
This woman took five giant steps forward in my -estima-



Survivors include his wife Mayvon of the home; one daughter, Mrs. Scott Britten;



ABATEMENT OF **NUSIANCES**

Incorporated cities generally have power and authority under their charters to abate nuisances, which is the stopping or preventing of a nuisance. This is particularly true where the health of citizens of the city is endangered, some sanitation ordinance is being violated so that disease is likely to spread, or where some constantly annoying noise is maintained to disturb the rest of people and endanger health. An example is a family in a closely settled community which keeps livestock such as cows, hogs or chickens penned in the back yard in violation of a city ordinance, thus attracting flies or rats to the neighbohood; or the animals make loud and disturbing noises at night disturbing sleep. Another situation is where a nearby neighbor keeps dogs penned close to another person's house and fails to keep the pen sanitary, and it creates a health hazard; or the dogs howl and bark at night and disturb the neighbor-

hood resident's sleep. The city will generally aid a complaint in instances of this kind and bring action against the offending party and abate the nuisance. It is fairly easy to obtain relief if the complainant can show that the acts in question constitute a violation of a city ordinance.

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

SECTION 1. That section 5 of Ordinance no. 133 be, and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction by the payment of \$25.00 for first offense and \$50.00 for each offense there-

dog has been vacinated with antirabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary within the last twelve months, if the dog is over six months of age. SECTION 2. That Section 7 of

Ordinance No. 133 be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner may redeem any animal placed in pound by paying all charges with in three (3) days after the animal has been picked up. If animal has not been redeemed within the three days then it will be destroyed.

SECTION 3. That if any section, part, or provision of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, then in that event, it is expressly provided, and it is the intention of the City Council in passing this ordinance that all other parts of this shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.
