Surprising Memphis To Face Tigers Here Friday

Their hopes for a District 2-A championship dampened, but far from erased, the McLean Tigers tackle the up-and-coming Memphis Cyclone at Duncan Field here Friday night.

Kickoff time will be 7:30. Until last week, Memphis hadn't been considered a serious threat for the district title. But the Cyclone's impressive 16-0 victory over the Defending Champion Wellington Skyrocks has changed all this.

Memphis had shown it could score in all five previous games, but lacked a solid defense.

The Cyclone defeated Crowell 15-6, fell to Shamrock 30-12, slaught-

ered Hooker, Okla., 50-13 and was clipped by Sanford-Fritch 36-24 and Silvertown 30-22 in games before colliding with Wellington.

Tiger Coach Fred Hedgecock said Wednesday his charges are attempting to "get up" for the tussle with Memphis.

But it is difficult to do, after losing such a heartbreaker to the White Deer Bucks here last week.

The Tigers, paced by Fullback Dickie Crockett, staged a full 48-minute battle before going down 12-6.

Crockett, an outstanding performer in every game, carried the ball on 29 plays and ended the evening with 152 of the 166 net yards gained by McLean.

The 170-pound fullback earned the respect of all Buck tacklers who attempted to haul him down, using what has become his trademark.

When the youngster sees the tacklers closing in, he invariably lowers his head and attempts to butt them out of his way. Using his head as an offensive weapon, Crockett always manages to gain a few more precious inches, feet or yards.

White Deer lived up to its advance billing, scoring the first time late in the opening quarter—after McLean had given the vis-

Gray Countians To Attend Convention Of SCD Association

Several men from McLean and Gray County will be in Sherman next week for the annual meeting of the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors.

Li. Gov. Preston Smith will be among speakers at the big SCD session, being held for the first time in north Texas and expected to draw 750 to 1,000 district officials.

Among them will be Milton Carpenter, Curtis Schaffer and James Cliett, supervisors of the Gray County SCD, and Arneal Scott of the Soil Conservation Service. Some of the Gray County men will be accompanied by their wives.

The lieutenant governor will address the supervisors on the final night of the conference, when the association holds its annual banquet in Sherman's Municipal Auditorium, site of all activities connected with the meeting.

Other speakers and dates of their appearance before the supervisors: J. Earl Laney, association president; W. Lewis David, state executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; and Jack Garrett, supervisor of the Southmost SCD, on Oct. 28. Dr. Rex Johnston of the USDA Agricultural Research Service and state Sen. Walter Richter, the morning of Oct. 29.

The Texas association comprises supervisors from 182 SCDs, embracing 99 per cent of the land in the state. A board of five supervisors, all volunteers elected for five-year terms, governs each district.

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NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Eben Warner is constructing a dam on his ranch north of Alanreed to control water erosion and distribute livestock grazing. He also constructed a livestock water storage facility.

The Gray County SCD provided assistance to Raymond Barrett in laying out his irrigation system so that he can water wheat this fall. Raymond drilled his irrigation well last April and has irrigated one milo crop.

Tony Smitherman plans to drill another well on his farm southwest of McLean.

He drilled two irrigation wells last year. Tony plans to tie all his wells together with underground pipe so that he will have better control of his irrigation water.

Dicky Everett has produced a lot of alfalfa hay this year on his farm north of McLean. Many irrigated farmers could benefit by observing Dicky apply his irrigation water. He has done an excellent job in managing his irrigation system which is evident by

observing the number of times the alfalfa has been cut and the volume of production from each cutting.

This type of production is an asset to the McLean area and will be of benefit to farmers and ranchers during the remainder of this drought year. Alfalfa is a good crop when properly managed and can play an important part in any farming and ranching operation.

There has been a definite step-up in the development of irrigation in Gray County. Approximately 4,000 acres have been developed in the past two years.

The Gray County SCD provides technical assistance through the Soil Conservation Service in laying out and designing irrigation systems. This is a free service available to all landowners in Gray County. For further information, contact the local SCS office or your SCD supervisor.

BANGS TESTING PROGRAM

Final plans were made last Monday night in the meeting room of the courthouse annex on the massive blood testing program that is scheduled to get underway Oct. 26.

A newsletter was mailed on Monday to all beef cattlemen along with a reprint of my column from The McLean News setting forth the procedure for having a herd tested and vaccinated (if you wish calves to be). Wilson Boyd will be responsible for reporting to the control laboratory in Pampa. It is anticipated that at least one technician will be stationed at McLean.

For larger herds you might want to hold your cattle in a trap and take the samples in to the laboratory at Pampa. Should a reactor or suspect be found it would be much easier to identify them and get them out of your herd. Tags are used for the ears. A chalk mark used on the backs will hold reasonably well for two or three days.

At the Pampa meetings each lineup man was provided with an appointment size calendar and a Gray County road map. Technicians from the Texas Animal Health Commission were also provided with maps to facilitate the work.

Our secretary, Doloris Seaney, had typed the name of each cattle producer on individual cards. These names were called out and the cards taken by one of the seven lineup men. A place was provided to put down the number of cattle to be tested and the number of helpers to be vaccinated.

So when you as a producer call your lineup man, be prepared to tell him approximately how many there will be to test and vaccinate.

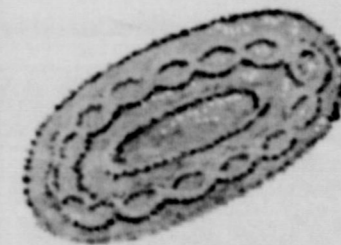

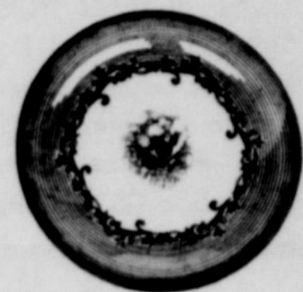

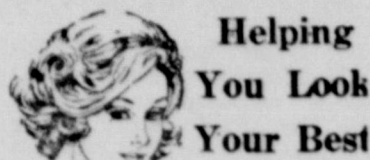
