### 40 Years Ago

McLean High School won 47 points in the literary events in the county meet last week, to Pampa's 42.

On account of the snow and rain, the athletic events were postponed until Saturday of this week, when a total of 130 points in these events will be contested for.

If McLean wins Saturday, the second cup now held by the McLean school will become the permanent property of the school, making two such cups held three years in succession.

In the literary events, high school, McLean won the following: First place girls debate, Elgin Shell and Lorena Ashby; first place debate, LeRoy Landers and Leslie Huff; first place senior boys declamation, Emory Crockett; third place girls declamation and second place senior spelling.

In the entire school, McLean won 109 points and Pampa 127. McLean won first in senior ward girls declamation, Velma Crockett; second place in junior boys declamation, junior and sub-junior spelling, music memory, arithmetic and extemporaneous speaking; third place in junior girls declamation.

The instances where one school is credited with both first and second places in declamations is due to the rule allowing double representation in counties having no more than five member schools.

A large number of boosters are expected to accompany the contestants to Pampa Saturday.

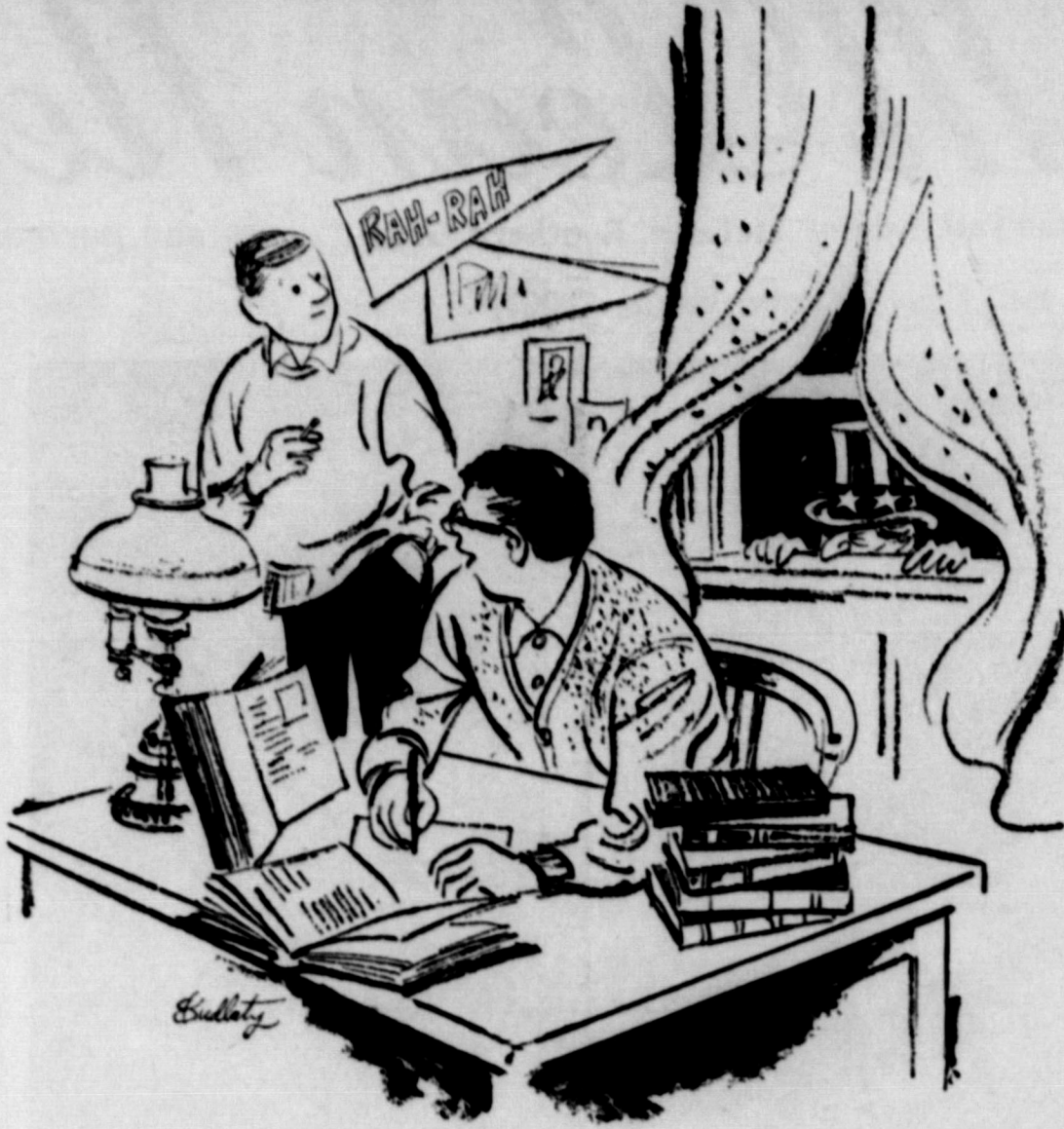

To obtain a spatter-finish on linoleum or floors, do this:

First paint the floor a solid color and allow to dry. To spatter, fill the brush with the selected color and strike it sharply against a stick held in the other hand. Make small spatters by using less paint on the brush and striking it against the stick held one foot from the floor.

Make large spatters by using more paint on brush and holding stick three feet above the floor. Tack or tape a dropcloth over walls and cabinets to shield them from spatters.

**Rumor vs. Fact**

The rumor that precinct No. 4 has received a great amount of the county budget even more than its share, is not borne out by facts recorded in the County Auditor's office. It is true that precinct No. 4 has more equipment than ever before in its history, but so have the other precincts. The county budget has grown 5 times its amount of 30 years ago. Expenditures in all 4 precincts have grown accordingly. Here are some pertinent facts:

Commissioners Salary is \$7,200 plus \$1,200 car expense for a total of \$8,400 per year.
