SEEDING NATIVE GRASSES

Farmers and ranchers in Gray 'ounty SCD are planning on seeding several hundred acres to native grasses this spring

Research has shown that the optimum time for seeding most native grasses is between March 15 to April 15. When seeded prior to March 15 they may germinate during a brief warm, moist period and then freeze during a cold snap before they develop cold tolerance.

When the grasses are planted after April 15 they usually suffer greatly from weed competition. It is very important that weeds be controlled the first year of plant-


