\$130,767 Project Te Reguire 20 Work D For Completion

Texas State Highway Department will receive bids on March 18 for construction of a new, longer and wider bridge over Jo Draw on U. S. Highway 200 in Ozona. A notice to contractors on the project is published in this week's issue of The Stockman.

Reconstruction of the Johns Draw bridge became a nece for completion of the channel improvement part of the John Draw flood control project new in process of completion by the Sett Conservation Service. The new bridge design will conform to the new channel to be cut through the town of Ozona as a further precaution in controlling flood waters of the sometimes rampaging wash.

Included in the Highway Departments' call for bids is also widening work on the Gurley draw bridge just east of the city limits on the same highway. It is presumed that this structure will merely be widened without completely rebuilding as is the plan for the Johnson draw structure.

It is estimated that about three months will be required to complete the Johnson draw bridge. The present bridge is to be wrecked and a new one installed. While the work is under way, traffic on busy Highway 290 will be re-routed to a low water crossing over the draw two blocks north of the bridge. Traffic will be turned at the Williams-Taliaferro corner and will return to the highway at the Silver Spur Motel corner.

Our Own Export-Import Bank has loaned much U. S. money to foreign nations, and there are many who feel this program is more worthy than the outright grants to foreign nations. True, the money is for the most part Government money, but it is at least offered on an interest-bearing loan basis and the return has paid for the administration of the program, plus some surplus.

When nations apply for loans, the Export-Import Bank officials first ask private sources of capital if they want to make the loan. Often one source will handle the loan, or several private capital sources will combine to cover the loan.

During the 24-year history of the Export-Import Bank it has authorized loans totaling \$9 billion. Only 1-20th of one per cent of the loans due have been lost, and any banker will tell you that's a good record. We currently have on our books loan and authorizations in


