MINERALS PRODUCTION REFLECTS ECONOMIC STRENGTH

The economy booms and the effects are felt right down the line to the smallest business firm on your Main Street—and by you personally. The economy lags and the effects also spiral down to affect your earnings, the vitality of your business, the future of your town.

No segment of the American economy is separated from the effects of boom or bust in the economy generally.

One of the best pieces of news to cross my desk this week was a report from the Department of the Interior summarizing mineral production in the United States last year. Couched in the welter of statistics was the encouraging word that as the general economy had prospered in 1963 so had the minerals industry—and new records were set in production and value.

The value of minerals produced by United States industries in 1963 totaled a record \$19.7 billion—some \$800 million above the previous high established in 1962. The 1963 total represents the largest value increase since 1966 and continues an upward trend begun in 1969.

Of direct interest to Panhandle residents are the figures as they relate to crude petroleum, natural gas and helium. The position of these industries is vital to our area.

Crude petroleum production continued to expand in 1963, reaching 2,750 million barrels, and topping the 1962 record by 3.2 per cent. Total value of crude petroleum at the well increased by three per cent to approximately \$8 billion.

The average value at the wellhead was \$2.89 per barrel, compared with the 1962 average of \$2.90 per barrel. Total demand for all oils in 1963 averaged 10,745,000 barrels daily, or 3.3 per cent higher than 1962.

Marketed production of natural gas in 1963 was 14,500 billion cubic feet, with an average value at the wellhead of 15.7 cents per thousand cubic feet. This represents a gain of 15.7 per cent in production and an increase of 0.2 cent per thousand cubic feet in average value compared with the 1962 figure.

Value of natural gas output rose six per cent to nearly \$2.3 billion. Natural gas processing plants increased their output of natural gas liquids at the unusually high rate of seven per cent in 1963 to attain a total of 16,700 million gallons. Most of the gain was in the production of LP gas and ethane.

Average value of all natural gas liquids was 5.2 cents per gallon, an increase of .01 cent per gallon compared with 1962. Helium shipments for consumption during 1963 reached a record volume of more than 600 million cubic feet. Helium output not shipped to consumers was stored underground in the Cliffside field northwest of Amarillo for later withdrawal and use.

More than 1,200 million cubic feet of helium was purchased from five industry plants under the government-industry cooperative long-range helium conservation program and added to the volume in under-

sizeable fund available. Still, voters of Gray County—not just those in McLean—approved a bond issue for a hospital here. And at the time of the balloting it was believed the \$150,000 would build a 24-bed hospital.

Perhaps you wonder why McLean shouldn't go ahead and accept the 16-bed hospital plan, and put an end to all this bickering. After all, enough money is available right now to build and equip a hospital of this size.

The main reason is that whatever is built quite possibly will be all McLean can ever expect. Either of the plans—16 or 20 beds—will take up all the property owned at the site of the present McLean Clinic.

Thus, there can be no adding on later without the purchase of some land. And, too, the foundation of either of the buildings will not be built strong enough for the addition of a second floor later.

With the smaller plan, the construction cost per bed will run more than \$10,000. Using the larger plan, space for another four beds can be built for \$5,000 per bed.

It is possible that we will have to settle for the smaller hospital. But we should keep fighting for the larger plan so long as there is a chance of getting it.
