Ozona Track Men Gain 5th Place In State Track Meet

First Time For Ozona Team To State; 18 Points Scored

The Ozona High School track team scored 18 points and finished fifth in the B division of the State Track and Field meet held in Austin last week.

Bobby Vargas, Jerry Jacobs and Jake Young captured points for the Ozona team which made its first appearance in the meet. Junction finished with 13 points and Eldorado had eight in the meet with White Oak capturing first place honors in Class B.

The meet itself was one of the most outstanding of recent years with records falling in all divisions of competition.

The oldest standing record fell Saturday in class 2A when an Amarillo vaulter cleared 13 feet 2 inches to eclipse a 13 feet 1 inch record set in 1923.

Ozona scored early in the meet as Bobby Vargas took second place in the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 5 3/4 inches. Coming back Saturday Jake Young won fourth place in the shot with a toss of 49 feet 5 inches and then Jerry Jacobs placed third in the high hurdles to give Ozona all of its points and a temporary lead.

While other teams may have encountered the same difficulty, the Lions were knocked out of a chance at more points when Jerry Jacobs ran a 19.8 low hurdles but finished third and failed to make the finals even though a number of others who ran 20's and 21's in slower heats got into the final events.

Ozona's Jacobs was the only boy to qualify in the hurdles who was not a senior.

This was the first year that Ozona has been represented at the state meet in many years and perhaps ever and with the nucleus of a strong team returning next year, Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere are looking forward to next season.

The 440-yard relay team failed to make the finals but ran very well and all members of the team will be back next season.

The object of training all members of the CAP squadron in the use and operation of this radio, is so that there will be a group of people in the community, any one of whom will be able to use the radio in case of a disaster or emergency.

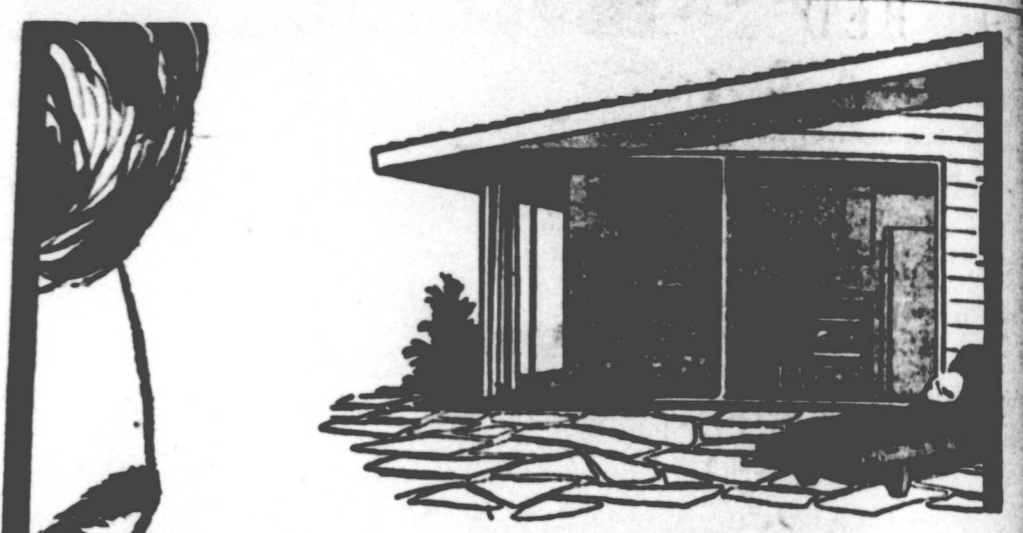

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, May 9, 1929

Fear that gripped Crockett county ranchmen that a drouth had taken its hold on this section was allayed Wednesday night by a drenching rain that amounted to a little more than an inch of moisture. The rain was accompanied by a heavy hail storm. The hail stones were small, however, and did little damage.

Miss Allyne Friend, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry J. Friend, was awarded second place in the state Clothing Contest held at the Baker hotel in Dallas last week. Miss Friend's work, a tailored garment, won second in competition with several hundred entries from all sections of the state.

"Nine-Fingered-Buddy" Sanders wanted in Cherokee, Okla., for robbery with firearms in connection with robbery of a bank there, and also jail breaking, is being held in the Upton county jail pending arrival of Oklahoma officers. Sanders was arrested in El Masho, boom oil town on the western edge of Crockett county, no longer a "booming" oil town but a haven for down-and-outers in the world of oil field hangers-on. The arrest was made by Sheriff W. S. Willis of Crockett county, Sheriff Bud Barfield of Pecos county and Ranger Rooney.

Fourteen civil cases and four criminal cases were disposed of by the district court in session here this week. The week's session made a fair clean-up of the docket.

"If there ever was a town that needed a new school building Ozona needs one." John L. Bishop, superintendent of the Ozona schools, told members of the Lions Club in an important talk at the weekly luncheon Tuesday. "Conditions are deplorable as a result of crowded conditions and something must be done before long if the local schools are to function

efficiently," Mr. Bishop said.

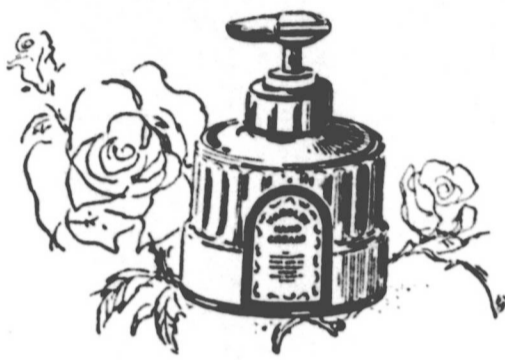

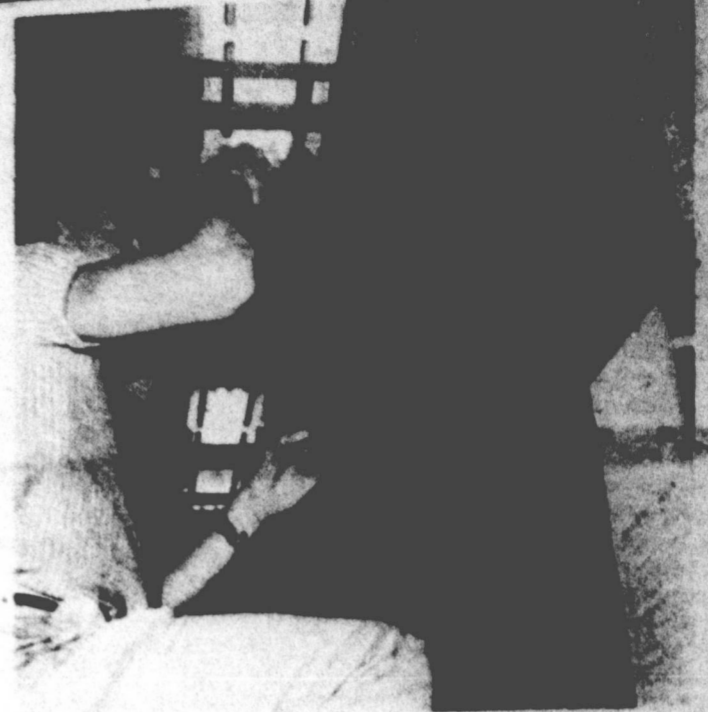

Jimmy Chamness was named outstanding boy.

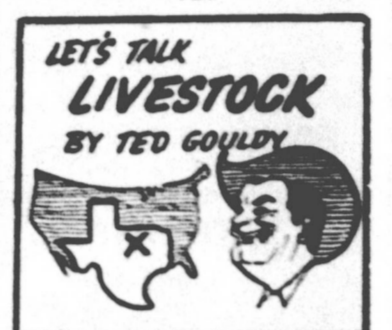

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Spring Lamb Movement Largest in 23 Months

FORT WORTH — Texas movement of lambs reached a new high mark for the season at Fort Worth Monday when well over 17,000 sheep arrived. The number was the largest in 23 months here. Order buyers and shipping interests were active from the start and trade got under way on a steady to mostly 50 cents lower market, compared to the extremely high close of last week. After these orders had been pretty well filled the trade eased off, and as the clearance proceeded most sales were fully 50 cents to \$1 lower.

Old crop lambs scaling around 100 pounds or less moved readily, but heavier yearling lambs were mostly \$1 lower and slow at the sharp decline. Relatively few strictly choice Spring lambs were in the offering, the best Springers sold from \$21.50 to \$22.50, the higher prices usually limited to off-market packer sales. A few choice handy-weight old crop lambs sold at \$18 and \$18.50, the top to shipper outlets, most of the better old crop lambs ranged around \$17.50 to \$18 and down, heavies \$16 and below.

Good and choice milk fat lambs cashed at \$21 to \$22.50, and cull to medium lambs sold from \$17 to \$20.50. Stocker and feeder Spring lambs cashed at \$18 to \$20. Good and choice old crop yearlings lambs sold from \$17 to \$18, a few \$18.50. Cull to medium old crops sold from \$12 to \$16.50. Stocker wether yearlings sold from \$16 down, and a few yearling ewes drew \$18 to

2,200 Cattle & Calves Uneven, Grassers Weak

In the cattle division at Fort Worth Monday stocker and feeder classes and bulls sold fully steady. However, on cows, slaughter calves and fed steers and heifers the trade was highly uneven. Shippers and order buyers representing independents and off-market packers took supplies at generally steady prices in active fashion. However, later sales were inclined lower and the bidding displayed an extremely wide division of opinion among the buyers as to values. Some cattle and calves sold at prices which were dollars above other packer bids.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$25 to \$28.25, while common and medium offerings sold from \$16 to \$24. Fat cows cashed at \$18 to \$21.50, and canners and cullers sold from \$13 to \$18, a few strong weights above \$18. Bulls cashed at \$17 to \$22.

Good and choice slaughter calves bulked at \$25 to \$28.50, a few to \$28 and above. Common and medium slaughter calves sold from \$17.50 to \$24, and culls cashed at \$14 to \$17.50.

Good and choice stocker steer calves drew \$26 to \$31, and stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$27.25 downward in most sales, a few lightweights to \$28 and above. Feeder steers ranged from \$27 downward, some 800-pound cattle at that figure. Replacement cows cashed at \$19 to \$22.

Casing Being Run In Crockett Wildcat; Test For W.R. Baggett Ranch

G. E. Kadane & Sons, Wichita Falls, Edwin L. Cox, Dallas, and Dan Auld, Kerrville, were running casing, size and seat unavailable, at the No. 1 Margaret H. Smith, in 4-333-L&SV, Crockett County wildcat eight miles northeast of Iraan, for completion attempt in the Wolfcamp.

Production was indicated on two drillstem tests. Gas surfaced in six minutes and oil in 45 minutes on a test between 6,375-6,405 feet. Reversed out was a full string of oil down to four joints below the test tool. In the bottom four joints was 25 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 95 feet of salt water.

A previous test between 6,205-20 feet recovered 558 feet of gas and 35 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Durham Drilling Co. Inc., Midland, will drill a 2,000-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett County, 8 1/2 miles northwest of Ozona. It will be the No. 1 W. R. Baggett.

Location, on a 702.2-acre lease, is 2,064.9 feet from the south and 916.7 feet from the west lines of 43-OP-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,534 feet.

It is an east offset to Standard & Fryer 1 Baggett, an 8,212-foot Eilenburger failure abandoned Feb. 18, 1951.
