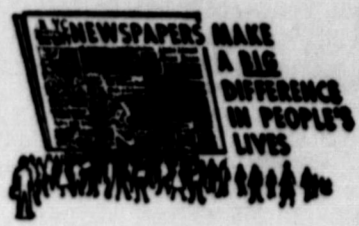

A. J. Carrubi, Jr. Announces For Gray County Judge

A. J. Carrubi Jr., Pampa attorney, has announced that he will be a candidate for County Judge of Gray County in the next Democratic primary. Carrubi in his announcement issued the following statement:

"With a pledge of dedication, I offer to the citizens of Gray County my services as their County Judge—with a strong desire to serve all the people of this county by promoting sound and stable growth under a county administration dedicated to efficient services based on a sound fiscal policy. I believe that I am qualified by my educational background, varied experiences and legal training to effectively fulfill the responsibilities of County Judge of Gray County."

Carrubi was born on Jan. 1, 1932, in Galveston, Texas, where he attended Kirwin High School. He graduated from high school in 1948, and entered the University of Notre Dame, where he received a Bachelor of Philosophy degree in accounting in 1952. He then spent two years in the U. S. Army before enrolling in the Law School at the University of Texas, from which he received his LL.B. in February, 1958. Carrubi and his wife, Joann, moved to Pampa immediately following his graduation from Law School, and after two years with another firm, he set up his own practice in 1960, and is now senior partner in the firm of Carrubi & Warner, Attorneys.

Since moving to Pampa in 1958, he has been a member of the Rotary Club for three years; has served two years as chairman of the Gray County Chapter of the American Red Cross and finance chairman two years; vice president of the Panhandle Chapter of the Muscular Dystrophy Association for two years; a director of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce for one year; two years as financial secretary of the Knights of Columbus in Pampa; two years as a board member of the Quivira Girl Scout Council; a member of the E.R.S. Club; member of the Pampa Industrial Foundation; vice president of the Gray County Bar Association for one year; member of St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church; charter president of the Democratic Club of Gray County; a member of the State Bar of Texas; a member of the Pampa Junior Chamber of Commerce, and is presently serving as state president of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce with his term expiring in April of 1966.

Carrubi was recently selected as West Texan of the Month for the month of December, 1965, by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and last year received the Distinguished Service Award as Pampa's outstanding young citizen from the Pampa Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Carrubi and his wife, Joann, live in Pampa, and have five children ranging in ages from three months to seven years of age.

Tax on Phone Bills To Be Reduced

All telephone bills will be reduced effective Jan. 1, 1966, George Newberry, manager Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., this week reminded telephone customers.

The federal excise tax on local telephone service and long distance calls will be lowered from the present 10 per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation signed into law last summer.

On each succeeding Jan. 1 an additional 1 per cent cut will occur so that by 1969 the entire 10 per cent federal excise tax on telephone service will be ended.

Farmers Asked to Send in Social Security Numbers

Farmers who are receiving payments in connection with participation in farm-action programs are being asked to let the ASCS county office know what their social security numbers are, according to Evelyn Mason, county office manager.

A form requesting this information—"Request for Identifying Number—Farmer"—together with a postage-paid envelope, will be mailed to each known producer who receives program payments, to be filled in and returned to the ASCS county office as soon as convenient.

The identifying social security number will be entered on payment-drafts to producers, and they will also be used by the Department of Agriculture in reporting such payments to the Internal Revenue Service. Such identifying numbers now appear on all reports of income payments—such as bank interest, dividends, etc.—made by the paying companies or agencies. This is required under the Internal Revenue Code.

Any questions about this matter should be taken up with the ASCS county committee.

ROCK ISLAND RR REALIGN DIVISIONS

A system-wide realignment of the Rock Island Railroad's operating divisions, effective Jan. 1, was announced today by G. W. Kelly, senior vice president-operations, in Chicago.

The change was made to provide more efficient and dependable transportation for the nation's shippers by applying advanced technology to present day train operations, Kelly said.

In the revamped profile of the railroad, the number of divisions will be reduced from six to five and will be designated as follows: The Illinois Division, Central Division, Des Moines Division, Missouri-Kansas Division and the Southern Division. Headquarters cities for the divisions will be: Chicago, Des Moines (headquarters for both the Des Moines and Central Divisions), Kansas City and El Reno, Okla. The present Rock Island division will be a part of the newly created Central and Illinois divisions; the Arkansas Division will be merged with the Southern Division, and the present Chicago Division will be absorbed into the Illinois division.

The Southern division, which now includes the former Arkansas division, has 1,980 miles of railroad, extending from Caldwell, Kan., on the north to Dallas on the south; and from Memphis on the east to Sayre, Okla., on the west.

Peace Corps Test On January 8

McLean area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 8, at the Pampa Post Office.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied French or Spanish requires another hour.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Progress on the McClellan Creek Watershed is moving ahead at a steady pace. A trust fund agreement has been entered into by the Soil Conservation Service and the sponsors of the McClellan Creek Watershed to finance the planning party for the watershed. The planning party plans to be in McLean the second week in January. They will be developing engineering plans for the watershed.

Conservation Applied

Lloyd Barrett has completed the dirt work on a waterway on his farm west of Pampa. He plans to establish the waterway to permanent grass. After the grass is established he plans to construct terraces to empty into the waterway.

John Haynes has completed 13 ponds on the Morse Ranch near McLean. These ponds will aid in better distribution of grazing. Charles Grigsby has laid an underground plastic water line and constructed a storage facility on his farm north of McLean. This pipeline will furnish water to four pastures and will eliminate construction of new wells or fence lands. The pipeline cost much less than another well.

Parallel Terraces

Parallel terraces provided fewer point rows than conventional terraces. This contributed to the fact that over 5 million feet of parallel terraces were built in Texas this year. These parallel terraces are suited to the farms in the Gray County SCD. Parallel terraces are designed so that each terrace will be the same distance apart. These terraces are usually laid out in a series of three or more terraces with a minimum number of point rows. The distances between the terraces are planned and staked to fit the modern four and six row farming equipment.

Parallel terraces can be constructed on most farms, and can be constructed a system of parallel terraces. A certain amount of cutting and filling will be needed along the terrace line to keep it level or to obtain a desired grade. The cost of constructing parallel terraces generally will not exceed 10 cents per foot; however, the Great Plains Conservation Program provides cost-share assistance to producers on installing parallel terraces as it does on many other practices. Parallel terraces permit easy farming of the land as before it was terraced and at the same time controls erosion and conserves rainfall.

A sprinkler irrigation system will fit well with a parallel terrace system as the laterals can be run with the terraces and not by crossing them as they would in a conventional type of terraces. Advance planning is needed to install the best possible parallel terrace system. Any farmer interested in building parallel terraces should contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service for more information on parallel terraces.

Start to Gather Tax Records Now

With the filing season beginning Jan. 1, now is the time to gather financial records to help you prepare your 1965 federal income tax return.

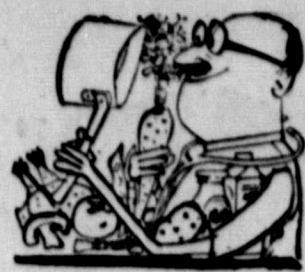

EATING IN RESTAURANTS

"I never know what I want in a restaurant!"
"I always get too much or too little in a cafeteria."
"There isn't enough choice on the menu."
"Everybody else eats a meal while I play with a salad."
"Restaurant meals are all the same!"

Is that the way you feel about eating in a restaurant? I don't mean going out to a good restaurant for a nice dinner with friends or family. That's a party! I mean trying to eat all or most of your meals in a restaurant because you have no time to cook at home, or have no home to cook in!

Nutrition At A Price

How can you be sure of getting a nutritious diet at a price you can afford to pay? It may take a little doing, but it can be done.

To begin with, learn to distinguish between good restaurants and poor ones. The good ones are clean, attractive, with varied menus and friendly service. It's a pleasure to eat there, especially as you become acquainted with the personnel. If you can find a pleasant person, or a number of persons, to eat with you some time, it helps to break the monotony, and tends

toward better and more leisurely eating.

Same principles apply

The main difference between home and restaurant eating is that when you eat out you select your food ready cooked instead of in the raw at the supermarket. The same principles apply. You can, and should, get your quota of each of the four food groups, just as you do at home — meats, fish and poultry or cheese, or eggs; the dairy group of milk and its products; the vegetable and fruit groups; and the enriched-flour-cereal-and bakery-goods group.

More Variety Than Home

The restaurant gives you a wider variety than you can have at home, and also allows every member of the party to have his own preferred foods, which he can't do at home. And there are no dishes to wash.

If you eat regularly in restaurants, try different ones from time to time, since restaurant chefs are just like home cooks — they tend to cook along the same lines more or less.

If you're a homemaker, cooking three meals a day, you should welcome the invitation when somebody says, "Let's eat out."

Telephone excise tax reduction goes into effect January 1 for Texas customers

Effective January 1, 1966, the Federal Excise Tax on telephone service will be reduced from 10 to 3 per cent. Following the initial drop, the tax will be lowered 1 per cent each year until it is eliminated in 1969:

Telephone users will receive the full cash benefit from this tax reduction. The tax, which is levied directly on those who use telephone service, has been included on monthly telephone bills, and each month your tax payment has been sent on to the federal government. In effect, the telephone company has been a collection agency.

When the excise tax is eliminated in 1969, telephone users in Texas will save more than \$50 million annually. This will mean more than \$4 million a month added to Texans' spendable income:

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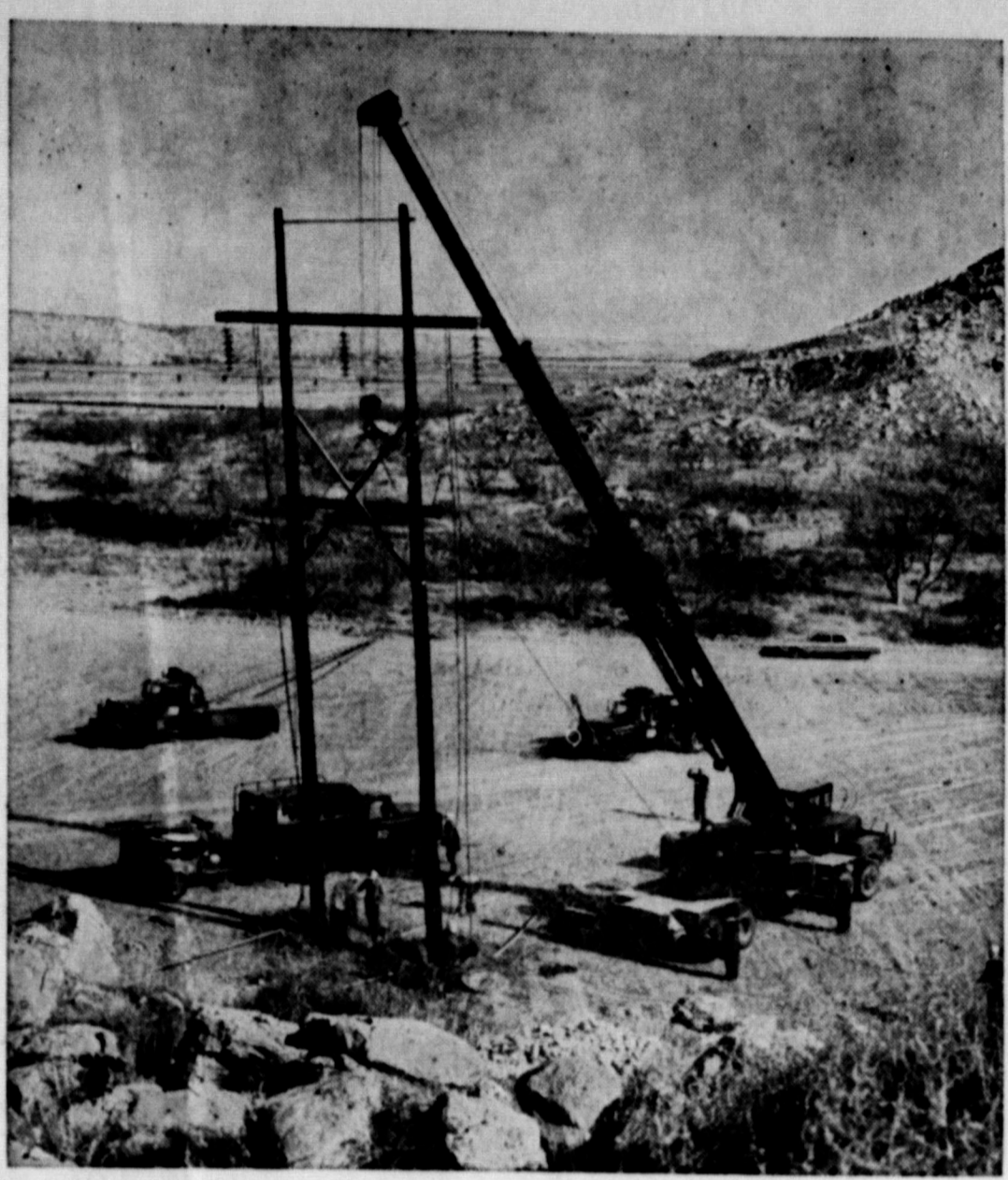

An 80 foot electric transmission line structure can be lifted and set in place in 8½ minutes with Southwestern Public Service Company's new hydraulic crane. The unit, the second one to go into service in the nation, was specifically designed for use in the electric utility industry. Southwestern Public Service Co. has announced a 1966 construction program calling for the investment of \$19,353,000 in new facilities, with a large portion of the additional investment to be in transmission lines.

**Construction, Improvements
On Calendar For 1966**

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strengthen and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designed for the construction and improvement of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X in Lamb County and Cunningham station, west of Hobbs, N. M., are the three generating stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than we are able now to transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone,' or main, line is an addition to existing facilities, and

means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the new generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols station, northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will increase the capability of the plant to 435,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

"The continued installation of major electric generating units is, of course, the best kind of evidence of our confidence in the future of our service area. There are many opportunities to attract small industries to this region, and a number of communities are actively engaged in well-planned industrial development programs. The advantages of this area are obvious, with our excellent climate, the optimism of our people, and good local governments. All of these will lead to new progress for the region," Watson said.

Electric power's role in meeting the municipal water needs of the region are a part of the 1966 program. A 115,000 volt transmission line will be completed during the year to provide the power to pump the water from Lake Meredith to

a storage reservoir near Amarillo. The Lake Meredith water is scheduled to be distributed to the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, beginning in late 1967.

"1965 was another year in which the average cost of our service to all our customers was lower than the previous year. As a matter of fact, it was the 13th consecutive year for a decline in the average cost of electricity used in our customers' homes. Our customers have helped make this possible by using more of our service. This enables us to install new and more efficient equipment, the type that will go into service as a result of this 19-million dollar improvement program in 1966. Reddy Kilowatt is still the servant who charges less for each hour the more hours you work him," Watson concluded.

TO MEET CRIME'S CHALLENGE

Viewers-with-alarm have always found much to criticize in our system of criminal justice. How outrageous it is when criminals escape the punishment they deserve! How monstrous it is when an innocent man is convicted by mistake!

But such criticism often skips blithely over the toughest question of all: which man is guilty, which innocent? Everyone wants to be hard on the guilty and easy on the innocent. But, of necessity, we must start the law's wheels turning before we really know which one we are dealing with.

Should we strictly limit the right of policemen to search a private home? Should we keep questionable evidence out of the courtroom? Such rules will protect many an honest citizen from unjust harassment. Yet, the very same rules will also protect many a hardened criminal from being caught.

This basic dilemma, of having to deal with persons whose guilt or innocence is not yet settled, has always bedeviled the administration of criminal justice.

And in recent years, two major developments have added fresh stress and strain to the whole problem.

1. Important methods of law enforcement, long used in many sections of the country, have been held unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court. Landmark decisions have left confusion and disarray in their wake.

2. Crime—brutal, sinister, sophisticated—has reached a record high.

Thus it has become urgent public

business to both clarify and modernize our entire apparatus of criminal justice. To that end, a massive, unprecedented project is now under way.

Eighty of the nation's most eminent experts, assembled by the American Bar Association, are drawing up detailed guidelines—a set of national minimum standards—for lawyers and judges, prosecutors and police.

These guidelines, to cover everything from original arrest to final plea, should provide us with a system of criminal procedure that is both fair and effective. Such a system is, in itself, one of the mightiest weapons in the war on crime.

It is of course fitting that we should view with alarm any codding of criminals or oppression of innocents. But with alarm only, not with despair. Solid progress is afoot.

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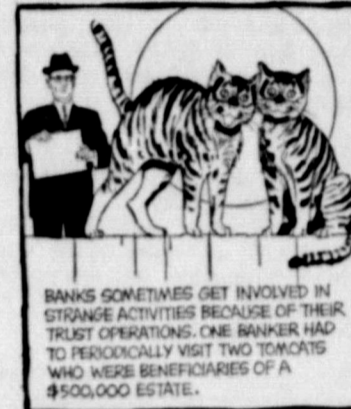

These are rights written into the Constitution and affirmed by the Supreme Court in 1829 when Mr. Justice Bagley wrote: "It is one of the essential qualities of a court of justice that its proceedings should be public."

If people are to know the truth the newspaper must report the news.
