And then the author began talking about people who collect books! He said that book collectors were among the worst "compulsives," because they would give up food and basic necessities to buy a new book.

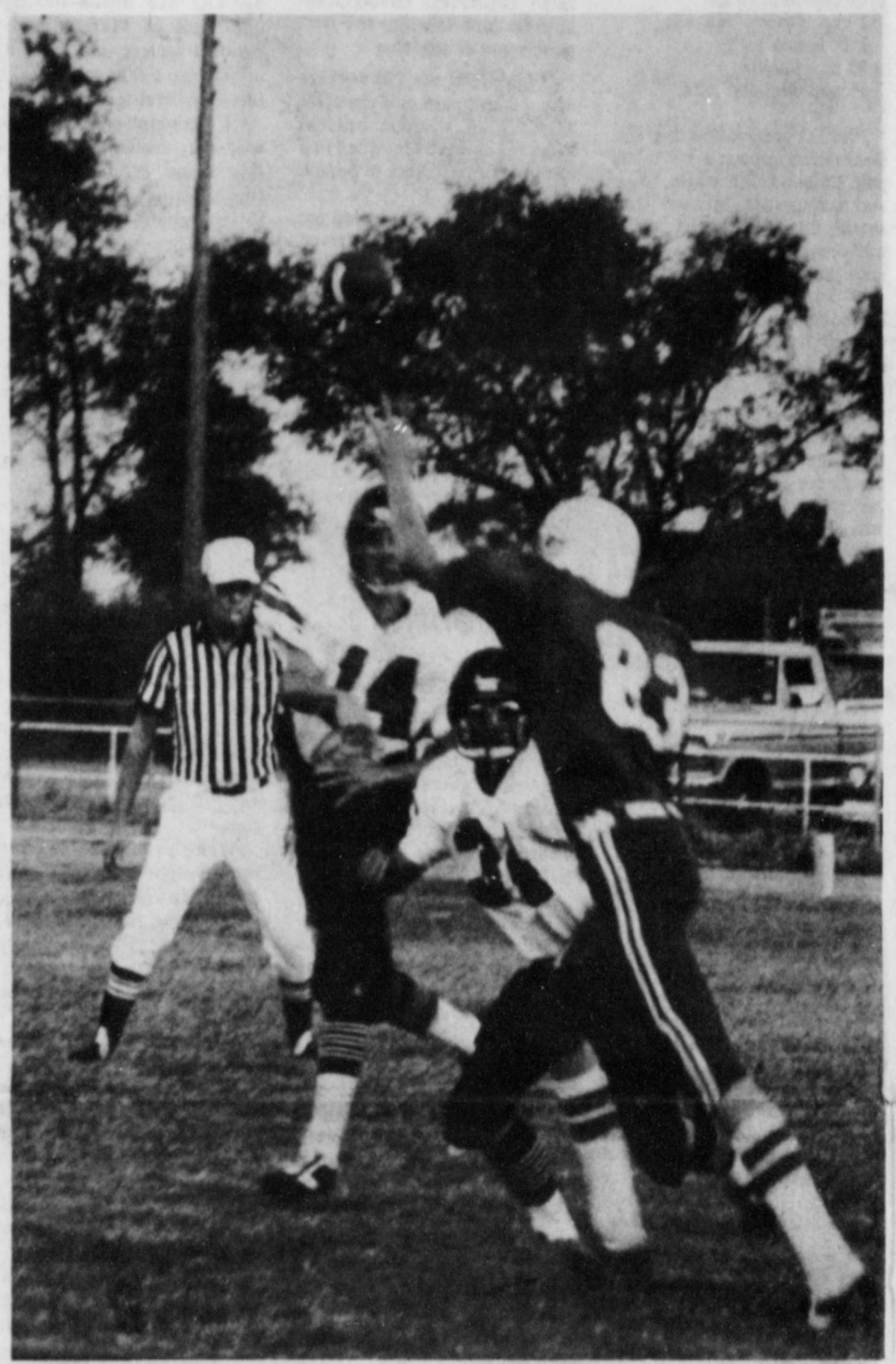

An older lady told Annie when she was a child "that chimney was ready to draw cats from under the bed." Annie recalled putting a cat under the bed to see that performance and was disappointed when the cat failed to go up the chimney. Enloes interest was always in stockfarming. Nola enjoyed staying home. Her memories of those young years are happy ones. "We were a big happy family and had lots of fun." She has been active in the Alanreed study club for many years, and Enloe's hobby has been "spinning yarns." He loves to talk about old times.

Drivers Cautioned To Watch Out For Youngsters

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety at Lubbock, said today, "There are hundreds of thousands of good reasons why Texas motorists should use extra caution while driving near schools."

"Many of our youngsters will be going to school for the first time and will not be aware of the many hazards existing on Texas' busy streets and highways."

"Precautionary measures, such as traffic signs and signals, safety zones and pedestrian crosswalks, are virtually useless if your children have not acquired good pedestrian safety habits."

Children's responsibilities to and from school include: observing all traffic signs and signals, walking against the flow of traffic when no sidewalk is present, crossing streets at designated crosswalks, and maintaining orderly conduct while enroute to and from school.

"As parents, we must be absolutely sure our children have a clear understanding of traffic dangers. In addition, as drivers, we must always be on the lookout for school children. It is our responsibility--as a parent--as a motorist--as a citizen," said Major Bell.

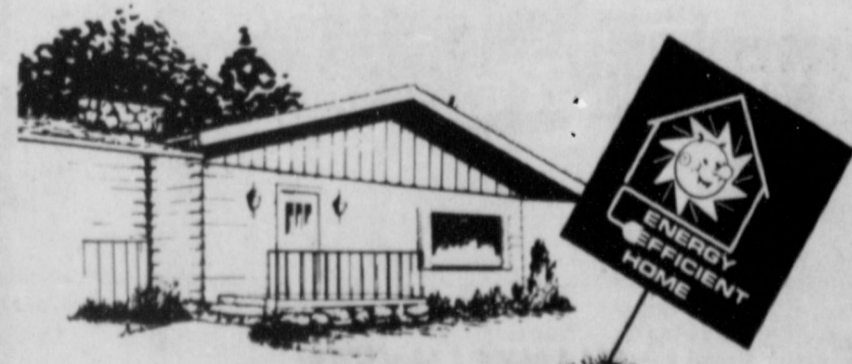

### Spotlight on HEALTH

#### Heading Off A School Health Problem

By Lawrence C. Parish, M.D.

When an outbreak of head lice occurs in a school, a letter is sent home to parents inviting them to meet with the school nurse and the school doctor.

Parents can play an important role in the control of pediculosis and in preventing its rapid spread to the community at large.

They should learn to recognize head lice and to suspect the possibility of their presence when a child persistently scratches his head or complains of persistent itching. In checking the scalp, particular attention should be paid to the back of the head and the area behind the ears. Close inspection will reveal very small, pearly, oval-shaped eggs attached to individual hairs near the scalp.

Several methods of treatment are available, but most physicians prescribe a medi-


lated shampoo available as Kwel Shampoo. It is used for four minutes and is followed with a finetooth combing to remove the shells of nits (eggs). It is wise to shampoo other members of the family with Kwel, too, as a prophylactic measure. Medications should always be used according to instructions.

To prevent reinfestation, laundry or dry clean contaminated clothing, contaminated surfaces, such as mattresses and upholstered furniture, and combs and brushes, can be sprayed with a special spray available without prescription as R&C Spray. Some school authorities also spray their school buses with it.

Head lice travel from one person to another by means of direct contact or indirectly through shared combs, brushes, hats or headscarves. 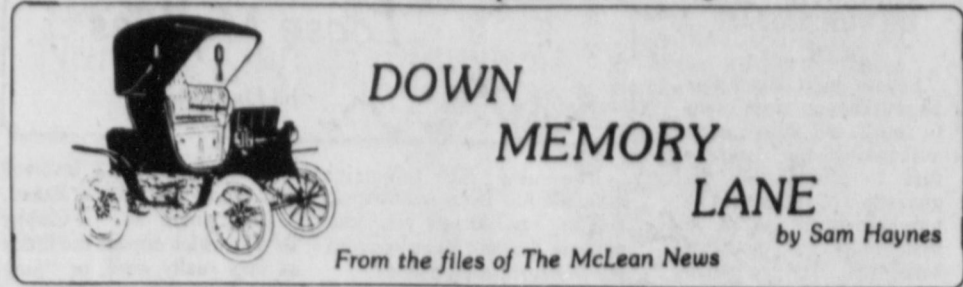

## Tips For Safe Driving

With fewer daylight hours and children going to school, now is a time for cautious driving. Experts at ANCO, the windshield wiper people, offer the following tips:

- Switch to snow tires and snowblades. If you drive in a northern state where winter quickly follows fall, switch to snow tires and replace regular windshield wipers with snowblades. Snow tires can increase traction on ice by 10-30 percent, depending upon tire type and construction. Snowblades are specially designed to prevent ice buildup freezing the blades to your windshield.
- Following these simple driving tips can help prevent serious accidents and save lives.
