Tigers Lose Final Game To Wheeler 34-6, End Season 4-5

The McLean Tigers shocked the District Champion Wheeler Mustangs with a touchdown the first minute of play Friday night here and took a temporary 6-0 lead after a long run by Kevin McDowell and a 4 yard touchdown by Craig Morris. The Tigers lead was short lived, however,

as Grimes of Wheeler ran 59 yards seconds later to tie the score. Both extra point attempts failed.

McLean was victimized by long break-away runs by the visitors, and could never complete the impressive drives they made by scoring again. Kevin McDowell was a standout performer for

the Tigers, amassing a total of 171 yards rushing behind the crisp blocking of the McLean forward wall. The McLean defensive unit played well in spots, but were victimized by long Wheeler runs and the 84 yards passing gained by the Mustangs. McAnear, Rice, Billingsley and

Stubbs and turned in their usual stellar game on defense for the locals, but impressive numbers of tackles were also turned in by Morris, Stevens, Swaner, and Bode. This was the final game of the season for the Tigers and completed the season at 4 wins, 5 losses and promises an exciting season next year.

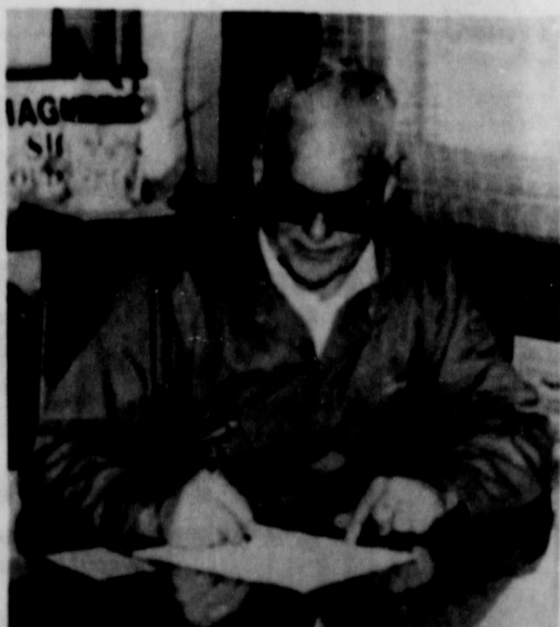

children. He was the brother-in-law of Lush Rogers of McLean.

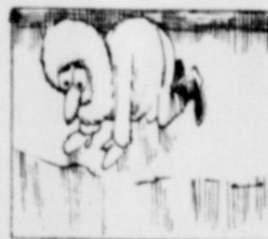

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Sends Out Tax Rebates; McLean Receives \$3,294.41

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent city sales tax rebate checks a full week early because many taxpayers paid by the 20th of last month, as all taxpayers will be required to do this month.

"We're sending these checks early because 134,000 Texas taxpayers paid before the deadline," Bullock said. "This kind of cooperation among taxpayers is helping us avoid new and higher taxes. It's obvious this change will help local governments put these tax revenues to work faster in their cities."

Starting in November, all taxpayers will be required to file by the 20th of the month instead of by the last day of the month.

The earlier deadline set by the Legislature will

bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Bullock said this month's early payments show that "Texas merchants have accepted

this change in the same spirit it was suggested to save us from a tax increase." Bullock's office has been working with trade and professional organizations to inform taxpayers of the

change. Houston received the biggest check, for \$19 million, compared with \$18.5 million for the same period last year. Dallas got \$12 million, compared with \$10.9 million

last November.

Lefors received \$606.05, compared to \$528.34 for the same period last year. McLean received \$3,294.41, compared to last year's \$3,516.08, and Pampa

received \$172,039.42, compared to the \$191,146.57 received last year.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's

MTS check for \$22.4 million pushed its 1983 total payments to \$147.6 million. San Antonio's MTA check was \$3.5 million, bringing 1983 payments to \$22 million.

Complete Book Of The Wild Turkey

Many people do not realize that the wild turkey at one time had almost disappeared from the scene in our country. New England, Ontario and the lake states no longer had turkeys, and many other states had greatly dwindling populations of the famous bird. Only in the deep south were the birds holding their own, and even they were harassed by land-clearing, lumbering, and

market hunters.

The 1920's saw sportsmen and conservationists coming to the rescue with protective laws that stopped the uncontrolled harvest, and by 1950 the turkey was well on its way back. This book tells this story as a conservation saga and honors those men who took the lead in this battle.

Today, turkeys are established in 42 of the fifty states, and thirty-nine of these now have some kind of season on

the magnificent bird.

"Complete Book of the Wild Turkey" tells you all about the bird itself, its history, peculiarities, etc., and also goes into great detail on how to hunt the wily rascal successfully. This volume may truly be the most interesting, informative, and helpful work ever published on the subject. It should be a very sought-after book as turkey season opens here within the next few days, and it is now available at Lovett Memorial Library.

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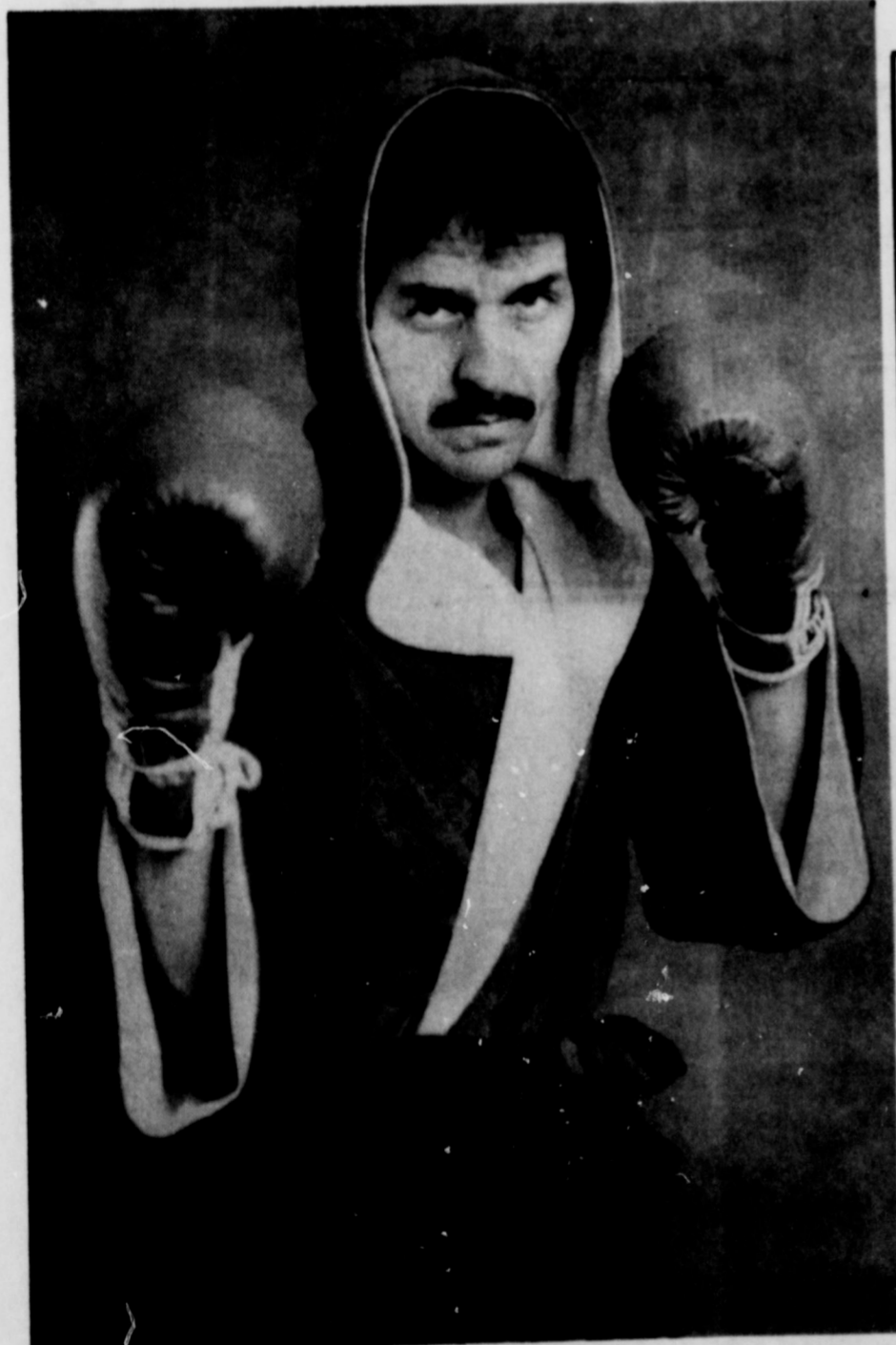
