Each day of noncompliance constitutes a separate offense.

The designated agency to handle this law would have no authority to come on your place and inspect to see that you were carrying out your approved plan. If they caught you with forty cows on one section of grass and your approved plan called for you to run only 30 then you could be imprisoned for up to one year plus a stiff fine.

The local governing soil and water conservation board must have a plan approved by the state. Now who do you think would dictate the guidelines on this one?

Should a local soil conservation not submit a plan to the state, then the state agency would write one for you.

Folks I'm for voluntary conservation through education, but I can't come close to buying compulsory conservation.

It will lead to farming by permit only. It will lead to making a crook out of every farmer and rancher in order for him to survive the maize of regulation.

It will take away every single management right and decision you can now make on your own.

Agriculture Shows Constant Change

Just as fashions change in clothing, Agriculture is also constantly changing. Manageability is more important to the tiller of the land today than ever before.

Research for developing new equipment, herbicides, and management techniques have brought about many changes in farming operations and more will undoubtedly be proven and adopted in the future.

With production costs increasing, cutting operation costs is a big factor, reports Rodney Hyatt, soil conservationist at Pampa.

Minimum or mulch tillage offers a method of cutting production costs. This simply means planting a crop in the residue of a preceding crop, stated Hyatt. This also gives excellent soil protection.

Benefits of reduced soil compaction, and labor expenses, and lowered production costs can be expected by lessening the number of trips over the land. Bonus benefits of conserving moisture and reducing erosion can increase yields.

Cultivation buries residues and causes a moisture loss, states Hyatt. Therefore relying on chemicals for weed control is encouraged, although some mechanical cultivation may be needed.

Year to year clean tillage offers poor moisture efficiency compared to mulch or minimum-tillage. Farming in surface residue improves moisture penetration from rainfall and irrigation by increasing the soil porosity. Also evaporation is reduced because residue keeps the soil at a cooler temperature.

In a nutshell, minimum-tillage points toward increased income through soil protection, and moisture conservation. For further information contact the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District.

WHEAT PASTURES

Wheat drills are running full blast on the High Plains. We also saw several running in the McLean vicinity. A good rain within the next two weeks will set us up for a good wheat pasture situation. However, this is always a guess up until and if you get that good ground soaking rain about two weeks after the wheat is up.

Stocker calves, already too high in relation to fats would take another price jump if the wheat pasture situation does materialize.

COMPULSORY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION
We have had a tremendous response from our comments in both The Pampa and McLean News with reference to the proposed law to make soil and water conservation compulsory.

In the past I have been one of the strongest advocates of a Soil and Water Conservation plan through the Great Plains Conservation program. This is on a voluntary basis, but I don't feel it is the American way to impose heavy fines and imprisonment sentences on those that chose to farm in their own way. There is a great difference of opinion on way constitutes bad and good conservation.

There are some government employees going around over the state trying to sell this program on the basis "It is coming and if we don't want some other agency to be in charge we better take it on."

I would say if Farmers and ranchers sit on their hands and let other people do their thinking for them, then it is coming.

The proposed law is trying to be sold on the basis of lets keep it in local hands. Now lets test this theory. How many of the government programs are law are controlled by the local boards? I believe you will agree with me that most of them are controlled on either a state or national basis. The rules are written elsewhere and you have little voice in changing the rules. The proposed new Soil and Water Conservation law will have the most far reaching affect on every farmer in this country. Only home gardeners are exempt from the severity of this proposed law.

Any land disturbing activity with first gaining approval of an overall conservation plan approved by the designated agency would be in strict violation of the law.

A proposed fine of \$500, and one year of imprisonment could be imposed.

Skin Tests Set for Oct. 30

A drive is on to erase the threat of TB from the McLean community. Tuberculin skin tests will be given free of charge in the basement of the Methodist Church on Oct. 30 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. During these hours, you and your family can get the TB skin test.

Those receiving the skin test must return to the same location to have the nurse read their test.

The skin tests are not the same as x-rays. X-rays will show only damage that has already been done. Skin tests show whether or not the person is carrying the germs that cause the damage--BEFORE THE DAMAGE IS DONE. The tests do not hurt. They cost you nothing. They take only a very little time. Every year in your family from age 10 months up should take the tests, including grandparents. You never get to old to have them.

The VFW and the ladies auxiliary urges everyone to take advantage of this opportunity to protect yourself and your loved ones from tuberculosis.

Remember too, that although this program is being coordinated by the VFW and ladies auxiliary it will require a great many people and a lot of work by the community to be successful. Watch for the ways to help. They will be announced later.

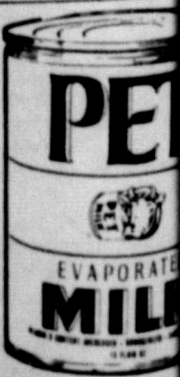

01. SHRIMP JAMBALAYA
 1 pound peeled and deveined shrimp, fresh or frozen.
 1 cup chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
 1/4 cup melted fat or oil
 1 can (1 pound) tomatoes
 1 1/2 cups water
 1 cup uncooked rice
 1/2 teaspoon-crushed whole thyme
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 bay leaf
 Dash pepper
 1/4 cup chopped parsley
 Thaw frozen shrimp. Cook green pepper, onion, and garlic in fat until tender. Add remaining ingredients except parsley and shrimp. Cover and cook for 20 minutes. Add shrimp; cook an additional 5 to 10 minutes, until shrimp is done and rice is tender. Stir occasionally. Add parsley at end of cooking period; remove bay leaf just before serving. Makes 6 servings.

The "Flu" may be of little concern to most people, but there are those with one or more chronic ailments which make it a mighty important part of their health planning, reports the Texas State Department of Health. The end of a long, hot

summer signals the approach of fall and winter and their threats to the health of the individual. Influenza is a distinct possibility during the cold, blustery, wet months.

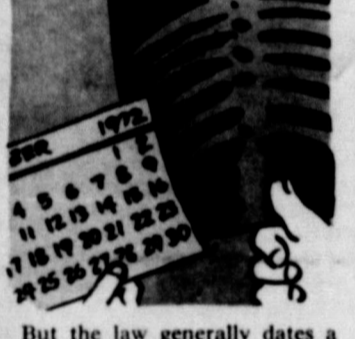

"Dating" a Disease

If you need an operation but have no hospital insurance, you might get the following bright idea: take out insurance first, then have the operation.

Obviously, the insurance companies would not like this sort of thing. To prevent it, health insurance policies often say you are not covered for a "pre-existing" illness—that is, an illness you already had when you bought the insurance.

But when does a disease really begin? Fixing a specific date is not always easy. In one sense, in terms of latent susceptibility, a disease may be traced all the way back to birth. As a poetic judge once put it:



"The seeds of death are sown when the first breath of life is drawn."

But the law generally dates a disease from the time when "discoverable symptoms" first appear. Take the case of a woman who had a gall bladder operation. The insurance company refused to pay her expenses, because she had had occasional stomach pains before taking out the policy.

"Those pains," argued the company in a court hearing, "mean she must have already had gall bladder trouble at that time. Therefore, it was 'pre-existing.'" But the court disagreed and upheld the woman's claim. The judge said mere pain was not a clear enough signal of what she had.

Suppose the disease is already known and simply gets worse. That usually is not covered. One man had cataracts when he bought a disability insurance policy. His sight gradually faded, and he finally became blind. Was this a pre-existing condition, excluded from his insurance coverage?

A court said it was indeed, because the blindness was a natural, foreseeable development of an ailment he already knew he had. But in another case, a woman did collect for surgery on a bunion, made suddenly worse when she bumped into a door. The court said the change in her condition was so unexpected and so drastic that it could fairly be called a brand new affliction.

What to do about it? If you fall into one of the special high risk categories, the State Health Department recommends an annual vaccination against influenza. You are in the high risk group if you have one of these chronic debilitating conditions:

Congenital and rheumatic heart disease, especially with the narrowing of a heart valve, and the hardening and thickening of arteries. Chronic bronchopulmonary diseases such as asthma, chronic bronchitis, cystic fibrosis, bronchiectasis, emphysema and advanced tuberculosis; and Diabetes mellitus and other chronic metabolic disorders.

Although the value of routinely immunizing all older age persons is less clear, the State Health Department says patients with incipient or potentially chronic disease should also be considered for annual immunization. Of particular consideration should be those with diseases affecting cardiovascular and bronchopulmonary systems. Persons who provide essential community services may also be considered for immunizations if local priorities justify.

The State Health Department doesn't recommend flu shots for everyone. However, those with chronic problems are more apt to suffer from the serious effects of flu and take longer to recuperate.

Your Child's First Days Of School

With the school rush on a gain, parents face the important task of helping the young child develop emotionally, as well as physically, in his new environment. "One of the very best ways to help your child in school is to be very aware of how he feels about his world," according to Dorothy Taylor, Texas Agricultural Extension Service family life specialist.

"Far too often parents assume that as long as they feed, dress and care for their children, they have fulfilled their parental responsibilities.

"Today parents face a similar educational task in learning about the mental health requirements of children. The need for such attention to emotional development is apparent—children with school problems largely are affected with poor emotional health."

Miss Taylor outlines the following general rules of helpful parental conduct: Assume the concerns that worries your child has are as important to him as your worries are to you.

Don't minimize his lost school work, his forgotten paper or his boredom with a monotonous task.

Encourage your child to talk about his concerns—sometimes negative feelings are best handled by simply talking them out.

Help your child in whatever way he wants you to—the child must be accepted on his own terms, not on those of his parents.

Be encouraging and always ready to go out of your way with little hope of thanks at that moment.

Miss Taylor stressed the need for parental concern and understanding in preventing and solving school problems.

"The parents' attitudes toward a comfortable school environment and satisfying school experiences help develop an emotionally healthy child."

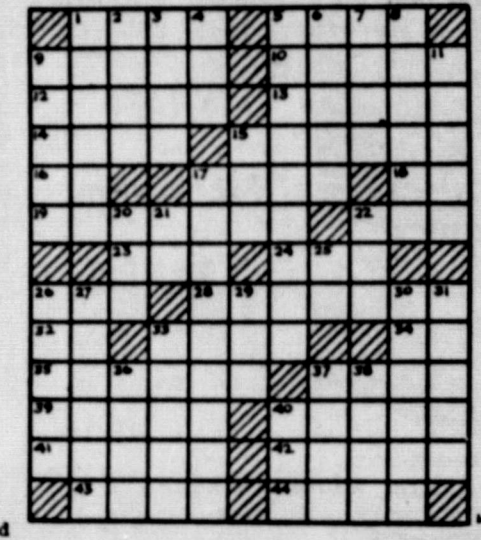

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

About 20,000 on Texas welfare rolls may lose their eligibility next month due to increased federal Social Security benefits.

Probably 110,000 more may get a cut in state Old Age Assistance as the federal benefit goes up.

However, Department of Public Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell emphasized that total income will still be higher even where state benefits drop.

Federal law requires the state welfare agencies to count Social Security income in figuring financial need for welfare grants.

Vowell said the Welfare Department is trying not to lower or deny welfare grants wherever possible.

He advised welfare recipients to notify their local aid offices of any recent changes in their need or other income.

Budgetary revisions in welfare procedures will permit continued assistance to about 4,700 old folks who otherwise would have had their welfare grants denied, Vowell said.

DEATH SENTENCES COMMUTED

Some 28 prisoners sentenced to death have had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment following a high court decision that capital punishment as now applied in Texas is unconstitutional.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin August 2 held the U.S. Supreme Court decision (now on appeal) meant sentences must either be commuted or prisoners given new trials.

A Board of Pardons and Paroles member said he did not know when inmates whose sentences have been commuted by Gov. Preston Smith actually will get the official news. He said there are 45 on death row in Texas prison and that the Board may wait until all sentences are commuted before informing either prisoners or the public.

Before action can be taken on commutations, prosecutors who do not want to start new trials must make formal written requests to the Board. In nearly all cases, local prosecutors are expected to request commutation rather than retrial.

The Board plans a meeting within the next month to take formal action.

DRAFT NUMBER AT 95

Young Texans whose draft lottery number is 95 can relax for the rest of 1972.

State Director of Selective Service Col. Melvin N. Glantz said 95 is the lottery number cut-off for the induction of non-volunteers for the rest of the year. Lottery cut-off for September is 75.

The Department of Defense has asked for 15,900 men from all states October-December.

Glantz indicated about 1,100 Texans will be drafted during the last three months of the year. Induction order will go to men qualified for military service who were born in 1952 and those who lost a deferment in 1972.

RAVE CUTS TAKE EFFECT

That 11 per cent average statewide auto insurance rate cut went into effect September 1 as scheduled.

They will be available to auto owners when they purchase new policies or renew existing coverage in the next 12 months.

An additional 10 per cent is possible after passing a National Safety Council-prescribed defensive driving course. Total reductions amount to about \$70 million.

AG OPINIONS

Attorney General Martin held constitutional a 1971 act to prevent insurance holding companies from draining assets of insurance companies they control. The act was an outgrowth of the National Bankers Life Insurance Company scandals.

In other recent opinions Martin concluded:

Independent school districts are barred from collecting delinquent ad valorem taxes incurred before Dec. 30, 1939.

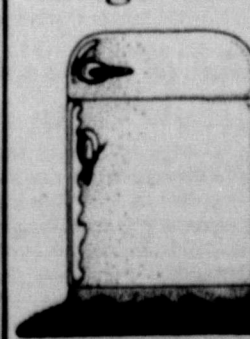

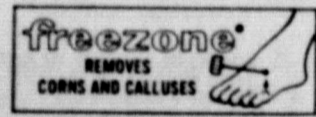

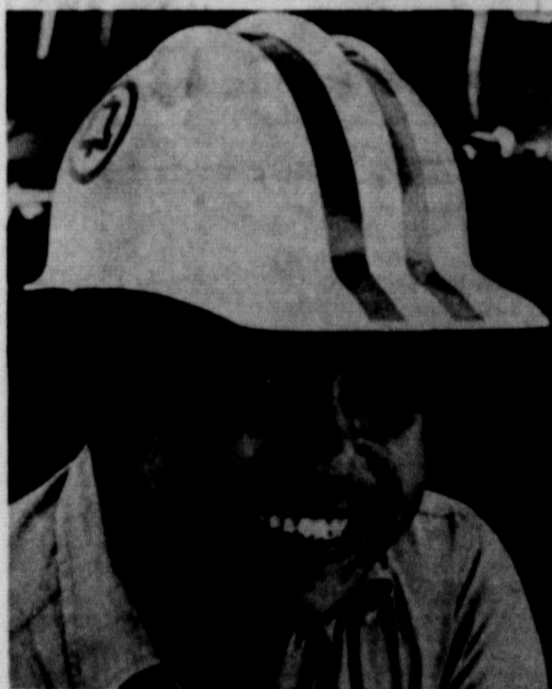
