# Wheeler To Hold Equipment Sale

The Wheeler County Livestock Show Association will sponsor a farm equipment sale, Saturday April 16, at the Wheeler County Agricultural Center, 1/2 mile north of Wheeler.

The sale will be held regardless of the weather. In the event of bad weather, the sale will be held inside the Agricultural Center.

Equipment may be consigned to the sale by contacting Vocational Agricultural instructors: Bryon Thoms in Allison; Dennis Crawford in Briscoe; James Moffett in Mobeetie; Bob Baxter in Shamrock; Wayne Bullock in Wheeler or County Extension Agent, Don King.

Consignments must be received by April 1, in order to be listed on the sale bill. However, equipment will be accepted up to the day of the sale.

# Retirees Can Avoid Filing Declaration of Estimated Tax

Retirees can avoid making quarterly tax payments by filing a Form W-4P to have Federal incme tax withheld on each pension and annuity payment, the inter-Remanu Strvice

By filing a Form W-4P, "Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding," with the agency paying the pension or annuity, the taxpayer will not have to estimate the amount of tax owed nor will he or she have to pay a large sum of money at one time. The only requirement with a W-4P form is that at least \$5 per month be withheld. Then the taxpayer must only file an annual tax return on or before April 15.

If a retiree does not file a W-4P and receives pension payments or other incomes which are subject to tax, he or she must file a declaration of estimated income tax, Form 1040-ES, when the estimated tax is \$100 or

Even if some tax money is withheld, a declaration must be filed when the estimated gross income includes more than \$500 on which no tax has been withheld. This, too, only applies when the estimated tax is \$100 or more.

Payment is then made either when the Form 1020-ES is filed or in equal quarterly installments beginning with the filing form, the IRS said.

Taxpayers can obtain further information by checking with a local IRS office.

# Tax Rebate

A rebate on city sales tax was received by to City of McLean in th amount of \$3,486.42 Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Tuesday that city sales tax rebates for the first quart r of 1977 totaled a re-ord \$89.5 million, up 18.5 percent from the same three-month period last year.

# Proposed Ciranges In Game Regulation

Among the notable hunting and fishing regulation proposals to be discussed at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department hearings the week of March 21-25 will be measures concerning landowners falsifying acreage totals when obtaining anterless deer permits and an increase in striped bass bag limit.

A hearing will be conducted in each of the 233 counties regulated by the Parks and Wildlife Department in order to explain proposals and obtain public comment. Parks and Wildlife Commissioners later review proposals and comments prior to action on recommendations in April.

Current regulations do not adequately prohibit a landowner or lessee from obtaining more permits for anterless deer, elk or antelope than proper game management should be agement indicates should be harvested from a particular tract of land. The proposed regulation is designed to prevent an overkill resulting from fraudulently obtained permits.

A related proposal will prohibit the use of a permit more than once.

Striped bass, initially stocked in Texas fresh water in 1968, have steadily grown in numbers thus permitting a larger creel limit. The bag limit proposal will increase the current statewide limit from one fish to three, except in Toledo Bend Reservoir, where it will be two as it is on the Louisiana side of the lake.

Public comment will also be invited at the hearings concerning management of red drum, commonly called redfish. Department studies indicate an overharvest of reds in coastal waters, redfish are sport and commercial fishermen.

Aoudad sheep hunters in the Panhandle will have a longer season if a proposed 14-day season immediately prior to deer season is approved. The current season is seven days.

Archery hunting reconsidered to permit small game hunters topossess a shotgun in camp, car on on their person, provided they have shells containing shot no larger than number six.

Changes in deer huntregulations are minor compared to past years. In Edwards and Real Counties, the proposed bag limit includes does and spike bucks. as in most surrounding counties, and an October archery season is recommend d. The definition of a legal buck in Kendall County will also permit spike bucks in the bag limit.

Another recommendation, if approved, would require that anterless deer in Zavala County be taken by permit only.

People who choose to live in rural or sparsely-populated areas deserve the same quality of health care as their big-city neighbors. The problem is that not enough physicians and other health providers want to live in rural areas.

The problem concerns the entire health services system, both the public and the private sectors. For a number of years, the medical profession in Texas, through the Texas Medical Association, has looked for ways to encourage young doctors to locate their practices in small towns where they can serve the surround-

ing countryside. According to Dr. Ed Schmidt, the past president of the Texas Medical Association, practicing medicine in outlqing areas offers sev- care, and to end the feeleral advantages: "short travel time between places, no smog, no traffic problem, relative freedom from crime, a wholesome atmosphere" are some of the examples he cites.

On the other hand, Dr. Schmidt recognizes that most young doctors are not attracted to rural practice. He explains, "Some doctors feel that they may not be able to cope with the situation, since they've been trained in an academic environment with a large amount of backup from big hospitals and medical centers. They don't feel comfortable" in a more isolated environment, he says.

It's also true, according to the medical association, that doctors in rural areas work harder, often for longer hours, and generally have lower earnings than their big-city counterparts. Furthermore, the doctors -- and their spouses -- often miss the social life, entertainment, and other amenities of a metropolitan environment.

Dr. Mario Ramirez. who has based his practice in remote Roma for the past quarter of a century, knows first hand the problems of both poverty and rural areas. Until recently, he was not only the only physician in the area, but he operated his own hospital -- the only one

in the South texas county. Now there's a new hospital in Rio Grnde City, but there is still a shortage of skilled medical personnel.

Dr. Ramirez believes that the best solution is to help young people from the rural areas obtain an education in medicine. Hopefully, after they receive their education, they'll return to hometowns to their practice among the people they know best. This approach has been used with some success, but it's inherently a slow process -- and the young doctors don't always want to go back home once they've spent a few years in the bright lights of the big town.

According to Dr.

Schmidt, science and technology are beginning to help rural physicians provide better ing of isolation. New devices such as remote elemetry, closed-circuit television, and computers can be used to give the rural practitioner access to expert consultants and other sources of vital information even if it's thousands of miles away. Also, the expanded use of paraprofessional medical personnel, such as physician's assistants and paramedics, helps to relieve the rural doc tor's burdensome caseload.

Public health in Texas has made great strides in its effort to provide better service to people in the countryside. Although there are fulltime local health departments in only about 75 of the state's 254 counties, the local agencies now serve roughly 80 percent of the population.

## Pond Planning

Most fishermen dream of having their own private pond or lake where they can sneak down and catch a good size bass and this is possible if proper pond planning, construction, stocking and management practices are followed.

Recent surveys have shown that farm ponds and small lakes are used substantially by fishermen throughout the state. More than 23, 000,000 fishing recreation days or about 35 percent of the total fishing trips occur on these small bodies of water in Texas.

The objectives of any good management program are to control the species of fish present and to provide conditions for good fishing. The management practices which best achieve these objectives are 1) construction designed to avoid the introduction of unwanted fish by preventing overflow through the use of overflow tubes or water falls; 2) installation of a drain pipe; 3) preparaton of the pond bottom; 4) eradication of wild or native fish in the land basin prior to impoundment, and 5) proper planning and costruction of a pond or

Pond site selection is usually dictated by the land surrounding the site. Most ponds are dug to provide livestock with drinking water withfrom one-half to two-thirds of their area in shallow water where weeds grow unbelievably thick.

Shallow lakes soon become muddy or clogged with unwanted vegetation and access to the water is restricted to both cattle and angler.

The drainage area for the lake should furnish enough water to fill the pond and maintain a water level that does not fluctuate more than a few feet during the dry cess water runoff or overflow can destroy the pond.

The completion date of the pond should be planned and the most desirable time is early fall. Sunfish and catfish are available from hatcheries during this period and their release prior to stocking bass will allow good survival. Further, lower water temperatures during the fall prevent reproduction of native fish that might be present on the watershed or in the lake

Construction of the lake bed, spillway, drainpipe, and clearing timber an installing fish shelters should be discussed with the contractor, local Soil Conservation Service, neighbors, and other pond owners to assure that you receive the best results for the amount of work done on your pond.

# County Agricultural Agent growth appears--usual-Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

A Landscape Horticulture Short Course will be held Wednesday March 30, in Pampa at the Courthouse Annex Meeting room. There will be two sessions on Wednesday. The morning program will be from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and the evening program will be from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Both sessions will cover the same information. In the afternoon from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., specialists will be available for individual con-

Speakers for the programs include Everett Janne, Landscape Horticulturist and Dr. Richard Duble, Turfgrass Specialist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, head-quartered at College Station, Texas. Discussions will cover maintenance of the landscape including pruning and training or mowing, planting and transplanting, weed control, soil management to include fertilization, irrigation, conditioning and thatch control of turf. The discussions will cover the above subjects as reevidence and be repre-lated to trees, shrubs, flowers, indoor plants, and turfgrass.

The program is designed for the home gardener who is interested in learning how to care for the home landscape. The meetings are free and open to the public. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, ion or national origin.

Livestock that eat shin oak buds, flowers and leaves as new growth begins in the spring begin to lose weight and have a constant case of diarrhea. Calves are especially susceptible, and some have died from hemorrhagic enteritis and bloody diar-24 hours.

Signs of the toxin working within the animal begin with constipation, a decrease in appetite, planting of grains. frequent urination and smaller intakes of water. Death may occur after the animal has

A logical solution to help prevent cattle from eating the poisonous'shin oak is to feed them during the time the new ly three to four weeks. But this is not enough. A supplement of calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime) needs to be added to the feed mix to serve as an antidote to the poisoning. feed mix of 600 pounds of ground alfalfa, 1,080 pounds of cottonseed meal, 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of hydrated lime has proved effective as well as economical. There should be no substitutions in the mix.

Calves should receive the mix creep-fed while older animals need about 4 pounds daily, starting about a week before shin oak buds ap-

pear.

USDA has released the following information about foreign grain crop prospects for 1977 in the northern Hemis-

According to reports received as of early February, planting of winter grains in Western Europe, the Soviet Union, North Africa, and South A sia proceeded generally according to plan. The major exceptions are the United Kingdom, Portugal, and Italy, where seedings were limited by wet weather.

Ground moisture has generally been plentiful in all foreign, Northern Hemisphere grain areas, and crops developed well before the arrival of winter weather. In cold areas snow has provided generally good protective cover as well as added moisture.

A good 1977 grain harrace, color, sex, relig- vest will depend on continuing favorable weather during the rest of the season, including a good spring planting season. However, the prospect at present is for a large winter grain harvest next summer in Northern Hemisphere countries outside the U.S.A. Since yields from fall planted grains are usually bigger than from spring grains, the heavy fall seedings also favor a large total grain outturn in those countries in 1977.
