## ALANREED PM EXAM BEGINS

Deadline Dec. 8 For Applications

An examination to fill the position of fourth-class postmaster for the Alanreed Post Office will be open until Dec. 8, the Civil Service Commission announced this week.

The post pays \$2,877 per year. Applicants must actually reside within the territory served by the Alanreed Post Office and must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications.

There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary limited appointments of one year.

Information Available

The commission said all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color or national origin.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the Alanreed Post Office.

Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than Dec. 8.

## McLEAN LOSES TO CANADIAN IN FINAL TILT

Wildcats Come From Behind To Triumph 28-24

The McLean Tigers brought their season to a close Friday night with a heart-breaking 28-24 loss to the Canadian Wildcats.

Penalties and mistakes played a key role in the downfall of the Bengals, who had been favored to whip the Wildcats. And Canadian was ready for this 1964 finale, with a deadly passing attack and determined battle on the ground.

The host Wildcats rolled up a net of 291 yards on the ground and added 155 more through the air, while McLean netted 303 rushing.

Canadian had 20 first downs to the Tigers' 16.

McLean struck early to take a 16-0 lead in the first quarter.

Taking the kickoff on their own 32, the Tigers marched downfield

# City Gets First Freeze, Snow

Cotton farmers in the McLean area are looking hopefully to the sky for a look at the sun, as rains continue to hold up harvest operations.

Weathermen Wednesday night were giving some encouragement, with predictions of clearing on Friday. Skies were almost clear in McLean this morning.

During the past week, rainfall here measured 1.45 inches officially, but farm and ranch gauges indicate considerably more than this has fallen in some areas.

Well over two inches had dropped on the Sitter Ranch south of the city through Tuesday, and intermittent showers boosted this still higher on Wednesday.

Lake McClellan was benefitting some from the rains, with a six-inch rise in the water level reported up to Tuesday night.

19.75 for Year

Warner Phillips, lake concessionaire, said the slow rains weren't producing as much run-off as he had hoped, but any amount of additional water in the lake will help.

Already the moisture total for 1964 stands at 19.73 inches here, with 2.86 of this coming in an unusually wet November.

The total for November, 1963, was only .59 inch. And to this date a year ago McLean had recorded just 14.69 inches.

Temperatures Wednesday night dropped to below freezing for the first time this fall. The low registered early this morning was 27 degrees. Snow grains also were visible here early today.

### 'Shop, Mail Early' To Assure Delivery On Time, PM Urges

"Shop early and mail early" was the suggestion this week for persons planning to send Christmas gifts and cards.

Frank Simpson, acting postmaster here, said this is the only way patrons can be assured of on-time delivery.

Simpson pointed out that while bad weather doesn't stop the mails, it certainly can slow them down.

He mentioned that planes can't get off the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up, trucks must move slowly and cautiously over highways.

The Postoffice Department has several new tools to use in this year's mail service. The most important is the new ZIP Code and transportation-distribution system that came into being with the Zoning Improvement Plan (ZIP).

Simpson is urging everyone to use the five-digit numbers, because in most cases the code cuts down the number of times a piece of mail must be handled. This saves time, labor and money.

He suggests that even if a patron doesn't know the code for the addresses of the people to whom they'll be sending cards and gifts, they should use the code on their return addresses. And they should check the codes from the return addresses of those who write to them.

"Moving the Christmas mail is a hard, tiring job and the four local postal employees who work so diligently during this period deserve all the cooperation they can get," Simpson said.

### COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

The rains have produced a possibility for a large amount of wheat pasture in the Pampa area. Some in the McLean area may be short on grass for wintering of cows and wheat pasture may be a way of carrying the cows through the winter.

If anyone in this area is interested in obtaining wheat pasture on top they should contact Foster Whaley. Cows coming off wheat will be in good condition and this would be an excellent time to cull if you haven't already done so.

We received the first 28-day report from the Pan Tech bull test-

### Agriculture Census Beginning Soon For Gray County Farms

Plans for taking the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Gray County have been announced by Mrs. Thelma Bray, newly appointed census crew leader for the county.

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after today, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural boxholders in the county.

This will give farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

Collect Questionnaires  
In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions they may have had difficulty with.

Enumerator visits are scheduled to begin in this county on Nov. 23. Enumerators will take about three weeks to complete their work, the crew leader estimates.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy.

Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, farm products sold and use of fertilizers, insecticides and herbicides.

## NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Trull Johnson recently developed a complete conservation plan on his ranch northeast of McLean. Trull plans to seed grass and construct a cross-fence so that he can manage livestock grazing more effectively. Also he plans to develop additional livestock water facilities.

**RANGE SEEDING**—There are several acres of land in Gray County that have been turned out to pasture without being seeded to native grass. Undesirable forbs and grasses cover the ground which provides some early spring grazing; however, its potential is limited.

Seeded grasses will establish in two to five years and dependable year-around grazing can be expected. Experiments have proven that desirable grasses will produce more pounds of beef per acre in most cases.

Harris King, Roy McCracken, R. D. Williams, Alvin Bell, Leroy Williams, Trull Johnson, O. R. Blankenship, John Haynes, Eben Warner, Cecil Seaney, Harvey Taylor, Lester Bailey, Elmer Immet and L. T. Goldston are some of the people that plan to do range seeding in Gray County this winter. Nearly all of these farmers and ranchers have had good results from range seeding in the past.

Make plans now to establish desirable grasses if you have land that's not paying expenses. Range seeding should not be done later than April 30 of next year.

**CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE**—If you are interested in doing conservation work, contact your Soil Conservation District supervisor: Milton Carpenter, Stan Friend, Curtis Schaffer, James Clett or the local Soil Conservation Service. We are ready to assist you in developing a soil and water conservation plan on your farm or ranch.

**DIVERSION TERRACES**—Three diversion terraces and a standard terrace system were staked for O. R. Blankenship on his place west of McLean.

Blankenship also plans to shape some gullies and establish several old fields to grass. The shaped gullies will be seeded to grass in an established dead litter cover. O. R. plans to carry out a com-

plete conservation plan on this farm.

Floyd Franklin, who farms just southwest of Pampa, has completed an irrigation well.

Stan Kretzmeier has completed a diversion on his farm northwest of Pampa.

**FERTILIZE CUT AREAS**—Several who have leveled land for irrigation have noticed a reduction in yield even after they have applied nitrogen. Experiments carried out at the Bushland Station showed that when the top four-inch layer is removed, practically all of the available phosphate is removed with it.

On areas that were cut as much as 12 inches and 150-200 pounds of phosphate were applied, plus 150-200 pounds of nitrogen, no reduction in yield was noted. On wheat only 100 to 120 pounds of nitrogen should be applied.

Where soils were cut as much as 18 inches and fertilized, a reduction of only 20 per cent was noted.

In most cases the land is cut less than 12 inches in the Gray County SCD. Where phosphate is applied along with nitrogen there should be no reduction in yield due to the cutting.

### Field Dressing Deer Leaflet Available From County Agent

With deer hunting season just around the corner, hunters may be interested in a new leaflet, "Field Dressing a Deer," now available at the county agent's office.

Since quality venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the freezer, field dressing is important, says Foster Whaley, Gray County agricultural agent.

Leaflet L-634 gives one method of field dressing and skinning a deer. However, points out Whaley, any method resulting in a clean, well-bled carcass is satisfactory. Unpleasant experiences with venison usually result from lack of care before the meat reaches the kitchen, he says.

Information in the leaflet has been provided by Wallace Klusmann, extension wildlife conservation specialist, and by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Another publication that should be of interest to hunters and housewives during this hunting season is Extension Bulletin B-987, "Wild Game Care and Cooking."

It offers many suggestions for preparing delicious dishes of venison as well as other wild game meats.

This bulletin is also available at his office, adds Whaley.

 I thought your readers might be interested in the following clipping from the Rains County Leader:

Just recently we ran across this startling piece of information. Though it is not secret, how many people know or realize its significance? Keep in mind that the President's power was originally limited. This came from the Los Angeles Law Library. It can also be found in the Federal Register, written on Feb. 20, 1962, pages 1519 through 1547.

On Feb. 16 and 27, 1962, John F. Kennedy signed into law the following executive orders which can be put into operation at the President's discretion and he alone has this power now!

- Executive order 10955 — Take over all communications media.
- Executive order 10997 — Take over all electric power, petroleum and gas fuels and minerals.
- Executive order 10998 — Take over all food resources and farms (including farm machinery).
- Executive order 10999 — Take over all methods of transportation, highways, seaports, etc.
- Executive order 11000 — Mobilization of civilians into work forces under government supervision.
- Executive order 11001 — Take over all health, welfare and educational functions.
- Executive order 11002 — Postmaster general (member of the President's cabinet) will operate a nation-wide registration of all persons.
- Executive order 11003 — Take over all airports and aircraft.
- Executive order 11004 — Take over housing and finance authorities to relocate communities; to build new housing with public funds; designate areas to be abandoned as unsafe; establish new locations for populations.
- Executive order 11005 — Take over all railroads, inland waterways and public storage facilities.
- Executive order 110061 — Designate responsibilities of office of emergency planning, give authorization to put all other executive orders into effect in times of increased international tension or economic or financial crisis.

Part One, Sec. 101d — Herein states (the Director of the Office of Emergency Planning) is to perform additional functions as the president may from time to time direct.

These orders became law merely by being published in the Federal Register. They do not require the knowledge nor consent of Congress. Congress is not allowed to pass on it, nor are we protected in any way. The entire program has been well engineered.
