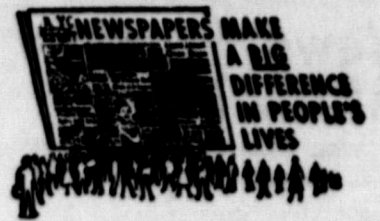

G. L. Lunsford Announces For County Judge Race

G. L. (NAT) Lunsford, Gray County justice of the peace of Precinct 2, has announced his candidacy for county judge.

Lunsford, who previously served eight years as Gray County commissioner, has been a resident of Pampa since 1929. "Even before there were paved streets or highways leading into our city," he pointed out.

"I know the needs of our county," he declared. He said he feels that his 11 years prior service in county government qualify him for the county judgeship.

"I have received hundreds of phone calls and personal visits from people all over the county concerning the race and it encouraged me to make up my mind to run for this office, Lunsford said in announcing his candidacy.

"I believe this post (county judge) requires a person to give his best at all times and I promise I will do just this.

"As county judge I will give the same courtesy and respect that I have tried to give while serving as justice of the peace."

An ordained minister for 30 years, Lunsford has served as church music director in several churches.

In his announcement statement, Lunsford added, "I have never asked for sympathy in any way, but because of my physical handicap, I will be unable to visit every voter.

"Please take this announcement as a personal contact. Your vote will be greatly appreciated."

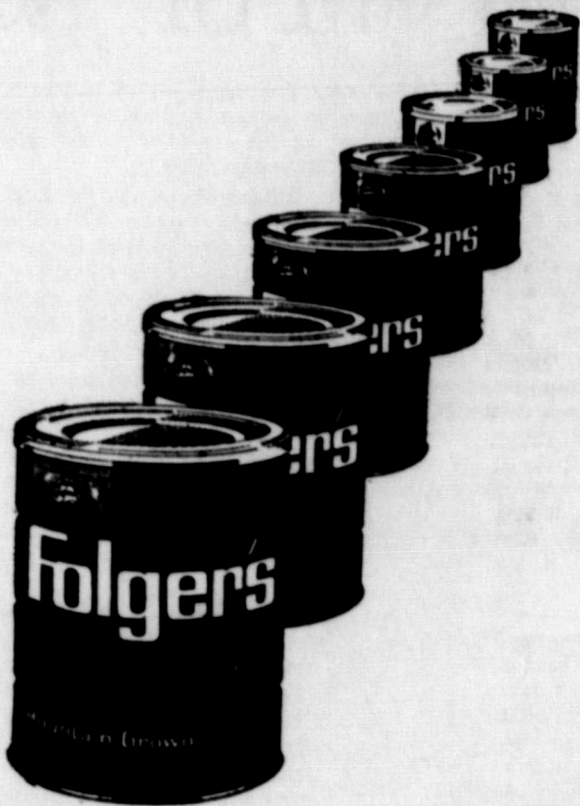
