Comments made by a Pampa sportswriter at Saturday night's Tiger football banquet led all listeners to believe there wasn't any question about which college gridiron Bob Patton would be playing on after leaving high school here.

The consensus of opinion was that Bob, one of the best all-around high school players we've ever watched perform, would be enrolling at Texas Tech in Lubbock next fall.

But this doesn't appear to be the case at all.

It's true, there has been a mutual interest between Bob and Tech coaches. However, it now appears this talented McLean youngster has just about made up his mind to attend Oklahoma State University at Stillwater.

Patton, winner of The McLean News Most Valuable Player Award for the past season, visited the OSU campus a couple of weeks ago, and came away quite impressed.

Before next fall, though, Bob is going to have to undergo some repairs.

In the last game of the 1963 season at Lefors, the youth broke his right arm just below the elbow. The fans didn't realize it, however, as he never seemed to slow down while leading the Tigers to victory.

The bone hasn't healed properly, making an operation necessary. Bob is to undergo surgery on Feb. 5 at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Surgeons will take a piece of bone from his hip and graft it between the broken ends of the arm bone. A metal pin also will be inserted in the bone to help the mending process.

Similar operations have been performed many times before, so success is almost a foregone conclusion.

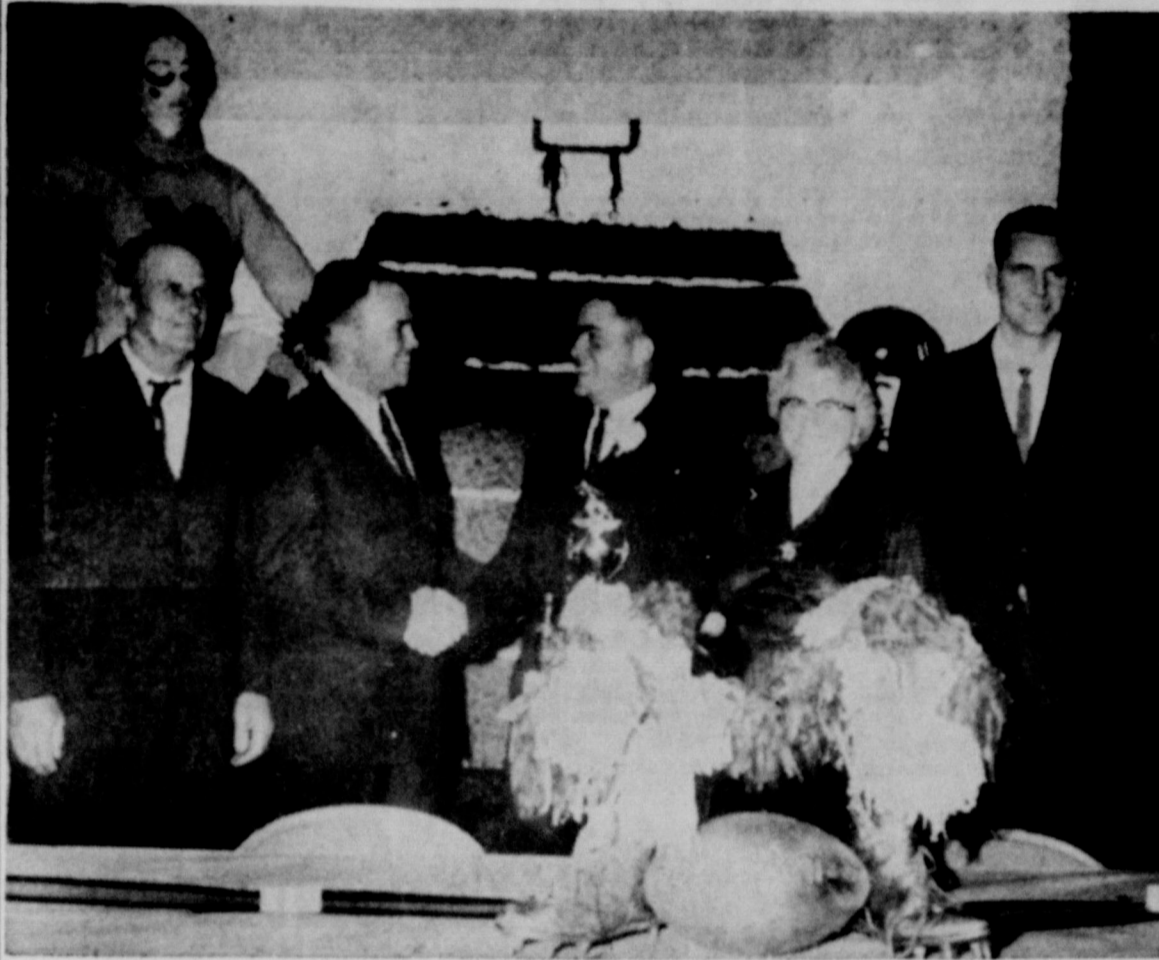
The surgeon general's report on the hazards of smoking caused many McLeannites to give up the habit immediately.

Patton, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Patton, was voted the Tigers' top performer by other members of the squad.

LBJ Congratulates Huff on Birthday

A. C. Huff, McLean resident who'll celebrate his 100th birthday on Feb. 8, was pleasantly surprised Sunday afternoon when he received a congratulatory telegram from President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The local centenarian also received telegrams from Sen. Ralph Yarborough and Congressman Walter Rogers.

The wires were delivered to Mr. Huff during an open house in his honor—and after he had delivered a 47-minute sermon Sunday morning at the Church of Christ, which he once served as minister.

"Sen. Yarborough informs me that you will be celebrating your 100th birthday tomorrow," President Johnson said. "I wish to add my congratulations and very best wishes for your health and happiness."

Rep. Rogers' message read:

Century Mark
"Mrs. Rogers and I extend to you heartiest congratulations on this day of celebration, the century mark of a distinguished life surrounded as you are today by the love of family and friends. We know that this will be one of the happiest days of all."

From Sen. Yarborough came these words:

"Congratulations on your 100th birthday. Your long and dedicated service to your community are to be commended. May you have many more fruitful years. Mrs. Yarborough and I join with your legion of friends in best wishes for the centenarian open house in your honor. God bless you."

THE GRACE OF GOD

In the Bible, the grace of God is His loving favor toward fallen man. St. Paul has more to say about grace than any other Bible writer, opening every one of his epistles with the declaration: "GRACE BE UNTO YOU AND PEACE."

Little wonder, for he himself was God's greatest demonstration of salvation by grace. In I Tim. 1:13, 14, he says: "(I) was before a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious; but I obtained mercy . . . AND THE GRACE OF GOD WAS EXCEEDING ABUNDANT . . ."

After years of service and suffering for Christ, he declared: "Be none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify THE GOSPEL (GOOD NEWS) OF THE GRACE OF GOD" (Acts 20:24).

Salvation is wholly by God's grace, not partly by man's works, for in Rom. 11:6 we read: ". . . IF IT BE BY GRACE THEN IT IS NO MORE OF WORKS: OTHERWISE GRACE IS NO MORE GRACE." And in Rom. 4:4, 5: ". . . TO HIM THAT WORKETH IS THE REWARD NOT RECKONED OF GRACE, BUT OF DEBT. BUT TO HIM THAT WORKETH NOT, BUT BELIEVETH ON HIM THAT JUSTIFIETH THE UNGODLY, HIS FAITH IS COUNTED FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS." Thus salvation is "not of works" but "unto good works" (Eph. 2:8-10). Good works is the fruit, not the root.

"All have sinned" (Rom. 3:23) but, thank God, all may be "JUSTIFIED FREELY BY HIS GRACE, THROUGH THE REDEMPTION THAT IS IN CHRIST JESUS (Rom. 3:24). Thus it is God's purpose "that in the ages to come He might show THE EXCEEDING RICHES OF HIS GRACE IN HIS kindness toward us through Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:7).

Bond Sales Are Far Short of '63 Goal

December E and H savings bonds sales in Gray County totaled \$35,324, according to George B. Cree Jr. of Pampa, chairman of the county savings bond committee.

This brought to \$278,377 the total for the year 1963, representing only 42.8 per cent of the goal.

Bond sales throughout Texas for the year hit \$145,334,910, which is 96.5 per cent of the state goal of \$150,600,000 and an increase of 1.5 per cent over 1962.

SEEDING NATIVE GRASSES

Farmers and ranchers in Gray County SCD are planning on seeding several hundred acres to native grasses this spring.

Research has shown that the optimum time for seeding most native grasses is between March 15 to April 15. When seeded prior to March 15 they may germinate during a brief warm, moist period and then freeze during a cold snap before they develop cold tolerance.

When the grasses are planted after April 15 they usually suffer greatly from weed competition. It is very important that weeds be controlled the first year of planting.

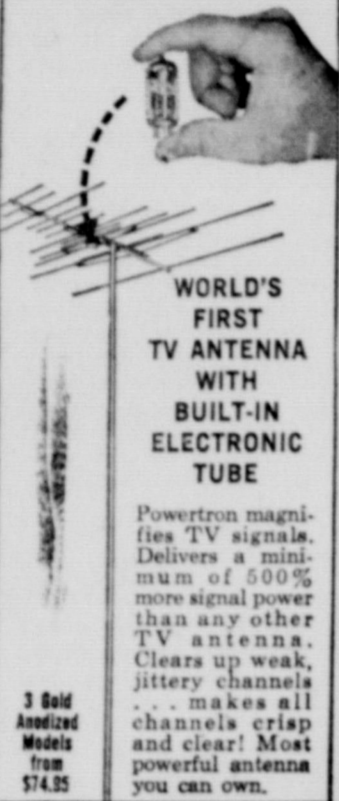
