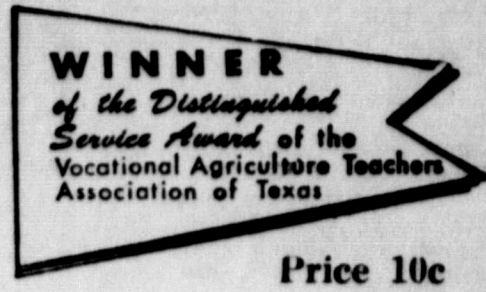

McLean Pioneer Killed In Car-Train Accident

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the McLean Methodist Church for Mrs. Mary Ethel Scates, 303 N. Gray, who was killed Saturday in a car-train wreck near Lela. Services were conducted by Rev. Raymond Hurn of Lubbock, who is Abilene district superintendent, Church of the Nazarene, assisted by Rev. Bob Hoover of Shamrock.

Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Mrs. Scates was pronounced dead on arrival at Shamrock Hospital following the crash, which occurred at 7:40 p.m. Saturday, just south of Lela. Her husband, Benjamin Frank Scates, was critically injured and was transferred from Shamrock to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo, where he remains in critical condition.

According to information, the Scates automobile struck the rear car of a Rock Island freight train and overturned several times.

Born in Chico, Wise County, Texas, Sept. 14, 1897, Mrs. Scates was graduated from McLean High School in 1916, and in 1927 received her degree in education from Oklahoma University. She taught school until her marriage to Frank Scates at Dozier on March 22, 1930. She moved back to McLean from Hereford in 1940. She was a member of the Church of the Nazarene.

Survivors, in addition to her husband, are one daughter, Mrs. Eula Mae Stipe, Pine Bluff, Ark.; four sons, Rev. Kenneth Lee and Glen Ray, both of Bethany, Okla.; Willis Wayne and Benny Albert, both of Wichita Falls; two sisters, Mrs. W. M. Davis, Dunellen, N. J., and Mrs. R. M. Francis, Plainview; two brothers, Rev. Fred Stockton, Pecos, and Dr. John L. Stockton, Kansas City, Mo.; and nine grandchildren.

Proclaimed by Governor Public Schools Week is being observed March 7-11 by proclamation of Gov. John Connally.

McLean Methodists To Hear Missionary

Rev. Lennart Blomquist, a Swedish-born missionary of the Methodist church, serving in Rhodesia, Africa, will be at the McLean Methodist Church Tuesday night, March 8, at 7:30 o'clock.

Rev. Blomquist was born in Vasteras, Sweden, and makes his permanent home in Stockholm. He holds a trade-teachers certificate from the Swedish Industrial College at Naas, Gothenburg; and his B. D. degree from the Scandinavian Union Theological Seminary, overseas, Gothenburg (Methodist). He has also taken special agricultural training at Texas Tech College in Lubbock.

He was ordained to the Methodist ministry in Sweden by Bishop Th. Arvidson in 1940 and was pastor in his homeland until 1947, when he was commissioned a missionary for Africa.

He has served at Nyadiri and Mutumbara and Old Umatal, prior to his present assignment as district superintendent for the Mtoko-Nyadiri District. The district has at present 75 churches and 17 preaching places; 72 public schools with about 5,000 students, one high school and one higher Teacher-Training College. Under the district administration comes also one hospital (250 beds) and 10 clinics.

A Community Development Program has gotten underway, which has become of great importance for the future, and for which Rev. Blomquist has also been responsible.

He is now spending a year's furlough visiting and speaking in Methodist churches in the United States and Scandinavian countries.

H. F. Dunn, pastor, extends a cordial invitation to the local people to attend the meeting on Tuesday night.

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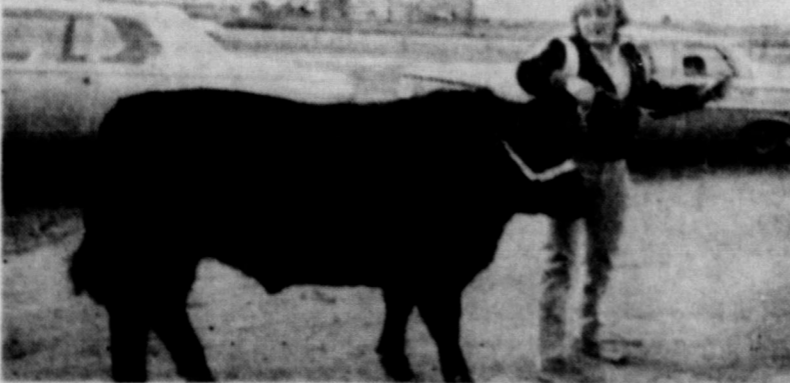

Tax Benefits For Older Americans

Tax relief is available to many retired persons in northern Texas who are living on a fixed pension or annuity. It also is available to older people who have incurred costly medical bills. Those reminders came from the Internal Revenue Service.

For those on a pension, the benefit may be through the "retirement income credit" provision of the federal income tax laws. These laws also allow persons over 65 to deduct 100% of their drug and medical expenses. On home sales, those 65 years of age may elect to exclude from their income part or all of the proceeds from the sale.

Documents 5018 and 5569, which furnish more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by writing to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

Texas Highway Map To Be Out Soon

The largest single order for the Official State Highway Map of the Texas Highway Department is now rolling off the presses.

The initial order for 800,000 of the full-color maps is up 200,000 over the first order for 1965 maps. In past years, substantial reprints have been required to fill the ever-increasing demand from both Texas motorists and out-of-state visitors.

The maps are produced for free distribution by the Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department. They provide motorists and Texans with up-to-date information on highways, mileages, lakes accessible to the public, safety rest areas, city route maps, and to distinguish Interstate, U. S., State and farm-and-ranch-to-market roads in the state.

The growth of the Interstate Highway network is graphically shown, as the 1966 map shows 521 more miles of divided highways than appeared on the 1965 map. The majority of this increase in the Interstate System.

Over 22,000 miles of farm-to-market roads are shown—some 750,000 more miles of this type road than appeared on the 1965 map.

Safety rest areas are again indicated on the map by small green dots alongside the highway. Last year there were 914 green dots. This year there are 934.

Postcards for convenient ordering of the 1966 maps will be available at each Texas county tax assessor-collector's office, and as Texans buy their 1966 auto tags they may pick up these free order cards at their tax office.

Free copies also may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, Austin, Texas 78703.

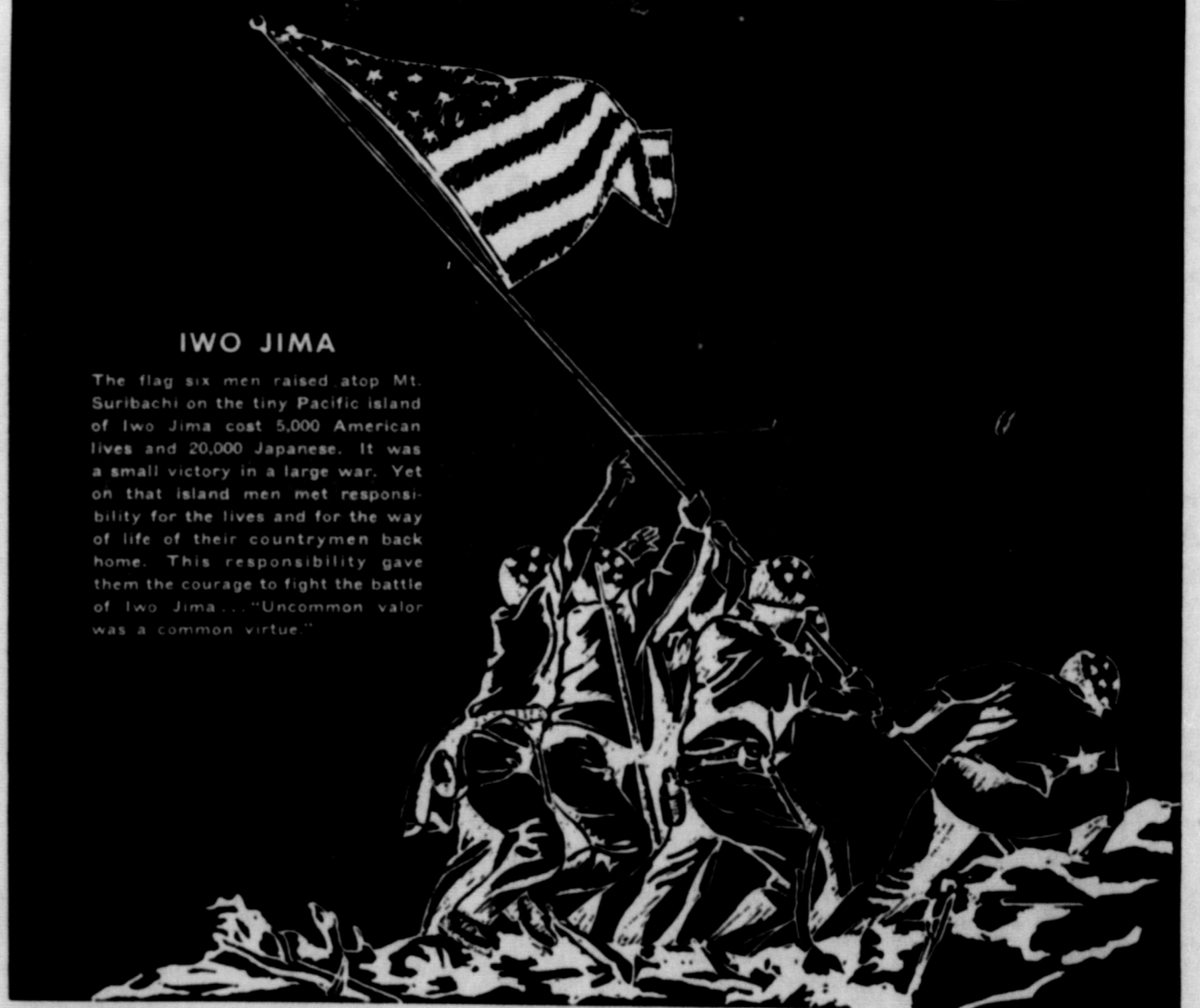

Beautification Plan For Texas Highways

The Texas Highway Department's 1936-37 Highway Beautification Program, Texas' first major push under the recently-enacted Highway Beautification Act, was tentatively approved recently by the Texas Highway Commission.

The \$10.8 million program, which will cover more than 300 projects throughout the state, will now be submitted to the Bureau of Public Roads.

The program, subject to approval by the Bureau, will be submitted over an extended period. Project plans will go to the bureau as they are completed.

As prepared by the Highway Department, the program represents Texas' first large effort toward compliance with the Highway Beautification Act of 1965 which was passed by Congress and enacted into law last October.

The program proposes work on 321 projects at a total estimated cost of \$10,802,400.

Of these, 122 projects are on the

Interstate System and will cost an estimated \$7,486,600.

One hundred and 99 of the projects are on the ABC system—federal-aid primary roads, federal-aid secondary roads and urban extensions of federal-aid systems. The ABC projects will cost an estimated \$3,375,800.

Of the projects proposed, 147 rest areas are planned; 19 scenic overlooks, landscape plantings for 133 projects, and right of way purchase for 64 projects.

Also, purchase of right of way comfort stations, 111 water systems, and lighting on 60 projects.

Health Examination Recommended For Athletically-Minded

"C'mon, be a sport," your friend challenges. Almost before you know it, you're an athlete—member of the local athletic association, the church league or the neighborhood hunting group.

A new leaflet from the American Medical Association cautions that before rigorous activity begins, shape up—arrange for a health examination, check your diet, plan for sufficient sleep, then begin your conditioning program.

A medical examination, usually required for high school athletes, is recommended for sports-minded adults, too—although athletic organizations may not request it. Before beginning sports activity, says the AMA, see your physician for a thorough checkup with emphasis on your heart, circulatory and respiratory systems and reflexes.

Athletes need the same food as spectators—but more of it. A daily diet should include nutrients found in the four basic food groups—meat and meat substitutes, milk and milk products, vegetables and fruits, breads and cereals. As you become more active, your appetite and food consumption will probably increase. Endurance sports call for stepped-up (but not excessive) amounts of carbohydrates. No single health food will make you a star performer.

The more active you are, the more sleep you will need. Even if your sport is not a vigorous one, your need for rest will increase slightly. Rest, however, will be more beneficial and easier to come by as a result of greater muscular activity.

The shift from spectator to sportsman must be gradual. Athletes recognize this and practice for two or three weeks before the first game of the season and earlier, train individually. Players should warm up before every practice, and so should the adult sportsman. After a medical checkup, begin your conditioning with brisk walking, mild running, or skipping rope—activities which work up an athletic sweat and increase endurance.

Plan ahead and put yourself in training. You—and your performance, too—will be shaped up.

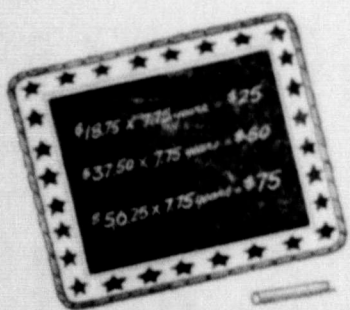
