Board Sets Policy For Outside Use Of School Policy

The McLean I.S.D. Board of Education encourages the public to use school facilities as long as their use of the school facilities does not interfere with the efficient operation of the school. In order to insure that the school facilities are taken care of by "outside-school groups" and to protect the tax payers money, the board of education did, on August 14, 1972, adopt the following policy on the public's use of the school facilities: "No charge will be made for the use of gyms for community-related groups or organizations, but there must be a school official in charge of the group. The facility may be used during the school year with no conflict with the school program. The group will be responsible for payment to the employee-supervisor." The following rules and procedure shall be followed: Application for the use of a school facility shall be made through the school administrative office and shall be in writing. Two copies of the application will be made. No rental fee will be charged for local groups or organizations to use the gym, unless spectators are allowed to attend the activity. A full-time school employee or official must be named by the group and this employee shall have the following duties: unlock the door, turn on the lights, clean the area used, turn off lights, lock and secure all doors. This employee shall clean the locker room, steps, and gym. Failure of the employee to satisfactorily clean the facility used will require an assignment of a regular janitor to perform this duty at time and one-half of the employee's regular pay. The organization will be billed for this cost. The group using the school facility shall assume the total cost of repair or replacement resulting from any damage incurred during the use. The cafeteria kitchen will not be open to any organization unless arrangements have been made with the cafeteria manager and an agreement as to payment for time required by the cafeteria personnel during such use. The cafeteria kitchen will not be used without cafeteria personnel supervision.

66% Savings Bond Goal Reached

Mr. George B. Cree, Chairman of the Gray County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County totaled \$42,289 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$276,766 for 66% of the 1972 goal of \$420,000. July sales in Texas were \$16,989,269 compared to \$16,810,210 during the same period last year. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$125,013,794, while 1971 sales totaled \$118,726,731 - a 5.2% increase.

Nationwide sales during July totaled \$492 million. For the January-July period sales were \$3.7 billion - 15% above sales last year. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$27 million were reported for July, 13% above the \$24 million exchange last year.

Public hearing to consider a resolution recognizing the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation as the Community Action Agency which will serve this county.

Consider borrowing \$75,000.00 from the county depository, as recommended by the County Auditor, to pay salaries and bills in September and October.

Announce date for Board of Equalization Hearing for Tuesday, September 12, 1972, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Consider transfer of funds as may be recommended by the County Auditor.

Consider authorizing employment of counsel for Red Deer Creek Watershed easements and Perry Lefors Airport aviation easements.

Approve Welfare Easements. Discuss the county jail.

Sheriff R. H. Jordan. Pay salaries and bills as approved by the County Auditor.

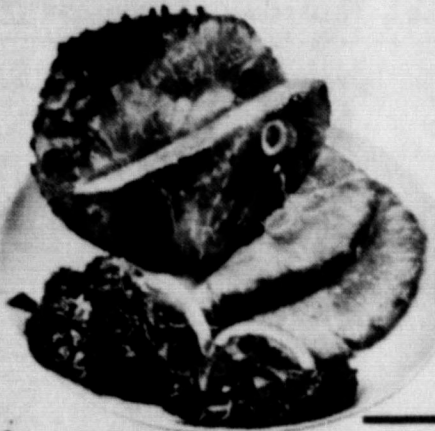

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Gov. Preston Smith is convincing high state officials and legislators he is serious about calling a special legislative session on insurance reform after mid-September.

Smith himself revived speculation at a news conference last week when he said odds favor such a session sometime before the general election November 7.

The Governor told newsmen legislative leaders had indicated they will cooperate with him. He included Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes among the latter.

"I believe he is giving real serious consideration to calling a session," said Barnes. "He really wants to have one."

Smith made clear there is nothing definite yet about his plans, and he would still want to make sure a session would be productive before he summons lawmakers.

Establishment of a competitive insurance rates system for all lines of insurance would be his top objective, Smith said.

He added he "probably" would seek Insurance Board reorganization but added:

"If we established competitive rates, I don't know how much further you would need the Board."

Smith earlier said an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin that the Governor cannot order funds transferred from one agency to another to meet emergencies may also bring on a special session.

Smith said recent opinions would place "drastic limitations" on the governor's powers and "threaten virtually every authority of the chief executive."

VET BONDS SOLD
The last \$3017 million in state veterans land board bonds were sold in Austin last week.

If the program is to continue without interruption, Land Commissioner Bob

Armstrong said, a new bond authorization will have to be submitted to votes by the legislature. Four authorizations have been approved in the form of constitutional amendments during the land program's 23-year history.

Low bid of 3,6902 per cent interest was submitted by the First National Bank of Dallas and Harris Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago and Associates.

Armstrong said he has support of House Speaker-elect Price Daniel Jr. and other lawmakers in submitting a new constitutional amendment to keep the program alive after the \$30.7 million is spent. He recalled the program has been self supporting, has required no taxes and has benefitted 48,000 veterans. The Commissioner indicated an additional \$50 million to \$100 million in bonds will be sought.

AG OPINIONS

Attorney General Martin, in a new opinion, struck again at the governor's powers over state fiscal matters. He invalidated more than 40 appropriations riders requiring approval by the chief executive (or other officials) on expenditures of funds.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A law which abolished the offices of county school superintendent, ex officio county superintendent and the county school board in Caldwell County is unconstitutional.

A corporation which purchases the stock of a bankrupt motor carrier may not be eligible for legal transfer of the bankrupt firm's specialized motor carrier certificate from the Railroad Commission.

Deduction of the value of a life estate is not authorized in computing inheritance taxes when the life tenant dies within five years after receiving it.

Piercing of ears for ear-

rings does not constitute practice of medicine and requires no medical license.

The Board of Nursing Home Administrators must deposit the initial license fee, which may not exceed \$100 for the

biennium, and the renewal license fee into the State Treasury beginning June 15.

Elected, state-salaried officials such as judges may also hold nonsalaried jobs as regents of state colleges

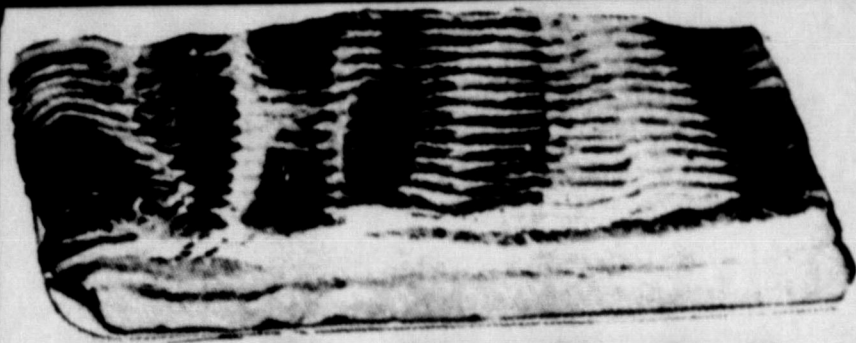

A statewide steering committee is expected to be named soon. "LOST" CLAIMANTS Sought

One hundred and 37 "lost" claimants who have \$49,500 coming to them from an antitrust suit settlement are being sought by the attorney general's office. If they can be located,

they will get money recovered by the attorney general from five major drug manufacturers in a suit involving overcharges for the antibiotic drug tetracycline. Those who filed claims but have not received copies of the final judgment in the price-fixing suit should call the attorney general's office in Austin.

STATE PAY RAISE GRANTED
A 6.8 per cent pay raise for about 67,000 state employees effective September 1 has approval of the Federal Pay Board.

The pay boost was authorized under a special "catch-up" provision of regulations permitting increases for employee groups where the average raises over the last three years was less than seven per cent. Pay Board approval is necessary where raises are higher than five per cent limit established as a guideline to check inflation.

State employees received pay increases of 6.8 per cent in 1969, 3.4 per cent in 1970 and 6.8 per cent in 1971. **ACT TO BRING STATE \$60 MILLION**

Texas would get about \$60 million in new federal money under the Rural Development Act of 1972.

The legislation authorizes more than \$980 million nationwide for physical and economic development of rural America. The program seeks to bring people and business to underpopulated areas and thus ease the congestion in urban centers.

National Guardsmen again aided Highway Patrolment with traffic problems over Labor Day weekend, emphasizing control of the drinking driver.

Gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe is pushing for total overhaul of the state budgeting system and creation of a Budget Commission.

Tagging The Deer Is Required Step

Tagging the deer in normally the last legal step, but one more simple procedure is required this season of hunters who send parts of their venison in different directions.

Recent action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission requires that any portion of the kill given to a fellow hunter must have a note signed by the hunter making the kill with his name, address, hunting license number and the date and location of the kill.

The note, or the regular tag if the hunter making the bag keeps all of the carcass, must accompany the meat until it reaches its final destination.

Parks and Wildlife law enforcement officials interpret "final destination" as the permanent residence of the hunter of a commercial processing plant.

This helps game management officers do a better job by insuring that deer are harvested legally and identified as such.

Let's use an example of a hunter who kills a deer and wants to share the meat. He gives a ham to one hunting partner and the backstrap to another.

A note must accompany each cut, and, of course, the usual deer tag is required on the portion retained by the hunter.

INSTRUCTIONS YOU MUST HAVE FOR YOUR HUNTING TRIP:

1. First you need a fast car—so you can beat the other hunters to the best spots. That will give you a chance of being killed before you get out in the woods. And save some other hunter some ammo and the mess of shooting you.
2. One or two cases of whiskey, four cases of beer, and lots of ammo. Food, tents and sleeping bags take up a lot of space, so get another case of whiskey, instead.
3. Be sure to shoot at anything that moves. If it's not a deer, there's always a chance it might be your mother-in-law.
4. Now, when you bag a deer, be sure and shoot all the shells you have left into it. This will be sure to splinter all the bones and bust all the entrails.
5. Don't bother to wash or wipe it out as the blood and manure will improve the flavor. Besides, the locker plant operator will be disappointed if you bring in a clean one.
6. If you decide to skin it, be sure to roll it around in the dirt, leaves, and

pine needles. Then wrap it in newspapers as they will stick well, and printers ink has the delicate flavor of burnt rubber.

7. Now bring it out to the car, throw it over the hood as close to the radiator as possible, so it will get ALL the heat and dust, and so people will be sure to see that you got one!

8. On the way home, stop at a tavern, so you can tell the other liars how you killed it. And be sure to stretch your kill into at least a mile.

9. Be sure to stay at the tavern until you are sure the locker plant you want to hang your deer in has been closed for the night and the operator is sound asleep. Call him now and tell him to get right down, as you must get your deer into the cooler before it spoils.

10. He will no doubt have a couple hundred hanging around. So make sure he cuts yours first—and makes it all into choice steaks and chops.

ASCS News By Evelyn Mason

1973 WHEAT PROGRAM
Wheat allotment notices and information on the 1973 wheat program have been mailed to producers. The 1973 wheat allotment is slightly over 4% less than the 1972 wheat allotment. Minimum set-aside under the 1973 wheat program will be 86% of the wheat allotment. There will be no limit on wheat acres for harvest under the minimum set-aside as in the last few years. Also in 1973, an additional 150% of the allotment can be set aside. (It was 75% in 1972.) Under this provision, the farm would have a permitted acres of wheat for harvest. This would be the 1972 wheat acres plus the 1972 addition-

al set-aside minus the 1973 wheat additional set-aside acres. We can compute the acreage for you in the county office for your farm. **1973 SET-ASIDE ACRES**

We have been advised that the payment deduction for less-than-average quality set-aside land is being increased for the 1973 program. "For wheat and feed grain farms, when low quality acreage is offered for set-aside--this is acreage not representative of land on which the farm's crops are grown--the entire payment will be based on the productivity of the set-aside land. For cotton, the reduction will be computed in the same manner as in 1972, except that the deduction rate will be 13¢ instead of 9¢ per pound." It will be more important than ever to be sure to determine your set-aside acres now and be sure it is on land of equal productivity.

REAP PROGRAM

We still have some funds available for practices to be carried out this year for conservation measures. **CHANGES IN FARMS, ETC.** If there has been a change in the operator or ownership of a farm for 1973, we would like to have the correction now so the information on the 1973 program will go the right party. Also if land has been sold or purchased which makes a reconstitution of the records on the farm necessary, this is needed now so all the records can be properly constituted and ready for the 1973 program. **SPOUSES NAMES**

When an election is held,

we need to use the first name of the spouse of each farmer to send in a ballot. We have tried to keep a record of this in the office but there are some we do not have. We will appreciate your sending us the first name of your spouse or giving it to us when you are in the county office.

Shred Cotton Stalks To Stop Boll Weevils

Even though the cotton crop may be harvested in some areas of the state, the 1972 seasons is by no means over! There's still a big job ahead if farmers want to grow cotton again next year. And that job is destroying cotton stalks to reduce the food supply of overwintering boll weevils.

"Boll weevils were numerous in many areas of Texas this year," points out Dr. Raymond Frisbie, entomologist in pest management with the Texas Agricultural Extension service. "Therefore, it's critical that producers shred and destroy cotton stalks as soon as possible after harvesting so that fewer weevils will be able to feed and build up a fat supply necessary for successful overwintering or diapause."

The Texas A&M University specialist explains the diapause condition that boll weevils enter as sort of "hibernation" state in which they spend the winter.

"Successful diapause control programs should reduce the need for early to mid-season insect control next year," say the entomologist. "Such in-season insecticide applications often trigger bollworm and budworm outbreaks by destroying beneficial insects."

Frisbie encourages producers who are still awaiting harvest to include an insecticide in their defoliant or desiccant to reduce the number of weevils entering diapause. "Needless to say,

harvesting as soon as possible is another way to gain a step on these pests," he adds.

Once stalks are shredded, the debris should be plowed under to a depth of at least six inches.

"Destroying cotton stalks and plowing them under is a key means of cotton pest management," contends Frisbie. "As alternatives to insecticidal control become more prominent, various cultural practices such as this become more critical in reducing damaging insect populations."

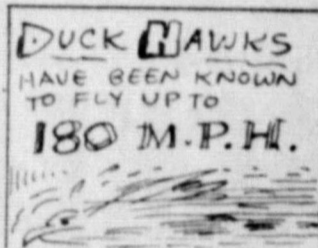
The entomologist emphasizes that "a good way to set your sights on a prosperous cotton crop in 1973 is to take the necessary steps now to reduce boll weevil numbers."

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It is unbelievable that the Communist Party would choose me an old country girl reared in the church as a member of their organization. But they must have wanted me, they invited me to meetings. I did not accept the invitation. Why did the communists want me to join with them--for one reason, and one reason only: I was a writer, therefore connected with magazines and radio. To Communism one writer is worth at least ten times as much as that person who has no such opportunities of contact. One article, strategically placed might be read by five thousand people, but the same information spoken by word of mouth might not reach more than fifty listeners.

Along about that time (about thirty years ago) the communists were doing their best to enlist Hollywood writers, actors, producers, etc. They were making a big production out of this effort. There was so much talk about communism in Hollywood that the FBI moved in and made investigation I was surprised that so many Hollywood artists had joined the party. When pressed for information on the subject, the artist--actor, writer producer, etc--often admitted he or she had joined the party, but added, "I never attended a single meeting." Let me remind you, that

if you work for them you don't have to attend meetings to be a help to them. As soon as you join the party-- you are hooked. The only real way to get out of that one is to go before the FBI and confess all who was in with you, who was the instructor, in other words, you have to "squeal" on others who worked with you. And comparatively only a few have that kind of courage and Americanism. (Whittaker Chambers was one such man.)

My best strike against communism came when I as free-lance Editor reader for a Chicago Publishing House, I was instrumental in bringing about the rejection of a procommunist Civil Government intended to be sold to the schools of our country. 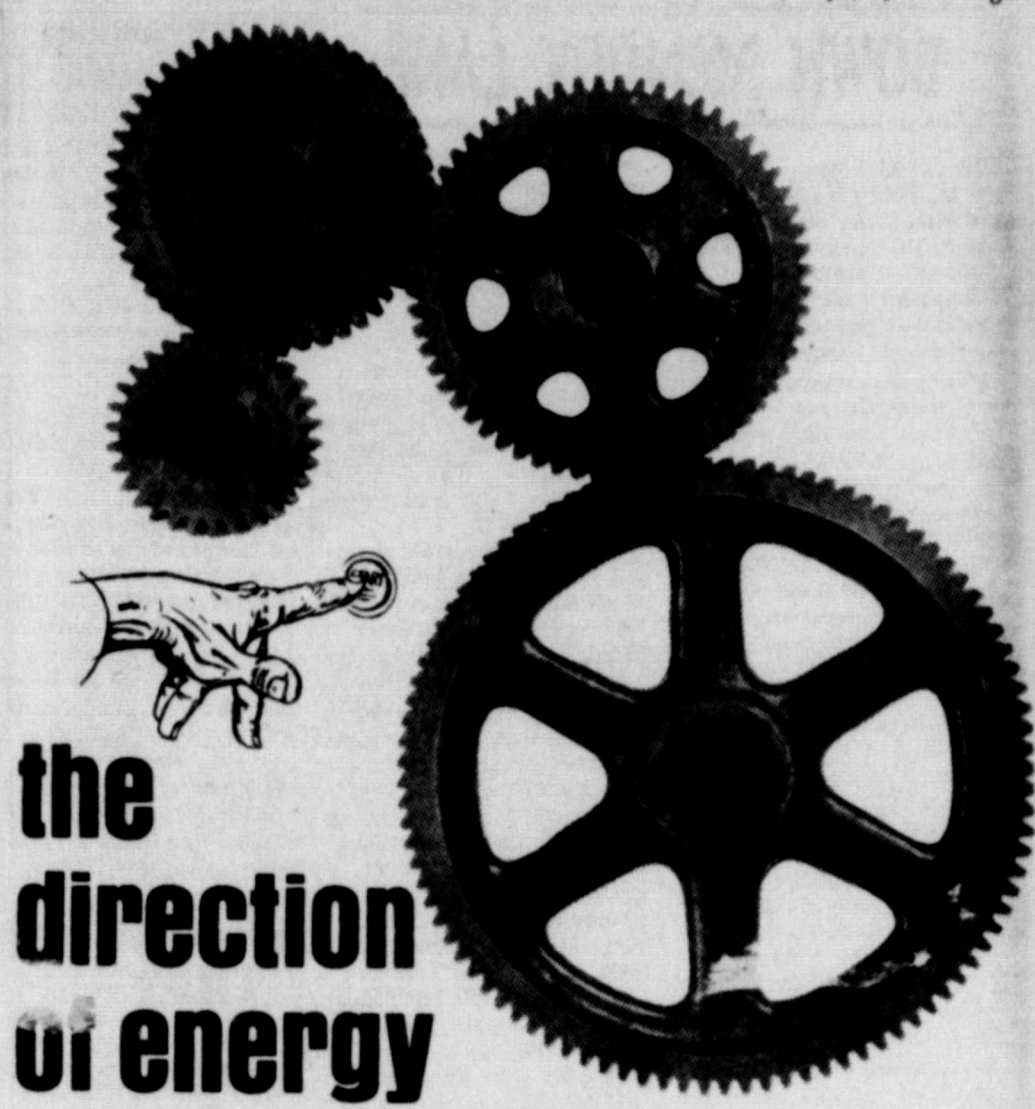

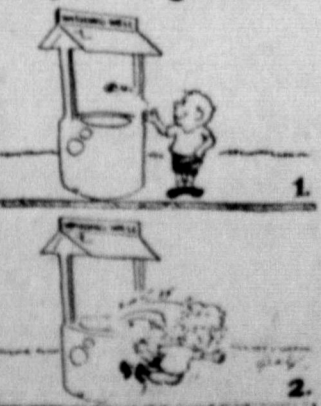

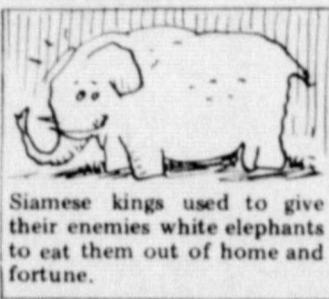
