The Iraan High School girls volleyball team roared from behind in the second half Saturday night to down the Ozona team 27 to 18 and repeat as champions of the annual Ozona tourney.

Ft. Stockton had already swept into all opposition in the Junior to a repeat of its title by swamp-High division.

A large crowd saw the finals Saturday night as Ozona made its bid for the title. The Ozona team, sparked by the play of Carolyn Mayfield and Gwynell Walker, held a two point lead at the intermission but managed to score only four points in the second half to fifteen for Iraan.

Barnhart won the consolation title in the high school division while Big Lake copped the honors in the Junior High division.

An all tourney team selected by the coaches included Carolyn Mayfield and Gwynell Walker of Ozona, Genelle McColla of Eldorado Sue Griffin, Barnhart, Betty Jean Sorrell of London, and Toby McAnally and Donna Crane of the champion Iraan team. Miss Donna Crane was also presented with the most outstanding player award.

Ozona won its way into the finals with victories over Eldorado and London while Iraan conquered Barnhart and Big Lake before reaching the championship game. Barnhart after losing to Iraan defeated Achery and Eldorado to get the consolation award.

Ft. Stockton crushed Iraan, Big Lake, and Ozona to win its title while Big Lake, after losing to Fort Stockton in the first round, defeated Iraan and Menard to gain the consolation prize.

The men rushed back to Ozona to the Crockett County Hospital where Mr. Laxson was pronounced dead. Other men in the car thought Mr. Laxson was asleep until they arrived at the rig and attempted to rouse him.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the Church of Christ in Ozona. Services were conducted by Frank Lilly, pastor. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with Cody Funeral Home in charge.

Junction Captures Ozona Relays For 5th Time In Row

Ozona Lions In Second Place; Vargas High Individual Scorer

One record fell Saturday as Junction captured its fifth straight victory in the Ozona relays by outdistancing the host Lions 61 1/2 to 40 in what proved to be a two team match.

The one record bettered in the meet was set in the discus where Iraan's big Don Jacobson shattered the existing record with a 145 foot throw.

The old record set in 1955 by Frank Wallace of Menard had been 137 feet 4 1/2 inches.

The host Lions, picking up early points in the field and short distance events, jumped into a quick lead which faded as the meet drew toward conclusion with Junction drawing away rapidly at the end.

Individual point leader in the meet was Ozona's Bobby Vargas who garnered 9 1/2 points to lead the Lions. Vargas scored a first in the broad jump, tied for second in the high jump, ran one leg of Ozona's winning 880 yard relay and also a leg on the 440 yard relay which placed second.

Vargas was closely followed by Bud Scheafer of Junction who accounted for 9 and 1/4 points for his team with a first place in the high jump, a place in the broad jump and a leg in two relays.

Jerry Jacobs counted seven points for Ozona by winning the 120 high hurdles and running a leg on two of the three relay teams the Lions had in action.

Mark White gave the Lions a second place in the high hurdles and Billy Bob Holden added a second place in the low hurdles.

Jake Young took top honors in the shot with a toss of 48'4" and Cico Cervantez won third place in the discus.

David Sikes placed second in the pole vault and Ronnie Paulk tied for third and fourth place.

The Lion 880-yard relay team won the event by edging Junction. The Lion team was made up of Bobby Vargas, Jerry Jacobs, Tony Parker, and Bobby Sutton, the same four ran the 440 and lost by a narrow margin to Junction.

The Lions lost ground in the 100 and 220 yard dashes where Junction won five places to none for the Lions. Ozona's fine freshman sprinters, Jim Doran and Tony Parker showed well but were not up to beating Junction's senior team.

Cattle Raisers Assn. Membership Increased 1000 During Past Year

San Antonio, Texas March 17 — Nearly a thousand ranchmen became new members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association during 1957. Charles A. Stewart, secretary — general manager of the world's largest regional cattle organization, reported to the Association's board of directors here today.

The Board met at the Gunter Hotel prior to the formal opening of the 81st annual convention on Tuesday. Registration during the day pointed toward a record attendance. Early estimates of visitors to the Alamo City have been between 1,700 and 1,900.

Current membership is placed as the fifth largest in the group's history with a new gain of 113 members over last year's increase. The exact number of new members in 1957 was 958.

"The drought years hurt our membership, of course, reflected a loss of 355 members who were forced out of the cattle business, but we have held ground remarkably well under the circumstances," Stewart said. "Fewer members dropped out in 1957 than during the previous two years, indicating more optimism are realizing the value of the Association's work. Our future prospects are excellent."

The Lions could place three men in the high hurdles as Mark White and Joe McMullan continue to show improvement and Jerry Jacobs is listed among those with the better times in the state.

Bobby Sutton and Billy Bob Holden will be strong contenders in the low hurdles. Holden won second place last week and Sutton apparently had fourth place when he tripped and fell on the last hurdle.

Jake Young will be favored in the shot and will stand a chance of placing in the discus if his form improves this week.

Finals in the Sonora meet in the past have been held at night and are scheduled for that time again this year even though the weather lately has not been promising.

Temple Firm Low Bidder On Bridge On Johnson Draw

New Structure On 290 240 Foot Long; Widen Gurley Bridge

The State Highway Department Tuesday received a low bid of \$67,399 for construction of a new, wider and longer bridge over Johnson Draw in Ozona and for widening of the bridge over Gurley draw east of Ozona, it was announced by the Department of Austin.

Low bidder was R. T. Farr Construction Co. of Temple. Robert A. McCulloch, senior resident engineer for the State Highway Department at Sonora, in charge of the local project, estimated that work would get under way on the bridge construction within the next three weeks to a month. Final award of the contract and issuing of work orders must await investigation of the contractors and his equipment.

The present bridge on U.S. Highway 290 across Johnson draw in Ozona will be wrecked and a completely new bridge installed. The new bridge will conform to the flood control channel improvement work to be done under the Soil Conservation Service Johnson Draw watershed control project. This channel work probably will get under way as soon as the new bridge is completed.

The new Johnson draw bridge will be 247 feet in length, consisting of eight 30-foot spans, and with a 44-foot roadway and four-foot sidewalks on each side, for a total overall width of 52 feet. It is to be supported by piers. Approximately three months will be required for completion of the structure, Mr. McCulloch said.

While the present bridge is being wrecked and the new one is under construction, traffic will be detoured to a low water crossing north of the bridge site.

The bridge over Gurley draw east of Ozona will be widened nine feet on each side from the present width. Traffic will continue to use the bridge while this work is under way.

"THE SIMPLE RIGHTS OF MAN"

Cynical questions arose with the curtain on Act II of the Senate Select Committee probe into "improper activities in the labor and management field" — the unending, four year war of Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers on Kohler Co. of Wisconsin.

Washington was being asked, for instance, whether Robert Kennedy might be serving as counsel to the Senate Committee or to the UAW forces. As a devoted henchman and disciple of Brother John, it is understandable that it might be difficult for Counsellor Kennedy to disassociate his public duty from the private ambitions of Senator Kennedy. And with Walter Reuther as both the personal embodiment of the UAW and an acknowledged archangel of the Democratic cause, there has been some reason to fear that only the Republicans on the committee were free to investigate objectively.

Within recent days the august New York Times observed editorially that: "Personalities and politics have taken over and seriously threaten the committee's usefulness." But that was before the arrogance and evasions and admissions of UAW witnesses got to be too much for even Democra-

tic stomachs.

In a colloquy with UAW Secretary-Treasurer Emil Mazey over "belly-to-back" picketing in front of the Kohler gates, and who said this was exercising "the right to protect our jobs." Chairman McClellan declared: "In a land of freedom, when a man wants to work, he has a right to go in that plant and work." And when Witness Mazey persisted, comparing the UAW action with Congress declaring war, the Chairman snorted: "We're not talking about war. We're talking about the simple rights of man."

With his declaration on the right to work, Chairman McClellan brought the Kohler investigation down to earth and made it clear to his committee that they are dealing here with the rights and dignity of all Americans and not with political advantage. His words recall a letter the Senator wrote recently to a constituent down home in Arkansas, and which was published in the Arkansas Recorder, of Little Rock.

"In going into the Kohler strike

which involves Mr. Reuther's union, the UAW," wrote Senator McClellan, "the Committee will place emphasis on two aspects of it: violence and secondary boycotts... we will expose whatever we find wrong with the union or with the Kohler company and which comes within the Committee's jurisdiction."

He said further: "I propose to treat Mr. Reuther just like I have all the others."

And we think he will, too!

TAXES — ROOT OF THE EVIL

Almost overnight a rather mystifying change in attitude toward the "recession" has occurred in Congress and in the White House. As nearly as it can be pin-pointed, it dates from the return of Vice President Nixon on a mysterious trip to New York — said to have been made on his own initiative, and in the course of which he is reported to have set at the feet of another great general.

Following President Eisenhower's letter to Republican Congressional leaders outlining new spending and earlier spending on projects to which the Government is already committed but specifically condemning such "pump-priming schemes" as the Rooseveltian PWA

and WPA — Vice President Nixon declared for tax-cutting. The Democratic-led Congress had been for pump-priming.

He would rather, he said, "go down the tax-cutting road than the spending road." He would cut personal taxes, business taxes and excises in order to put "money in the hands not only of customers but in the hands of investors and job-givers." At once a rash of new tax-reduction bills broke out on Capitol Hill, and the White House declared for a tax cut — not right now, but later if needed.

Thus, a tax cut appears more likely than not and it becomes important to consider what kind would do the most good. There are bills that could only be hatched in an election year, "hand-out" measures that would boost the deficit more than the economy.

And there is the Sadlak-Herlong bill, a carefully thought out measure that would reduce all income taxes, personal and corporate by a minimum of 25 percent in five years. It provides the safe and sane reform of the tax structure to give business a green light, to give individuals relief and to provide the Treasury with more money by stimulating business activity.

Spending by people and business, made possible by a sane tax cut, will restore the economy faster and more constructively than spending by Government.

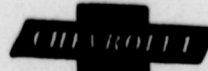

When you are fishing for the big ones it is man against fish. If you land the fish you are the best. After you get him on the stringer find a new location and start all over again.

Will it work? Try it yourself. Hawaiian Lures — Twenty-five years ago a fisherman in Ohio by the name of Fred Arbogast was testing out lures to see what effect they would have on catching fish. There was something about a Hawaiian skirt that intrigued him, so he made a skirt for an original lure and called it the Hawaiian Wiggler.

It didn't take long for this lure to catch on. Every man wanted one in his tackle box because it was a bass killer. Since that time Fred has gone on to his reward, but his Hawaiian Wiggler lives on. More than 14 million of them have been sold.

Gar Fishing — It won't be too long until gar fishing will be coming along again. Over near Madisonville they are catching some of these big tackle busters already. Recently two were taken in Blue Lake on the east side of the Trinity about 25 miles northeast of Madisonville.

One of them weighed 118 pounds and the other 74, with more than a score of smaller ones.

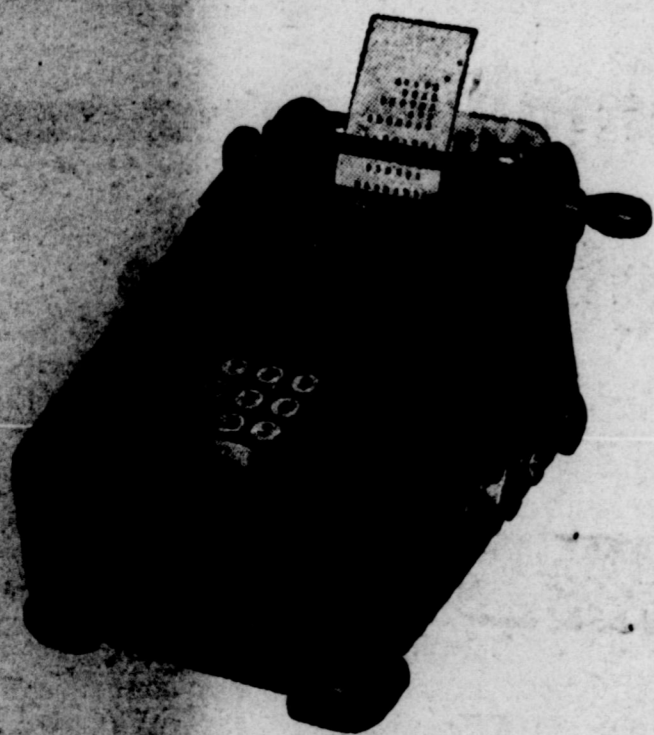

Garden Club Reminders

Lawn fertilizers should be applied in early spring and again in mid-summer for best results. Apply 4 to 5 pounds to each 100 square feet of lawn and water deeply. Never apply fertilizer to wet grass blades or fail to water after application. Always water your lawn deeply so that grass roots will grow down deeper and deeper and come into contact with more soil area. This makes for drought resistance. Water in the early morning if possible so that grass and bordering plants have plenty of time to dry before night-fall thus preventing many fungus attacks. Aerate your lawn with spading fork or power machine if possible.

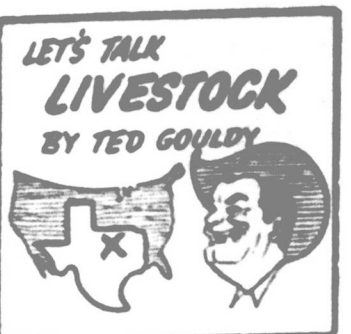

Increased Livestock Supply Finds Very Strong Demand

FORT WORTH — Stocker demand remained very broad and prices were stronger again, despite a 20% increase in the cattle and calf offering at Fort Worth Monday. Slaughter interests were again faced by a very tight supply situation, and were forced to yield stronger prices on their portion of the supply. Anything suitable to go back to pasture was priced beyond the reach of slaughter interests. The somewhat more open weather of the past weekend enabled stockmen to expand shipments to market.

Comparative prices: Mature steers were virtually lacking in the run. Good and choice slaughter yearlings cashed at \$35 to \$38, and medium and lower grades cashed at \$16 to \$24.

Fat cows cashed at \$18 to \$20.00, and canners and cutters sold from \$12 to \$18. Bulls brought \$18 to \$21.75.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$24 to \$28, and common and medium offerings cleared at \$17.50 to \$24. Culls sold at \$14 to \$17. Good stocker steer calves and lightweight stocker yearlings sold from \$23 to \$28.25, some around 550-pound yearlings at \$28.25. Heifer calves of good grades sold around \$24 to \$26. Some good to choice 350-pound calves sold at \$29.

Largest Offering of Year Arrived in Sheep Division

There were about 7,000 sheep and lambs in the run at Fort Worth Monday as clearing weather last week permitted some expanded movement to market. A larger portion of the run was new crop milk fat lambs, and prices were firm on them. Old crop lambs and yearlings

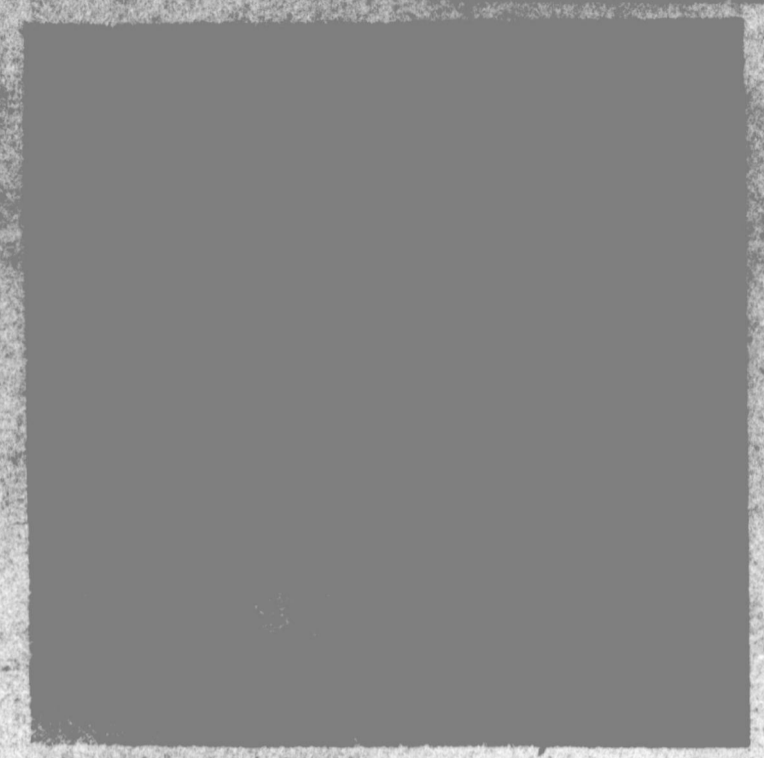

of unemployment of insured workers of any state in the nation — 2.6 per cent here compared to 7.9 per cent nationally.

On Plus Side — Other business barometers tend to bolster the view that Texas' economy is weathering the squally weather well.

First 1958 reports from the Bureau of Business Research on overall business activity showed the January index up eight per cent from December, one per cent from January, 1957.

Texas Banking Commission's spring call for condition of Texas banks brought reports of hefty increases in money on deposit. Some cities showed drops in bank deposits, but in general they were up with some cities setting records or near records.

BBR's report notes that "although evidence of recession is plain, the strength of the state's economy is shown by its stubborn resistance to further decline."

A small increase in building activity in early 1958 may be the forerunner of a general revival of the home building industry this year, says BBR.

On the state's No. 1 economic headache — sagging oil production — a BBR spokesman says competition of cheap foreign oil could "flatten out" Texas' growth curve. Suggested antidote: bring in other industries with strong growth potential to "fill in the gap."

Governor To Battle Imports — Gov. Price Daniel has asked Washington to reduce oil imports. He has presented evidence gathered by the state oil import commission on how Texas' economy is hurt by cutbacks in production. Governors of other producing states have joined him in asking that imports be limited to the 1954 level.

Though many economists predict that the problem of foreign oil is here to stay, Texas officials hope to gain at least enough relief to get the stymied domestic industry going again.

growth, having both issues come up at the same time makes each seem worse. New tax talk, never popular, is even less so with people feeling the chill wind of a cut in income.

Barring an unexpectedly swift upturn in the economy, the twin issues will break through the middle of next summer's political campaigns. It'll be particularly rough campaigning for those who have to get on one side or the other of the taxation fence.

Some legislative candidates are already being asked, "If there has to be a new tax, what kind will you vote for?" Some say they haven't decided what they'd vote for, but will say what they'd vote against. Others say they're making no decision until after the State Tax Study Commission completes its reports.

Lower, But Growing — Latest report by the Tax Study Commission shows some of the possible directions in which Texas may have to move to get additional tax money.

It notes that: Besides Texas only two other states are without either

a general sales tax, personal income tax or corporate income tax.

Texans in 1956 paid lower state and local taxes than the average for other states — \$129.50 per capita for Texas compared with \$157.50 per capita national average.

Rate of tax increase for Texas has been much faster than U. S. average. Texas rate of increase from 1953-56 was 23.4 per cent; national average, 19.4 per cent.

Commission's next report will deal with future spending needs, says Sen. William S. Fly, chairman.

Unemployment Up Again — Texas Employment Commission reports claims for unemployment compensation at a new high.

There had been a slight drop for the previous week. But latest weekly tabulations showed TEC paid out \$1,434,448, compared to \$996,464 for the same week a year ago. Number of persons filing claims was 82,576, almost double the 42,705 who filed a year ago.

Even so, most recent nationwide figures show Texas to be a highly favored area. Labor Department's Bureau of Employment Security says that Texas has the lowest rate
