Feed Lot, Plant To Be Built Here

Work is under way on the Triangle Ranch Feed and Cattle Co. feed lot and plant here, with operations expected to begin in early spring.

John C. Haynes, the mayor of McLean, and his two sons—Sammy and Johnny—will operate the newest industry for the city, which is to be located some 2½ miles west of here.

John C. Haynes said Wednesday a 53-acre tract of land has been purchased on the south side of Highway 66, and the construction of fences has begun.

The site is between U.S. 66 and the Rock Island Railroad. A feed lot with space to accommodate 1,000 to 2,000 head of cattle is being prepared at present, but land is available to increase this number when needed.

Haynes said a mill, which will produce pelletized feed, and also a feed mixing plant are to be constructed.

A shot in the arm for this area's economy could result from an expensive business transaction reported over the weekend.

Mineral rights under some 6,000 acres of Gray County land located between Lefors and Alanreed were purchased in what was described as a "multi-million-dollar deal."

New owners of the rights are Western Petroleum Co. of San Francisco, Calif., and Megargel Drilling Co. of Megargel, Texas. The mineral rights were bought from Coley Parker of Fort Worth and Harry Parker of Fort Worth.

Extensive drilling operations are expected on the property, which already is the site of some 17 oil wells and 26 gas wells.

Twelve more oil wells are planned this year, and an official of Western Petroleum was quoted as saying there is a possibility of 40 more new wells on the land.

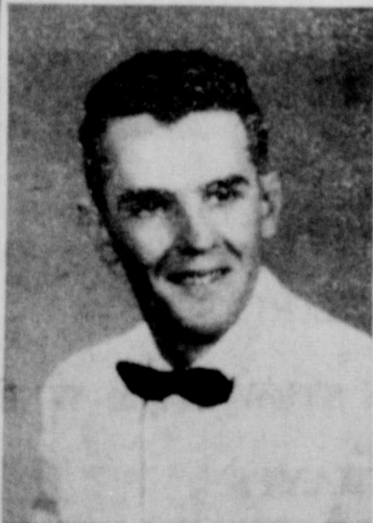
Situated as it is, McLean could benefit even before the wells are completed. Each drilling crew includes several employees.

And these employees must have places to live, food to eat, clothing to wear, gasoline for their cars.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

The chickens have come to roost in a major area of the nation's food retailing; insofar as trading stamps are concerned, and many people are unhappy.

Early in 1962 A&P, the nation's largest chain operation, having more than twice as many stores, and over twice the volume of the next largest, went into trading stamps. This was quite an event as A&P had fought the stamp idea for years.



However, the position of A&P was that they were forced into it by the use of stamp plans by their major competitors principally in the marketing area that is roughly bounded by Chicago, Cleveland, New York and Philadelphia.

As is known, any stamp plan costs the grocer two per cent of his gross business. Use of S&H Green Stamps, issued by a private company, usually cost a little more than this, while stamp plans operated by several of the chains are reported to cost a little less.

While part of this cost is passed on to the customers, stamp plans are quite apparently hurting chain store profits.

An analysis of the progress of 14 chains, including A&P in the major A&P operating territories, in the initial six months after the A&P stamp plan got underway reveals that 11 of them showed less earnings, despite comparable, or even increased sales, over same period of previous year.

Of the three who did show an increase in profit, one, Jewel Tea, gives no stamps.

While most stamp giving chains in the analysis showed profit margins of less than 1% on sales; in fact many of them showing less than 1/2 of 1%, Jewel Tea, on the other hand, showed a profit margin on sales of 1.66%.

There are many indications that the stockholders of stamp giving chain organizations are getting quite unhappy.

On the other side of the coin, in a recent speech at a convention, the head of a 13 store New Jersey chain, which does not give stamps, claimed that stamps represent usury.

His contention is that each book of 1,200 stamps costs the consumer \$3 in the higher grocery prices paid to offset the costs of the stamps. On this amount, the consumer collects no interest even though the stamps may not be redeemed for months.

He then asserted when a consumer trades in his stamps for a premium, they are based on the full retail list price of the article. But by buying the same article at a discount house, or at a sale price, the consumer can buy for as much as 44% less. Thus he claims, consumers pay more for food to get stamps to trade for merchandise at prices not in line with prevailing market prices. And the grocer loses by giving stamps. And while this goes on, the Federal Trade Commission wonders if the public is being deceived by labels not printed in big enough type. Yet, little has been done so far by the FTC to make public aware of the price it pays for stamps.

County Fails To Reach Bond Goal

December savings bond sales in Gray County were \$46,199, according to George B. Cree Jr., chairman of the county savings bonds committee.

During 1962 the citizens of this county purchased \$422,071, which represents 59.4 per cent of the 1962 sales goal of \$710,000.

Sales in Texas during 1962 totaled \$143,146,965, which is 86.7 per cent of the state goal of \$165,100,000.

U. S. Treasury records disclose that the number of individual bonds issued during 1962 set a five-year record, with over 75 million individual bonds issued during the year.

The number of \$50 bonds purchased was the highest amount since the war years, and the sale of \$25 bonds was at a five-year record.

"The increased sales of the smaller denomination bonds are a direct result of the Freedom Bond Drive, when over one million American workers enrolled in the payroll savings plan for bond buying. This was a 15 per cent increase over 1961," was reported.

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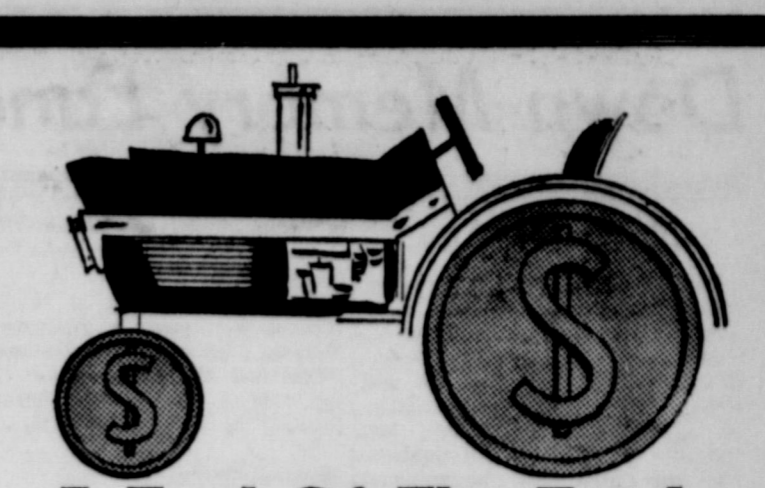

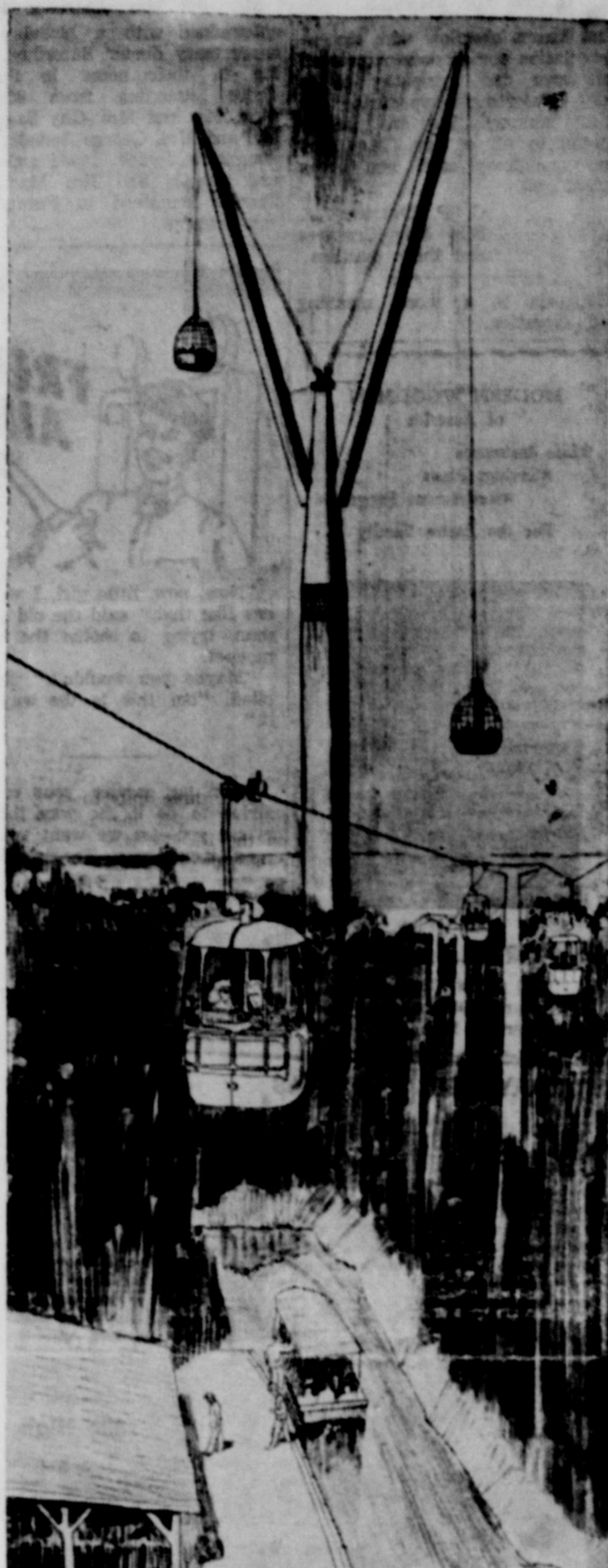

STRAY CATTLE
 Last week, Jinks Shaw asked me to announce on my daily radio program the fact that he had a lost calf. We mentioned this on our Monday program, and a neighbor called in on Tuesday and told us where the calf was.
 As people begin to gather cattle and sheep off wheat, usually one or two strays will be in every 100 head or so. Many times one or two head will be missing.
 Last year we served as a clearing house and reported both strays and missing cattle by radio. We would be very happy to also report the same information in this article.
 So let us know if you have missing cattle or strays. Please give descriptions.
 We would also like to have you as one of our radio listeners. If you get up by 6:50 a.m., tune your radio to KDPN. We are on each weekday.
CATTLE BLOATING
 For centuries man has been studying the causes and prevention of bloat in cattle, which costs cattlemen millions of dollars annually.
 Recently the Agricultural Research Service published a report on current findings in this field. Here is a summary:
 1. The tendency to bloat is a heritable factor, as the basic cause lies in deficient saliva secretion.
 2. The physical nature of feed does influence incidence of bloat.
 3. Levels of phosphates in pasture soils or climatic condition are not apparently correlated with incidence.
 4. None of the chemical preventives available today are satisfactory.
AUROFAC CRUMBLES
 Irene Williams asked me to calculate the amount of Aureomycin crumbles that should be added to meal and salt-meal mixtures to give the proper amount for 400-pound calves.
 Here are our recommendations according to labels:
 Hand feeding—mix 3½ pounds of aurofacs with 100 pounds of meal, if one pound per animal is the intended amount daily.
 Mix 3½ pounds with 150 pounds of meal, if you want to feed 1½ pounds daily, and 200 pounds of meal to 3½ pounds of aurofacs, if you want to feed two pounds daily.
 Some people use a self-feeding mix of salt and meal. The salt is used to limit consumption of meal when fed free choice.
 One-half pound of salt will limit daily consumption of 400-pound calves to the desired level of meal. In other words, if you want a calf

to eat one pound of meal daily, then place one-half pound salt with one pound of meal and this will be all the calf consumes.
 Below is a chart you can use, if you want to add aurofacs crumbles:
 1. For one pound daily consumption of meal—150 pounds of meal, 50 pounds of salt and 3½ pounds of aurofacs.
 2. For 1½ pound daily consumption of meal—150 pounds of meal, 50 pounds of salt and 3½ pounds of aurofacs.
 3. For two pounds of meal daily—200 pounds of meal, 50 pounds of salt and 3½ pounds of aurofacs.
 Aureomycin is a disease-preventative. More commercial feed lots use it heavily on new cattle.
