## 12-Foot Rise in Water Level Ups Lake Business

Recent heavy rains have transformed Lake McClellan, 16 miles west of McLean, into what it was intended to be—a fun place for boating, fishing, swimming, water-skiing, swimming and picnicking enthusiasts.

And more than 60 boats and an untold number of skiers, swimmers and picnickers were having the time of their lives at the lake last Sunday.

Warner Phillips, the lake concessionaire, said that Sunday was by far the biggest day of the year for McClellan.

What brought the hundreds of persons out was the 12-foot rise in the water level from rains through last week.

The level, standing just 5½ feet below the top of the spillway on the newly rebuilt dam, is higher now than it has been in the past three years.

The water was still somewhat discolored with silt Sunday afternoon, but this made no difference

to the visitors, and Phillips said the water should soon clear up as the silt sinks to the bottom.

Fishing was described as "good," and it will get much better within the next year or so.

All of the fish were destroyed intentionally last year to rid the lake of the ever-increasing population of carp and other rough fish. Last fall, however, thousands upon thousands of young channel catfish and bass were released in Lake McClellan.

Some of these have already grown to "keeper" size.

More than \$1 million has been spent on improvements at the lake in the past 4½ years, and Phillips reported that additional work is planned.

Three ramadas—attractively covered picnic tables and fireplaces on concrete slabs—have been completed on the west side of the lake near the concession building. Ten more of these are scheduled for construction on the south side

of the lake.

More restrooms also are planned.

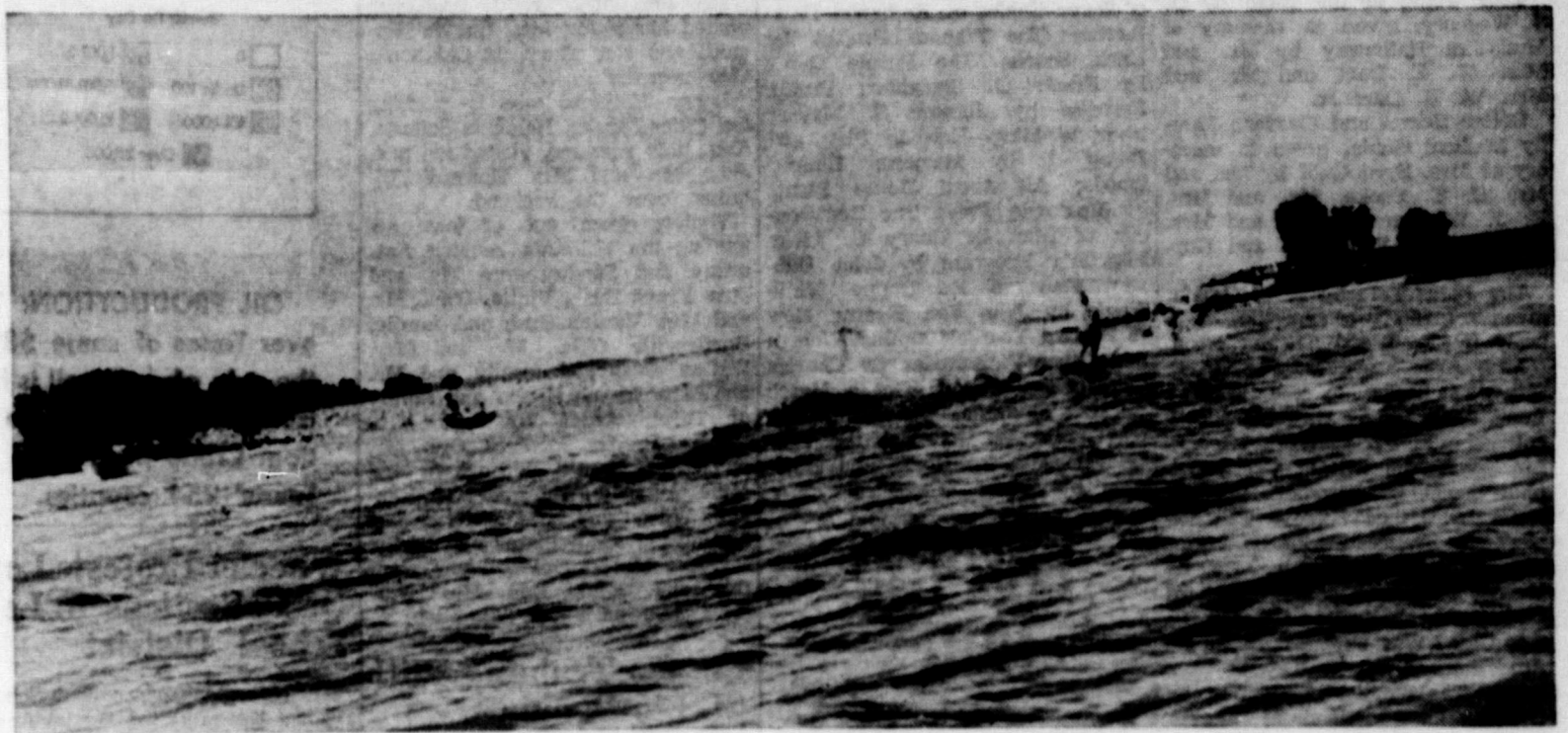
Phillips admitted business "hasn't been too good" the past couple of years, but he sees nothing but a "boom" in the future.

Asked if he thought Lake Merideth, near Borger, would draw many of Lake McClellan's regular "customers" away, Phillips said he doubted that the opening of the new reservoir would reduce the number of visitors at the local lake.

He pointed out that Lake McClellan is a beauty spot, as well as being a fine recreational area, and has trees almost completely surrounding it. In the hot summertime sportsmen like the comfort of the shaded areas when not out on the water.

While Lake Merideth is much larger, the trees there are few and far between—and this will be true for many years to come.

## But Advises Seeing U.S. First Lt. Pakan Finds Europe Interesting

First Lt. John S. Pakan, after 26 months of duty with the Army in West Germany, found Europe interesting, but suggests that Americans see the United States first before going abroad.

Pakan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Miro Pakan of McLean, recently returned from Germany and was separated from the Army in New York.

A 1957 graduate of McLean High School, Pakan received his bachelor's degree from West Texas State University in 1963 before entering the service.

He completed the Infantry Officers Orientation School at Fort Benning, Ga., in April, 1963, and was assigned to the Berlin Brigade's Third Battalion, Sixth United States Infantry.

This Army unit was reorganized in part in September, 1963, as the Fourth Battalion, 18th U.S. Infantry. During his first eight months in

## STORY HOUR TO BEGIN

The story hour and summer reading programs at Lovett Memorial Library will begin at 9:30 a.m. next Wednesday, according to Mrs. Lavern Carter, librarian.

## SS BENEFITS MOUNT IN GRAY

More than \$191,060 is being received monthly by Gray County residents for old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits, according to Hal Geldon, district manager of Social Security in Amarillo.

Geldon announced the figure in releasing his annual county benefit data report, which shows an increase of \$15,585 per month over the corresponding period last year.

As of Jan. 1, 1965, some 2,800 Gray Countyans were collecting about \$2,292,720 annually from Social Security—up \$187,000 over the same date in 1964.

Geldon said the increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of the county's aged population.

"This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter," he pointed out.

In the nation at large more than 19 persons were receiving such benefits as of January, 1965, at the rate of over \$1.3 billion per month. The average monthly old-age re-

## 19 Rural Accidents Are Investigated By Patrol During May

Nineteen rural traffic accidents were investigated in Gray County in May, according to Sgt. J. M. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor for this area.

One person was killed, nine injured and property damage was estimated at \$13,010.

Through the first five months of 1965, 76 rural mishaps had been investigated. These killed three persons, injured 50 others and caused property damage estimated at \$63,345.

Wilson announced that due to the manpower shortage in the uniform services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, applications for the position of patrolman are being accepted until July 6.

Examinations will be given throughout the state on July 14 and 15. The four month training school is scheduled to begin on Aug. 31 at the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

Young men between the ages of 21 and 35 who are interested in this type of work should contact the nearest Department of Public Safety patrolman or office for additional information.

## SINGER HIKES TO LAS VEGAS

Danny Marcus, Nashville, Tenn., recording artist, has an unusual method for promoting his latest release.

Marcus is walking from Nashville, home of the "Grand Ole Opry," to Las Vegas, Nev.—a distance of 1,900 miles.

He traveled through McLean, the halfway point between Nashville and Las Vegas, Monday afternoon, remaining here until a thunderstorm had left the area.

The singer left Nashville on May 16 and hopes to arrive in Las Vegas near the end of July. He is walking on U.S. 66 to Kingman, Ariz., and then will take the final 85 miles across the desert to Las Vegas.

His wife is driving along the same route with a camper.

Marcus, who has made one other record, is publicizing his "Again, Again and Again" recording. The song was written by Bill Anderson, a recording star in his own right.

Along the 1,900-mile route, Marcus is visiting all radio stations and most newspapers.

## Gray County Big Producer of Oil

Texas has produced more than 27 billion barrels of oil during the past 69 years of recorded production, resulting in a statewide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3 billion a year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Gray County, which has had recorded production since 1925, has had a total crude oil output of 480,300,000 barrels up to the beginning of 1964.

Gray County production in 1963 was 11,743,000 barrels at the rate of 32,200 barrels a day.

With 203 out of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil, each section is marked by several prolific fields.

"The widespread development of production in all sections of the state has been fostered by the state's oil and gas conservation laws," James L. Sewell, association president.

Conner was elected the outstanding senior by the A and M Collegiate FFA chapter.

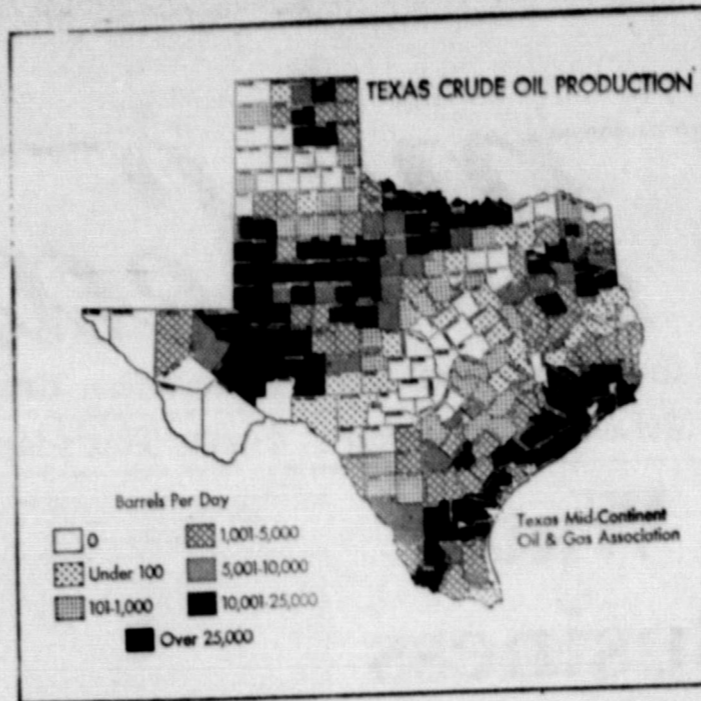
## Flowers-Dawson Vows To Be Said Friday

## Wheeler Protests Loss Of 16 Sections to Lela School District

The Wheeler Independent School District has protested the taking of 16 sections of land from that district for attachment to the Lela School District.

Attorneys for the Wheeler district filed an appeal recently with Commissioner of Education Dr. J. W. Edgar asking that the action of the Wheeler County school board be reversed.

The county board by a vote of three to two favored taking the land from the Wheeler district, after a petition had been filed requesting this action.

The disputed property is part of the old Kellerville School District. Property owners in the Kellerville district voted to consolidate with the Wheeler district last year.

Signing the petition presented to the Wheeler County school board were Mr. and Mrs. George Reneau, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Daughtry, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Phillips and Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Pickett.

A ruling on the appeal is expected within the next few weeks from the commissioner of education.

## 'New Grower' Wheat Allotment Requests Are Due by July 1

July 1 is the final date to request a "new grower" wheat allotment in Gray County, according to Miss Evelyn Mason, manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Pampa.

Miss Mason said the requests for this type of allotment should be made at her office, located in the courthouse annex east of Pampa.

Other "final dates" listed by Miss Mason include:

Aug. 2—To request measurement service on grain sorghum; Aug. 11—To report measured grain sorghum acres; Sept. 1—To dispose of excess grain sorghum and excess cotton acreage.

Wheat measurements were reported by all producers under the self-certification program and disposition of acreage also was reported, Miss Mason said.

Reporters are about to complete spot-checking on 25 per cent of the farms in the county.

The ASCS manager told producers that if their farm was one spot-checked they will receive a notice to measure acreage.

Producers will report measured grain sorghum acreage this year. This can be done when all the grain sorghum is planted on the farm.

Measurement service will be offered at the rate of \$7 per farm, plus \$2 for each additional plot, with \$5 for each terrace line to be plotted.

**PUBLICATIONS**

We have two publications that would be of keen interest to people who deal in livestock. We have re-ordered more of these publications than any others.

One is MP 741—Texas Livestock Auction Markets. This has a listing of all the livestock auctions in Texas and tells what day of the week these auctions are held.

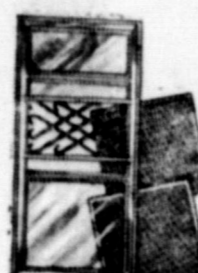

 Germany. Lt. Pakan was a platoon leader, with a brief period in the Berlin Honor Guard and Check Point Charlie.  
 He served six months as the executive officer for a small special detachment and later commanded the detachment for five months.  
 One function of the detachment was to develop special expert weapon marksmen and fire competitively with other special detachments and with the best marksmen from France and Britain.  
 Pakan's U.S. team won all events, both individual and team, to make the United States first in the Allied Weapons Competition.  
 He made many tours into East Berlin (the Russian sector) with the liaison mission program, and was able to photograph some of that area. He also entered the Russian held East Berlin as the responsible officer with Special Services Orientation Tours for uniformed military personnel.  
 While assigned in Europe, Lt. Pakan and his wife, Karen, toured Italy, Spain, Austria, France, Holland, Switzerland, England, Luxembourg, Belgium, Monaco and Germany, both the West and the Autobahn portion of East Germany.  
 An avid amateur photographer, Pakan made many photographs, mostly on slides, during the travels.  
 "It certainly was good to see these states, and for the will-soon-be tourist, I suggest traveling in the states before seeing Europe," Pakan said. "The World's Fair is worth seeing, and not as expensive as most folks think."  
 Pakan said he and his wife "enjoyed the continent very much, learned a great deal about their living habits and would like to see it again someday—especially Rome, Italy."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.**  
**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44** proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:  
 "Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."  
 "Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."  
 "Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."  
 "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:  
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."  
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
