STEER ROPING, BRANDING SET AT STADIUM

Some of the world's top ropers will be in McLean Sunday afternoon to compete in championship steer roping and branding at the Duncan Field football stadium.

The event is being sponsored by the McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Association, and is expected to attract hundreds of people from throughout this area.

Starting time is 2 p.m. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults, \$1 for servicemen and 75 cents for children under 12 years of age.

Among the ropers will be Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, Colo., who currently holds the title of world champion steer roper.

Also indicating they will be here are Shoate Webster of Lenapah, Okla., and Clark McEntire of Kiowa, Okla., who have held the title at least two times previously.

WRECK HURTS TWO CITIANS

Two McLean residents were injured Monday afternoon in a one-car accident east of Lefors on SH 273.

Herman Glenn and Mrs. Vera Hudson remained in Highland General Hospital at Pampa Wednesday for treatment.

Mrs. Hudson, who had been employed in McLean for the past several weeks, sustained serious back injuries in the mishap.

The extent of her injuries had not been learned here Wednesday, but she was reported in fair condition and showing some improvement.

Glenn, the driver of the car, was not believed seriously hurt in the accident but was being held in the hospital Wednesday for observation.

The accident occurred a mile east of Lefors when a tire blew out on the car. Glenn lost control, and the vehicle smashed into a culvert after leaving the pavement.

Opening May 14

Bids Invited On McLean Hospital

Bids were invited this week on the construction of the McLean Hospital.

Opening of the sealed proposals is scheduled by the Gray County commissioners court at 2 p.m. on May 14 in the courthouse county courtroom in Pampa.

Plans and specifications for the project may be obtained from the architects and engineers—Clayton B. Shiver and Russell A. Megert, Penthouse, Fisk Building, Amarillo.

The plans call for enlarging the present McLean Clinic building through additional construction into a 21-bed hospital.

Gray County voters approved a \$150,000 bond issue last July for the hospital—by an overwhelming majority.

However, it was learned after the bonds were voted that this amount was not sufficient to construct a hospital the size planned.

Cost of the 21-bed hospital has been estimated at more than \$190,000.

LANDER RITES HELD SUNDAY

Funeral services for Ed J. Lander, former mayor of McLean, were held Sunday afternoon at the Erick, Okla., First Christian Church.

Interment also was in Erick.

Mr. Lander died at 6 p.m. Thursday in a Fort Smith, Ark., hospital. He had been in the hospital since suffering a heart attack several days before his death.

Born in Lawrence, Kan., he moved to McLean in 1923 as station agent for the Rock Island Railroad. He moved to Fort Smith from McLean in early 1960 after retiring from the railroad.

A well known city and civic leader here, Mr. Lander was first elected to the city commission in 1926 and served as either mayor or an alderman for some 31 years.

Continues Service
His service on the commission was continuous until 1959, except for a two-year interval.

The federal housing project constructed in McLean in 1960 was named "Ed Lander Place" by the local housing authority in honor of the former mayor.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Lander was married to Miss Mourcen Riley in Erick.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by two brothers, Chet Lander, Pampa, and Frank Lander, Borger, and one sister of Enid, Okla.

Continues Through Month of April

Several homes were missed in the cancer crusade conducted by McLean volunteer firemen last week. Fire Chief Boyd Meador said Wednesday.

Meador asked persons who were not called on during the drive, but who want to contribute, to contact any fireman or leave their donations at The McLean News office.

If Meador or any other fireman is called, the money will be picked up.

The fire chief explained that there weren't enough firemen to make a complete house-to-house solicitation last Thursday in the required time.

More than \$500 had been collected in the Cancer Crusade here by Wednesday afternoon.

Don Lane of Pampa, who is the McLean city attorney, is serving as chairman of the Gray County Cancer Crusade.

More Help Needed
The fund-raising effort will continue through the month of April.

Lane said that more money is needed by the American Cancer Society to help in its fight against the dread disease.

"Unless progress in cancer control continues, 45 million Americans now alive will develop the disease," Lane explained.

"Our primary purpose is to save these lives, to act as public health crusaders, to reach these people in time. This we do through placing our educational program first and fund-raising second."

Through the crusades, Lane continued, "face-to-face contact" is made with everyone in the community, "urging alertness to cancer's seven danger signals and stressing the importance of regular health check-ups."

"Only through such an independent crusade can we address ourselves as directly and forcefully as we must to the urgency of the cancer problem."

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—(Special) — Only the upper 15 per cent of Texas high school graduates ought to be taken in the state's top universities, the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School has been told.

A subcommittee also informed the panel that some type of higher education must be made available to all and that there is an urgent need for general upgrading of the college system. Enrollments must be built up, dropouts reduced and standards improved, the study group heard at a meeting last week.

SCREWORM APPROPRIATION ASKED—Gov. Connally has requested a \$5,500,000 congressional appropriation for continued protection

against the screwworm menace.

A two-year program has eradicated the screwworm from Texas, Connally told congressional leaders, and feasibility of a barrier along the Mexican border to prevent re-infestation is proved.

While southwestern states, livestock producers and sportsmen have financed over half the \$12,000,000 program to date, Connally said, it is now an international matter and should be financed by the U. S. without local matching requirements.

The state, producers and sportsmen would continue to provide inspection, survey and other services in the U. S.

OIL FIELD BRINE—The Texas Water Pollution Control Board scheduled a hearing for July 1 at 9 a. m. on its order prohibiting the surface disposal of oil field brine in Area II of the Ogallala formation—the Middle High Plains. All area II permit holders are to appear at the hearing and show cause why their permits should not be amended to conform to the no-pit order.

A May 27 hearing has been set for Ogallala area I—the Panhandle area—and a hearing on area IV will be held on August 5.

CANDIDATES POLLED—Texas State Teachers Association polled legislative candidates on their stand on education and reported they endorsed a \$45 per month pay raise for school teachers and strongly favored five other measures which would benefit Texas schools.

Replies to the questionnaire, sent by TSTA's magazine "Outlook," came from 26 of the 35 Senate candidates and 269 of the 406 House candidates.

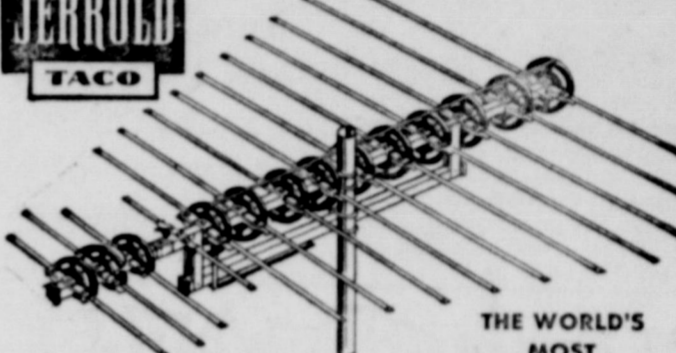



Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:
 As a fellow taxpayer, and a
 board member of Precinct No. 3,
 I feel you are interested and should
 know that I have attended the
 hospital board meetings, including
 the one at Austin, Texas, with the
 Hill-Burton representative. I went
 with the board members and hos-
 pital administrators to inspect
 hospitals in Spearman, Ballinger
 and Groom, and visited in the hos-
 pitals in Hollis and in Memphis
 last week. As a result, I have
 facts and figures for you.

Shamrock's original hospital plan
 called for a 42-bed, 33,000 square
 foot building at a cost of \$775,000.
 This carried by a majority vote
 of the hospital board. Because of
 opposition pointing out the differ-
 ence in size and cost in compar-
 ison with the other hospital build-
 ings visited, another meeting was
 called. At this meeting the build-
 ing was reduced to 28,000 square
 feet at a cost of \$710,000. This
 plan passed by a majority vote,
 however opposition was stated, and
 now your bond election is ordered
 for May 5.

The election to come before the
 voters May 5 is asking for a bond
 issue of \$365,000 (county taxpayers
 money) and a Hill-Burton grant
 of \$345,000 (government issue tax-
 payers money).

I feel as a board member and a
 taxpayer, that the plan presented
 does not give one full tax dollar
 value. As an example, I refer
 you to the Memphis, Texas, hos-
 pital.

The hospital administrator and
 county commissioners extend an
 invitation to you to come visit
 their newly constructed, 30-bed, 16,
 200 square foot hospital building
 which was built with a \$250,000
 bond issue. \$30,000 of this was not
 needed in construction, thus was
 used for the first month's expenses.
 With Hill-Burton aid the 16,200
 square foot building was built and
 equipped with all new equipment,
 and new furnishings, including for
 each room oxygen, bath, telephone,
 TV, intercom and other luxuries,
 at a total cost of \$453,000.

For comparison, let us add 12
 more patient rooms to this build-
 ing, which would be approximate-
 ly 92' x 40' or 3,680 square feet
 at a cost of \$85,000, bringing the
 total floor space to 19,880 square
 feet at a cost of \$538,000 for 42
 beds.

This information is correct, as
 I received it directly from a
 Memphis (Ill.) County commis-
 sioner and hospital administrator.
 Please save this letter until next
 week and I will give you facts
 and figures concerning the Groom
 Hospital building in comparison to
 the Shamrock Hospital building as
 proposed. This letter is meant
 only to inform you. If you have
 any questions I will be glad to
 try and find the answers.

FORMER RESIDENT OF McLEAN LIKES RIDING RAFT ON RIVER

A former McLean resident who had "rather ride a raft down the Colorado River than anything else I can think of to do" was the subject of a recent feature article in the Boulder, Colo., Daily Times-Call.

Jude Davenport, who lives in Lyons, Colo., was described as "a man with a thirst for adventure." He is the brother of Mrs. T. E. Crisp of McLean.

Davenport, now retired, became interested in raft-riding in 1961, when a trip down the Colorado River was discussed with several friends.

The group of five men set out on their journey from a point 15 miles below the Glen Canyon Dam in Arizona in a boat 28 feet long and nine feet wide on June 20, 1961.

Ten days and 320 miles later they tied up at Temple Bar on the south side of Lake Mead.

Davenport worked for the Soil Conservation Service from 1942 to 1963, but earlier in his life he was a rodeo cowboy.

He recalls that in 1923 he shipped out to England with the Tex Austin Rodeo and stayed there three months before the company went broke.

To get the money to return to the States, he sold his horses and all personal possessions.

Davenport and his wife recently moved to Lyons from Deer Trail, Colo. Mrs. Davenport teaches school at Byers, Colo., and drives home on weekends to be with her husband.

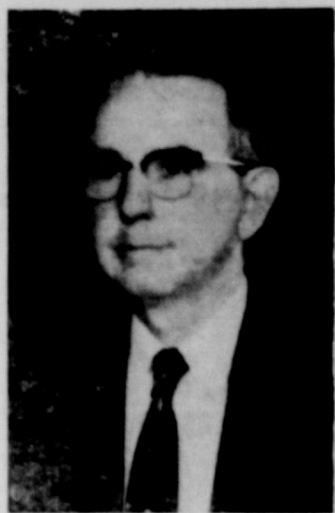
The couple has three children—Mrs. Uenta Bentley of Masters.

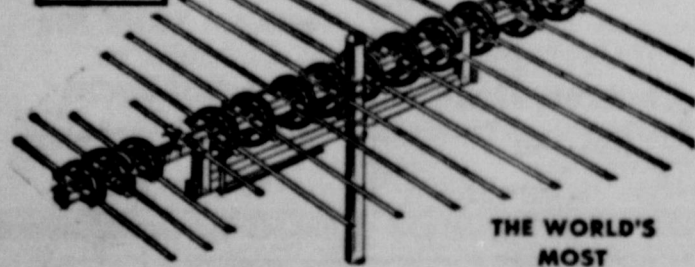
