State Capital NEWS

Massive immigration from the capitol, followed by a overhaul and interior re-arranging of the historic building about to get under way. Fortunately, the big repairs will take place at the end of the tourist season, so visitors will be dodging carpenter paint and movers for a

After July 1, the new million State Finance building will be ready for occupancy. Employees of the State Auditor and Comptroller will immediately move from their quarters into the state's office facility.

The finance departments' new space in the capitol remodeling contractors will be in to re-do their quarters. Work will be done late July and next year when the Legislature meets, office space for all state representatives, enlarging quarters for many state senators and new committee rooms will have been built in the vacated space.

A \$1.5 million appropriation set aside by the Legislature for the renovation and elevator already is being through the northern end of the capitol.

Painting contractor also is working on the Senate chamber (500 face-lifting job), and approximately \$400,000 will be spent on 1,200 yards of green carpet for the senatorial floor.

Model committee room is being set up in the Senate's plans. It includes a raised dais for members, individual microphones and theater seating. Sen-ators expect to gain two or three committee rooms.

Those who will stay in the capitol aren't to happy about the branch post-office moving to a new finance building, but are assured removal of a temporary makeshift quarters in hallways will remain of the old building's basic architecture and style.

The 1856 "frontier" pendule is being rewritten by a Bar Committee for submission to the Legislature.

For overhaul would eliminate articles covering crime and overlaps. Proposals further seek to weed out "unenforceable" including those against sex-ual acts between consenting adults.

A strong new paternity law recommended to identify illegitimate children make them responsible for social support.

The draft would leave sentencing of convicted persons to a jury instead of a judge except in those where the death penalty is involved. But it would permit judges to refuse to impose death penalty through assent of jurors.

Instead of general sentences for crimes, the revision would set four degrees of felony and three of misdemeanors, with prison terms to be fixed according to the specific nature of the offense and circumstances.

The redraft also would make corporations criminally liable for pollution cases, establish general trespass article (covering such offenses as college trespass) and define prohibited conduct short of compul-sion of crime.

University of Texas Law School Dean Page Keeton said the bill, if adopted, would be "best in the nation."

VESTON ISLAND PARK LIGHT - The park closed its deal to buy 1,781 acre Maco Stewart Island for \$890,000 (half to be reimbursed by federal government).

Maco Stewart Jr. sold the land to the state in 1969 pending continued use by the state for their lifetimes. The Wildlife Commission will pay three heirs \$500,000 for the full title to be sold immediately.

Development will be on land Gulf beach side, although no date has been set for building. Galveston County office will conduct purchasing details.

state and local elections cannot be denied persons living on federal installations. Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr.'s office says the ruling will affect some areas of Texas.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin plans to appeal the decisions of U.S. District Judge Reynoldo Garza in Brownsville, taking jurisdiction of Platoro Ltd.'s case demanding the state return the treasure it recovered from a Mexican Padre Island shipwreck. Garza accepted the suit as a salvage case.

Federal jury in Abilene found that the Abilene School Board did not act arbitrarily in giving unexcused absences to 300 Mexican-American pupils who boycotted classes for 10 days last fall.

Second oil and gas and sulphur lease sale of 1970 will be held here at 10 a.m. August 4. Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced.

Two hundred and four tracts will be offered in the Gulf of Mexico, sixty-four uplands and riverbeds.

Twelve sulphur tracts are located in far West Texas. Minimum bonus is \$25 an acre (\$20 for uplands and riverbeds), delay rental \$4 a year, royalty of one-sixth and primary term of five years.

NURSING HOME RULES TOLD Public Welfare Department sent 800 to 900 nursing homes regulations implementing new rules they can collect from the state and federal government and supplements collectible from patient's families.

"Skilled" care homes will get a raise from \$300 to \$381 a month, with no supplement. Intermediate Care 111 facilities will be cut from \$300 to \$294 and ICF 111 homes from \$210 to \$198, but the latter two groups can collect family supplements of \$25 a patient.

Welfare Department served notice, however, that it will not serve as a collection agency, and homes cannot deny care to any patient for lack of a supplement. "Supplementation cannot be collected from patient's assistance checks."

SAFETY DEVICE REQUIRED Railroad Commission ordered all flowing wells in bays, estuaries, lakes, rivers or streams to prevent pollution spills.

Rule goes into effect October 1 and is aimed at preventing disasters like the Chevron well spill off Louisiana. Commission also adopted a form to be used by oil companies in reporting immediately (by telephone or telegram) all spills of as much as five five barrels.

SHORT SNORTS State Health Department will operate two mobile dentist's offices for poor.

Attorney General Martin has held that school districts must pay tuition fees for pupils sent to another district for training in a 12-grade school system where higher-grade training is not available in the home district.

Teachers To Be Paid On 10-Month Basis Texas public school teachers -- those on the state minimum salary schedule -- will receive pay raises averaging about \$1,050 per year in 1970-71.

Students will go to school and teachers will teach -- and extra five days (180 days instead of 175). In addition, teachers will be on duty for 10 more days of non-teaching work during the year, and will be paid on a 10-month basis, instead of nine.

These changes in the school year and the basis for figuring teacher pay result from amendments to the minimum foundation program law passed in 1969 by the Legislature.

Under the minimum program, a beginning bachelor's degree teacher in 1969-70 was paid \$593 per month for nine months, or \$5,337 for the year.

Phil Cates Asks For Recount Of Votes Cast

Phil Cates, Lefors, a Democratic candidate for State Representative from the 79th Legislative District, announced, he has requested a recount of votes cast in the June 6 runoff election.

In a prepared press release, Cates said he believed he had an obligation to his campaign workers to ask for the recount.

Cates was unofficially announced as the winner in the runoff against Ray Trospert of Higgins. Last week, however, a canvass of vote by the State Democratic Executive Committee in Austin found discrepancies in the vote tabulation and declared Trospert the winner by a small margin.

In his statement, Cates said, "... both my opponent and I have now tasted victory and defeat in the same election and I believe if such a change can be made in one small precinct it is entirely possible that in other counties other larger changes are possible."

Cates said the recount is being requested in accordance with Article 9, 38A of the Texas Election Code.

Wheatheart Contest To Be Held At Perryton Aug. 22

PERRYTON - Invitations have gone out to cities in the Golden Spread to send a contestant to the annual Wheatheart of the Nation beauty contest scheduled in Perryton on August 22, as a highlight of the annual Perryton Celebration.

The Wheatheart contest is one of the outstanding beauty pageants in the Southwest and the selection of the Wheatheart of the Nation has been a highlight of the Panhandle area since its beginning in 1947.

Any single girl 16 years or older, with a good reputation and character who is properly endorsed by a civic club or business firm is eligible for this beauty contest. Judging is based on beauty, personality, poise, and figure.

The 1970 Wheatheart of the Nation will receive a \$1000 college scholarship. The first runner-up will receive a \$500 college scholarship and the second runner-up will receive a \$250 college scholarship.

Drownings Take 134 Lives This Year

Drownings in Texas have taken the lives of 134 persons so far this year, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

With the exception of a few freak accidents most of the drownings were the tragic ends to what started as outdoor pleasure outings.

Swimming, boating, wading and fishing were activities which all figured in recent drownings.

Picnicking also figured in two recent drownings of toddlers who wandered away from their elders.

Forty-one of this year's drownings were boating accidents. Of these, six persons were in violation of the law which requires that a Coast Guard approved life saving device be on board for each person in the boat.

Swimming accidents accounted for 35 drownings this year. In most cases the victim misjudged his abilities to get himself out of trouble.

Last year 516 persons drowned in Texas.

Bob Price Announce Panhandle To Get Emergency Service

Congressman Bob Price announced today that effective October 1, the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation of Amarillo will receive \$165,000 to provide emergency food and medical services to an estimated 11,428 low income individuals.

The Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation operates in Potter, Randall, Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Collingsworth, Parmeswisher, Childress, Donley, Armstrong, Castro, Briscoe and Hall counties.

Neighborhood centers will be designated in each county where low income individuals can receive medical examinations and vouchers with which to purchase food.

A similar emergency food and medical service grant has been made to the Central Plains Community Action Agency in Plainview. The \$15,000 grant is for a 22 month program serving 500 persons through one neighborhood center in Hale County.

"I believe we all agree that no American should go to bed hungry or be without medical services when needed. The purpose of these grants is to make food and medicine available to those who would otherwise have to do without," Price said.

Approximately 700 low income women in eight counties served by the Hockley County Community Action Commission will be eligible for family planning information. The 18th District counties of Bailey and Lambare included in the Commission area.

Grubs Are Ugly But Not Dangerous

Horrified anglers who find ugly black or yellow grubs under the skin of their prize bass needn't worry. They're harmless.

Marion Toole, inland fisheries coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said warm weather usually means more of the grubs will be found on bass, bream and other scaly varieties of freshwater fish.

Toole said the grubs, which usually are encysted on the dorsal side of the fish just beneath the scales, can be trimmed off the fish before it's cooked.

The grubs, which are either black grub (Cassiphiala buboglossa) or the yellow grub (Clinostomum marginatum) have a complicated life cycle in which they utilize three hosts. In addition to fish, the organisms spend part of their life stages in the bodies of water birds and snails.

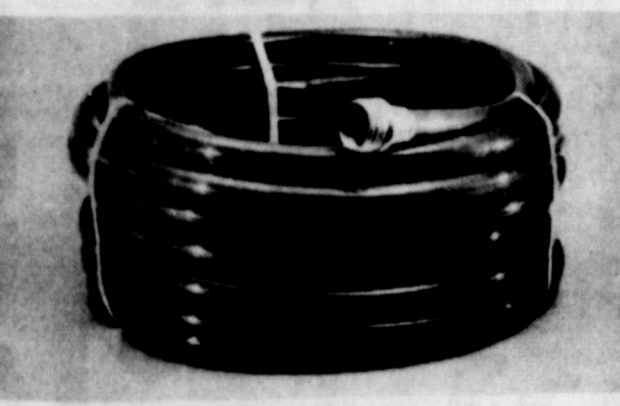

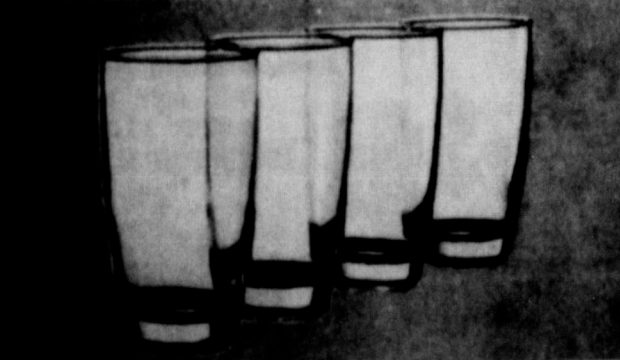

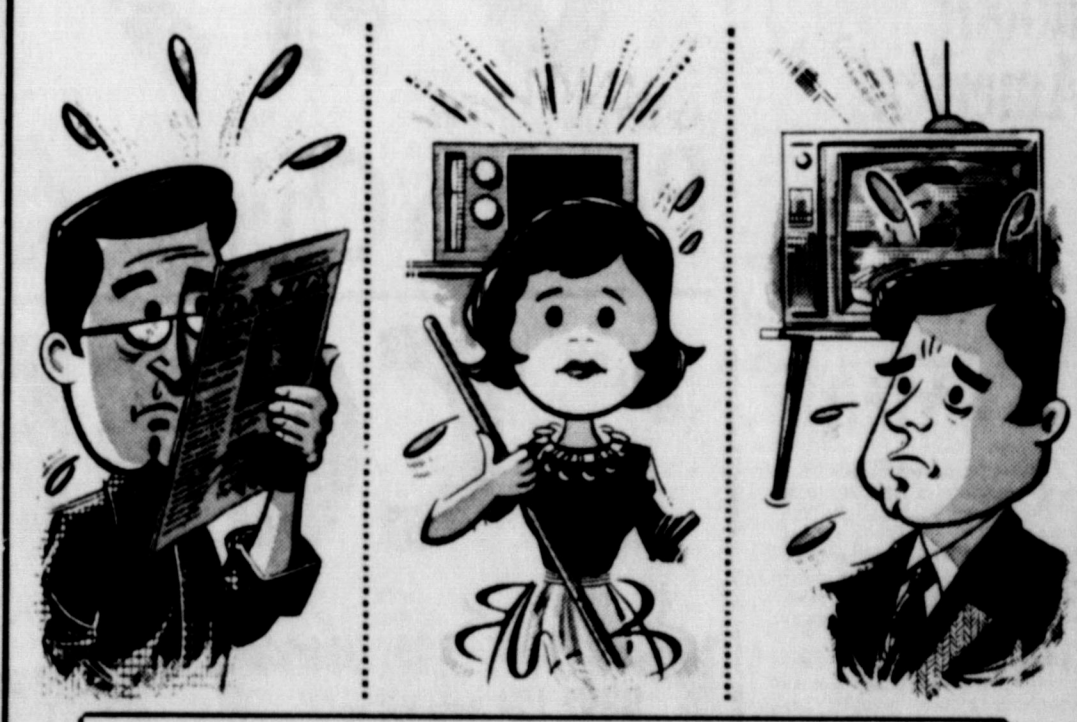

Marion Toole, inland fisheries coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said warm weather usually means more of the grubs will be found on bass, bream and other scaly varieties of freshwater fish.

Toole said the grubs, which usually are encysted on the dorsal side of the fish just beneath the scales, can be trimmed off the fish before it's cooked.

The grubs, which are either black grub (*Cnephia buboglossa*) or the yellow grub (*Clinostomum marginatum*) have a complicated life cycle in which they utilize three hosts. In addition to fish, the organisms spend part of their life stages in the bodies of water birds and snails.

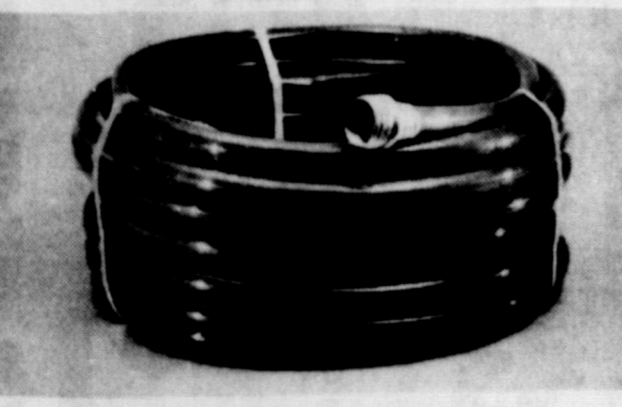

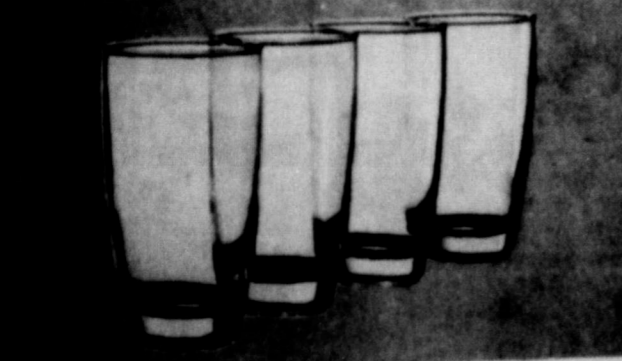
