

Construction Is Assured By 730 to 272 Majority

Residents of McLean, southern Gray County and all across this area could look forward today to having local hospital facilities in the near future.

Bolstered by an overwhelming 417 to six, "for" vote in McLean, the \$150,-000 bond election Tuesday to construct a hospital here was approved by a majority of almost three to one across Gray County.

The final county-wide tally was 730 for to 272 against. These figires were still unofficial Wednesday afternoon, pending a canvass of the election returns by the ounty commissioners court.

However, County Clerk Charlie Thut said Wednesday that the results as announced probably will be the final official count,
