These applications must be signed and returned to the County Tax Office before a voter certificate can be mailed to you. 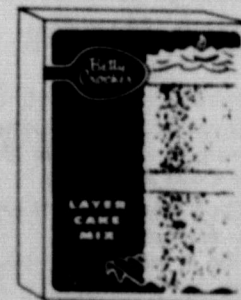

LIVESTOCK PRICES

Livestock prices are continuing their relentless climb to record levels. Slaughter steers now stand \$6.00 per cut higher than a year ago. Hogs prices are \$10.00 up. Even lamb prices are up \$4.00. Cattle now stand as high or higher than in 1952. Wouldn't it be nice if all other prices of things farmers and ranchers buy stood at the same level as they were in 1952. A good pickup could be bought that cost less than \$1800., a haircut for a \$1.00, a private room in a hospital for \$12 to \$15.00 and a tractor for less than half of today's cost.

Americans in 1970 spent 16.6% of disposable income on food - down from 20% in 1960; 22.2% in 1950. Beef and pork is the best buy today than ever. You spend less of your disposable income for meat, eat a lot more of it and the quality is better than ever.

COTTON GINNING

A total of 594 bales of cotton has been ginned and less than ten bales are yet to come in. Looks like about 600 bales for 1971 crop. Lateness of harvest on both cotton and milo sets a record. Last week some irrigation farmers in the Groom vi-

cinity were still harvesting milo.

ASCS NEWS

Recently several important notices have been mailed to farmers concerning the 1972 wheat and feed grain program. There have been several changes made that are very important to you. I would advise you to read these carefully.

FEEDING CATTLE ON WHEAT

On February 2nd, I have been asked to present a program on the Economic Utilization of wheat pasture at a Seminar called Colorado Beef day. The Seminar will be held at Lamar, Colorado for the eastern part of Colorado.

For some time we have pushed the idea of grazing wheat out in lieu of harvesting. We have encouraged the feeding of up to 6# of ground grain on wheat. We have run numerous trials to prove to our selves this is a good practice. Some of the data that I have compiled might help you in the utilization of wheat pasture. I am running off 300 copies of the printed presentation that I will be using. If you would like to have a copy, I'd be very happy to mail you one. Gain cost of a 400# steer gain-one pound per day on straight wheat cost close to 25¢ per pound of gain. Feeding 6# of grain can increase this gain to 2# per day and cut gain cost to 19.3¢ per day.

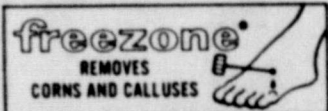

Hereford Sale To Be Held At Guymond
