Roller Kills Amarillo Woman

An Amarillo woman died early Saturday from injuries suffered in a one-car accident near McLean.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Cherry Standiford, 32, of 222 S. Manhattan, died at 2:30 a.m. Saturday at Northwest Texas Hospital where she was brought following the accident which occurred about 12:15 a.m. 5.6 miles south of McLean on Texas 273. Department of Public Safety trooper, James Estes, said the late model pickup truck driven by Mrs. Standiford apparently went out of control, ran off the road and overturned about three times. She was pinned in the vehicle, said Estes.

Mrs. Standiford had lived in Amarillo since 1956. She was born in Pearless. She worked as a nurse's aide at Olsen Manor Nursing Home here and was a Baptist. Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in Blackburn - Shaw Memorial Chapel. Officiating was Rev. R.C. Pollan, pastor of the Central Baptist Church in Saginaw. Burial was in the Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon.

Survivors include three sons of Amarillo, John T., Jr., Kenneth R., and Ricky; one brother, Travis Cherry of Saginaw, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Cherry of 2707 S. Buchanan.

All registered Voters get New certificates

Gray County Tax Assessor, Jack Back, said that his office will mail new Voter Certificates to all persons who were registered as of January 31. This certificate will be good for the voting years 1976-78.

Included with the new certificates will be a request for information to update the current rolls, in compliance with Texas' new voter-registration law.

"No one will be removed or purged from the voter registration rolls for failure to return the information form," he said, "but I strongly urge you to assist our office by returning the request with all information blanks filled out."

After March 1, only the new blue voter certificates will be valid for voting in Texas. These certificates will be mailed to registered after February 1.

Back also urged all persons not currently registered to vote, or those who have moved since they last voted to re-register.

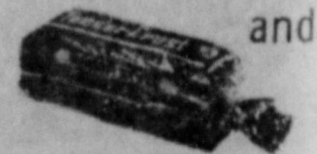

According to Gen. 7:16 after Noah entered the ark in obedience to God's will, the Lord "... shut him in." Yes, God closed the door of the ark with Noah and his family safe inside. The door of Noah's ark was closed to a generation which had every opportunity to turn to God but refused to do so. Everyone on the wrong side of the door, when it was closed, perished! These were rebellious to God and were shut out because of their impenitence.

In the case of the five foolish virgins, it appears theirs was a case of indifference and procrastination rather than outright rebellion. They apparently had very good intentions, but the result was the same! SHUT OUT!

Both categories of people are seen in great numbers today. The Bible plainly teaches that they will be shut outside the door of eternal salvation. What a tragedy that so many choose to live their lives apart from God.

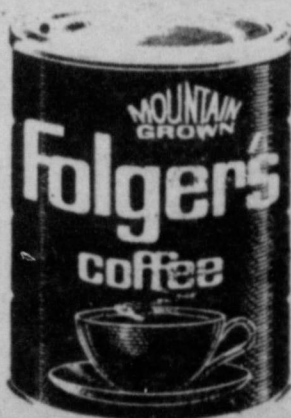

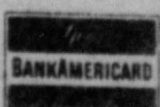

M. H. S. Elects Favorites

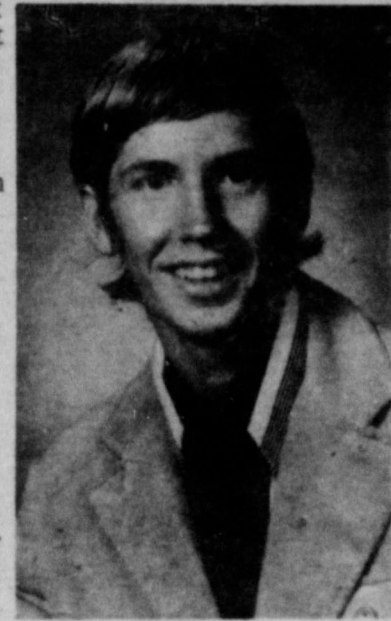
Tuesday, Jan. 27, the student body of MHS had election day. The votes were all secret ballot.

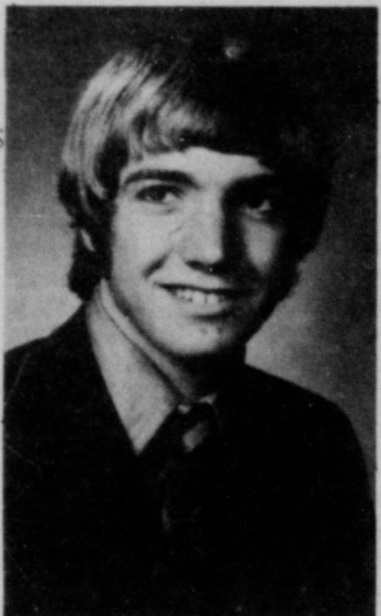




