WEATHER IN McLEAN AREA STAYS STORMY

Moisture Total For 1965 Climbs To 10.71 Inches

The weather picture for McLean and the entire Panhandle continued wet with frequent tornado scares during the past week.

Severe weather alerts kept many residents dodging and out of their storm cellars, as twisters were spotted in this area. No damage was noted in this immediate vicinity.

However, a tornado killed one man north of Shamrock last Friday night, and heavy wind damage also was reported in and around Wellington.

More thunderstorms were forecast Wednesday afternoon.

2.20 on Friday
Rains fell four straight nights of last week—Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday—with the heaviest, officially 2.20 inches, coming to McLean on Friday.

The thunderstorms washed out the McLean 66 Rodeo all three of these nights, as far as the fans were concerned, but contestants still managed to get part of their competition out of the way Thursday and Friday.

A near-cloudburst hit south of town Thursday night, dumping 4.99 inches of rain on the Sitter Ranch, which had received one inch the night before.

Lake McCellan Rises
Heavy rains on the Lake McCellan watershed brought the water level up considerably at that popular recreation spot. But Warner Phillips, lake concessionaire, could not be reached Wednesday afternoon and it was not known how much the water had risen.

The rains washed out most of the newly planted cotton all across this area, and most farmers are preparing to re-seed, or have already re-seeded their fields.

As a result of the thunderstorms the past several days, McLean's rainfall total for the year shot up to 10.71 inches—5.99 coming in June.

By this same date in 1964, only 6.49 inches had been received. June last year saw 5.84 inches during the entire month.

Temperatures have been warm, with humidity high. Top thermometer reading for the week was 90, which was recorded on Monday and again on Wednesday.

The low was 53 degrees on Saturday and Sunday.

Rains Fail to Stop Celebration; Rodeo Completed on Sunday

Heavy rains soaked the city late last week, but failed to dampen enthusiasm for the annual McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Celebration.

Three of the four scheduled night rodeo performances were rained out, so far as most fans were concerned. Still, the host of cowboys managed to get part of the competition out of the way Thursday and Friday nights so that the rodeo could be completed Saturday night and Sunday afternoon.

Financially, the celebration also

was successful. Final receipts and expenses hadn't been tallied up Wednesday afternoon, but it appeared some profit would be shown for the Lions Club and Roping Club, which sponsor the festivities each year.

Johnny Haynes, president of the McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Association, expressed his thanks Wednesday to the many residents who helped to make the event a success.

He thanked all who participated, and offered special words of ap-

preciation to the chairmen of the various parts of the celebration:

Paris Hess, who was in charge of the barbecue; Flip Breedlove, who prepared the barbecue; Chuck Cooke, head of the barbecue wood detail; Sammy Haynes, publicity; Bob Sherrod, rodeo chairman; Harvey Taylor, rodeo secretary; Slack Boyd, parade marshal; Mrs. Chuck Cooke and Mrs. Evan Sitter, co-chairmen of the Old Settlers Reunion; Jim Hathaway, head of concessions; Jewel Meacham, rodeo gate chairman; J. T. Trew and R. T. Wood, who were in charge of the Derby Town Fiddlers Contest; the Junior Chamber of Commerce, for operating the west concession stand at the rodeo grounds; Ruby and Neville Back, who made arrangements for the Horse Show, and all who participated in the Merchants Calf Roping Contest.

Haynes said it was impossible to name everyone who helped to plan and stage the celebration, but he wanted them to know that without them the activities could not have been held.

More than 200 entries made this year's rodeo one of the biggest ever.

Ed Harland of Texhoma, bareback bronc riding; Jim Brock, Lubbock, saddle bronc riding; Sammy Whatley, Pampa, calf roping; Lee Sifford, Amarillo, heading and heeling; Bill McClanahan, Canadian, bull riding; Bill Stevens, Happy, bulldogging.

Debby Ferguson of Petersburg won the barrel racing saddle, given this year for the first time, for having the best two go-round average in this event.

The committee was appointed at the regular monthly meeting of the city commission.

Long Needed
Mayor Meador pointed out that the city has long needed such a publication, and the brochure will be printed as soon as the necessary information is prepared.

Gary Joe Graham Finishes TCU Ranch Training Program

Gary Joe Graham of McLean was among the 21 ranch training students at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth honored at a graduation dinner recently.

Graham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Graham, McLean.

The dinner, held in Brown-Upton Student Center, is the climax of a year of work which has included classroom instruction in addition to almost 8,000 miles of travel in visiting outstanding ranches in the Southwest.

This is the ninth class to finish the TCU program, which was begun in 1956.

Guest speaker for the dinner was Walter E. Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press, who is recognized for his leadership in agriculture through the Press Soil Conservation Awards program.

9-Month Course

The Ranch Training Program, presented in a nine-month unit, provides the opportunity to study all phases of ranch operation at first-hand. The course includes intensive classroom instruction in basic principles of land, grass, livestock, records and marketing, as well as field work to illustrate how these principles are applied in actual situations.

Enrollees may earn 32 hours of college credit and certificates at the completion of the course. Graham was graduated from McLean High School in the spring of 1964.

One of the bull's horns pierced Buchanan's right side, entering between two ribs, and punctured the lung before other cowboys could pull the rider to safety.

Buchanan was given emergency treatment at McLean Hospital and then was rushed to an Amarillo hospital for surgery.

He was reported to be recovering from his injuries Wednesday afternoon.

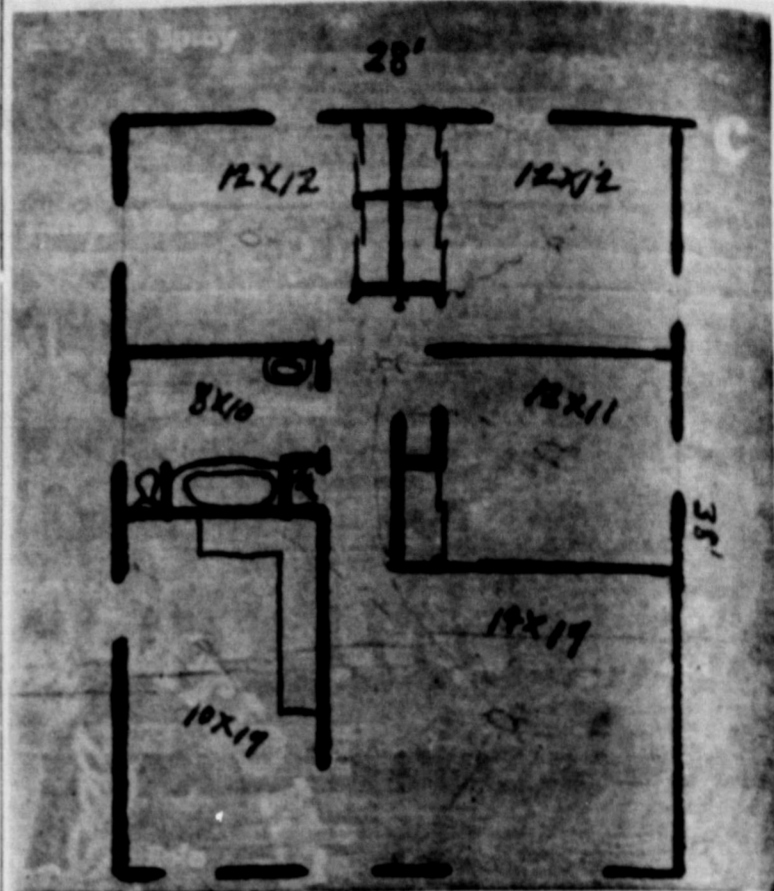

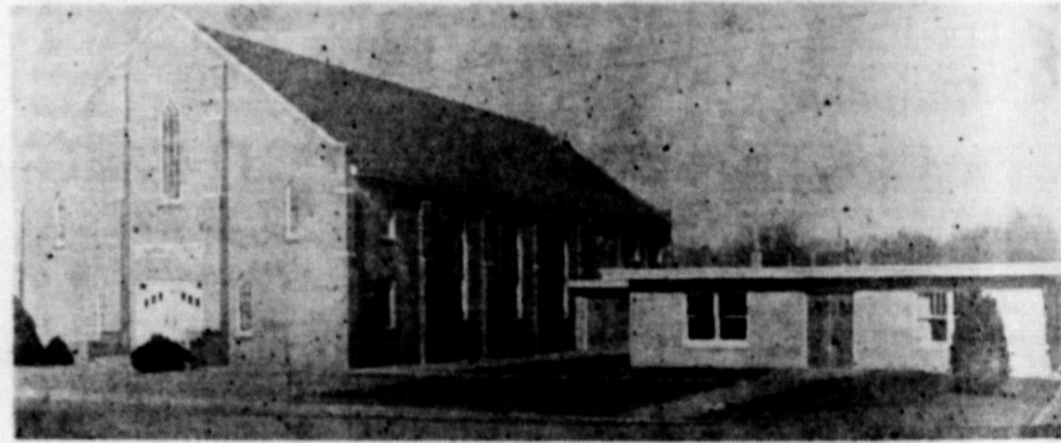

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Lawton Hoffer has completed several acres of land leveling on the place he operates north of Laketon.

A. C. Wilkerson is doing some land leveling on his farm east of Pampa. A dam site was located for Shelton Nash on the place he operates west of McLean.

Elmer Balch leveled five acres of land on the place he operates southeast of Pampa. Elmer has sprigged this five acres to bermuda grass. Elmer sprigged eight acres to bermudagrass in 1964.

Leroy Williams has completed a fence to protect a young grass planting. He has seeded 16 acres to switchgrass and 49 acres to weeping lovegrass. He fertilized this grass with 20 pounds of nitrogen and 20 pounds of phosphate per acre.

Brush spraying is in full swing by Mrs. James Noel, Harvey Hudgins, John B. Rice, Clifford Allison, Ercy Cubine, Dick Pugh, Cecil Seaney and several others.

Harry W. Youngblood has seeded 12 acres of sideoats grama on his irrigated place just north of Lefors.

The following amount of conservation practices was completed in the United States during the 1964 fiscal year: Terracing, 36,000 miles; diversion terraces, 3,108 miles; 66,242 ranch and ponds; range and pasture planting, 3,000,000 acres; 3,719 Great Plains Conservation Plans were approved on 5,453,644 acres, 248,000 acres of this land is being converted from cropland to grass.

We can see from the above figures that farmers and ranchers are doing a good job of conserving the soil; however, there is still much more to be done.

This year the Gray County Soil Conservation District had 5,000 acres of agricultural land damaged by wind erosion. Most of the damaging winds occurred during February.

There were approximately 1000 acres of wheat damaged. Due to adequate moisture after the "blow period" this wheat developed to where it will possibly make 10 to 15 bushels per acre.

Fine, medium and coarse textured soils need an average of 1,000 pounds of drilled crop residue and an average of 1,750 pounds of row crop residue for protection during critical wind and water erosion periods.

Johnny Johnson, Curtis Schaffer, Stan Friend and Elmer Balch do an excellent job of managing their crop residues. They use stubble-mulch type equipment to maintain the crop stubble on top of their lands.

One of the most commonly used types of equipment is sweeps. Bushland Experiment Station has proven with research that over a 10-year period stubble mulch farming will adequately protect the land from wind and water erosion and in most cases will increase yields.

Earl Tarbet has conserved most of the water from the recent rains with his new terrace system on his farm southwest of Kellerville. They conserved enough moisture from one rain last year to make a cotton crop. Earl said, "I have had very little runoff from the cropland since the terraces were installed."

The Agricultural Research Service conducted an experiment on rainfall runoff from small watersheds a few years ago. The results indicated that where watersheds had been seeded to permanent grass, runoff has been decreased 93 per cent. In only two years, runoff was reduced to .26 inch from 3.70 inches annually during the period 1941 to 1954. All of this land was in cultivation 50 to 60 years prior to grass establishment.

The annual 26 inch on these watersheds compared favorably with 22 inch from another watershed which had been in permanent grass since 1937. A similar watershed that had been in cultivation and was unprotected had a runoff of 5.43 inches.

This indicated that grass cover is the answer for conserving moisture on steep slopes and will provide adequate protection from wind and water erosion.

SCREW WORM PROGRAM

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation set a goal to raise \$300,000 in the screw worm program. It was recently announced that over \$600,000 was contributed in this drive by ranchers in the Southwest. Texas ranchers alone contributed \$365,000.

It is marvelous how people will respond when they believe in something. So often so many of the other drives meet no more than half the goals as established.

Much of the success of this program goes to the outstanding leadership that directed it from the state level.

Dolph Briscoe, former legislator, past president of S. W. Cattle Raisers Association and now president of SWAHRF, can take a large share of the credit. There are many other state leaders that can claim much credit to the success of this program.

Recently Sec. Orville Freeman and his counterpart from Mexico had a meeting in south Texas to discuss the possibility of pushing the barrier zone to the Isthmus of Mexico. The zone would be only 114 miles wide at this point, whereas there is a 1,400 mile barrier zone to maintain at its present location.

I am hoping this can be done. Wouldn't it be a shame to see the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation go dormant after screw worms are wiped out. Think of the many other similar tasks they could undertake. They have the complete confidence of every last rancher.

Why not a state-wide program to eradicate cattle grubs? A research program to cut down losses due to shipping fever?

I'm sure Mr. Dolph Briscoe Jr. would appreciate hearing from ranchers on the above subject. Write him at Mission, Texas.

THIS AND THAT
George Saunders says he has received over five inches of rain on the ranch in the last week. Some time ago I visited George's place and saw what I thought to be the best grass I've ever seen in that area. At the time I saw the grass we had not had rainfall as abundant as recently. Two aerial sprayings in successive years was chiefly responsible for the grass being so good. Shinnery oak had really been hit an effective lick.

To me this is the best way to increase carrying capacity of your range land. There is a lot of country in the southeast part of the county that should be sprayed.

Joe Taylor is out of rat poison. If someone is coming to our Pampa office soon, please stop by and take Joe a supply. Otherwise I will have him restocked by next Tuesday.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so that the membership of the Senate shall be increased from 31 to 39 members; and to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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UNDERSTANDING Differently
