Rev. Lennart Blomquist, Swedish-born missionary of the There will be two vacancies with Methodist church, serving in Rho-

Rev. Blomquist was born in Vasteras, Sweden, and makes his permanent home in Stockholm. He holds a trade-teachers certificate from the Swedish Industrial College at Naas, Gothenburg; and his B. D. degree from the Scandanavian Union Theological Seminary, overseas, Gothenburg (Methodist). He Lubbock.

He was ordained to the Methodist ministry in Sweden by Bishop Th. Arvidson in 1940 and was pastor in his homelandd until 1947, when he was commissioned a missionary for Africa.

He has served at Nyadiri and Mutambara and Old Umtali, prior to his present assignment as district superintendent for the Mtoko-Nyadiri District. The district has at present 75 churches and 17 preaching places; 72 public schools with about 5,000 students, one high school and one higher Teacher-Training College. Under the district adminis tration comes also one hospital (250 beds) and 10 clinics.

A Community Development Program has gotten underway, which has become of great importance for the future, and for which Rev. Blomquist has also been responsible. He is now spending a year's furough visiting and speaking in Methodist churches in the United States and Scandanavian countries. H. F. 



Highway Commission. The \$10.8 million program, which will cover more than 300 projects throughout the state, will now be submitted to the Bureau of Public Roads

The program, subject to approval by the Bureau, will be submitted over an extended period. Project plans will go to the bureau as they are completed.

As prepared by the Highway Department, the program represents Texas' first large effort toward compliance with the Highway Beautification Act of 1965 which was passed by Congress and enacted into law last October

The program proposes work on 321 projects at a total estimated cost of \$10,862,400.

jects are on the ABC systemfederal-aid primary roads, federal-

Of the projects proposed, 147 rest areas are planned; 19 scenic overlooks, landscape plantings for 133 projects, and right of way purchase for 64 projects.






