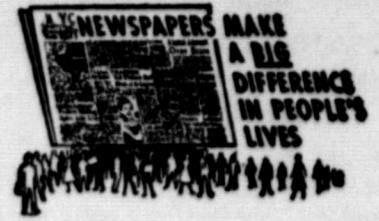

## POLL TAX STILL REQUIRED TO VOTE

Attorney General Waggoner Carr today urged all Texans who will be eligible to vote in this year's elections to obtain their poll tax before the Jan. 31 deadline.

In some counties the number of persons qualifying to vote is below normal. Some attribute this to the fact that there is some confusion on the part of many Texans as to whether a poll tax must be paid this year because of the recent lawsuit attacking this requirement.

Carr called attention to the fact that the judges of the Federal District Court hearing the case involving the validity of the Texas poll tax law, have recommended that Texas voters comply with the present law, because the lawsuit is not likely to be finally decided before Jan. 31, which is the deadline for poll tax payment.

Carr listed the following four rules for obtaining poll tax receipts and exemption certificates to qualify for voting in elections held between Feb. 1, 1966, and Jan. 31, 1967.

1. In order to vote in any primary, general or special election for the nomination or election of any state or local offices, or to vote in any election on a question or proposition, persons not exempt from payment of the poll tax must do so by Jan. 31, 1966.

2. Persons over 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1965, are exempt from paying the poll tax. However, in cities of 5,000 or more population, an exemption certificate must be obtained by Jan. 31.

In cities of less than 5,000 population—which includes McLean—no exemption certificate is required.

3. Persons who were under 21 on Jan. 1, 1965, but who will be 21 years of age by the election date, or who were not residents of Texas on Jan. 1, 1965, but will be so by election date are not subject to the payment of the poll tax.

4. Persons eligible to register and who have not paid for a poll tax or obtained an exemption certificate to vote in any primary, general or special election for nomination or election of members of the United States Congress, may do so by obtaining a special poll tax receipt (issued without payment of the tax) by Jan. 31, 1966. This is a registration certificate and qualifies anyone to vote for federal offices. The county tax collector marks the receipt with the notation "Poll Tax not paid."

In McLean, poll tax payments may be made to Mrs. Ruby Cousins at City Hall.

Survivors include her sons, Buddy and Doy of McLean; a daughter, Mrs. Gladys Andrews of Childress; sisters, Mrs. Jim Simpson of McLean and Mrs. A. O. Sweat of Wellington; brothers, Porter Smulcer of Wichita Falls, and Omer Smulcer of McLean, 11 grandchildren, 15 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Pallbearers will be Bill Simpson, W. C. Simpson, Joe Simpson, W. C. Kennedy, Bill Kingston and James Smith.

## John C. Haynes Places Hat In Ring For County Judge

John C. Haynes, McLean rancher, this week became the fifth Gray County Democrat to file for the party's nomination for county judge.

Haynes is a former mayor of McLean and was last week reappointed to the Gray County hospital board. He held the office of mayor for three consecutive terms.

In addition to his ranch, Haynes is the owner of a feed lot and mill west of McLean. Haynes has been active in a number of civic organizations.

A resident of Gray County since 1909, Haynes has been in the wholesale business and has also been active in banking. He was once cashier of two McLean banks and for a short while at the First National Bank in Pampa.

Although he has spent most of his life in McLean, Haynes has twice resided in Pampa. He is a member of the McLean Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

Asked his reasons for announcing his candidacy, Haynes said, "I believe that I can do some things as county judge that should be done. I've been considering this for the past three or four years."

Others already in the race for county judge are Incumbent Bill Craig, Pampa Attorney Harold Comer and A. J. Carrubi Jr. and Justice of the Peace G. L. "Nat" Lunsford.

Deadline for candidates to file for their party's primary is Feb. 7. As yet no Republicans have announced intentions to run in the race for county judge.

The race is drawing considerable interest, but only one out of five eligible Gray County voters has paid his poll tax or filed for an exemption. Poll tax deadline is Jan. 31. In the McLean precinct, no exemption certificate is necessary for those exempt from paying the poll tax.

## Watershed Meeting Held In Pampa

Plans problems and possibilities of the McClellan Creek Watershed project were probed last Thursday afternoon at a joint meeting and information session in the Gray County courtroom.

In addition to watershed landowners, other organizations represented at the meeting included Gray County commissioners, the cities of Groom and McLean, state and federal soil conservation authorities and wildlife services.

Attending from McLean were Elmo Whaley, Charles Cousins, Jim Hathaway, Joe Burroughs, Creed Lamb, Boyd Meador, Joe D. Smith, Truitt Johnson, James Clett, Leslie Darney, Milton Carpenter and H. H. Hudgins.

Billy Davis, chairman of the McClellan Watershed Association's steering committee, presided.

Davis introduced Phil Grazier, engineer in charge of the work plan staff, U. S. Soil Conservation Service, which began work in the McClellan area Monday.

Grazier explained that his team is beginning a survey that may take several months. The primary aim of the survey is flood control, he said, but there are several options open to those in the watershed.

In addition to flood control, the dams may be built to include irrigation, recreation, industrial storage, municipal water supply or fish and wildlife propagation.

In these cases, there would be additional cost. Grazier said, but the watershed sponsors could charge a fee to cover maintenance and operation and to recoup the investment.

Grazier said that 11 damsites in the watershed are being investigated. The final plan might include more or less than that number.

Members of Grazier's survey team were introduced. These included John Ray, a native of LeFors, who is in charge of a two-man team based at McLean.

Also introduced were Don Clark, geologist; Allen Caldwell, hydraulic engineer; Jos Camp, civil engineer; and Herbert McWharter, economist.

Grazier said that these people would be visiting landowners in the watershed to get information needed for the survey. He said it would be particularly helpful to contact those who had kept any form of rainfall records for past years.

The rainfall and water yield studies will determine the feasibility of proposed projects.

The cities of Groom and McLean requested that the survey investigate the possibility of obtaining municipal water supply from the watershed project. They also indicated that they would like the team to determine the feasibility of using the same dams for re-

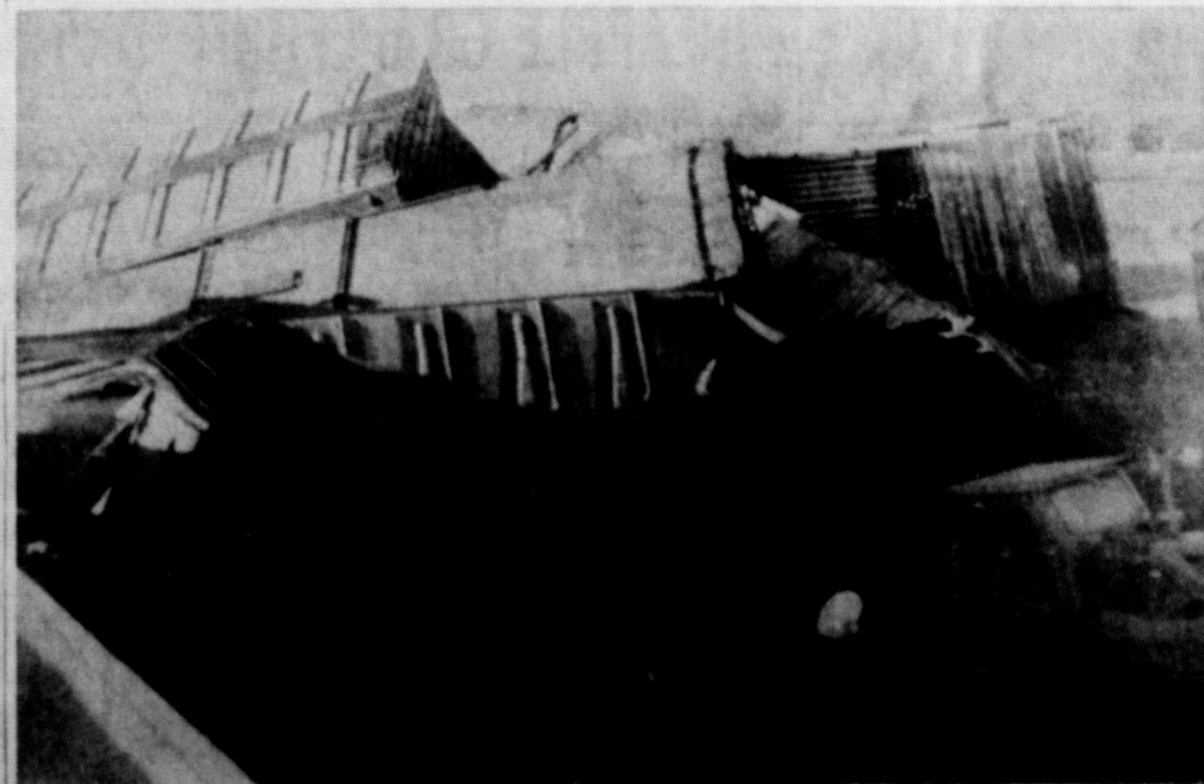

## ROCK ISLAND HAD PILEUP WEST McLEAN

Traffic began to move over rails a mile west of McLean Friday night, after bulldozers had cleared the lines of wreckage left from the derailment early Friday of Rock Island Lines Train No. 31.

Two of four diesel units and 17 empty carbon black and milo hoppers derailed at 3:20 a.m. Friday, heavily damaging 600 feet of main track and several of the cars. No injuries were reported to the westbound train's crew of Walter Lemke, engineer; Oscar Wedgeworth, conductor; and Jim Hart and Garland Kidwell, all of Amarillo.

The train carried 17 loaded cars and 42 empties. The lead and second diesel remained on the track.
