## Ozona's Girl Cagers Play Comstock Friday; Lost Opener Last Fri.

The Ozona High School girls basketball team will open its home season at Davidson Gym Friday night with A and B games with Comstock. The first game is slated to begin at 7 p. m. and the main event at 8 p. m.

The Ozona girls opened their season in Barnhart Tuesday night and absorbed two losses to the strong Barnhart team by scores of 60 to 13 in the A game and 40 to 18 in the B game.

While the losses were one sided the results were not unexpected for several reasons. Ozona's team is made up chiefly of sophomores and freshmen many of whom have never seen a game let alone play in one and the job of taking a squad of such vast inexperience and trying to mould a basketball team is staggering.

In addition to the ills besetting Ozona's team, Barnhart has one of its best teams in years and has been rated some chance of getting into the state race this year.

Friday night's contest might be a bit better for the locals since Comstock is also just getting its program started and is in no way a match for Barnhart.

Beverly Alford led the Ozona scoring in the A game with 6 points and Janie Lara had 4 but that was scarcely worth mentioning in comparison to Sue Griffin's 25 and Janet Perry's 22 point efforts.

In the B game a former Ozona girl did most of the damage to the locals' cause. Mary Sue Trotter scored 23 points and Ozona's Charlotte Johnigan had 8 and Molly Sue Richardson 6.

Starting for Ozona Friday night will probably be Diane Phillips, Jerrie Coupe and Beverly Alford at forwards with Glenda Friend, Frances Childress and Donnell Carnes at guards. Janie Lara might break into the lineup by Friday, however.

All 16 Ozona girls got into the two games in Barnhart and Miss Barbara Ann Tuggle, the girls' coach, said Wednesday morning that she felt every girl did the best she knew how and hustled all the way which was all any team could do.

### New Coach Dozier Faces Paucity of Players With Experience

Ozona High School Basketball Coach Brooks Dozier announced Monday that a scheduled basketball game between Ozona and Crane in Crane had been cancelled.

Ozona has not begun basketball practice due to the extended football season and Coach Dozier does not plan to call the boys out for the 1958-59 season until Monday, December 8.

Only three regulars from the 1958 team will be returning and the present status of two of the boys is in doubt. The two starters are guard David Sikes and forward Jerry Jacobs, both of whom have been out of football for several weeks due to knee injuries that have been slow in healing.

Loss of either or both of the senior lettermen would be a severe blow to Ozona's basketball hopes to say the least of the matter. Sikes returned to limited action against Plains in the regional contest and may be well on his way to mending but the high scoring Jacobs remains a question.

Bobby Sutton, a stellar athlete and regular guard on last year's team, is the third letterman returning for the first year under Coach Dozier's direction.

Squadmen expected to lend help and battle for the remaining positions are Johnny Cooper, Jim Williams, Johnny Jones, and Don Powers all of whom saw a great deal of action on Ozona's B team last winter.

Jimmy Freeman, a fine freshman prospect who had to drop out of basketball early last season due to illness, will head a group of able athletes who will be out, even though shy of much experience.

Coach Dozier will also get last year's highly successful Jr. High team who are expected to form a strong freshman unit this winter.

The season will mark the first change in Ozona's basketball coach in a decade. The new coach, Brooks Dozier, is a graduate of Howard Payne and had coached for seven years before coming to Ozona from 3A Beville this fall.

## Bill Jacoby To Get State Award At Dallas Meet

### Ozona Lad To Address S-GRA Convention on Range Management

Bill Jacoby, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Jacoby of Ozona, winner of the first statewide awards in 4-H Range Result Demonstration program, sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assn., will deliver a four-minute talk on range management and benefits the 4-H range study program before the annual convention of the TS&GRA in Dallas next Wednesday morning.

Young Jacoby will be in Dallas to receive the Association's award of a medal, an engraved belt buckle and a scholarship to the annual Range Camp which is held each summer. Another young West Texan, Reynolds Lee Foster of Sterling county will also be at the Dallas meeting to receive similar awards.

Objectives of the program are to give 4-H youth an understanding and appreciation of range management; to stimulate the use of proper range management practices now and in the future and to encourage closer working relationships in range management conservation between youth and adults.

Bill is completing his seventh year of 4-H club work. He has won many honors in lamb feeding but his outstanding successes have been in grass and range judging and in activities closely related to work done in range management result demonstration program.

In addition to his outstanding record as a feeder and judge, Bill has collected and mounted 175 range plants and has assisted with the planting, maintenance and record keeping on 20 different grasses being handled in a nursery.

## Midland Operator To Drill Shallow Wildcat 8 Miles West of Ozona

Ross Brunner of Midland filed application to drill the No. 1 Alma Cox, a 1,300-foot wildcat in Crockett County, eight miles west of Ozona.

Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 330 feet from the south line and 590 feet from the west line of 5-ST-John H. Gibson.

Fred Turner, Jr., of Midland filed application to drill the No. 2-BB Shannon as a 3/4-mile southeast offset to his No. 1-BB Shannon, virtually assured Queen sand strike in Crockett County, five miles southeast of Iran. Scheduled depth is 2,100 feet.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south line and 1,080 feet from the west line of 22-4-Archer csl.

Operator was installing a pump at the No. 1-BB Shannon, that earlier swabbed 56 barrels of new oil in 10 hours from open hole between 1,923-46 feet.

## Two Fire Calls In Ozona Night Result In Only Minor Damage

Ozona Volunteer Firemen answered two calls here Monday night but only minor damage was reported in the two fires.

An early evening run was made to the Ozona Drug where insulation on a furnace duct was smoking. The fire was quickly extinguished with no damage.

Early Tuesday morning, the insulation on an overheated furnace motor in the home of Mrs. Tom Smith resulted in a run by the department. Acrid smoke from the burning insulation filled the house but only minor damage to the motor was reported.

## Queen Sand Strike Assured In Crockett

A Queen sand strike virtually was assured in Crockett County with the swabbing of 56 barrels of new oil in 10 hours at Fred Turner Jr., Midland, No. 1-BB Shannon, in 22-4-Archer csl, five miles southeast of Iran.

Operator fractured open hole between 1,923-46 feet with 40,000 gallons of water, recovered load and then swabbed the above amount of new oil.

The prospect is 1 1/4 miles east of oil production in the Noelke field and one mile southwest of gas production.

## Lions Bow Out In Blaze Of Glory In Two-Point Defeat

### Plains Cowboys Plus Men In Stripes Stop Dist. 8 Champs

The Ozona Lions bowed out of the 1958 state football race last Friday night when they dropped a heart-breaking 20 to 18 game to the Plains Cowboys in Big Spring.

The Lions put on their best exhibition of football of the season and outplayed the winners in every department of the game except for making the extra points.

The Lions led the Cowboys 74 yards in yardage gained, had the first downs tied at 12 each, and led on vital penetrations 6 to 5, but the failure on the part of the Lions to put across any of their extra point tries spelled defeat.

A fumble on the one-foot line, two pass interceptions in the end zone, and two touchdowns called back were but a few of the breaks that gave the Cowboys the win and sent the Lions out of the state race in defeat, but not without honor.

The Lion effort was by no means a one-man show as Jim Freeman, B. B. Ingham, and Diz Reeves along with Billy Bob Holden all turned in great performances, but none the less it was Bobby Sutton's great effort as tailback of a dynamite-loaded spread formation that carried the Lions to one assault after another on the Plains goal and left the defense bewildered with his run, pass options.

The Ozona all-state candidate ran on 21 occasions for 228 yards, scored two touchdowns, passed for 64 yards more, with one going for a T. D. and had two more touchdowns passes called back and still another dropped.

Plains for its part had a fine team with some great athletes of its own, but as far as the Lions were concerned much of the credit for the win would have to go to Joe Don Marrow a 180 pound bull of a back who ran with the ball 29 times and gained 161 yards, scoring two touchdowns and a two point try in the process.

The Lions got their first and only break in the contest midway of the first quarter following the Lions' first possession of the ball. Plains kicked off to Ozona and the Lions, running from their T formation, sent Sutton for seven on the first play, but two plays later the Lions still needed two and Sutton dropped back to kick 38 yards to Ray Faught on the Cowboy 15.

Faught used poor judgement in trying to field the kick and was hit, and lost possession of the ball all about the same time, with Jim Doran covering the ball for Ozona.

Billy Bob Holden got 12 yards on a slant play, and two plays later Sutton rode a good block at right guard to score the game's first (Continued on Page Four)

#### THE REAL RED AGENTS

What sort of people are we harboring over here in this land of the free, etc.

A magazine comes out with an article describing a nuclear powered airplane, complete with "artist's conception," which the magazine claims the Russians are flying around Moscow. Nobody in the government has any comment, at least for the first week or so that the news is headlined by various of the so-called commentators and news analysts. Then one lone expert gives out that so far as the governments observers and intelligence service, etc. know the Russians are not flying such a plane. But, they said, "They probably will beat us doing so."

Comes again some space signal observer or other and opines that the Russians have fired a space rocket out beyond the moon or around it. Said they heard a strange signal — checked it three days. Says an aviation company signal section they heard a strange noise for fifteen minutes. Couldn't identify. And the headlines and the same analysts and commentators make a big noise of it for several days. Finally some timid soul in the government ventures the opinion that the signal might have come from somewhere on earth.

Seems the Russians can get a flood of "scarce America" publicity right here in this country without turning a hand at the task. Hubert Humphrey, the Minnesota liberal Democrat, has just had dinner at the Kremlin and a chat with Khrushchev. He's already hinting at how much danger we face in Berlin. Wait until Dave Garraway has him on his TV show.

#### IN A YEAR OF Consistent Republican Defeat, our incorruptible Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has won what may well be the most important election since the New Deal's inauguration of crop controls and price supports back in the '30's. #### "YELLOW DOG" IN REVERSE

People who have reached middle age will remember the old "yellow dog" contracts. Under them, employers forced workers to guarantee that they wouldn't join a union. If these workers did join, they were summarily fired.

The unions fought hard against these contracts, and public opinion was back of them. Many years ago the contracts were outlawed, as they should have been. There's no room for this kind of coercion in a free country.

But now we have "yellow dog" contracts in reverse. They are found in compulsory unionism (the union shop) which forces a man to join and remain a member of a union in order to hold his job. And there's no room for this kind of coercion in a free country either.

Compulsory unionism is just as bad as compulsory non-unionism. The right of people to join or not join a union or any other organization, as they choose, should be established as an absolutely basic and irrevocable right. Right-to-work laws — now in effect in 18 states, with several more states due to vote on them in November — provide the answer.

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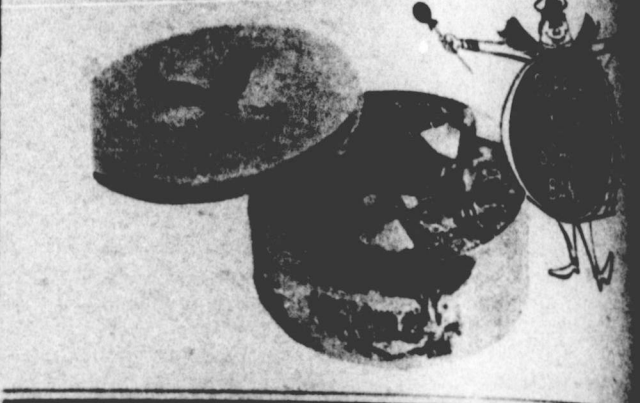
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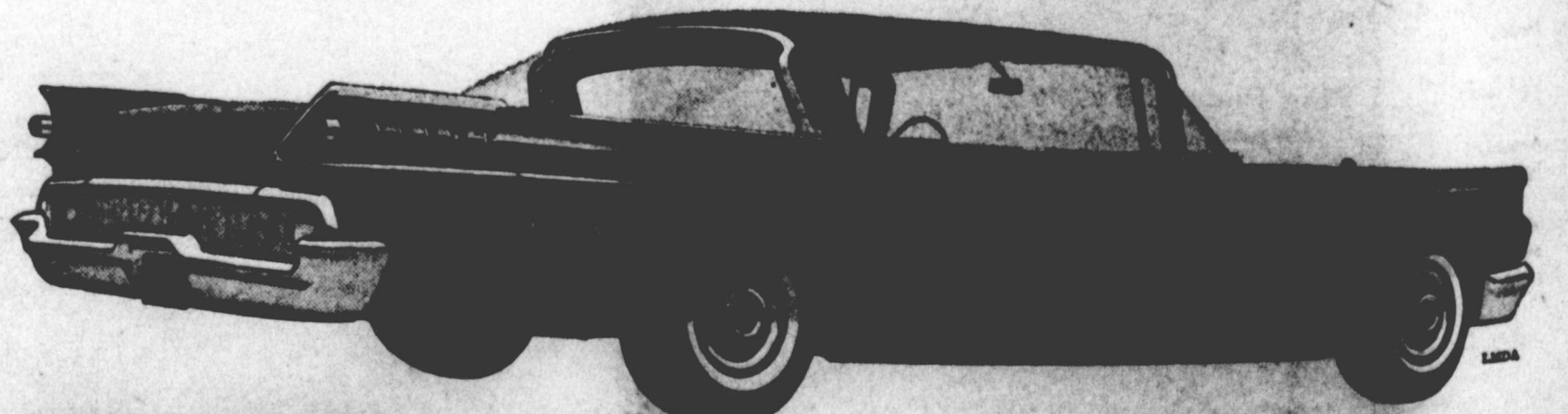

touchdown. The Lions were ready to kick the extra point but a bad snap wrecked whatever play was intended, and the Lions led 6 to 0.

Plains bounced right back following the kickoff as Marrow and quarterback Don Williams started a tatum at the Lion forward wall that carried to the Ozona 46 where a fine block at the line of scrimmage and a deliberate clip in the path of the ball carrier sent Marrow 46 yards for the score. Marrow tried to run over the extra point but was stopped short and the score remained 6 to 6.

Ozونا came out of its T formation and went into the spread following the end of the first quarter and the Plains team was caught flat footed. Sutton exploded up the middle for 32 yards and then Jones got four and Sutton picked up nine for the first down, before a jump pass to Holden covered the remaining distance for the T. D.

The Lions were detected moving in the backfield and a five yard penalty rubbed out the play, marking the first penalty of the game despite a great deal of clipping, slugging, and piling on being carried out by the Plains crew right under the eyes of the happy-go-lucky officials, who considered a back moving a foot illegally to be a far greater crime than slugging a ball carrier once he was down.

The Lions did not let the penalty stop the drive, however, as they moved to the fourteen before Plains' Jim Williams intercepted an Ozona pass in the end zone to halt the threat.

B. B. Ingham and Jim Freeman crashed through to spill Williams on passing efforts for losses of three and five yards and Marrow kicked to Sutton.

The Lions stormed back in a hurry. Holden almost had Sutton's pass near the end zone before it slipped away, but the Lions, with Sutton and Jones carrying, moved the ball to the one foot line before a fumble went all the way out of the back of the end zone to nullify the effort.

This time the Plains team mounted a drive that carried 80 yards for a score but had to have lady luck with it to do so.

After reaching the ten yard line, Ray Faught started to sweep Ozona's right end and was hit hard, fumbled, and the ball rolled into

the end zone and squarely to Plains' center, Vernon Ethridge, who covered the ball for the score.

An effort to get two on a pass was foiled by Bob Meinecke who intercepted for Ozona.

That score wound up the first half and the Lions went to the rest period trailing 12 to 6 but could have been leading 24 to 12 just as easily.

The Lions kicked off to Plains to start things in the third quarter and once again lady luck reached down and gave Plains a big hand.

Marrow took Sutton's kick but was greeted hard by Joe McMullan, Tommy Porter and B. B. Ingham on the 25 and the ball squirted to the 30 and landed squarely in the arms of a Plains player on the 30 yard line.

From the 30 the Cowboys did not need any help and pushed into the end zone from the one following a drive that covered 70 yards and consumed 9 minutes of the third period. Marrow added the game deciding two points and the Plains team seemed to be safely ahead 20 to 6.

Sutton wasted little time getting the Lions back into contention as he followed up a good kickoff return by Diz Reeves with a 73 yard jaunt that featured speed plus bruising power to rack up a Lions score.

Sutton took the snap and got a good block at the line of scrimmage to pop up the middle where he floored the Plains left linebacker, took advantage of a good block on the safety man and ran over the right half to break into the open.

The cut to the right gave the Plains right corner man a shot at him but Sutton was not in a mood to be caught and the race was a futile one for the Plains defender.

The Lions once again faked a kick with the apparent intention to pass, but the play was rushed badly and never got off the ground.

Ozونا struck again in the latter part of the third quarter as Sutton found Holden open down the side line and threw a perfect touchdown peg to the Lion fullback but the flag was down, and the play rubbed out.

The fourth quarter saw both teams surge goalward only to be stopped by savage line play, but the Lions got the best of the in-fighting and the play gradually moved the Cowboys back with the Lions finally reaching the Plains two yard line with three minutes to go, but here once again the

Lions ran into trouble.

Sutton ran to his left and then decided to pass and Williams once again intercepted for Plains in the end zone.

Fans began to leave, thinking the Cowboys would control the ball, but with ten seconds to go Ozona stalled the Cowboys on their own 43 and took the ball on downs.

Sutton, once again looking like Norm Van Brocklin, sent a beautiful strike to Holden who took the heave on the fourteen and raced over for the score. Holden was covered by two Plains backs both of whom were within two yards of the receiver, but the ball was looped perfectly to Holden who took it over his shoulder like a pro and raced into the end zone to stun the crowd.

With the Lions leading on penetrations, yardage gained, and the first downs tied, the Lions were now in striking distance of a win if they could make two points. But it was not to be, and the game ended 20 to 18.

The Lions had ended a highly successful season on a high note. The game was a credit to Ozona in every respect, and all of Ozona has every right to be proud of the 1958 Ozona Lion football team.

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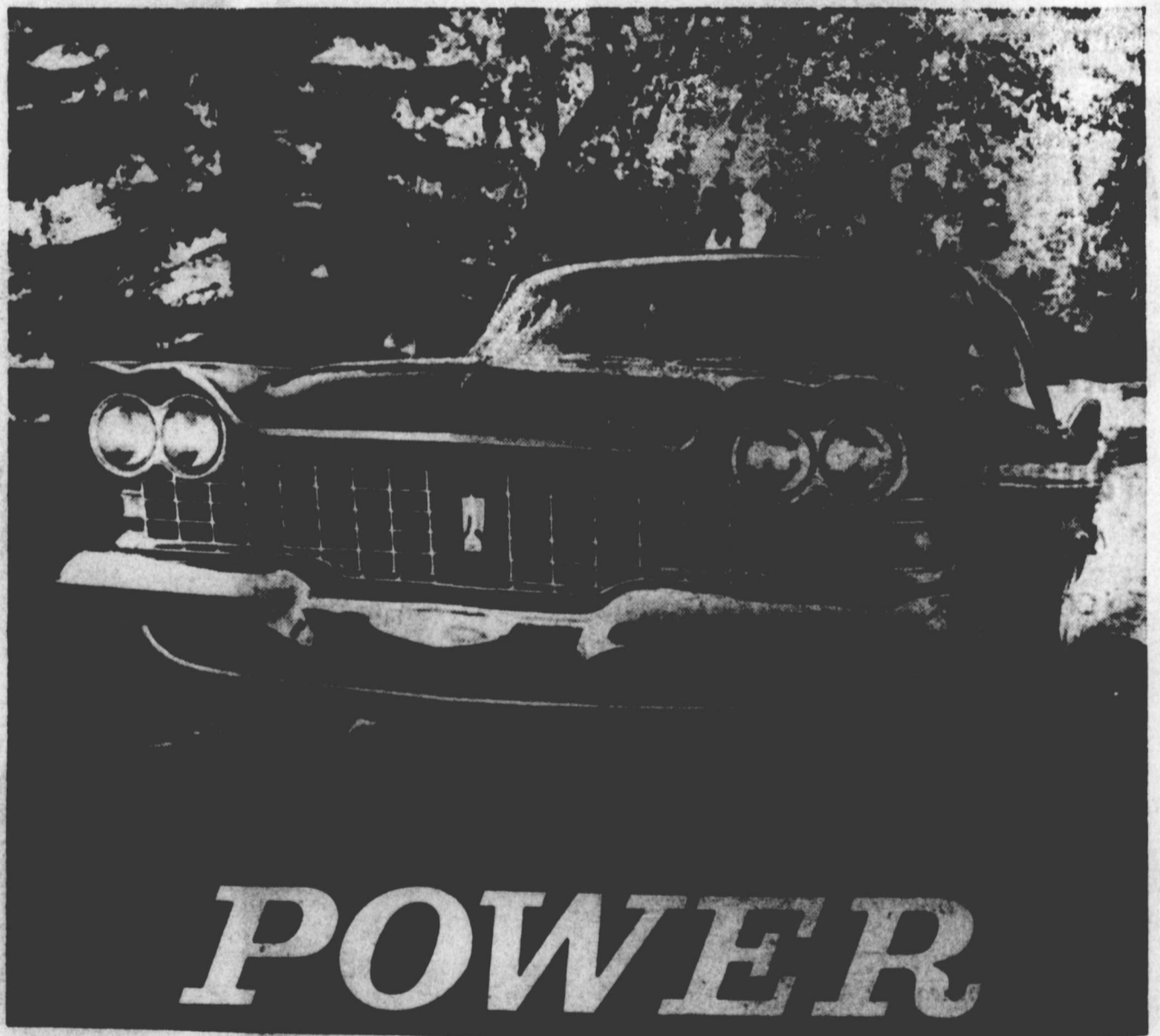
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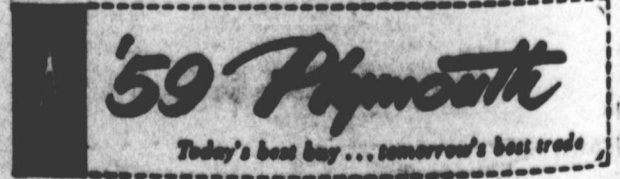

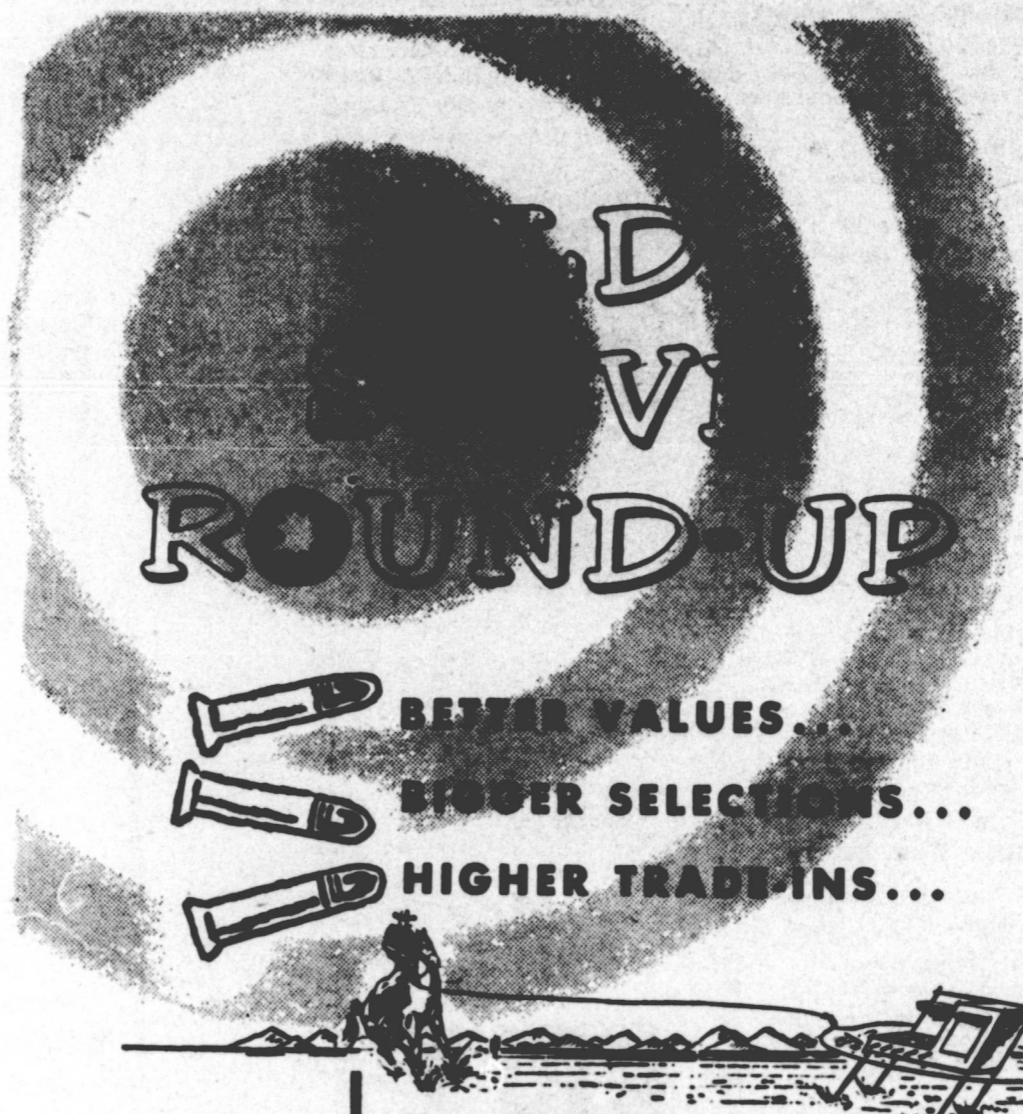
