Just Between Us

Many taxpayers, and you count us among them, are becoming a little gushy when they're told such and such a bond issue can be voted at an increased cost to them.

Bond issues just don't work that way. Bonds, when voted for any purpose, must be paid off at face value plus interest.

Now, don't get us wrong. We aren't against bond issues and are not attempting a blanket condemnation of all of them.

A community never shows progress without being willing to spend money to make improvements. But we prefer that no juggling of figures, or facts, be attempted in order to mislead the voters into approving certain spending plans.

You can hand it to the Wheeler board of education for coming up with a gem-dandy idea to put across the new \$750,000 bond issue for constructing a new school system in that community to the northeast.

The Wheeler Times last week announced with a banner headline that the annual school tax rate had been reduced from \$1.35 to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

Just below was another headline announcing that the board of education had been petitioned to call an election on a \$750,000 bond issue to pay for a new high school, new elementary school, remodeling of the gymnasium, equipment, landscaping, etc.

It was explained that the tax rate was being reduced, but still there would be plenty of money to pay off the new bonds and operate the schools.

How is all this possible?

The people in the former Keller-ville School District, which now is a part of the Wheeler School District, can tell you very easily.

All property in the district has been re-evaluated for tax purposes. Residents now will pay taxes at the rate of 45 per cent of the actual value of their property. (This compares with 33 1/2 and less in the McLean District based on valuations set many years ago.)

The key to all this is the valuation placed on the property.

One resident of McLean, who shall remain nameless, owns land located in the Wheeler School District. His tax rate, like everybody else's, was reduced from \$1.35 to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

Still, his tax bill for the next year was increased by five times the amount it was for this year.

We heard of one who will pay seven times as much.

At this rate, we wonder how much longer a person will be able to own property. The farmer and rancher already are having a rough time of it, and the increased tax burden simply digs deeper into his meager earnings.

Perhaps the people of the Wheeler district should frame this statement from their board of education, and be prepared to feed it back to the board a few years hence:

"The local school board positively assures the public that the total monies derived from this tax rate (\$1.25) would adequately finance the current building program under consideration and the cost of local operational expenses. This would also finance any additional personnel and anticipated teacher pay raise made necessary by state law."

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Leslie Darsey, Drew Word and Bill Crisp are sprigging bermuda grass on their places north of Alanreed. The sprigs are being gotten from Word's stock farm.

Anyone needing bermuda grass sprigs should contact Drew.

An erosion control dam was staked for Erey Cubine west of McLean. This dam will help to protect cropland and control a large gully that is eating back into several farms.

Farmers and ranchers are seeding about 2,500 acres of range and pasture grasses this spring.

Some of those seeding grass are O. R. Blankenship, Erey Cubine, Sackett Wagner, Kenneth Elsheimer, John Haynes, Robert and Artie Sailor, Mrs. James Noel, Harry Youngblood, Willie Harris, Lester Bailey and several others.

John Quirk who farms north of Groom is in the process of sowing 160 acres to sorghum for a dead litter cover. John will sow blue grama and sidecoats grama in this dead litter cover next spring. It is very important that weeds be controlled on newly sowed grass. The best way to control these weeds is by spraying with 2,4-D.

Leroy Williams has shaped a three-way gully and a three-acre waterway on his farm south of McLean. He has seeded the waterway and gully to switchgrass.

Lawton Hoffer who farms north of Laketon has staked one field for leveling. He plans to border this field and establish it to alfalfa.

Bob Sherrod seeded a 40-acre

field to improved grass on his farm northeast of McLean. This field was turned out as pasture approximately 30 years ago and was covered with trash grasses and yucca. It was plowed and leveled before seeding.

Bob plans to establish a 100-acre field to improved grasses next year. A cross-fence will be constructed so the grass can be managed until it is well established.

Elmer Balch has started leveling five acres on his farm southeast of Pampa. This land will be bordered and spigged to bermuda grass. The purpose of the borders is to control the flow of irrigation water.

Elmer established 21 acres of switchgrass and seven acres of bermudagrass during the past two years. He has an excellent stand of switchgrass which should produce a lot of forage this year with proper fertilization and irrigation.

It will also be considered for seed production since the grass seed market is above average.

An erosion control dam was staked for construction on the Roland Williams Ranch northeast of McLean. This dam will protect 30 acres of hay meadow and control several large gullies.

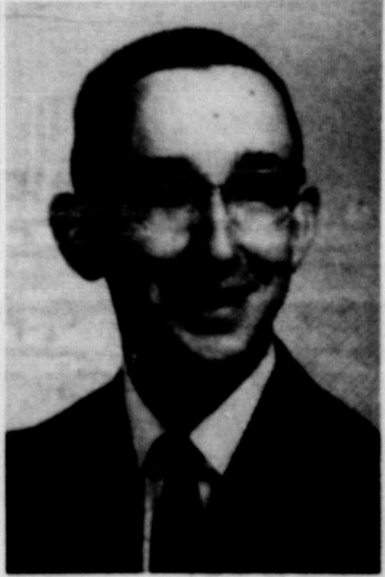

IRRIGATION
Drew Ward's irrigation well still holds the record of being the highest known producer in Gray County. It was clocked at better than 1,800 gallons by Felix Ryals, manager of the High Plains Water

District. Rex McAnelly, manager of Moody Farms, has a new well on top of one of the high plains. It produces 1,450 gallons. Rex has a rotary sprinkler system that rotates around his well or outlet point. When the system has made a 360 degree rotation, 170 acres have been irrigated. Each nozzle is calibrated to put out an amount of water that will be the equivalent of one inch up three inches of moisture. There are water cylinders that propel the system. If you would like to see this mammoth system in operation, it is located along the east side of Moody Farms.
