A contract for 0.000 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 200 in Crockettt County has been a-warded to a Temple, Texas firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

R. T. Farr submitted the low bid of \$67,399.81 on the project Construction of a new bridge located at Johnson Draw in Ozona and widening of Gurley Draw east of Ozona, a distance of 0.069 miles on U. S. 290, is expected to take 90 working days, according to J. A. Snell, District Highway Engin-




