Strain Brothers, Inc., of San Angelo, were low bidders on the last flood detention dam in the series of seven which the Soil Conservation Service and Crockett county are building to control flood waters on the Johnson Draw watershed when bids were opened by the Commissioners Court here

Monday. Strain Brothers, contractors on the dam at Site No. 6, largest in the series just south of the Big Lake road at the north edge of Ozona and nearest of the dams to the city, bid \$198,528.30 on the dam at Site No. 4 on the W. R. Baggett ranch. Ford Allen, who supervised construction of the dam at Site 6, will be in charge of the construction when it gets under

Three other contractors submitted bids on the Site 4 project. Roland L. Scherer of Weatherford bid \$200,560.69; Condon-Cunningham, Inc., of Dallas bid \$218,139.64. Coricana bid \$229,422.60.
