Showers totaling 47 inch gave McLean a brief respite from the dry heat Sunday and Monday, but the temperature was bearing down again by Wednesday.

Hail small enough to cause no damage accompanied the light rains.

Weather Bureau instruments maintained by City Supt. Pete Fulbright recorded 41 inch of moisture from the Sunday shower and .06 inch on Monday.

However, unofficial rain gauges in and around the city measured as much as 7 inch.

High temperature of the week was 95 degrees, which came on Friday. The low was 47, recorded on Thursday.

Rainfall for the year now stands at 2.81 inches, .35 inch less than the 3.16 recorded to this date in 1962.

In May of last year McLean received 1.76 inch.

3 INJURED IN HIGHWAY MISHAP HERE

Two men and a woman were injured early Tuesday morning when their station wagon overturned after a tire blew out 3.1 miles west of McLean on Highway 66.

Alexis Ann Levovsky, 18-year-old model from Toronto, Canada, was driver of the 1960 Chevrolet stationwagon, which plunged off an embankment on the right side of the highway and overturned 2½ times.

Miss Levovsky, her fiancé, Don Friend of Los Angeles, Calif., and Herbert Tepper, also of Los Angeles, were brought to the McLean Clinic for treatment and then admitted to Highland General Hospital in Pampa.

Cuts, Bruises
Teppers suffered cuts and bruises and Friend sustained broken ribs in the accident. Miss Levovsky was shaken up but apparently not seriously injured.

Highway Patrolman Charles Henderson said the left rear tire of the stationwagon blew out as Miss Levovsky was driving east. She applied the brakes, causing the vehicle to swerve right and roll down the embankment.

The three were en route to Toronto.

Miss Levovsky got out of the car and climbed back up to the highway before collapsing. Emmett Allen of Alanreed stopped to give assistance and then called the Highway Patrol.

Plans are being made to deliver a shipment of brassiers and girdles made at the Marie Foundations factory here via of the annual Wagon Train leaving the city late this month.

Mayor John C. Haynes said at Saturday night's rodeo meeting that Sears Roebuck and Co. has been asked for permission to deliver the products in this unique way to the Amarillo Sears store.

The Wagon Train, which travels to Amarillo each year to publicize the McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration, will leave the city on Memorial Day, May 30.

Sign Release Forms
Persons planning to make the trip were asked to attend the next rodeo meeting on May 18 and sign release of responsibility forms.

The meeting will be held at city hall at 7:30 p.m.

Faris Hess, wagon master, announced at the meeting last Saturday that Cotton John Smith, farm director of KGNC-TV, plans to arrange a welcome party for the Wagon Train when it arrives in Amarillo on Friday night, May 31.

R. T. Wood, local representative of Gooch Feed Mill Co., informed the rodeo planners that his company will furnish feed for the animals in the Wagon Train.

Rodeo planners decided to ask each business in McLean to sell one book of 10 tickets for the saddle to be given away during the celebration.

CONSTRUCTION EXTENDS NEW ROAD NORTH

Construction is scheduled to start Friday on 11.94 miles of the new State Highway 273 between McLean and Pampa, it was announced Wednesday by G. K. Reading, supervising resident engineer of the project.

Reading said the project is divided into two parts. One will begin 8.5 miles north of McLean and extend to the North Fork of Red River near Lefors, and the other will be from the south city limits of Pampa to Loop 171.

Estimated cost of the first portion, starting north of McLean, is \$782,181.54, while the other will cost \$80,832.40.

Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo holds the contract for the project.

Completion in May, 1964
Construction will consist of grading, structures, flexible base and hot asphaltic concrete surface.

Work is scheduled to be completed in May 1964.

Reading, Texas Highway Department resident engineer from Pampa, said that through traffic between McLean and Lefors will be detoured via RM 1321 during the construction period.

Local traffic originating within the limits of the project will be routed over specially constructed detours. From the south city limits of Pampa to Loop 171 traffic is to be routed through the project.

According to Reading, a speed zone for a maximum speed of 45 miles per hour has been authorized. He asked the cooperation of the public in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs and speed zones.

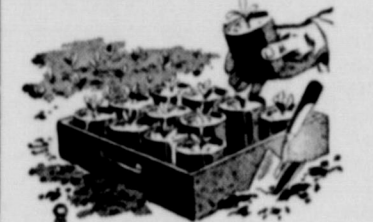

GOPHER CONTROL
I visited with Hack McCurley on his farm a couple of weeks ago. When I asked him how good a job we did on his gophers, he replied we got them 100 per cent. I couldn't believe it until I took a look for myself. We couldn't find a single fresh mound in the entire field. You will remember, we got a special new type burrow-building machine up from east Texas and personnel from the Rodent Control Service to demonstrate the new method of control.

Later Hack told me the demonstration was worth a thousand dollars to his alfalfa crop. I told him I'd be glad to settle for \$500. So far, I haven't even gotten a cup of coffee out of him.

Seriously, the results were perfect. We have plans at our A and M headquarters for building these machines. I have the address of some firms that build them, if anyone is interested.

Run down to the McCurley place and take a look for yourself.

MEAT IMPORTS
Several people have mentioned the meat imports item I had in this column last week. Here is a more recent report than the one I printed last week.

Remember, the information comes from the Australian Meat Board and makes no mention of other importing nations.

The Australian Meat Board reported that the Thor I sailed April 4 to arrive Los Angeles April 29 with 6,720 lbs. beef; and San Francisco May 2 with 201,600 lbs. beef. The Monterey which sailed April 11 and was included in the previous report has been revised to the following: San Francisco April 25 with 230,720 lbs. beef and 134,400 lbs. mutton; and Los Angeles May 3 with 241,920 lbs. beef, 89,600 lbs. mutton and 26,880 lbs. lamb. The Cap Corrientes sailed April 14 to arrive Seattle May 1 with 394,240 lbs. beef and 33,600 lbs. mutton; San Francisco May 4 with 1,458,240 lbs. beef and 78,400 lbs. mutton; and Los Angeles May 8 with 2,607,360 lbs. beef, 403,200 lbs. mutton and 112,000 lbs. lamb.

This totals 6,018,880 pounds. To put it another way, this would be the equivalent of a little over 15,000 animals that weighed 800 pounds each.

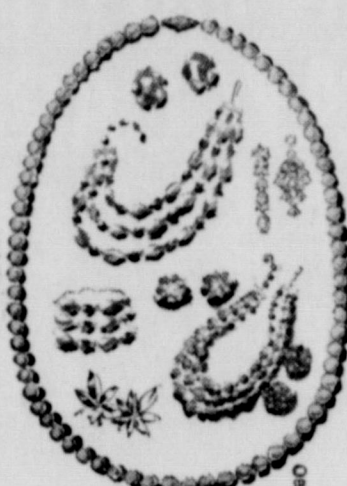

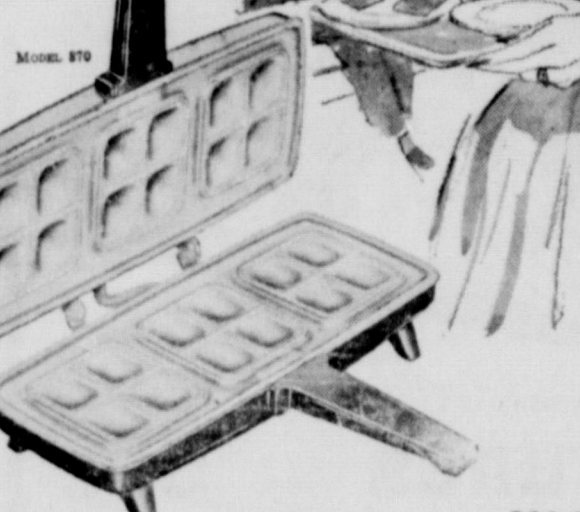
