## Public Service Co. Plans Development Expansion Program

Southwestern Public Service Co. is embarking on an expanded industrial development program, it has been announced by W. L. Pearson, vice president and industrial manager for the electric company.

Larry S. Milner, who has been an industrial consultant with the Texas Industrial Commission, will become manager of industrial development at Southwestern Public Service, Pearson said.

Pearson also announced that an industrial development seminar for the company's managers will be held at the Southwest Service Center in Amarillo on Sept. 22.

Milner, who is a native of Brownwood, has been with the Texas Industrial Commission since 1964. Prior to that time, he was chamber of commerce manager at Cisco, and a staff member of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce.

The new industrial development manager attended Howard Payne College and graduated from the University of Texas. In addition, he has taken a number of post-graduate courses in area and industrial development.

"As far as electric power is concerned, and its role in industrial development, each of the communities that we serve starts off equal with any other. Because of our interconnected generation and transmission system, we can meet the electrical needs of any industries that are likely to locate in this area at any point in the area. What we hope to do now, with the addition of Milner to our staff and with the seminar and other activities that we are planning, is to provide for each community some additional manpower, informed manpower, to help it in its industrial development program," Pearson said.

Among the speakers at the Sept. 22 seminar will be Jack G. Springer, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; James A. Covell, economic development consultant for the General Telephone Company of the Southwest; Harry W. Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, and Roger K. Owen, area development manager for Southwestern Public Service Company. Milner will be the master of ceremonies for the program and also a speaker.

Attending the seminar from McLean will be James L. Thompson.

## Vehicle Inspection Period Begun for 1967

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced this week that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on Sept. 1 and will end on April 15, 1967, as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one-half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5,500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official vehicle inspection station sign displayed at each station.

Garrison suggested that if motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection will be eliminated.

In announcing the new inspection period, the public safety director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspection program began in 1951.

## Pre-Pay Coin Phones In Use in McLean

Pre-pay coin telephones went into operation in McLean on Sept. 9, according to George Newberry, telephone company manager.

Newberry said he felt that customers will find the new pre-pay telephones more convenient than the post-pay phones which have been in operation here for some time. He said the difference between the two types of phones is that in pre-pay the customer deposits a dime before he receives dial tone. On post-pay phones, the customer dials his call, then deposits a dime when he receives an audible signal letting him know that the called telephone had been answered.

## Telephone Service Interrupted by Careless Hunters

Each year, thousands of telephone conversations are interrupted by hunters who are negligent when shooting near telephone wires and cables, according to George Newberry, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager.

It only takes one careless shot to knock out vital local and long distance service for an entire area, he said, noting that many important calls may be missed while the telephone service is out.

## New Easter Seal Program to Start

A director for the new state-wide Easter Seal treatment and service program which will ensure rehabilitation services to all physically disabled Texans has been named by the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

George J. Zachariah, Big Spring, society president, announced appointment of Roy M. Campbell, 40, of Sioux City, Iowa, as director of care and treatment for the state-wide private health agency.

Campbell's work will include implementation of the new Easter Seal Treatment and Service program designed by Robert W. Milam, M. D., F. A. C. S., of McAllen, Texas, chairman of the Easter Seal Society's case service committee.

Campbell will also serve as consultant on treatment and service activities of treatment facilities and programs in Texas supported by Easter Seal funds and will direct case service work throughout Texas.

Zachariah pointed out that the Easter Seal Society, which helps support 24 treatment centers in Texas, does not duplicate services, but works closely with all private and public health agencies in seeing that needed treatments and services are provided for the physically disabled.

## Political 'Doctering' Is Dangerous

Practically every week of the year is dedicated to commemorating some activity or event. The week of Oct. 2 to 8 has been set aside as National Pharmacy Week, and during this time, the achievements of firms and industries that supply pharmaceuticals will be called to the attention of the public. It is ironic that the drug industry, which has led the way in developing a whole arsenal of life-saving drugs, has been subjected to a growing mountain of regulation instead of appreciation for its achievements.

It appears that these regulations are taking their toll in research and development. According to an authoritative source national introductions of new medicines by American drug companies declined sharply during the first six months of 1966 to the lowest point in 25 years.

Thirty-nine new products were introduced compared with 55 for the first half of 1955 and 154 for the same period five years ago.

The life-span of the average person has been appreciably lengthened in recent years, as a result of the massive research and development efforts of the drug industry. Its never-ending quest for the means of prolonging the miracle we call life is essential to medical progress. National Pharmacy Week is an appropriate time to be reminded of the dangers inherent in over-regulation and political doctering.

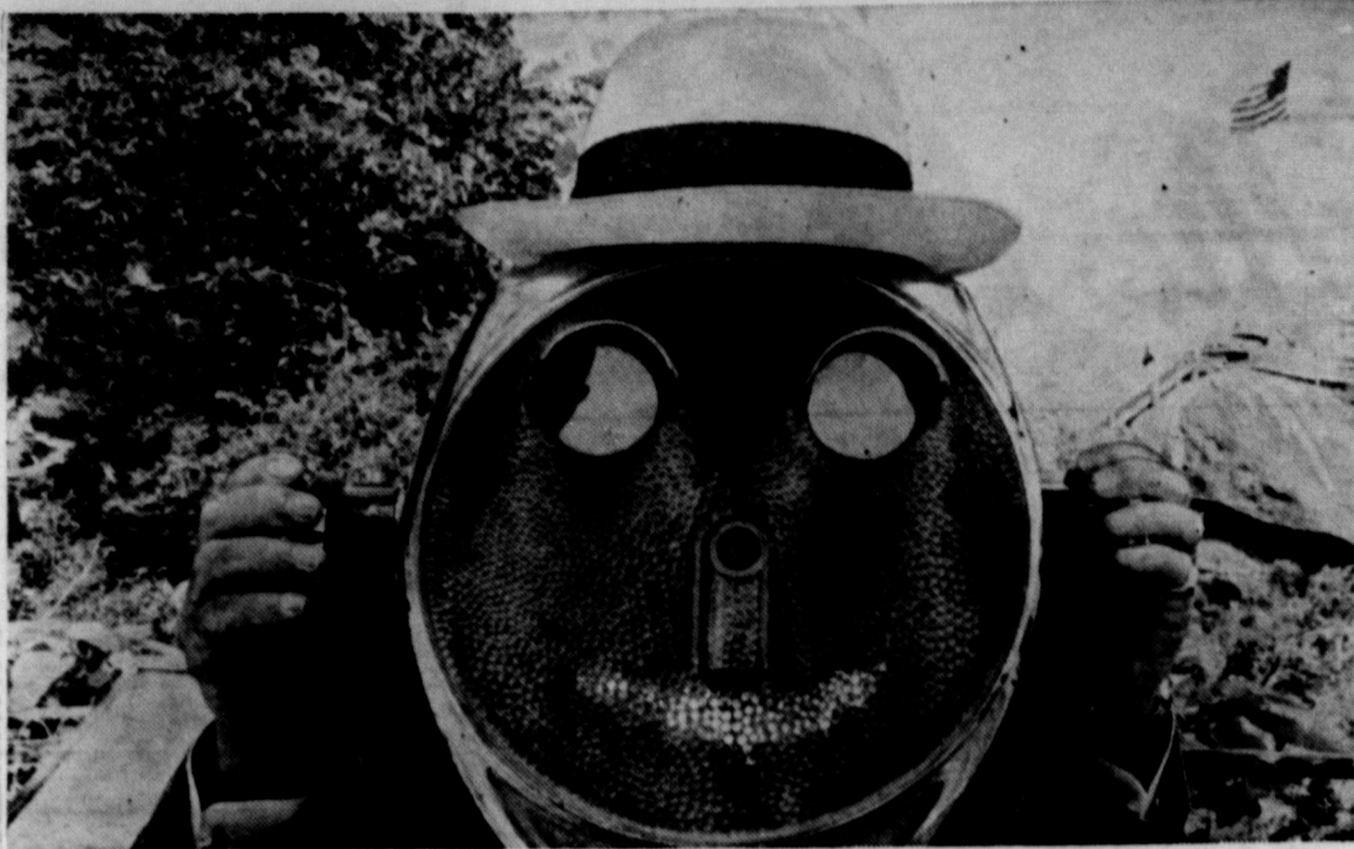

# State Capital NEWS

While most of the state welcomed the touch of cool rains last week, just all hopes of completing the Texas Water Plan by the time the Legislature opens Jan. 10.

The board will take from four months to a year before it acts on adoption of the preliminary Texas Water Plan due to the scores of suggestions received from a series of river basin hearings.

All suggestions must be screened even before the board can refer the plan to Texas Water Rights Commission for a public hearing on water rights involved.

A panel of five consultants, headed by Joe M. Kilgore, has gone over a list of proposed studies prepared by the board's planning staff. The panel will present their suggestions to the board at a meeting on Sept. 19. Mainly, these will cover which studies can be made within the money available to the agency during the fiscal year.

Another water study by the development board, to determine the occurrence and quality of underground water in Shackelford County, will begin in mid-September, Executive Director Joe G. Moore

announced. Richard Preston, a water development board geologist, will conduct the study, which will begin with an inventory and sampling of all domestic, municipal, livestock, irrigation and industrial wells in the county.

Study will then move on to the collection and compilation of data regarding depth, distribution and quality of underground water. Surface and shallow subsurface rock formations will also be examined as an aid in determining the depth and mode of occurrence of ground water requiring surface casing protection in oil and gas drilling operations.

Texas Water Rights Commission has approved an amendment to the permit held by Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston which would nearly triple the storage capacity of the proposed Wallisville Reservoir. But another public hearing will be called to consider the application, if the federal government does not complete its participation within a year.

**AG OPINIONS**—Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that when the county attorney in a county of 20,000 or more population wins

a suit and collects delinquent personal taxes, he may deduct a commission from the taxes. County attorney, however, must pay that commission into the county treasury for the officers' salary fund, Carr held in the opinion requested by Harris County Attorney Joe Resweber.

In another official opinion, Carr held that names of contributors and amounts of their donations to buy land for Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County do not have to be made public. Opinion affirmed the position of State Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will E. Odom who has declined to disclose sources of the park fund. Odom is fund trustee and receives donations for purchase of park land.

Attorney General concluded that park fund administration is not an operation of the PWC, and that it's up to private administrators to decide whether to announce names of various donors.

**HEAD START SLOWED**—Approximately 60 Head Start programs are being held up in five southwestern states because of Congressional delay in approving appropriations for the Office of

Economic Opportunity, Regional OEO Director Bill Crook reports. Delay, said Crook, is proving costly in both time and money to the agencies which had expected to correlate the pre-school readiness programs with the regular school term. In some cases, he stated, administrators are serving without pay, rather than hurt the continuity of the program.

First priority on funds allocated to southwest regional office is being given to those projects which are already in operation in the five states.

Crook's office is writing letters to local community action agencies and school districts, explaining that final action cannot be taken on their applications until Congress comes through.

**DEAN'S OPINION**—Page Keeton, dean of the University of Texas School of Law, strongly urges a complete recodification of Texas' 110-year-old penal code.

Keeton said the penal code had undergone "intermittent patching" through the years "without reference to the problem of maintaining a consistent system."

"The plain fact," he continued, "is that we have been 'getting along' with our present law. But I believe our administrators are doing a good job not because of but in spite of our present system of substantive criminal law."

Keeton recommends complete revision of the laws, rather than partial revision.
