McLean's Derrith Welch has been invited to play in the Texas School-boy All-Star Basketball Classic to be staged in Fort Worth in August.

Welch was chosen for the squad of outstanding Texas High School players by the High School Coaches' Association.

The local cager is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Welch.

Teams in the game are to represent the northern and southern sections of the state as divided by the Interscholastic League and Coaches' Association.

They will be coached by two outstanding high school coaches.

The basketball classic is being planned in conjunction with the annual Coaching School, Aug. 14, sponsored by the Coaches' Association.

Scholarships Offered

Welch, 6-6 Tiger pivot, will graduate from McLean High School this spring. He has been offered basketball scholarships by several colleges and universities throughout the nation.

He was named to the All-District 2-A Team and also the Class A All-State team the past season.

The local youth also was picked as one of the outstanding basketball players in the United States last year.

During the past season, Welch scored a total of 897 points in 27 games, for an average of 33.2.

"Vera Featherston Back Day" will be observed in McLean Monday, April 13, to honor Mrs. Jim Back, local school teacher whose first book is now being published. The McLean city commission recently designated the day for special observance, and Mayor John C. Haynes issued a proclamation to this effect Wednesday.

An autographing party for Mrs. Back is scheduled from 2 to 9 p.m.

at Lovett Memorial Library, sponsored by the Pioneer Study Club and library board.

Copies of Mrs. Back's book, "Feathers," will be on display during the party. The public is invited to attend.

The publisher, Naylor Co. of San Antonio, has arranged to provide these pre-publication first editions for sale now prior to the national release of "Feathers."

A number of the books have already been reserved on special orders placed with Mrs. Back.

Mrs. Back dropped the last syllable from her maiden name, Featherston, to give the book its interesting title.

Based on fact and fiction, "Feathers" might be classified as biography. The pages contain personal recollections of Mrs. Back, family stories, old letters and information from scrapbooks.

Born in Aspermont, Mrs. Back lived in Stonewall and Kent Counties many years. She is an honor graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene.

One of her brothers, Solon R. Featherston, is a trustee of Hardin-Simmons. He and another brother, C. H. Featherston, are well known Wichita Falls businessmen.

Mrs. Back's father, the late Edward Baxter Featherston, was a preacher-farmer, and was known as a good story-teller himself.

A long-time teacher in the McLean schools, Mrs. Back recently was awarded a 25-year service pin by the board of education.

She currently teaches English in junior high school.

She is a charter member of the Pioneer Study Club and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Illustrations in the book are by Ken Carter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler Carter of McLean. Carter now lives in Monahans.

City, School Elections

Two Trips to Poll Ahead for Voters

Two trips to the polls are scheduled for McLean voters during the next few days, as they choose three city aldermen and two school trustees.

First on the agenda is the school election Saturday, with the city balloting the following Tuesday.

Voting each of the two days will be in city hall, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

There are three candidates listed on the school ballot and four on the city ballot.

Seeking the McLean Independent School District trustee positions are George Orrick, A. L. Fuller and Jay Thompson.

Orrick, a local rancher, is the only incumbent among the three. J. B. Roach, the other member of the board whose term expires this month, is not a candidate for re-election.

Field Superintendent

Fuller is field superintendent for El Paso Natural Gas Co. and Thompson is manager of Southwestern Public Service Co.

Other members of the board are Ted Simmons, Guy Beasley, Sammy Haynes and Jim Hathaway.

Trustees serve three-year terms. Candidates for the three aldermen's post on the city commission are Creed Lamb, Joe Burroughs, R. T. Wood and Jack Shelton.

Lamb, owner of Lamb Funeral Home; Burroughs, superintendent of the Warren Petroleum Co. plant, and Shelton, owner of The McLean News, are incumbents seeking new terms.

Wood is representative of Gooch Feed Mills in this area.

Mayor John C. Haynes and Aldermen Boyd Meador and Jewel Meacham have another year of their present terms to serve.

Windbreak Planting

The Gray County Soil Conservation District has red cedar and Podocarpus pine trees available for farmstead and feedlot windbreaks.

The trees can be picked up at Bruce Nursery north of Alanreed. They are potted for delivery and should not be planted later than April 15.

Irrigation—John Harnly plans to drill an irrigation well on his farm south of Kingsmill. The Gray County SCD assisted him in laying out the irrigation system.

MEAT IMPORTS

This is still a timely topic among cattlemen these days.

In 1962 we imported 152 million dollars worth of meat from Australia. We imported 48 million dollars worth of wool. All other imports from Australia made a grand total of \$288 million worth of products we received from them.

In 1963 Australia imported over half of all meat imports into the U. S. When cow men get up in arms. This is the popular thing to do, is cuss meat imports and blame them for the depressed price of fed beef today.

There are two sides to every story.

Let's look at a few facts and figures that might tone us down a bit.

In 1962 we exported to Australia \$299 million worth of material. A breakdown on this looks something like this. We sold them \$86 million worth of industrial machinery, \$17 million worth of electrical equipment, \$39 million of raw tobacco, \$19 million worth of man-made fibers, \$14 million in tractor parts and \$81 million of miscellaneous items, plus a long list of other items.

Labor cost in most of those items would probably account for at least half of the total cost. In other words, about \$220 million was received by American laborers in producing these goods that went to Australia. If we should close our doors to all trade with Australia and this would probably be the result of a tariff wall so high we didn't receive any beef from them—what effect would this have on the people employed in the U. S. A. making products to sell them? They would buy beans instead of beef. These are things you should consider before making a hasty decision about meat imports.

Our trade relations with New Zealand might need a closer look. We exported only \$56 million

AUSTIN—(Special)—Top finance officials of the state now feel reasonably sure the next fiscal year for Texas governmental operations will dawn with an unfamiliar general revenue surplus on hand.

Texas' hard-pressed general fund has been in almost constant deficit for more than six years. As of March 25 it still was \$36,600,000 in the red. However, budget-makers are impressed with optimistic U. S. Treasury reports that the income tax cut is going to boom state and local revenues by putting more money in circulation. (Theory: more money spent, more sales taxes collected.)

"There will be a surplus. The question is how much," commented one veteran finance observer. Ideas on "how much" stretch all the way from a relatively modest \$5,000,000—estimated by the comptroller's office—to upwards of \$90,000,000.

While the feeling is general that the Legislature will begin its budget-writing next year with prospects of money on hand, the surplus likely will not be enough to avert a new tax bill.

Public school teachers are campaigning for a \$405 annual pay raise which would cost the state \$68,000,000 for the next biennium. Texas Commission on Higher Education has endorsed a program

which totals \$86,000,000 additional spending for the college and university system for 1965-67.

Other state agencies are continuing to grow and few have been known to ask less money.

The surplus should provide a protective cushion. However, governmental finance experts feel that taxpayers won't get by the 1965 legislative session unscathed.

POPULATION TREND—Calculations on population growth made by University of Texas researchers indicate a fizzle in the population explosion.

They estimate that Texas experienced a yearly gain in population of 1.8 per cent between April 1, 1960, and April 1, 1963, which would amount to quite a slow-down from the 2.2 per cent annual gain during the 10 years from 1950 to 1960.

Even more significant, the researchers noted, was an evident brake in the population increases in Texas' 21 major cities. Where they gained 3.5 per cent a year from 1950 to 1960, they gained only 2.2 per cent a year in the three years prior to April 1, 1963.

RETAIL SALES—February, usually a bright spot after drab January receipts, showed a four per cent drop in retail sales, reports University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research.

But the bureau had good news for merchants. It reported that retail sales in February topped those of February, 1963, by four per cent. So the state's accelerated economy continues the upward climb of the past three years.

FASTER CARS FOR GAME WARDENS—State Parks and Wildlife Department is replacing some six-cylinder cars used by game wardens with modern motor mounts called "Police Specials."

Department's executive director, Weldon Watson, said the new V-8's are faster and "will help overcome a serious handicap to our warden force."

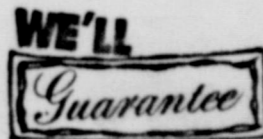

To offer to serve on the Board of Education is the best way I know to pay my debt to McLean for being such a wonderful place in which to live.

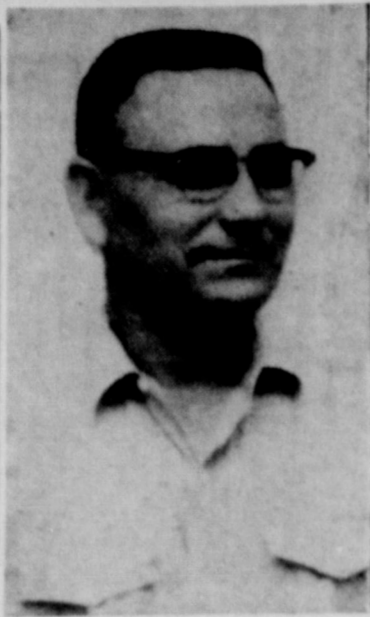
As far as I'm concerned, the present School Board members and other candidates for the board are fine people.
