Beginning October 2, The McLean News will charge tax on all newspaper sales, due to the last Legislative session and the passage of another dandy bill!

Although the collection of tax on our subscriptions will be a hassle for us to handle, I really feel sorry for the larger papers. As I understand the new rulings independent carriers will have to apply for a tax permit because they will be responsible for the tax collections. This might prove to be a big headache for lots of people.

There is (and will continue to be) a lot of pressure on the Legislature to get this inefficient tax repealed, and hopefully next session, that will be the case, however, as of October 2, all newspapers will have to charge the required tax.

McLean News readers who have already paid their subscription this year will not be affected by this tax. Subscribers who have yet to pay their subscription and pay it after October 2, will have to pay the tax. In Gray County rates will be \$14.75. Outside Gray County rates will be \$16.85. Singles copy issues should now sell for 37c instead of 35c.

I often find myself in disagreement with Comptroller Bob Bullock, but I must say that in handling the interpretations of the new laws, he and the Texas Press Association have been invaluable. They have taken usual mumbo-jumbo, and condensed it into factual, helpful information and guidelines.

We have received several ads from the Comptroller's office, explaining the new tax and the new items that will undergo taxation. We will be publishing them from time to time in the hopes this will clear up some of the confusion surrounding this bill.

Lloyd Kurtz Resigns October 1; Brian J. Pohlmeier To Head Bank Of Commerce

Beginning October 1, McLean bankers will see a new face in the President's office of the Bank of Commerce in McLean.

Brian J. Pohlmeier, of Muleshoe, will assume presidential duties October 1. Senior vice-president Lloyd Kurtz has resigned his post in the bank effective that date.

Grades 1-3 To Dismiss At 3 p.m., Beginning Today

Students in the first, second, and third grades will no longer be dismissed from school at 2:40, according to a release from elementary principal, Dorman Thomas.

In the release, Thomas stated "As a result of the requirements made mandatory by the state, we have made many changes in the school this year. We are required to have a

certain amount of time allocated each day for the different subject area."

According to Thomas, when school first started, officials tried to fit all necessary and required subjects that had to be taught daily, into their schedule "This was more difficult in the first three grades because they went fewer hours," explained Thomas. "Grades 1-3 have

been taught all of the subjects for the proposed amount of time that the state has mandated."

"The teachers have found that they can get everything taught but it does not leave much time for relaxation and fun. If school has to be all work and no fun, the children are apt to develop negative feelings."





