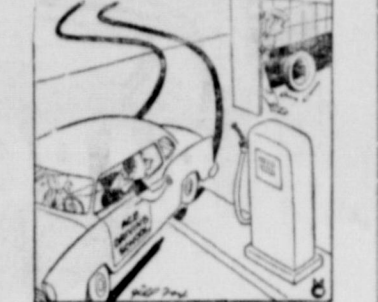
"These actions violate state law prohibiting state employees from influencing legislation or legislators," claims the union.

Sen. Culp Krueger of El Campo, sponsor of one of the TEC bills, says the split is just another AFL-CIO smoke screen to hide the real issue—which is their opposition to the appointment of J. E. Lyles as labor's representative on the commission.

LEJ LAW HIT—Rep. O. H. (Ike) Harris (R-Dallas) has introduced a bill to repeal the so-called "Lyndon Johnson law."

Present law permits a candidate's name to appear on the ballot twice, thus permitting him to run for two offices at the same time.

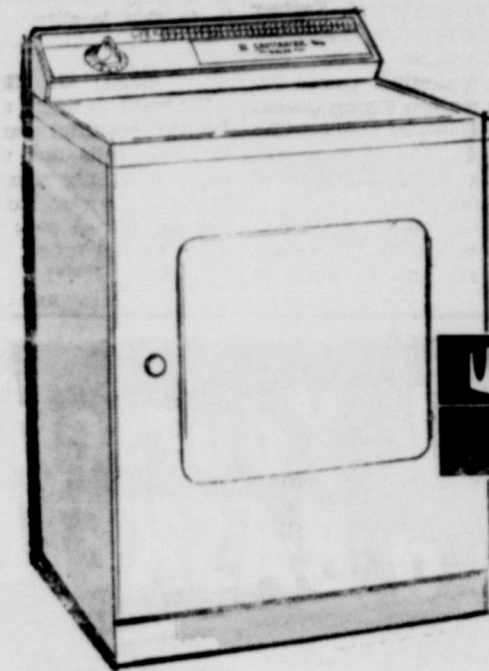

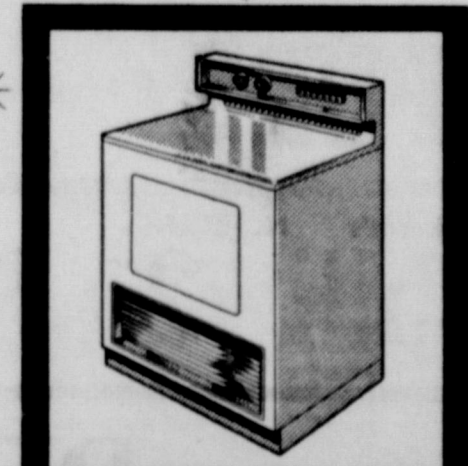
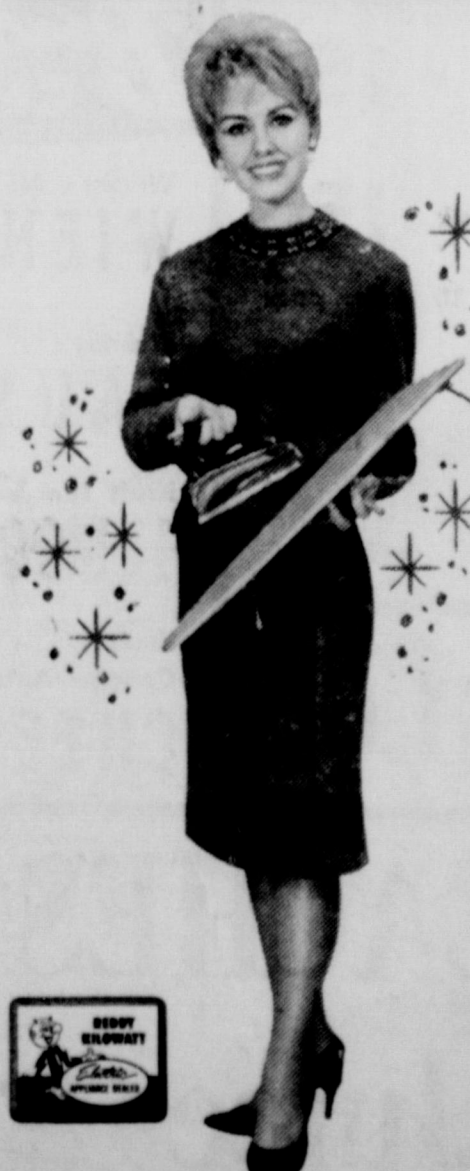

Many People Lose Social Security

Many people lose money because they don't check on their Social Security when they reach retirement age, according to Hal Geldon, Amarillo Social Security district manager.

In many cases, these people are still working and believe they cannot get any benefit payments unless they are completely retired. Geldon stated that workers who earn over \$1,200 yearly may still get some Social Security payments depending on the amount of their earnings.

He cited as an example, a 65-year-old worker eligible for \$100 a month from Social Security. In this case, the worker could get some benefits even if his yearly earnings were as high as \$2,600.

If a wife or child were eligible for benefits on his account, the worker could earn more than \$2,000 and still collect some Social Security benefits for himself and his family.

Information about Social Security provisions may be obtained from the Amarillo Social Security office, or a field representative when he is in this locality.

GOPHER CONTROL DEMONSTRATION

A good many local farmers with alfalfa are having trouble with gophers. Earlier we arranged with Jim Ellard, Rodent Control Service of Lubbock, to have a machine brought up from East Texas that is supposed to be very effective against gophers.

The machine builds artificial burrows and deposits poison grain in them. Due to the extremely bad weather we have been having, the demonstration had to be postponed.

If weather doesn't run us out, we will try to have this on Tuesday, Feb. 1, on the Hack McCarley farm.

COTTON CROP STATE TOTALS

The 1962 cotton crop returned Texas farmers nearly \$800,000,000 and was again the state's principal cash crop.

The December cotton report indicates the state produced 4,680,000 bales with an average lint yield of 349 pounds per acre.

Growers received an average of around \$120 per acre for lint and seed. Brother, this isn't hay. This is cotton, which is still king in the South.

INVESTMENT CREDIT INCOME TAX

I heard one farmer say his newly developed irrigation well pump and motor actually cost him about 80 per cent of the selling price after he had figured up the income tax savings through investment credit, additional 20 per cent first year depreciation and other advantages offered.

This particular person attended our income tax school.

I talked to another fellow that had put down an irrigation well in the Grandview community in west Gray County. His cost was over \$10,000. I asked this fellow if he took advantage of the investment credit. He had never heard of it.

Neither had the fellow that made out his return. He stood to lose over \$700.

I've noticed a lot of new fences being built in the McLean vicinity. All of these are eligible for a direct credit against your income tax at seven per cent of the actual cost.

Your useful life must be at least eight years. Fences are usually set up for longer periods.

Cattle chutes and most other tangible personal property will qualify. Certain real property will also—a water well drilled for cattle, plus windmills and replaced head for windmills.

Don't overlook this big tax savings. We still have plenty of tax guides for free distribution.

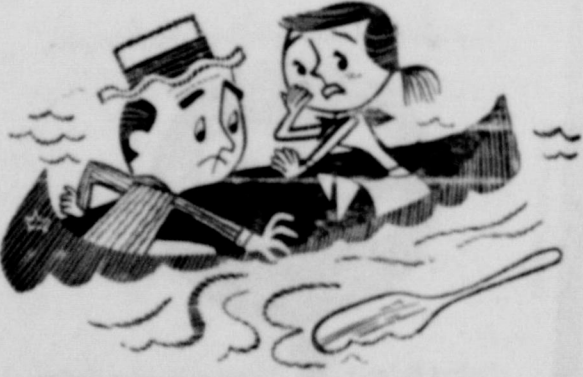
